## ABOUT 1,500 ATTEND ROPING CONTESTS AT SANDERS FARM

### Outstanding And Enjoyable Program Is Staged Here

Pearson, Andrews, Roddy Petree, Fields Make First Places In Sunday's Show

One of the most outstanding and enjoyable events ever to be staged in Littlefield was the roping program put on at the Ernest Sanders farm Sunday afternoon, which was attended by about 1500 people, and which was sponsored by the Littlefield Roping Club.

Visitors from considerable distance came to Littlefield Sunday to enjoy the cowboy program, including residents from Levelland, Enochs, Bula, Olton, etc., and did the ropers and cowboys, most of whom were locals, put on a show! The highest of compliments have been passing up and down the main street about the fast ropers and the fine horses.

One attendant reported to the Leader like this: "It sure was real entertainment. I never saw faster ropers—those boys sure have something there—and they had as fine horses to perform as there are anywhere."

In the first event in which 15 ropers took part, the winners were: Sid Pearson of Levelland, time 13.7 seconds; Linol Thomas of Levelland, 17.5 seconds; Red Truett of Bula, third place, time 18.5 seconds.

The second event of the show was a matched roping between Jack Andrews of Anton and Red Truett of Bula, at which Andrews' time on four calves was 72.5 seconds, and Red's time was 77.4 seconds on four calves.

The third event was a jackpot roping between 23 ropers, and the three winners were: Roddy at time of 18.2 seconds; John Roberts of Levelland in time of 18.5 seconds; and the third place in the contest was made by Jack Andrews of Anton, whose time was 23.1 seconds.

The fourth event was another matched roping between Jack Vann of Hart Camp and Andrew Petree, who were to rope four calves each. However, they did not go to a finish, as Jack Vann on his second calf hurt his leg, and Petree was adjudged the winner as he made the fastest time on the first two calves.

### Wednesday Hottest Day Of Past Week; Temperature 101

Yesterday was the hottest day for the past week with the thermometer at the West Texas Gas company registering 101 degrees after lunch. ### Gov. Stevenson And Lt. Gov. Lee Smith Win

Governor Coke Stevenson's vote Tuesday surged farther ahead than 632,786 ballots of the 751,022 while the election bureau listed Gov. John Lee Smith as a main winner with a majority of 144 over three opponents. Attached in run-offs were incumbent Grover Sells and State Senator E. Martin of Fort Worth for Attorney General, and Judge Richard Critz and Col. Gordon Simpson for the Supreme Court post held by Critz. Complete returns from the 13th district today showed Rep. Ed Gossett had won Democratic renomination by 365 votes over State Senator George Moffett of Guadalupe in only one of 17 Texas Congress-

sional contests which had remained in doubt. The Texas Election bureau in a special tabulation gave Gossett 24,836 votes to 24,467 for Moffett, and said that while the official canvass next Saturday might show a change, it was not likely to. Windup figures by the bureau on Texas' Democratic first primary election showed renomination (in election tantamount to election) of 16 Congressmen, four of them unopposed. Rep. Richard Kleberg was posed. Rep. Richard John Lyle, Army officer in Italy; Judge J. M. Combs of Beaumont won the seat vacated by Rep. Martin Dies, and three Congressional races were left for decision in the August 26 runoff.

Coke Stevenson And George Mahon Easily Win Over Opponents

In the election held Saturday, voting was heavy in the Littlefield boxes, but light over Lamb county, about 2900 votes being cast, with 4189 poll taxes paid, including exemptions.

An unusual incident is that there will be no run-off in any county office.

Sheriff Sam Hutson was re-elected sheriff. According to the latest report obtainable he received 1865 votes. His opponent, G. M. Vann, received 1060.

In the County Clerk race, Miss Treva Jennings carried the election with 1571 votes. Her opponents were: Roy Granbery who received 724 votes, and B. B. Ivie 571.

In the other county offices, in which the present officials had no opposition, and who are returned for another two years, are:

Judge I. B. (Doc) Holt, who received 2799 votes; County Attorney E. S. Rowe, who received 2799 votes; Clerk of the District Court, Herbert Dunn, for whom 2802 ballots were cast; Assessor-Collector Frank Cummings, for whom 2810 votes were cast; and County Treasurer, Ann Blythe, who received 2807 votes.

