

WE MUST MEET OUR FIFTH WAR LOAN QUOTA

Pat Boone, in a special broadcast over KICA, Clovis, Monday, appealed to Lamb County residents to back the invasion troops by buying more war bonds than ever before, reminding them of the sacrifices being made by our troops. Mr. Boone's timely message follows:

"We have before us a tremendous task in selling our assigned

quota of War Bonds during this Fifth War Loan Campaign, especially this time of the year when our farmers are very busy in their fields, and some are having a great deal of trouble in getting a stand. Our combined quota is \$755,000 and out of this amount we are to sell \$305,000 in "E" Bonds.

"It is interesting to note that

according to statistics obtained from the Treasury Department last week that the District of which Lamb County is a part has cashed in only .8 of 1% of the War Bonds that have been purchased. This is the best record in our Nation; of which fact we are very proud. It is a great contrast to the Nation which has cashed 6%. People in our county have

bought over \$3,800,000 worth of War Bonds since the war started.

"At this time the eyes of the nation are upon our boys who are in combat on the coast of France, in the rugged regions of Italy, and in the jungle lands of the Pacific. In fact in this great global war American men are in stations all over the world. They are forging ahead on every front,

partly due to the fact that you have furnished the money through the purchasing of war bonds and the payment of your taxes to buy the finest war equipment that the world has ever known. Without your continued help in this manner, our nation could not so readily supply their needs. American men in the service of our country are interested in the response that

their home towns make to the Fifth War Bond Drive, and I trust and hope that when this campaign comes to a close on July 8, we can write our boys that Lamb County has again as always gone over the top with its quota.

"Our bond sales have been rather slow the past week. I believe that this is due partially to the

Mr. Cundiff explained that of the 82 ballots he sent out, there were 53 completed and returned.

Pilot Col. Hawthorn One of First To Bomb Jap

Pilot Col. Harry T. Hawthorn, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. P. Hawthorn, of Littlefield, but later of Antonio, was one of the Fifth Air Force pilots to strike the first land-based planes at the island of Yap, as reported from Fifth Air Force Headquarters, Guinea, under date of June 14 (referred to by the Star in their edition of June 18).

Many friends of the Hawthorn family in Littlefield and area are interested to read the following report of the bombing:

Through thunderous tropical rains and rain, bombers from Southwest Pacific bases have struck the island of Yap.

They left Yap's airbase pockmarked and fires blazing in ground conditions before returning on the journey to their base with only night fighter intercepting them. Though the weather made observation impossible, the 5th Air Force had the satisfaction of knowing that the first land-based strike on the enemy base, more than 400 miles northeast of Palau, was actually effective because they flames springing skyward through the overcast.

Robert E. Erickson, New Bri-

tain, Conn., pilot of one of the bombers which made the raid, believes his crew was responsible for one of the fires. The members of Erickson's crew included Co-Pilot Lt. Herbert C. Corley, Terrell, Texas, and Bombardier Lt. Du Valla Davidson, Houston.

"Other crews included: "Bombardier Second Lt. Donald A. Vaughn, Artesia, N. M.; Co-Pilot Lt. C. E. Whately, Hope, Ark.; Pilot Maj. James T. Pettus, St. Louis; Pilot Col. Harry T. Hawthorn, San Antonio; and Navigator Capt. Joseph B. Kinsel, San Antonio."

Col. Hawthorn has a distinguished war service. In December last he flew General MacArthur over New Guinea during a paratrooper attack on Jap positions, and later came back to the States to visit his wife and parents at San Antonio, Texas.

He has had almost two years overseas service to his credit as a Flying Fortress pilot in the Southwest Pacific. After completing 60 combat missions in December, 1943, he received the Silver Star with the Oak Leaf Cluster, Distinguished Flying Cross and Air Medal.

Col. Hawthorn's father, during his residence in Littlefield, was agent for the Panhandle Refining company.

At this same meeting he received his Lone Star Farmers Degree, which is the highest honor granted by the State F.F.A., at a banquet given during the convention at the Cactus Hotel.

Dwane also received a check from Firestone Rubber Company for \$238 to be invested in his farming program.

During the convention the new State Officers were installed after the outgoing officers finished up business for the past year.

Committee meetings were held by the boys, and plans for the new year in F.F.A. work for the State F.F.A. organization was worked out.

The American Farmer applications were also approved to be sent Washington for final approval, one of which was from the local chapter and was none other than Carrol Jones, brother of Dwane.

