

# Rites Held For Pat Boone Sr.

Funeral services for Patrick Boone, Sr., 65, widely known as Pat Boone, were held Wednesday in the First Baptist Church here. Mr. Boone died Monday in a Littlefield hospital, after a lengthy illness.

Leading civic and business positions, including serving as Littlefield mayor in 1938, as city commissioner, school board trustee for both Littlefield Independent school district and the Lamb county board, of which he was president at his death, and on which he had served since 1939.

He also was chairman of the Democratic executive committee for Lamb County from 1955 until his death. He was Lamb county war bonds sales chairman during World War II.

Mr. Boone was a charter member and past worshipful master of the Littlefield Masonic Lodge, a member of the Littlefield chapter of the Royal Arch Masons, member of the Knights Templar Commandery and a Potentate Aid, Khiva Temple.

He was a charter member and past worthy patron of the Littlefield chapter, Order of Eastern Star, a past grand patron of the Texas OES, a post he held in 1949, and chairman of the national credentials committee of the General Grand Chapter of the Order of Eastern Star.

In business circles, he was a charter member of the Littlefield Federal Savings and Loan Association and, at his death, a member of its directors board. Until recently he was a director of the First National Bank of Littlefield.

He had been a member of the First Baptist Church in Littlefield since 1934.

Mr. Boone was married in 1921 to Miss Flora Best Hopping of Littlefield, who survives him, along with one son, District Judge Pat Boone, Jr., of Littlefield.

Other survivors are Mrs. Pat Boone, Jr., two grandchildren, Betty and Pat IV, all of Littlefield; and two sisters, Mrs. D. N. Pope and Mrs. W. A. Allison, both of Roswell, N.M.

Mr. Boone was born in Roswell, N.M., on Nov. 14, 1897. Masonic rites were conducted for him at Littlefield Memorial Park. Funeral arrangements were by Hammons Funeral Home of Littlefield.

### To Complete Alford's Term

B. D. Garland, Jr., owner and manager of Garland Motor Co., has been appointed by the Littlefield City Council to fill the unexpired term of councilman John Alford.

Alford, who is moving to Lubbock, submitted his resignation last week to be effective Aug. 15. Garland will assume office Aug. 16 unless an earlier move is necessary. Alford's term extends to April, 1965.

### New Church Unit Planned

Architect's plans for a new sanctuary and additional education rooms at the First Presbyterian Church have been accepted, and a call for bids is expected in the near future, according to Rev. John Hill, pastor.

The appointment of Garland came during a called council session Monday night. The newly-appointed councilman was out of town this week.

In other action Monday, the council approved the employment of McMorries and Associates of Amarillo for additional study on the supply, storage and distribution problems of the municipal water system.

The water engineering firm was originally employed to make a study of the city's well fields. A comprehensive report, including a cost estimate and the firm's recommendations on action to take on the water system, is due by Sept. 15.

Councilmen also approved re-investment of \$40,000 plus an additional \$3,000 from a sinking fund. The money will be invested with the city's depository, Security State Bank.

The council gave tentative approval of the salary schedule for the new fiscal year but decided to give further study to the matter. Mayor B. W. Armistead and all council members were present for the meeting.

## Teacher Pulls Olton Tots From Cesspool

Quick thinking and alert action by an Amarillo school teacher was credited with saving the lives of two Olton youngsters Monday.

The two boys--brothers Arturo and Abel Delton, 4 and 2-years-old, fell into a 15-foot deep cesspool about 9:30 a.m. Monday. Ronnie Upton, a junior high teacher at Amarillo, was in Olton as a vacation relief man for National Biscuit Co.

Upton, after seeing the boys taken care of, had one thought uppermost in his mind. "Where can I take a shower?"

## Utility Adjustments Start For 84 Loop

Utility adjustments to clear path along the 6.9 miles that make a U.S. Highway 84 south of Littlefield are in progress now, reports Rhea Wiley, resident engineer for Texas highway department. Bradley's office has entered work for the 4-lane section "in the early stages of preparation", he added. Connection of the bypass section scheduled for 1964.

The loop section will begin. It will rejoin the present Highway 84 route about three miles northwest of Littlefield.

The loop will skirt the south edge of the city, passing below Crescent Park about 200 yards below 23rd Street, newest street in that subdivision, and just above Martin Street, in the southeast section.

The loop will cross U.S. Highway 385, at the south edge of Littlefield, with an overpass. Access will be provided from the 4-lane route at Highway 385 and at other major street crossings of the highway in south Littlefield, and on the Bulva road on the west side of the city.

The present Highway 84 route through Littlefield will be maintained by the Texas highway department as a business route, Bradley emphasized.

Cost of the new loop section is estimated at about \$840,000, Bradley added.

Cost of the utility adjustments is shared 50-50 by the highway department and Lamb County, as was that of the right-of-way, which totalled nearly \$800,000, County Judge J. B. Davis reported recently.

