They found that the evergreens add much to the home's attractiveness during the winter when the other shrubs have lost their leaves. 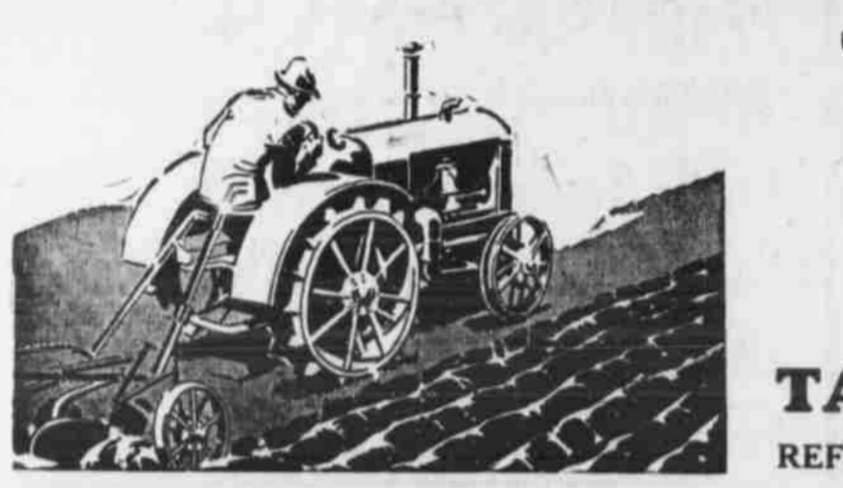

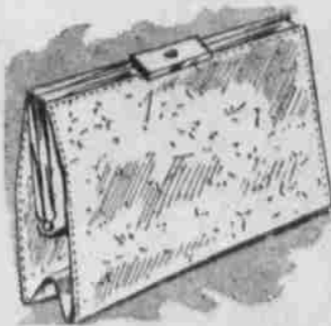

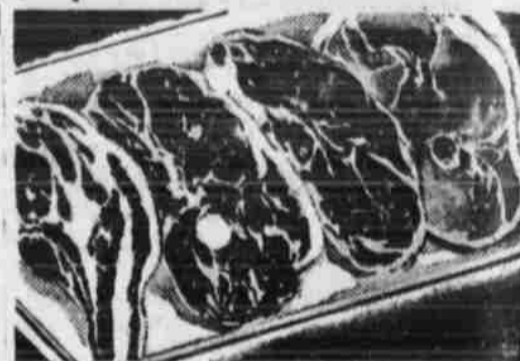
