## Appointment As Manager Approved

H. (Dick) Carl was informed Monday through the administrative office of the REA, Washington, that his appointment as manager of the Lamb County Rural Electrification Cooperative had been officially approved.

Carl came to Littlefield in 1938 from New Mexico, where he had been employed in construction work, and assumed the position as line man for the local branch of the REA, which position he held until his enlistment in the Navy, February 24, 1942.

He spent three and a half years in the service, most of which time he spent in the Pacific theatre of war.

During this time he participated in 32 bombardments, among which were the invasions of Tarawa, Iwo Jima, Wake and Marcus, as well as sea and air attacks. The cruiser on which he was serving was torpedoed at Guadalcanal.

Following his release from the service in October, 1945, Carl returned to his position as line foreman for the REA here, and on March 15 of last year he was advanced to the position of acting manager.

Carl is young, alert and capable and since his association with the REA as acting manager, the association has continued to go forward in every phase of the work.

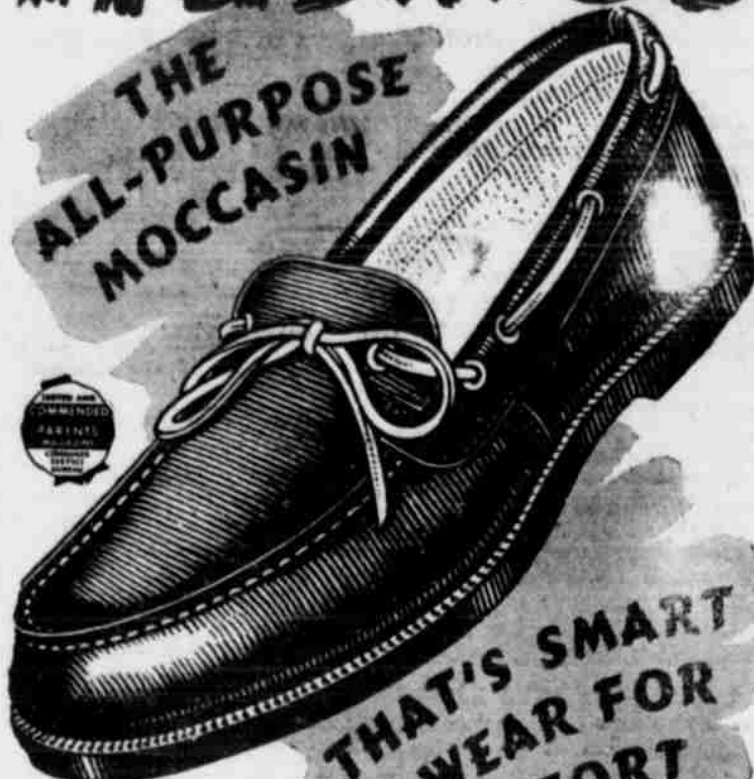

**With Land Bank Since 1935**

### Only Six Days Remain in Which To File Claims

Only six days remain for eligible survivors of veterans who died after their discharge from the armed forces and before August 10, 1946, to file their claims for social security benefits payable back to the time of the veteran's death. These World War I veterans' survivors who may qualify should apply for benefits at once to avoid possible loss of money, Elliott Adams, manager of the Lub-

bock office of the Social Security Administration, warns.

The 1946 veterans' amendment to the Social Security Act provides monthly cash benefits for dependents of ex-servicemen who died or will die, within three years after discharge, leaving their survivors without compensation or pensions from the Veterans Administration.

Survivors of ex-servicemen who died before enactment of the amendment on August 10, 1946, were given six months in which to apply for benefits payable back to the date of the veteran's death. That six-month period expires on February 10. Social security benefits generally are payable retroactively for a maximum period of three months prior to the time claim is filed.

"Applications under the veterans' amendment have been far fewer in this area and nationally than was expected," Mr. Adams said. "It is possible that a number of eligible persons have failed to apply for their benefits." They should seek information at once on their possible benefits at the nearest social security office. The office for this area is at 1311 Texas Avenue, Lubbock.

Benefits may be payable to children under 18 and the widows taking care of them, to widows 65 years of age or older, or, in some cases, to aged dependent parents.

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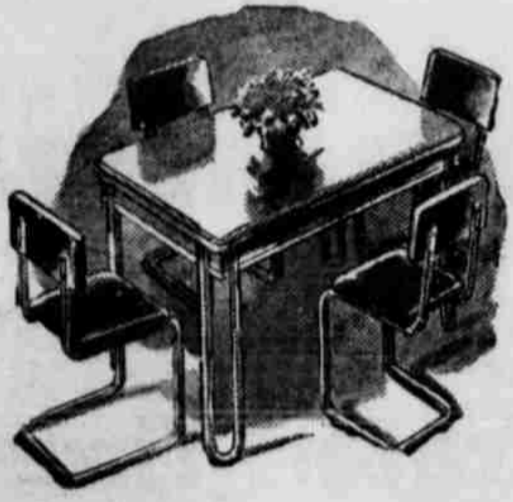

**Contact State Committee on Water Control Now, Says Plains Water Association Leader**

"It's time for positive and prompt action and there's something definite which land owners can now do to forestall legislation in Texas on ground water control," said W. O. Fortenberry of Monroe, president of the High Plains Water Use and Conservation association. "Legislation has now been introduced in the Legislature, House Bill No. 80, and this legislation has been referred to the House Committee on State Affairs."