The loop section will be the next upcoming contract on Highway 84. Timing for contracts to extend the 4-lane route on to the Lamb-Bailey county line has not been set by the highway department.

### Weather

The U. S. Weather Bureau's extended 5-day forecast for the Lamb County area calls for temperatures to average 3 to 6 degrees above normal with little or no precipitation. Minor daily changes. Normal highs 90-96, normal lows 62-72.

20-year-old Lubbock man, Raymond Eugene Rosson, was drowning victim Sunday in Bull Lake while on a skin-diving.

Effort by the Littlefield fire department was unable to revive the youth, who was recovered from the lake a half-hour after his drowning, in 10 feet of water.

Bill Weige and several other volunteer members of the Littlefield Fire Department attempted to revive the victim without success. They used fire department resuscitator as well as artificial respiration about an hour at the lake enroute to the hospital.

# A COURTEOUS NOTICE AND WARNING: LITTLEFIELD MERCHANTS WILL ENFORCE THE LAW ON BAD CHECK PASSERS

The passing of bad checks has become a problem in Littlefield, one serious enough to require certain procedures in accepting checks. In this procedure, we sincerely request the cooperation and understanding of all persons.

First, we are asking that an address be given on all checks written in the stores listed below. This will be a tremendous help to your merchants, and will be appreciated. Every effort will be made to minimize the bother to a customer.

Second, if a check is returned, a notice will be sent to the giver giving the reason. It will ask that he make any corrections necessary to clearing the check.

Third, IF THE CHECK IS NOT CLEARED WITHIN A SHORT PERIOD OF TIME, IT WILL BE REFERRED TO THE COUNTY ATTORNEY FOR FULL ACTION UNDER THE TEXAS HOT CHECK LAW.

The County Attorney has assured his full cooperation in prosecuting on bad checks. He will not negotiate once a check is referred, but will go ahead with enforcement with the full support of the merchant who holds the check.

**THE PURPOSE WILL BE TO CONVICT ANY OFFENDER WHO KNOWINGLY DEFRAUDS WITH A BAD CHECK.**

Only by doing this can the important practice of doing business by check be kept simple and easy for everyone.

In warning to **ANYONE WHO WOULD DEFRAUD BY CHECK**, avoid this practice in Littlefield. It will not be tolerated!

A listing of bad checks will be kept by merchants and will be available to business firms. Anyone with a check on this list will not have his check accepted by any of these business firms, until all checks are cleared in all businesses.

The Texas Hot Check Law is published here for information purposes. County Attorney, Curtis Wilkinson, here affirms his intent to prosecute fully on bad checks.

**TEXAS "HOT CHECK" LAW**

**THE LAW**  
 It is unlawful for any person to give a check, draft or order for any purpose with intent to defraud and knowing at the time that he or she has not sufficient funds in the bank to pay such check, draft or order, in full and all other checks upon such funds then outstanding.

It is unlawful for any employer to give a check, draft or order for salary or wages, knowing at the time that he or she has not sufficient funds in the bank to pay such check, draft or order in full and all other checks upon such funds then outstanding.

Failure of the maker to pay the holder of a check, draft or order within ten days after he has been given notice by the holder that the check was refused by the drawee (Bank), shall be evidence of intent to defraud. This notice may be given by the holder in person or by registered mail.

**THE PENALTIES**  
 For the first conviction of a violation of this law:

- On checks, drafts or orders of \$5.00 or less, the punishment shall be, A fine not exceeding \$200.00.
- On checks, drafts or orders over \$5.00, but less than \$50.00, the punishment shall be, By imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding two years, or by a fine not exceeding \$1,000.00, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
- On checks, drafts or orders of \$50.00 or more, the punishment shall be, By confinement in the penitentiary for not less than two nor more than ten years, and by a fine not exceeding \$10,000.00.

Penalties for Second and Third or later Offenses Increase Under the Law.

