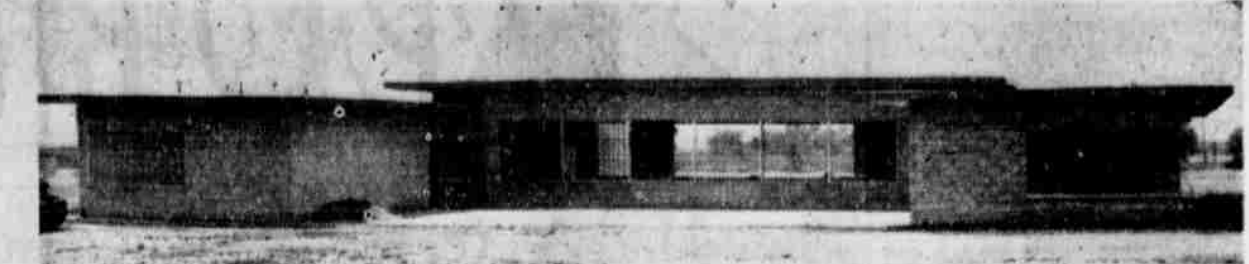
**500 Members, Guests Attend Country Club Opening**

### To Be Taken Business Census

L. D. Whiteley, of Lubbock, district supervisor of the U. S. census was in Littlefield Tuesday, mapping plans for the taking of a census of Littlefield business firms, the first days of next week. Only a comparatively few business houses are exempted from this provision of the census laws, these including professional men and services, builders, contractors, newspapers, etc.

The federal law, authorizing a business census was set up late in the 1920's by act of Congress, and the first census was taken in 1929. The last business census taken was in 1939. Unlike the head count census to get population figures, the business census is interested on volume of business, and details of that volume, in every town and city in the United States.

Starting probably next Monday, business census forms will be left at practically every local business house along with an envelope, in which it must be returned when completed. The forms are not especially difficult, but are detailed, and many business men need help in filling them out. The assistants will be ready and willing to assist anyone wishing or asking for such assistance.

Filling out the forms correctly, is mandatory, under severe penalty of law, according to Mr. Whiteley. He added, however, that the information given to census takers or contained in the forms, is secret, and available to only the census department. It cannot be used as a basis for investigation by other government agencies, nor as any basis for taxation in any form.