Precinct No. 3 was the only precinct in the county in which there was opposition offered. E. C. Ross opposed the present incumbent, W. E. Bentley, for the office of Commissioner, and won the race. Mr. Ross is reported to have polled 619 votes as against Mr. Bentley's 605. The balance of the commissioners who had no opposition, and will continue to serve in the county are: Precinct No. 1—H. R. Hysinger; (Continued on Back Page)

### Mahon Re-elected As Congressman From 19th District

Reported To Have Margin Of Two To One On Unofficial Returns

Congressman George Mahon was nominated to a sixth term as congressional representative from the 19th Texas district by a margin of almost exactly two to one over his opponent, C. L. Harris, Lubbock Attorney, in Saturday's democratic Primary.

On the basis of almost complete, but unofficial returns, the totals showed: Mahon 28,167 and Harris 14,490. These returns included complete counts from about 21 of the 25 counties in the district.

Congressman Mahon again apparently carried every county in the district, repeating his achievement of 1940, when Harris also sought the office. Harris, however, at that time received a substantially larger, and Mahon a considerably smaller vote in Saturday's primary than in 1940. The vote in the 1940 contest was Mahon 50,026, and Harris 9,784; M. D. Ramsey of Floyd county, a third entry in the race, received 6,352 votes. Rep. Mahon had no opposition two years ago.

## Farm Safety Week From July 23 to 29

July 23 to 29 has been set aside as Farm Safety Week by presidential proclamation.

As many man-days are lost every year through farm accidents as would be required to produce two and one-quarter times the entire annual wheat crop of the United States. More than 18,500 farm family members were killed in 1941 in preventable accidents. This number is greater than those in any of the five major branches of industry. Motor vehicles and farm machinery killed more than 8,000 farm residents last year. Accidents involving farm animals ran a close second to machinery in causing fatalities.

Unsafe conditions and unsafe practices were responsible for most of them—conditions which must be remedied, practices which must be avoided, if the American farmer is to do his part of the tremendous job of winning the war.

No farm can be made 100 per cent accident-proof. But hazards of machinery and equipment, of falls and burns, can be minimized through care and thoughtfulness. Here are some of the things the farmer should do to make his farm as safe as possible: Keep guards in place on power shafts, belts and chains to prevent being caught in them; block machinery and turn off the power before adjusting or unclogging it; keep children away from machinery. Slow your tractor to four and one-half miles per hour (a fast walk) before using brakes, then apply brakes smoothly and evenly. Store gasoline outdoors or in a special isolated building, using bright red containers.

Be careful not to surprise animals when approaching them. Keep the bull in a safe pen and use a staff to lead him. Have cattle dehorned and cut the boar's tusks short. Keep small children away from pens and barns.

Keep hammer and axe handles secure; have a definite place for every tool when not in use. Stroke from behind when whetting tools to avoid cutting the hand if blade moves to far forward. Keep ladders and steps in good repair and use a handrail on stairways. Equip all electric circuits with proper size fuses.

Avoid over-exposure to the sun, and avoid heat collapse by drinking plenty of water and taking plenty of salt. Avoid open fields and lone trees in thunderstorms. Provide adequate fire-fighting apparatus, know first aid and keep a first aid kit.

## Cable Rates To Prisoners \$6.00 Plus 10% Tax

Mrs. A. H. McFarland, Chairman War Home Service, stated Saturday that anyone wishing to send prisoners of war packages may obtain boxes suitable and of uniform size at the local Red Cross office; that these are expected here in a couple of weeks. She pointed out, however, that labels will be needed before boxes may be sent.

American Prisoners of War and civilian internees held by Japan were reduced to a flat rate of \$6.00 plus 10 per cent tax. Each cable message may contain ten words of text exclusive of the name of the addressee and sender, as well as other identifying data.

Sometime ago the State Department is reported to have received a message from the Japanese Government stating that the Japanese were prepared to send a vessel to Vladivostok, to pick up relief supplies for prisoners of war, and civilian internees. The Soviet Government is cooperating and had named a convenient Soviet Pacific port adjacent to Vladivostok where relief supplies might be picked up by a Japanese ship. It is hoped, therefore, that supplies which were stored there for sometime may now have been released and distributed.

Messages Handled By Red Cross

More than 2,000 messages per work day between residents in America and civilians in enemy or enemy-occupied countries were handled last year by the Red Cross Home Service Inquiry Unit. During the first three months of this year 157,607 messages were exchanged through the Red Cross.

