Texas NYA Lowers Age Limit To 16

AUSTIN, December 9 — Unemployed boys and girls in Texas who are 16 years of age, out of school, in need and who want the work experience provided on National Youth Administration projects are now eligible for such employment.

With the minimum age requirement for work on NYA projects reduced from 17 to 16 years, approximately 127,000 Texas boys and girls become eligible for NYA employment, Kellam said.

City Dam Project And Clean-Up Started At Earth Last Week

The Earth Community Council met at the Earth Theatre Tuesday night of last week when committees were appointed for the starting of work on the City Dump ground project and clean-up drive.

Two or three acres of land, located about five miles away from the city, are to be bought or leased for 99 years to be used as a city dump.

A clean-up drive will be inaugurated in town and all trash and junk is to be removed from streets and alleys and hauled to the new dump ground.

One hundred dollars or more will be necessary to accomplish the project. The land is to be fenced, and lease or purchase money must be provided.

Grover Dennis, Pap Parish and L. G. Anglin named on a committee to raise the necessary funds, started work Wednesday morning. This is a community project and everyone who can is asked to contribute either money or labor to assist in the project.

The Community Park project was also discussed at the meeting.

BE IT REMEMBERED that on this 20th day of November, 1940, the Commissioner's Court of Lamb County, Texas, convened in special session held at the Court House in the City of Olton, Texas, and being the regular meeting place for said Court, there were present and in attendance the following members, namely: S. A. DOSS, COUNTY JUDGE, presiding; and, JACK CRAWFORD, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3; PAUL M. LEWIS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2; G. M. VANN, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3; M. D. ABBOTT, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 4.

and, among other proceedings had, were the following: There came on to be heard and considered the petition of Pat Boone and more than fifty (50) other persons, as resident property taxpayers voters of ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, praying this Court for an order for an election to determine the following proposition:

"WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of the said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A shall be issued in the principal sum of THREE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$300,000.00), for the purpose of constructing and maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, and which bonds are to bear interest at a rate not exceeding Four Per Centum (4%) per annum, and are to be issued in such denominations and payable at such times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioner's Court, but not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from the date thereof; and that at such election there shall also be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers voters of the said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, the question as to whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property within the said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, for the purpose of paying the interest on the said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption or payment thereof at maturity."

AND IT APPEARING to the Court that said petition was presented to this Court and filed with this Court, on the 4th day of November, 1940, and that it is duly signed by more than fifty (50) resident qualified property taxpayers voters of said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, OF LAMB COUNTY, IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court that on said date, to-wit: November 4, 1940, by order duly passed and entered of record, this Court set said petition down for hearing before the Commissioner's Court, at a session thereof, to be held in the Commissioner's Court Room in the Court House in the City of Olton, Texas, on the 20th day of November, 1940 at ten o'clock A. M., which was not less than fifteen (15) days nor more than thirty (30) days, from the date of the aforesaid order setting such petition down for hearing; and,

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court, from the evidence submitted, that notice of this hearing was thereupon given by the County Clerk in the time and manner required by law, and which notice informed all persons concerned of the time and place of such hearing, and of their right to appear at such hearing and contend for or protest the ordering of such bond election, and further, that the aforesaid notice also stated the amount of the bond proposed to be issued, and described the boundaries of said Road District, as such boundaries are described and defined in the order of this Court creating and establishing said Road District; and further, that the aforesaid notice also designated the road to be constructed and improved; and,

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court, and the Court so finds from the evidence submitted, that the Clerk of this Court, pursuant to the order setting said petition down for hearing, posted and published the notice of such hearing in the time and manner required by law; that said petition was presented to this Court and filed with this Court, on the 4th day of November, 1940, and that it is duly signed by more than fifty (50) resident qualified property taxpayers voters of said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, OF LAMB COUNTY, IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court that on said date, to-wit: November 4, 1940, by order duly passed and entered of record, this Court set said petition down for hearing before the Commissioner's Court, at a session thereof, to be held in the Commissioner's Court Room in the Court House in the City of Olton, Texas, on the 20th day of November, 1940 at ten o'clock A. M., which was not less than fifteen (15) days nor more than thirty (30) days, from the date of the aforesaid order setting such petition down for hearing; and,

