

Standing only a few miles off-shore, the Iowa hurled more than 200 tons of flaming projectiles at war factories.

A few days before this crowning achievement in her wartime career, the Iowa's big guns wrecked the port and industrial city of Muroran on Hokkaido, northernmost of Japan's large islands.

Since she was launched nine months after Pearl Harbor, the big battleship has taken part in virtually all naval action in the islandto-island conquest of Jap-held Pacific territory. She was in on initial strikes at the Marshalls, air strikes at Truk, the Carolines, Marianas, Formosa, New Guinea, actions in the Philippines and at Okinawa.




