A field demonstration showing the High Plains Foundation Farming Systems will be held Tuesday afternoon August 31 on the Eldon Gohlke farm about six miles east of Littlefield. The demonstration, from 4 to 6 p.m., will be under the di-rection of Loyd Langford, associate agronomist at the High Plains Research Foundation.

Mr. Gohlke has set aside 30 acres on his farm, which is planted to two rows of cotton. skip one row, two rows of grain sorghum, skip one row, and two rows of cotton, with the pattern being repeated across the field. This system of farming was developed as a results years of research by the High Plains Research Foundation

This system of farming is designed to increase net returns per acre of land on less irrigation water. Additional benefits received are increased yields, improved cotton quality, reduced production costs, greater protection of crop and soil from wind damage, and increased soil organic matter over solid planting or skip-row planting of cotton.

Loyd Langford, Associate Agronomist, at the Foundation is working with 17 farmers on the High Plains, located from Tulia on the north to Seminole on the south, and Friona on the west to Ralls on the east. These demonstrations are composed of cotton skip-row and interplanted with grain sorghum, castorbeans, or soybeans.

Farmers selected to demonstrate the High Plains Foundation Farming System are part of an overall program to acquaint area farmers with this profitable method of farming. Reports at the High Plains Research Foundation show this system of farming to increase yields of grain sorghum up to 1500 pounds, castorbeans, 500 pounds, and cotton one-half bale per planted acre. The quality of cotton is improved and the crops are produced with at least Each of the field demonstrations are marked with an appropriate sign. All interested persons are welcome to visit the demonstration.



# Bones Determined

### To Be Indian

The whereabouts of Andrea Phares, who disappeared from her Hale County home ten years ago, remained a mystery Wednesday when the skelton dug up by four boys near Earth Monday proved to be that of an Indian.

Wednesday morning Lamb County Deputy Sheriff Earl Clark, EarthCityMarshalClarence Hazlett and Dr. C. Thomas Richardson returned to the scene of the discovery of the skelton and completed the excavation of the grave.


Included in the bones found yesterday were pieces of a thigh bone and arm bones, Clark stated that they were the bones of an Indian.