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court, from the evidence submitted, that notice of this hearing was thereupon given by the County Clerk in the time and manner required by law, and which notice informed all persons concerned of the time and place of such hearing, and of their right to appear at such hearing and contend for or protest the ordering of such bond election, and further, that the aforesaid notice also stated the amount of the bond proposed to be issued, and described the boundaries of said Road District, as such boundaries are described and defined in the order of this Court creating and establishing said Road District; and further, that the aforesaid notice also designated the road to be constructed and improved; and,

by law; that is to say— (a) The County Clerk and Ex-Officio Clerk of the Commissioner's Court of Lamb County, Texas, executed said notice by posting true copies thereof in the following three public places within ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, to-wit: ONE COPY at Greer's Blacksmith Shop, Spade, Texas; ONE COPY at Rhoten's Grocery, Weeks & Bagwell Gin Community; and, ONE COPY at City Hall, Littlefield, Texas;

(b) That the said County Clerk also posted a true copy of such notice at the door of the County Courthouse of Lamb County, in the City of Olton, Texas;

(c) That each and all of the three copies of the notices of this hearing were posted by the County Clerk at the three public places in said Road District, above described, on the 4th day of November, 1940; that each of said places was a public place in said Road District; that each of the notices posted at such places was posted in a conspicuous position; that each of said places was accessible to the public; and that each of said notices so posted as to be easily visible to the public;

(d) That the copy of the notice of this hearing was posted by the County Clerk at the Courthouse door, as aforesaid, was posted on the 4th day of November, 1940, and that such notice was posted at said places so as to be easily visible to the public;

(e) That the said County Clerk also caused said notice of this hearing to be published in THE COUNTY WIDE NEWS, which is a newspaper of general circulation in the said County, and which said notice was published in said newspaper on the 7th day of November, 1940, which date was at least five days prior to the hearing set for the consideration of such petition.

AND WHEREAS, on the 20th day of November, 1940, and being the date fixed for hearing said petition, the same came on to be heard in due and regular order; and,

WHEREAS it appearing to the Court that if the said bonds are voted and issued, the money received from the sale thereof will be applied to the construction and maintenance of a road beginning at the east line of Lamb County and continuing in a northwesterly and westerly direction through the Town of Spade to the City of Littlefield, Texas, and thence from the City of Littlefield to the West Boundary Line of Lamb County;

AND NOW THEREFORE, on this 20th day of November, 1940, the Commissioner's Court of Lamb County, Texas, by reason of investigations carefully made, and from all facts found and evidence submitted at this hearing, finds, AND IT IS THE ORDER AND JUDGMENT OF THIS COURT:

(1) That the petition for said bond election is signed by more than fifty (50) of the resident qualified property taxpayers voters of ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation.

(2) That due notice of the hearing had on such petition has been issued, made and given in the time and form and manner required by law.

(3) That the proposed improvements will be for the benefit of all taxable property situated within the boundaries of said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS.

IT IS THEREFORE FURTHER CONSIDERED AND FOUND AND ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONER'S COURT OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS:

I. That an election shall be, and is hereby ordered to be held within ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, on the 21st day of December, 1940, and which date is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted: "WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of the said ROAD DISTRICT 1-A, shall be issued in the principal sum of THREE HUNDRED THOUSAND (\$300,000.00), for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, and which bonds are to bear interest at a rate not exceeding Four Per Centum (4%) per annum, and are to be issued in such denominations and payable at such times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioner's Court, but not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from the date thereof; and that at such election there shall also be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers voters of the said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, the question as to whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property within the said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, for the purpose of paying the interest on the said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity."

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED said election shall be held under provisions of the laws of the State of Texas, particularly Chapter of the General Laws of the Legislature, at its First Called Session in 1926.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED all persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and this County, and who are resident property taxpayers voters in ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, and who have duly rendered their property taxes at said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition issue the bonds shall have ten or printed on their ballots, words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF." And, those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

South Littlefield, VOTING PRECINCT NUMBER 12, at Methodist Church, J. T. Elms, Presiding Judge; Spade, VOTING PRECINCT NUMBER 3, at School Building, Lon Chamberlain, Presiding Judge; North Littlefield, VOTING PRECINCT NUMBER 16, at Gram School Building, M. P. Reed, Presiding Judge;

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the manner of holding election and canvassing and returning returns thereof, shall be governed by the General Laws of State, when not in conflict with provisions of Chapter 16 of General Laws passed by the Tenth-ninth Legislature, at its Called Session in 1926.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in THE COUNTY WIDE NEWS, a newspaper published in Lamb County, Texas, for three successive weeks before the date of the said election, and, in addition thereto, there shall be posted copies of this order at three public places in said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 1-A, and also at the door of the County Courthouse, in the City of Olton, Texas, and all which notices shall be posted three successive weeks prior to the election.

