WILL BE HELD AT 6 O'CLOCK SUNDAY MORNING

Seven Churches To Cooperate At First Methodist

A Union Sunrise Easter Service, with seven local churches cooperating, will herald the arrival of Easter Sunday, next Sunday morning at 6 a.m., when a visiting pastor will occupy the pulpit of First Methodist Church here, where the seven-church sponsored service will be held, and with Church of the Nazarene, Church of God, Assembly of God, First Christian, First Presbyterian, Salvation Army, and First Methodist Churches, combining and co-operating in the service, but also extending an invitation to one and all to attend.

Capt. W. T. Gregory, who is in charge of the Lubbock Salvation Army Unit, will occupy the pulpit for this special service. Capt. Gregory has been at Lubbock for the past five years.

Special Easter music will be featured at the Union Service at the early morning hour.

However, practically every church throughout the city and county will have individual Easter services, at varying hours throughout the day, set aside and observed throughout the Christian world, as the most holy of all of the days of the year.

The First Baptist Church and Parkview Baptist Church are both beginning revival services Sunday morning, that will continue for the next two weeks. However, the Parkview Church will hold a Sunrise Service and various groups in the First Baptist are planning special services. (Continued on Back Page)

Local Postal Receipts Show Large Increase

Postal receipts for March 1952 quarter shows a gain of \$1542.59 over the same period of 1951.

The total postal receipts for the March 1952 quarter was \$14,375.51 as compared with \$12,832.92 in 1951. This increase in postal receipts shows a steady growth in the office since other sales at the local Post Office were also up as compared with 1951.

The revenue stamp sales amounted to \$2348.80 this quarter as compared with \$1792.67 last year. Revenue or Documentary stamps are stamps that are used on deeds when land sales are transacted. Indications point that when one considers the sales and consider that it requires \$1.10 for each thousand dollar transaction, that a large amount of property has changed hands within the business territory of the local office.

Ham Leaves with Catsup Gravy
Broadcast: April 12, 1952

1/4 cup rolled oats 2 Tablespoons hot fat
1/2 cup Fat Milk 1/2 cup catsup
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard 2 teaspoons vinegar
1 lb. ground, uncooked ham 2 teaspoons Worcester sauce
1/4 cup finely cut onion 1/4 cup water
2 teaspoons sugar

Mix oats, milk and mustard. Let stand 5 minutes. Mix in ham. Put into 4 greased muffin cups holding 1/4 cup each. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 45 minutes, or until light brown. Meanwhile, cook onion slowly 5 minutes in hot fat. Add catsup, vinegar, Worcester sauce, water and sugar. Boil slowly and stir 3 minutes. Turn out loaves and serve with the hot gravy.

Opening Of Roden-Smith's Self Service Store Outstanding Success

Roden-Smith's ultra-modern new streamlined, self-service drug store which was re-opened Thursday, after being closed for several days, to permit replacement of old fixtures with late model fixtures, the first of their kind to be installed on the entire South Plains, were jubilant at the splendid reception the new store was accorded on the occasion of its three-day formal opening, Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The management estimated that more than 5,000 persons visited the store during the three day opening sale. 2240 of these registered and became eligible for about \$500 in merchandise gifts given away Saturday evening. Many who intended to register were unable to do so, due to the congestion at the registration tables, for many hours.

Souvenirs were given to store visitors throughout Saturday, and 450 carnations (the entire carnation supply on hand at the Chisholm Floral) were handed out to the ladies. In addition more than 500 free cigars were handed to male visitors at the store, and 10 or 12 gross of balloons were presented to juvenile store visitors.

The store was literally banked with baskets of flowers, carrying cards of local business houses, and from drug suppliers, and these only tended to emphasize the beauty and lines of the newly installed fixtures, finished in a color scheme of gray.

The store was jammed Saturday evening at six p.m., which was the announced hour for the selection of names to be awarded the hundreds of dollars worth of special merchandise prizes, and fourteen special gift awards.