"Fortenberry urges that those who have contacts with any of the members of this committee or with influential friends in their districts write or wire immediately stating the position of citizens of this area on ground water legislation. We feel that there is not yet enough dependable information on which to base any ground water legislation," said Fortenberry. "Although this bill refers only to five Winter Garden area counties, it sets a dangerous precedent, in that it declares water underground in that area property of the State of Texas. It is only a short step to declaring that water, oil, gas and other minerals in that or other parts of the state are state property."

This is contradictory to the long Texas law and tradition that land and everything below it is the property of the title holder.

"The caption of this bill," said Fortenberry, "states that it is an act declaring the waters of underground streams, channels, artesian basins, reservoirs, lakes and other bodies of water in the ground, lying and being situated in the area to be the property of the State of Texas and the right to the use thereof to be acquired by appropriation and not otherwise."

Fortenberry said that the House State Affairs committee is composed of Bell of DeWitt, chairman; Crosswait, Dallas, vice-chairman; Brooks of Beaumont, Colson of Navasota, Crawford of Palacios, Hannah of Dallas, Heflin of Houston, Lanier of Marquez, Lehman of Giddings, Lock of Lufkin, Murphy of Houston, Sallas of Crockett, Smith of Hays, Sparks of Sherman, Suiter of Winnsboro, Storey of Longview, Swanson of Tyler, Wallace of Fort Worth, Whitworth of Smithville, Williams of Scurry and Williams of Bexar.

**Remains World War II Dead Due to Arrive in August**

The tentative date for the return of the first remains of America's World War II dead from temporary military cemeteries is August, 1947, Colonel E. V. Macatee, Commanding Officer of the San Antonio General Depot, has been notified.

The preliminary operational schedules prepared by the office of the Quartermaster General contemplates that those who fell at Pearl Harbor and other armed forces personnel who now rest in seven cemeteries in Hawaii will reach the San Francisco Port of Embarkation about August 18. Those who are buried in the Henri Chapelle temporary cemetery in Belgium are scheduled to arrive at New York about August 25.

Only the remains of those whose return is requested by next of kin will be brought back to the United States for final burial in either a private cemetery or a National Cemetery, Major T. B. Larkin, the Quartermaster General of the Army, said in announcing the tentative schedule.

**Texas A & M to Study Irrigation On High Plains**

In answer to many requests from farmers, county agent and others interested in irrigation on the High Plains, Texas A&M College Agricultural Experiment Station will initiate a study of the organization and operation of irrigated farms on the High Plains in the next few days, according to Assistant County Agent W. K. Frey.

The study, Frey says, is for the purpose of developing information pertaining to irrigation practices, related production, and production requirements. Frey says it should be clearly understood that this is strictly an economic study, and has nothing whatever to do with current agitation for legislation to control water use on the High Plains.

The study was planned several years back, but due to the war, and lack of personnel, money, and facilities,

Use Association, and the High Plains Water Conservation and Use Administration has given the study his endorsement, and feels that it holds promise of considerable benefits to irrigation farmers in this area.

Frey says the Lamb County water conservation and Use Association will be contacted immediately for recommendations as to which farmers in Lamb County will be cooperators in the proposed study.

**Cull Poultry Carefully**  
 Every year a lot of money invested in poultry raising brings in on re- because poultry flocks are not fully culled—and every year a hard work gets no results and upon tons of feed are wasted. Poultry raisers do not keep flocks effectively culled. Every hen that does not lay more than enough eggs to pay for her feed should be culled out of the flock. All such hens are good

for is to increase the cost of producing eggs.  
 Any time is a good time to cull. A lot of good poultrymen cull from day to day and from week to week. At feeding time they pick up any bird in the pen that shows signs of poor production. This is a good practice.  
 If farmers will cull their flocks every week until all diseased birds are removed, this will save the young chicks that are being raised this year from contacting many common diseases.  
 There are farmers in Lamb County that buy 200 baby chicks each year but never sell a culled hen. Why buy baby chicks and give them a

chance to contact the disease that may be prevented by culling.  
**Locker Plant vs. Farm Freezer**  
 Whether to buy a home freezer or rent space in a community food locker—that's a question that many frozen-food conscious farm families are trying to decide now.  
 A good answer to that riddle for an average family of four is a combination of both sides of the question, a combining rented locker space with a small home freezer of about six cubic feet is a solution that appears to strike a good balance between cost and convenience.  
 Here's how it is figured: A six-cubic-foot home cabinet with separate freezing compartment will provide enough space for freezing and storing those fruits and vegetables that are brought in each day, until they are ready to be taken to the locker. And when the growing season is over, the cabinet furnishes plenty of storage space for a number of packages of each type of frozen food, as well as space for left-over and cooked foods. Assuming that such a home freezer would last ten years, and figuring in the purchase price and operating costs, a six cubic foot box will

compiled the material in the booklet say that it is a simple means of putting down on paper the family's ideas of what they want to do on the farm and in the home. Such plans should be written down, so the family will have a guide in carrying out ideas. A farm and home plan can help the family provide for such a thing as a farm or ranch free of debt; comfort and security in old age; adequate food for the family; improved soil fertility and a high production level.  
 Space is provided in the booklet for setting down ideas to be carried out in the future, and jobs one as plans are completed. Instructions are given and scaled pages provided for making maps helpful in re-arranging the layout of the farm and farmstead.