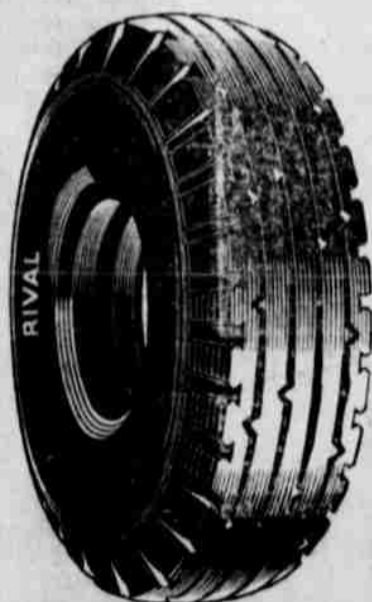

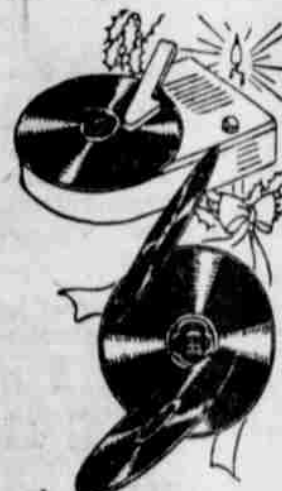

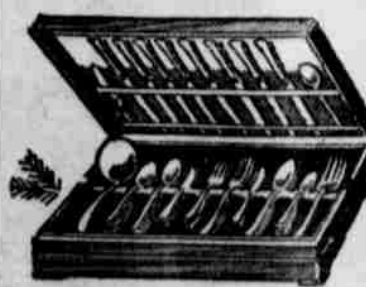

How the idea started—Christmas candles — Christmas tree candies date back to the very earliest times in the Christian era. The Yule candle of goodly size, lighted early in the evening, is a universal religious and national custom. Candle lighting featured the Norse mid-winter festival of the turning of the sun. The Jewish feast of Chanukah or lights is also celebrated similarly at the same season.

Christmas gifts — Romans exchanged gifts during gay celebrations. But giving presents of course goes back much earlier. The Romans, however, gave it clearer identity as a part of their festival program. Christmas boxes and cards of today have a link to the ancient Roman festivities. In France, gifts are distributed to children New Year's Eve instead of Christmas. In England, Germany, Italy and most everywhere else, the custom is like in the United States—Santa comes a-visiting at Christmas.

One of the most interesting and perhaps the most beautiful scenes near us during the Christmas season, is the Madrid Christmas Festival, located 27 miles from Santa

Fe, and has become a mecca for New Mexico people and other visitors from all West Texas. High in the Orti mountains of northern New Mexico the little coal mining camp of Madrid dons its best holiday dress for the 12th consecutive year to thrill thousands of visitors with its famous Christmas lights.

A school teacher in Clovis, N. M. told us last year about her visit to Madrid, and she declared that the best way to receive the enchantments of the scenes on the mountain sides is to arrive in the little mining town before dark . . . nothing glamorous about it. Then as dusk falls, and the lights are turned on, it is truly a sight that is wonderful.

Starting 12 years ago the community enterprise has grown rapidly and though it attracts thousands of visitors each year, it has never been commercialized. Madrid is a mining town and the project is financed and all work is done by members of the voluntary Employees club of the company which operates four mines there.

The nativity scenes begin in the canyon where the town is situated with scenes of the town of Bethlehem and rise up to mountain slope to a great star and a 36-foot Christ which carries out the theme, Christ which carries out the theme "I am the Light of the World." Each important event in the Nativity is shown including the shepherds, Wise Men and flight to Egypt. All of the scenes are equipped with motion.

Toyland in the baseball park, contains a miniature train, ferris wheel and a merry-go-round all made by the miners from scrapped metal and lumber.

### Father Of C. C. Stinson Passes Away At Norman

In Ill Health Two Years; Suffered Several Strokes

J. W. Stinson, 79, father of C. C. Stinson, of 3 miles south of Sudan, Cherokee County, Alabama, passed away at his home at Norman, Okla., Sunday afternoon, December 1 at 2:30 o'clock, as a result of a cerebral hemorrhage. Mr. Stinson was born June 19,

## Applications For Mattress Material Being Accepted

Any low-income rural family, or any low-income family living in a town or city, and deriving at least one-half of its total income during the latest preceding calendar year from agricultural occupations, is eligible to receive the necessary material to make cotton mattresses. A low-income family means any family which had for the latest preceding calendar year a gross income of \$500.00 or less with an additional \$50.00 for each member of the family in excess of four persons.