This message service and a similar service maintained by the Vatican and the Roman Catholic Church are the only recognized legal means of communicating with civilians in enemy-held territory. Red Cross messages originating in this country are made out on forms available at all Red Cross chapters. They are limited to 25 words and may not mention politics, the war, business or financial matters. All messages go to Red Cross National Headquarters, Washington, D. C., and are cleared through the Office of Censorship.

They are then sent to the International Red Cross Committee in Geneva, Switzerland, where they are again censored. The International Red Cross Committee then forwards the messages to the Red Cross societies of the countries of destination for delivery.

The average time required to get an answer to a message to Europe is nine months. Delivery is often delayed because of deportation, shifting population, and other upheavals resulting from war, but every possible effort is made to get the message through. As already stated, this service is available through all Red Cross chapters and has been used by many persons in rural areas of the United States who have relatives in the old country.

Social Security Representative To Visit Here Aug. 16

Sometimes young widows, aged parents, and orphans do not know they are eligible for benefits and lose money through delay in filing their claims.

In addition to the monthly old-age benefits payable to the insured worker himself at age 65 or after, the Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance system provides for monthly benefits to members of his family. Benefits are also payable to his family at his death, whatever his age.

Benefits totaling over 16 million dollars a month were in force at the end of 1943 for almost 900,000 beneficiaries. The sharpest increase in number was in widow's benefits, which rose 62 per cent.

A safe rule is this: When in doubt about your right to old-age and survivors insurance benefits, visit the local office of the Social Security Board. No matter where you live, you're probably not very far from a Social Security Board field office or from one of its part-time service points.

The Social Security Board field office servicing this area is located at 1311 Texas Avenue, Lubbock.

A representative from the Lubbock Social Security Board office will be in Littlefield every third Wednesday afternoon, when he may be contacted at the post office. His next visit will be August 16.

The Pantex Ordnance Plant was constructed in 1942 as one of the Government-owned facilities for loading ammunition for our Armed Forces. Ground was broken on March 27, 1942, by the Freese and Nichols and McKenzie Construction company under supervision of the Corps of Engineers, and in the remarkably short time of five months and 21 days the load lines were ready to begin operations. Certain-ty Products Corporation, who had received on February 28, 1942, the contract for operating this Ordnance facility, was ready with the trained key personnel and the operating forces, and on September 17 the first bomb rolled off the production line. No other similar Ordnance facility in the country was put into production and met so quickly the urgent cry in the summer of 1942 for war supplies.

The commanding officer for this Government-owned, contractor-operated Ordnance facility is also the representative of the Army Ordnance contracting officer in Washington. He is assisted by a staff of Army officers and civilians in carrying out his responsibility to protect the interests of the Government.

The plant covers an area roughly four miles by six miles, located 17 miles northeast of Amarillo. There

are five production lines—three active bomb and shell loading lines, one inactive booster pelleting and assembly line, and one inactive Ammonium Nitrate line. The latter two lines have been inactive and have been held in a standby condition since April 30, 1943, and May 15, 1943, respectively.

Since the only reason for this plant and its operation is the furnishing of loaded ammunition to our Armed Forces, production schedules are directly affected by changes in

the military strategy and requirements of the Field Forces. They take pride in the fact that they have been able to meet their schedules and have furthermore developed improvements in bomb and shell loading procedures resulting in noteworthy reductions in cost and man hours.

I am about to dissolve completely and run down in my shoes. This is the winter season here and I am dreading to see summer come if it is any hotter than it is now. "There is not much that I can tell you that you would be interested in, except that I am somewhere in the jungles of New Guinea. I saw some of the New Guinea Fuzzy-Wuzzies yesterday and they were the filthiest looking humans I have ever seen. They are as black as the ace of spades and their hair is fuzzy and bushy, about six inches long and sticks up and out. They have some sort of dye they use and the top ends of their hair is a real bright red. They really look comical. They are very small in size, averaging about five feet six inches in height.

"Our camp is cut out of the jungle and is pretty dirty. It rains here practically every day and the ground stays pretty muddy. The soil is so rich that it stinks when it is turned.

It would be an ideal soil for cultivation. It is so hot that the ground gives off steam practically all the time. It is so humid that you can actually wring water out of your shirt in the morning when you get up.

"The chow situation at this camp is fairly good. I have eaten worse food in the states.

Don't think from the above that I am griping about any thing. I am just trying to tell you about our situation here. In fact, I will say that everything is really better than

I expected and I expect to make very best of it and do my best on every assignment given me. see you in about two years. Lots of Love, S. S.

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