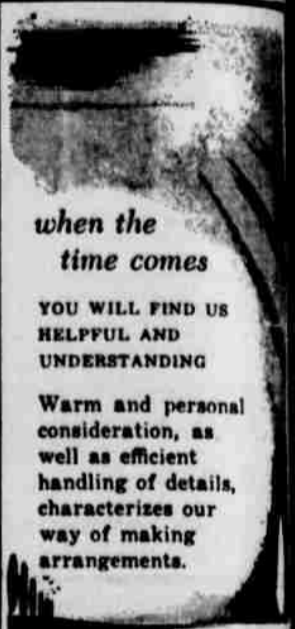

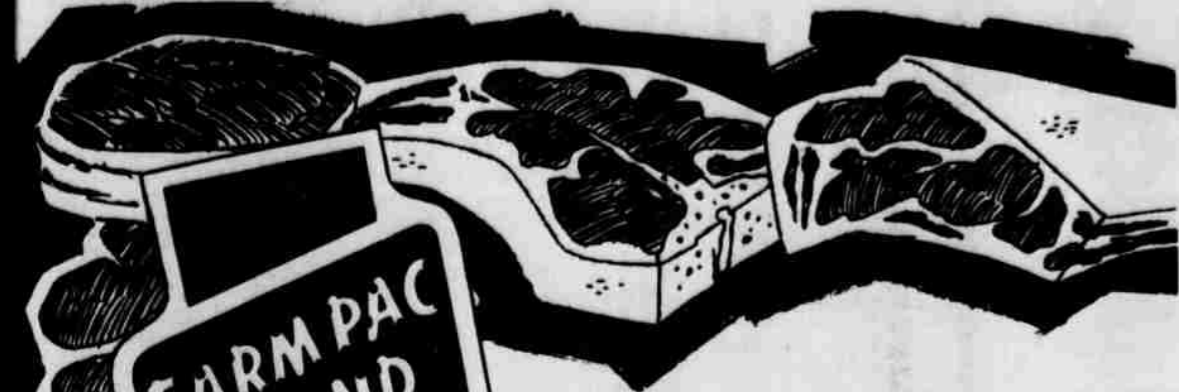

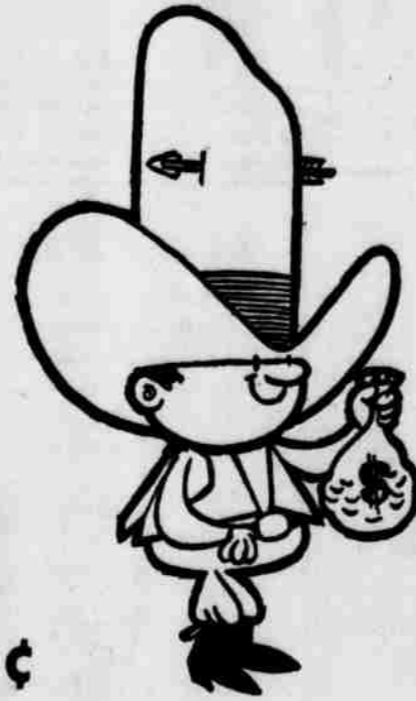

### Nelson Threw Away His White House Key

You have to give Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York credit; he is still in there pitching after probably having booted his political ball game far out into left field.

The governor outlined an attention-getting program for his Republican party, then followed through with a civil rights campaign that gave the governor's conference a few fast rounds.

In all this Nelson Rockefeller is unquestionably sincere. This is a man who has been superbly trained in business and who has won his spurs fairly in politics as New York governor. He was riding a Presidential crest that might have swept him into the White House.

But not anymore. When the governor went about the business of changing wives, and busting up a couple of households while doing it, he ran into the bedrock of American morality. History has its own precedents for Presidential hopefuls, one with which Gov. Rockefeller was intimately aware, William Randolph Hearst, 50 years ago.

Hearst spent 20 years and as many millions of dollars seeking the White House key, against a back-



### Farm Safety, Today A Technical Matter

This is Farm Safety Week, one of those quiet special weeks that has a growing significance in a fast-developing industry.

Just a few years ago Farm Safety had as its principal rules the avoiding being kicked by a horse or pronging someone, or yourself, with a pitchfork.

This is not so today, when farming is one of the most mechanized of industries. Today's farm laborer must be at home with the handling of a variety of engines, with electric motors using high voltage, with fuels that can be highly volatile under certain conditions, of insecticides and herbicides that require special handling.

A lot of his equipment also moves, and this adds a hazard that many industries do not have. It is all safe enough, when it is kept in mind just how unsafe any part of it can be if handled carelessly.

Once again we are reminded of the technical progress of agriculture, and the new status of an industry where a farm producer must be a practical chemist, an engineer and a capable agriculturist also to make a sizeable business pay business returns.

Today he must also be a working safety engineer. Farm accidents can be costly, as well as dangerous. That's why the industry calls attention to a special week, like the amber warning light at an intersection.

His case was different from that of the New York governor's, although genial Nelson no doubt finds some solace in this section of history.

The Presidency is the world's toughest job, one demanding sacrifice that probably cannot be estimated by anyone who has not been President. The question must inevitably arise whether a man who cannot discipline his private life can stand the every-second chafing that a President of these United States bears.

It may remain for the 1964 Republican convention to hammer home this fact harshly, but there can be no doubt about it. Nelson Rockefeller today can do about anything he wants to, with the wealth that he manages admirably, and he can go almost anywhere, from Conrad Hilton's finest world places to his own private tropical island.

But he cannot go to 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington, D. C. The key to this house belongs rightfully to the American people, who still, thank goodness, are mighty particular about its tenant.