A. B. Chapman Seeks Election As State Senator



Judge Alton B. Chapman of Floydada, District Judge of the 110th Judicial District of Texas and president of the State Judiciary, has authorized the Lamb County Leader to formally announce his candidacy for State Senator of the 30th Senatorial District of Texas.

Judge Chapman, the youngest district judge in Texas at the time of his appointment had successively been county attorney two terms and district attorney. He resigned the latter office upon his appointment as judge, after serving two years four months in that capacity.

As district attorney, the record shows he tried approximately 200 cases, with the loss of only three.

A stock farmer "on the side," he raises milking Shorthorns; he is a director of the Panhandle-Plains Dairy show at Plainview, is a director of the Texas Milking Shorthorn Breeders, Inc., and has been an exhibitor at the Plainview show for the last several years.

He has never asked election to any office for more than two terms and has never lost a voting box in Dickens County, where he was reared.

He was born at Rochester, Haskell County, Texas, July 22, 1904.

Bond Rally To Be Staged Tonight In Littlefield

Bonds To Be Given Away; Battle Front Films To Be Shown

J. O. Garlington, chairman of the Littlefield drive in the Fifth War Loan, announced Tuesday plans completed for a city wide canvass to get underway Friday, following the bond rally here Thursday night.

The bond rally will be staged in front of the First National Bank, Littlefield, with the program opening at 8:30 o'clock tonight. Col. E. A. Simpson of Amarillo, veteran of World War I, will be toastmaster, and deliver an address. Col. Simpson is recognized as an outstanding speaker.

The program will also include talks by Sgt. Hardy, and Cpl. Stangle, wounded soldiers of World War II, who are patients at McClosky Hospital, Temple. Sgt. Hardy has returned from combat in the Southwest Pacific, and Cpl. Stangle from the European area, both of whom were seriously wounded. They will bring with them to the rally two films, which will be shown. One has been brought from the Southwest Pacific, and will show the battle of Tarrawa, which is a 30 minute film; and the other film was captured from the Germans, and shows the German Western Wall and a number of other defense setups of Germany.

It is expected that other veterans will be present and make talks.

Sgt. Hardy and Cpl. Stangle are guests of the Littlefield Post of the American Legion for this week. They are appearing and showing the films at all rallies in the county.

A special feature of the rally will be the giving away of several war bonds, which are being donated by patriotic business men of Littlefield.

TWO WAR WOUNDED HEROES ADDRESS AMHERST BOND RALLY

By CHARLES CHAPMAN

A bond rally was held at the Amherst High school auditorium Tuesday night, June 20, with First Sgt. Woodrow Hardy and Cpl. John T. Stangle of McCloskey General Hospital, Temple, as guest speakers. These boys are going to make eight stops in this region in cooperation with the Fifth War Loan Drive. In various regions they will be sponsored by the American Legion, Elks Club, Chamber of Commerce, and other clubs. In Lamb county these boys are sponsored by the American Legion. Cal Farley of Amarillo, who has helped Lamb county to put over its war bond drives many times in the past, was master of ceremonies. Pat Boone, county chairman of War Bond committee, and O. K. Woodall, district commander of the American Legion, also made a talk. The program for the evening was opened with a 45 minute moving picture of "Kill or Be Killed" (a War Department training film), followed by the "Battle of Tarawa," "The Anzio Beachhead," and "The Fortress of Europe" and "The Wall Hitler Built by Slavery." And then Cpl. John T. Stangle of the 36th division (this division is made up of Texas boys only), of Clifton, Texas, told his story of the battles over there. The 36th division was mobilized Nov. 25, 1940, and trained all over the United States until April 1, 1943, when they received sailing orders, and left the United States. On April 15, 1943, they arrived in Oran, North Africa. They trained at Oran for about six months and then they received their orders to prepare for the real thing. On Sept. 9, 1943, they landed on the Salerno beachhead and worked their way up into San Pietro, Italy. On Dec. 9, 1943, Cpl. Stangle was hit in the left arm by shrapnel from a German artillery shell. Then he was sent to North Africa and then to the United States, where he was put in a hospital in the South and then he made a request to be transferred to McCloskey General Hospital at Temple where he would be only 65 miles from home and he could go home every week end. Before entering the service, Cpl. Stangle attended Howard Payne College taking a course in physical education. Plans after he is discharged are uncertain.