Each eligible family will be allowed the material to make a mattress for each two members of the family, not to exceed a total of three mattresses per family. There will be a charge of 65c per mattress to help pay the cost of the needles, thread, and to pay the supervisor in each community.

Applications for the mattress material may be filed at any of the places listed below on Thursday, December 19:

Littlefield — City Hall, George Boss and Bill Boley in charge.  
Olton — District Court Room,

Mr. Crawford and Mr. Sides in charge.

Amherst — Lobby of the AAA office, Dave Harmon and Sid Morris in charge.



**SPRING LAKE AND EARTH AREAS ON REA CO-OP EXTENSIONS**

More than 45 miles of rural electric power lines will be built in Lamb County to serve the communities of Earth and Spring Lake out of the \$127,000 allotted last week by the Rural Electrification Administration to the Bailey County Cooperation for construction of a total of 263 miles of extensions to the coop lines, Cecil W. McLauri, superintendent, announced last week.

A short extension will also be built from Bula running into the southwest section of the county and reaching to within 4 miles west of Sudan, McLauri said.

The extensions to the Earth and Spring Lake community areas, however, from one of the major portions of the new projects. The line which will serve those communities runs northward from Spring Lake into Castro county to Dimmitt, and will serve a considerable area in that county.

Approximately 85 farms in the Spring Lake and Earth communities will be served by the new extension, McLauri said. House wiring and plumbing projects are already underway in that sector.

Contracts for construction on the extensions will be let in about 30 days, McLauri said last week. Definite dates for the letting have not been announced. The complete routes have been staked, however, and everything is in readiness for construction work to begin as soon as bids are received and contracts awarded.

The allotment of \$128,000 to the Bailey county cooperative was announced last week by Harry Slat-

tery, administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration. Extensions are to be built in Lamb, Bailey, Farmer, Castro and Cochran counties.

Nearly 400 members will be added to the cooperative when the new projects are completed, bringing the total membership to nearly one thousand.

McLauri also stated that plans are now being made and routes surveyed for another 100 miles of extensions to the project, and these will be submitted to the REA in Washington as soon as data is complete.

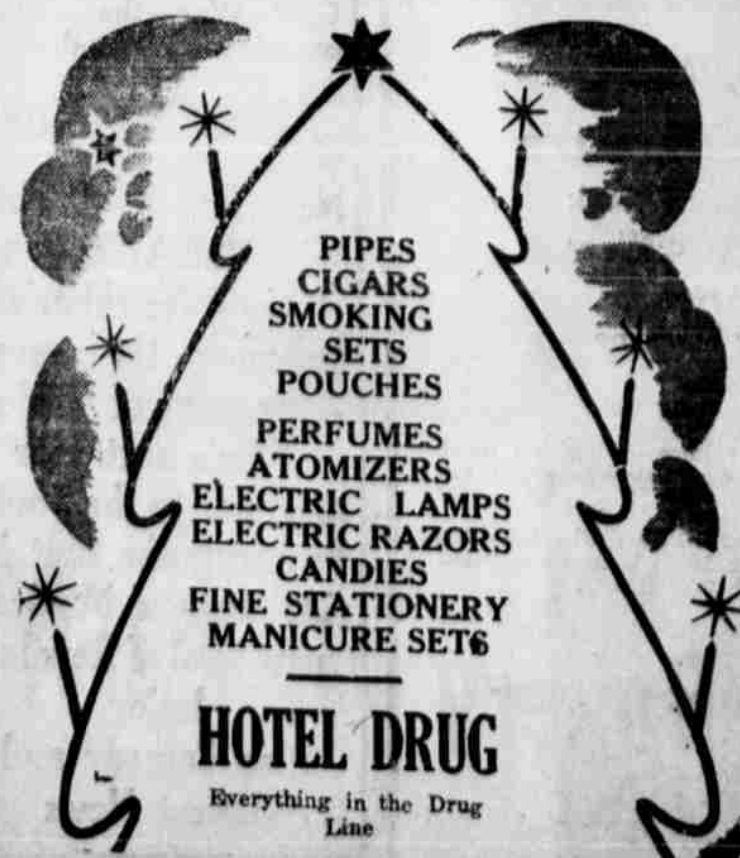

Can We Keep Out Of War?

Since 1783, when our first war with Great Britain ended with a victory for the colonies, we have been at war with France, again with the British, with Mexico, with Spain and with Germany, not to mention the little fracas among ourselves in the 1860's. Leave out our Indian wars, our adventures cross the Pacific in the Philippines and China, and in the course of a little more than 150 years we have been engaged in six major wars.

