



#### Well-Built House Can Always Be Made Over

The well-built home of another eraobsolete only because of the omission of moving features and interior equipment which have come within the last few years to be adopted as necessary, offers to the owner or the build er a fertile field for the exercise of an interesting and profitable hopby in adding or removing features which make or detract from the modernity of the house.

Among the additions possible is that of the second floor sleeping porch, which may economically be built where a first floor projection extends beyond the body of the house

This makes necessary the removal of the slanting roof of the projection, if there is one; the construction of a room by erecting glazed walls, construction of a roof and enlarging a window to make room for a connect-

The sleeping porch may also be added by supporting it outside the main body of the house over an open porch or a rear terrace, but this method makes the heating rather difficult unless the unprotected floor be well

Should it be decided to place the addition over an attached garage it is advisable to put sheet metal or some dense material in the floor so that the gasoline fumes will not penetrate to the sleeping porch.

Probably the most important consideration in the construction of the windows to be used.

There are many types of patented bardware for windows which will permit of the entire unit of windows being folded up to one side, but the usual prastice is to put the type used for the remainder of the house.

Steel casements are economical for this use and have the further advantage of ease of construction, which is a paramount consideration if the work is to be done by the home craftsman. They are simply placed by screwing into the wood framing and caulking the joints with a plastic compound prepared for the purpose,

#### Tree Has Many Good Qualities for Garden

The Mayday tree is recommended to garden-makers who live in states where the number of good flowering trees is limited. This tree is an early flowering wild cherry, the native home of which is Manchuria. It is one of the first of the bud cherries to bloom. producing its flowers in pure white recemes, which make a handsome ap-

pearance and are very fragrant.

The somewhat drooping habit of the racemes makes them particularly appealing. This tree can be used to advantage as a lawn specimen, but is hardy and sturdy enough to be planted in rows to serve as a wind-break The small fruit seems to have an unusual attraction for the birds.



FAVOR SOY BEANS FOR DAIRY COW

#### Equal to Linseed Oilmeal as Protein Supplement.

Soy beans provide an excellent proteln supplement for use in the grain ration for dairy cattle. Numerous experiments conducted by some of the eading experiment stations have proved ground say beans to be equal to linseed offment as a protein supplement in the dairy ration. Usually high protein feeds such as linseed oilmeal, cottonseed meal and corn gluten feed are high in price and if dairymen would grow more soy beans it would make them more independent of these high-priced protein feeds and insure a greater dairy income.

In feeding trials conducted at the Purdue university agricultural experlment station in 1923 comparing ground soy beans with linseed oilmeal, soy beans proved to be equal to linseed oilmeal as a protein supplement for dalry cattle when fed in the grain ration of corn and oats.

Experiments conducted at the Purdue and South Dakota stations comparing soy bean hay with alfalfa hay, soy bean hay was found to be practically equal to alfalfa hay when fed

to dalry cattle. Trials conducted at the Iowa station in 1922 in comparing ground soy beans with linseed oilmeal, as a proteln supplement for the dairy ration, the ground soy beans proved to be worth \$60 per ton when old process linseed oilmenl was selling for \$45 per ton. In other words, the ground soy beans fed as a protein supplement to the basal grain ration of

mere than the linseed oliment. As a roughage for general herd feeding, good quality soy bean hay has proved to be just as good as at falfa hay in the Purdue dairy herd the last winter. In fact we think so much of the bean hay that this year we will have 75 tons for winter feeding .- J. H. Hilton, Purdue university.

#### Figures Tell Story of

Dairy Herd Improvement Figures from more than 100,000 individual yearly records from cows on test in dairy herd improvement assoclations in the United States indicate that, on the average, cows producing 100 pounds of butterfat a year returned but \$14 over the cost of feed.

Cows that produced 200 pounds of butterfat returned \$54 above feed costs; those producing 300 pounds returned \$96; the 400-pound producers returned \$138; and the cows of 500 pounds butterfat production returned \$178 above feed costs. Thus the man milking a 500-pound producer would have more net return than if he milked a dozen cows producing only 100 pounds of butterfat. This would take no account of the added labor of milking and caring for the larger herd or of the much greater expense of providing stable room for a herd fusiend of a sing'e r

The production Spures used in this entculation were obtained by the United States Department of Agriculture from the cow-testing associations of the country and the returns from butterfat are based on farm prices reported from all parts of the country.

It seems that lice prefer the less thrifty calves and on these they multiply and feed until the calf stops growing, loses weight and has very little resistance left.

It should be clear that after giving cow the first half of a full ration necessary to keep her alive, and after giving her barn room, running the risk of her dying, and doing chores for her the year around, it is the poorest posthie economy not to give her the sec end haif of a full ration, which she will use in producing milk.