First Sgt. Woodrow Hardy, 25, of the 45th division and Norman, Okla., joined the National Guard at Norman, Okla., in 1937 and on Sept. 16, 1940, they were made a federal troop of the infantry. Sgt. Hardy participated in the invasion of Sicily and fought in the Salerno invasion. Sgt. Hardy fought in the interior mountains near the town of San Salvatore until Oct. 15, 1943, when his right hand and part of his right fore arm were cut off by a shell fragmentation. On Oct. 20, 1943, he was flown from Naples to North Africa, and then was in various hospitals in North Africa for four months and then he was shipped back to the United States in a hospital ship. Sgt. Hardy arrived at Charleston, South Carolina Jan. 13, 1944, and then transferred to the McCloskey General Hospital at Temple. This hospital specializes in amputations. Before entering the service Sgt. Hardy attended the University of Oklahoma at Norman for three years where he majored in pre-med, but due to the

loss of his hand in battle, he will take up law.

These two boys are making a 22-day tour over the State helping in the sale of war bonds in the Fifth War Loan Drive. These boys will make eight stops in this region. Both the above heroes were awarded the Purple Heart.

Following the program a large number of applications for War bonds were taken.

Amherst Artilleryman Trains Invasion Forces In Europe

Sergeant Poston H. Tapp, son of Mrs. Camello Tapp of Amherst, is listed as one of 27 men hand-picked by the high command, to help train artillerymen who have already invaded France, others who will be sent across the channel.

This group is composed of veterans of two invasions, and of several major land battles with the Nazis. Each is a master of the big guns employed by Uncle Sam.

In one of these battles, the gun crew was ordered to destroy a church in which was hidden a Nazi machine gun nest. Orders are orders, but after the entire city had been cleaned up, the men of the unit took up a collection, which the chaplain turned over to the priest to help in rebuilding his church.

Biting Dog To Be Observed 5 Days

Reports indicate that a neighbor of the injured boy shot the dog, the head of which was brought to Littlefield and sent by the City to Austin for analysis, but no trace of rabies were found.

W. G. Street, city secretary, states that in the 15 years he has been City secretary that he has sent hundreds of dog heads into the laboratory at Austin, and that out of this large number only two were found to have any trace of rabies. He states that rabies is a low altitude disease among animals, and that on account of the high altitude here, there are not many rabie cases in the area.

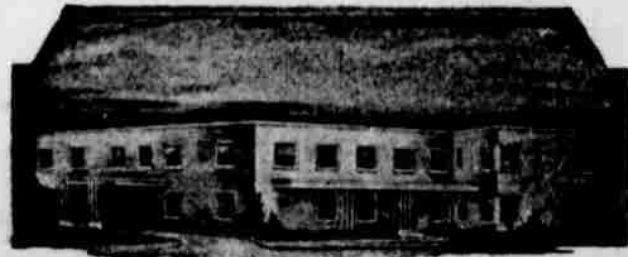

and moved with his parents and the other 10 of the 12 children of the family to Dickens County in 1918, where he lived until four years ago. At that time, he, Mrs. Chapman and their three sons moved to Floydada to be in the center of his judicial district. He was educated in Simmons University at Abilene and the University of Texas at Austin.

Judge Chapman issued the following formal statement:

"If elected senator, I shall represent the best interests of the people as a whole, without obligation to any corporation or special interests, of any individual or group. I have no fight whatever with corporations. They serve useful purposes, we need them and they have their rights. But I promise, if elected, that I shall not, during the time I am your senator, accept retainer fees from any corporation. I do not believe a man can serve two masters.

"The most important question before the people today is the war effort. Any power this office may have that can be directed toward winning the war will be used by me to the end that your fighting men may return to their loved ones and to the institutions for which they are fighting. In this connection, I shall support any legislation the laws of the land will permit that will insure a White Primary for Texas.

"I shall support a program of social security for the aged, the blind and the dependent children, and give my best efforts to the welfare of all state eleemosynary institutions. I am a strong believer in schools and will do my best for all schools and the teachers who are giving so unselfishly that our educational system may go on through the war.

"West Texas has always had to fight for her rights in the legislature. I feel that my experience qualifies me to ably represent this area of Texas in her fight for her part of the rural aid money, fair share of oil production, more uniform freight rates, more equal apportionment of paved highway funds and her other rights as part of Texas.

"I believe we should clear our state of debt and build a surplus for the reconstruction period—which is sound business for the state as well as the individual. I know of many leaks that can be plugged to help in