That's an average of a war every 25 years or so. It's 22 years now since the First World War ended with the

Armistice of Nov. 11, 1918. A new generation of young men has grown up, there's a big war going on, our nation is spending more money in military preparations than at any time since the last war, young Americans eager to fight are joining up with the British and Canadians, we are being told that we are next on the aggressor's list of intended victims.

Add that all up, and it looks as if it were going to call for more diplomatic skill and more self-restraint on the part of the American people than has been displayed so far, to keep us at peace.

Purpose of this organization will be for the school administrators to discuss their problems and form a unity in the educational program of the county.

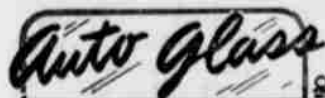

FARM MARKETING QUOTA GIVEN BIG MAJORITY IN COUNTY

ELECTION OF ACA COMMITTEEMEN WILL BE HELD DECEMBER 13-14

More Than 82 Percent Favor 1941 Farm Plan

82% Vote For Quotas In Texas While Majority In Nation Was 91.2%

At the Marketing Quota Referendum Saturday, December 7, 1940 Lamb county farmers voted, the Lamb County A. C. A. committee reported. The total number favoring quotas in the county was 798; the total number opposing quotas in the county was 173. The number favoring marketing quotas was 82.2 percent.

The total number voting in the 1940 referendum was 1,000 with 71 percent favoring quotas in the county. The majority favoring quotas in Texas was 82 percent, and the majority in the nation was 91.2 percent.

The following is the result by communities in Lamb county on the 1941 marketing quota referendum, tabulated and announced by Chairman C. W. Smiley:

Amherst: total votes cast 146; "yes" 132; "no" 14; total percent for 90.4 percent.

Spring Lake: total votes cast 116; "yes" 85; "no" 31; total percent for 73.3 percent.

Sudan: total votes cast 136; "yes" 117; "no" 19; total percent for 86 percent.

Littlefield: total votes cast 251; "yes" 222; "no" 29; total percent for 88.4 percent.

Olton: total votes cast 111; "yes" 77; "no" 34; total percent for 69.4 percent.

Spade: total votes cast 134; "yes" 110; "no" 24; total percent for 82.1 percent.

Fieldton-Hart Camp: total votes cast 77; "yes" 55; "no" 22; total percent for 71.4 percent.

Total: 971 "yes" 798; "no" 173; total percent for 82.2 percent.

Allotment For Youth Program

An allotment was made last week end of \$2,000 for Littlefield for an Industrial Youth Program to be established through the vocational agriculture department of the state department of education of Texas, Supt. F. A. Hemphill announced this week.

The project will be started here Saturday at the high school, Mr. Hemphill said, and an instructor will be employed this week. The program is established for the training of youths from the ages of 17 to 24, who are not in school, and included in the project here will be sheet metal work, wood work, study of electricity, tractor and motor repair.

Mr. Hemphill said that approximately 20 boys were expected to meet at the high school Saturday.

One class will be held in the day time and one at night, and will continue until after July 1, 1941, Mr. Hemphill said.

Marvin L. Collins Traps Grey Timber Wolf Friday

Marvin L. Collins of Hart Camp trapped a grey timber wolf on the P. H. Hanes ranch, six miles north of Marlin Friday afternoon, and exhibited the animal in his truck on the city square at Marlin, which attracted much attention.

Mr. Collins, whose hobby is trapping, took a truck load of negroes who had been pulling bolls in Lamb county, back to their homes at Marlin last week. The negroes had told him about the wolves in that vicinity, so he took his traps with him on the trip. He was accompanied by his son, Vernon L. Collins, student in the Spade high school.

The grey timber wolf, trapped by Mr. Collins, weighed approximately 55 pounds, and he believed she was

a very old wolf. It was his opinion that the wolf had been in the Hanes pasture, which is a body of about 900 acres and a virgin forest, several years, and probably had bred several litters of puppies. He plans to go back and look for the lair.

He uses a No. 3 wolf trap with a scent bait, and he caught his prey Friday by a front leg and wired her mouth and securely tied her before taking her into Marlin. He killed the wolf, and is saving the pelt, which averages in value from \$1.50 to \$7.50.

Mr. Collins enjoys trapping, and last year he trapped 132 wolves on the Halsell ranch north of Amherst. He has about 75 traps and a complete camping outfit.

Epidemic Of Flu Prevails In City

A large number of flu cases are reported in Littlefield.

The Littlefield Hospital reports about ten patients with flu, some of whom also have pneumonia.