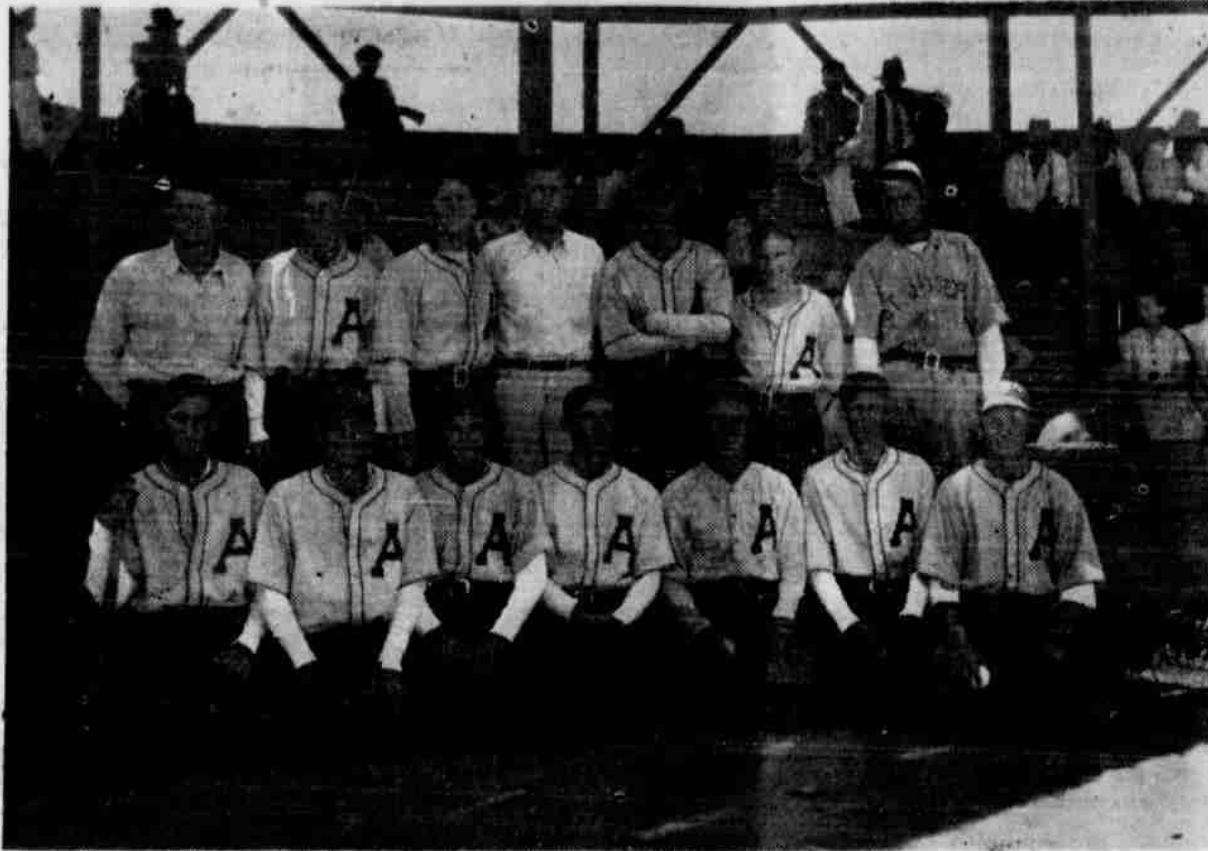

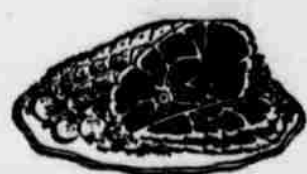

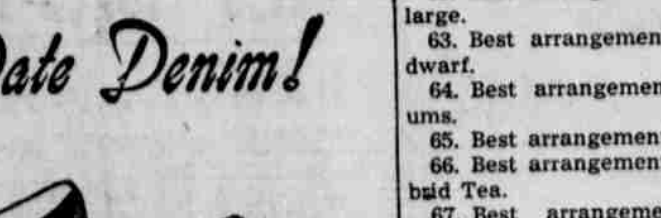

## Local Lutherans To Assist In Raising Funds For Concordia College Proposed Administration Building



Concordia College, Austin, Texas, expects to construct a new administration building (architect's sketch shown above) with funds now being raised by the supporting church body. The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, in a \$2,000,000 "Building For Tomorrow" program for its colleges and seminaries.

Lutherans of Emmanuel Church, 417 West Third in Littlefield, are preparing for participation in a nation-wide effort to raise over \$2,000,000 which will be used for construction of new buildings at colleges and seminaries operated by the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. Next Sunday, June 5th, has been selected by most of the 5,000 Missouri Synod Churches, including Emmanuel Lutheran here, as the day on which they will support this worthy and necessary cause. The above picture indicates how the school in Austin, Texas, used for pre-ministry and pre-teaching training, will benefit from this special offering.

This will be the first large fund raising project for capital investments at educational institutions of the Missouri Synod since 1925. Major expenditures of the church body during the last decade have been devoted to wartime service to armed forces personnel, to foreign and domestic mission activities, and to postwar relief abroad for which an estimated \$15,000,000 was contributed by the 1,500,000 members of the Synod since 1925.

In addition to the replacement of obsolete buildings, the new program calls for eventual expansion of the existing educational facilities at 12 colleges and seminaries to provide a minimum of 200 candidates annually for the Lutheran ministry and a minimum of 475 graduates annually, prepared to teach in the Synod's expanding system of 1204 full-time elementary schools, identical with Emmanuel's, the latter closed for the present.

The only non-educational item in the church's "Building for Tomorrow" project is \$200,000 for remodeling of the six-story office building in downtown St. Louis, which will become the new headquarters of this church after renovation has been completed.

Working out the details of gathering this offering is the Stewardship Committee, composed of H. Synaischek, M. Hobraischek and L. Thornton.

Rice was found shot to death in a bedroom of his home in Littlefield at 7:30 o'clock Friday morning.

A .38 calibre revolver was reported found near his body.

**Note Found on Body**

A note was found on the body after it was taken to Hammons Funeral Home.

**Serves As Sheriff**

Rice served one term as Lamb County's sheriff and went out of office on January 1, after having been defeated

by Sid Hopping last year.

His body was discovered by his wife after she had heard a shot. Officers found the body near the opening of a closet door in the back bedroom of the home at 421 West Fourth. His head was near the closet door.

He had been shot at close range, officers indicated, with the bullet entering the head above the right ear, and leaving through the back of the head.

An investigation was carried out by Sheriff Sid Hopping, County Attorney Bob Kirk and Sam Farquhar, Justice of the Peace.

Statements were taken by Mr. Farquhar from Mr. and Mrs. Starr Halle, Dr. J. R. Coen, Sheriff Sid Hopping and Deputy Dick Dyer, who were the first to arrive following Rice's death.

Mr. Farquhar Saturday issued his verdict to the effect that "Rice died from gunshot wounds apparently fired by himself."

**Born in Oklahoma**

Rice was born June 21, 1907, at Loco, Oklahoma.

He married Miss Nadine Malone at Dimmitt March 9, 1929, to which union was born one son, Larry, aged 13.

**Lived Here 9 Years**

After living at Dimmitt and Hereford Mr. and Mrs. Rice and son moved to Littlefield nine years ago, where they continued to make their home.

During the war Rice served with the Army in Germany and other points for about three years. After serving his one term as sheriff he operated a used car lot in Littlefield.

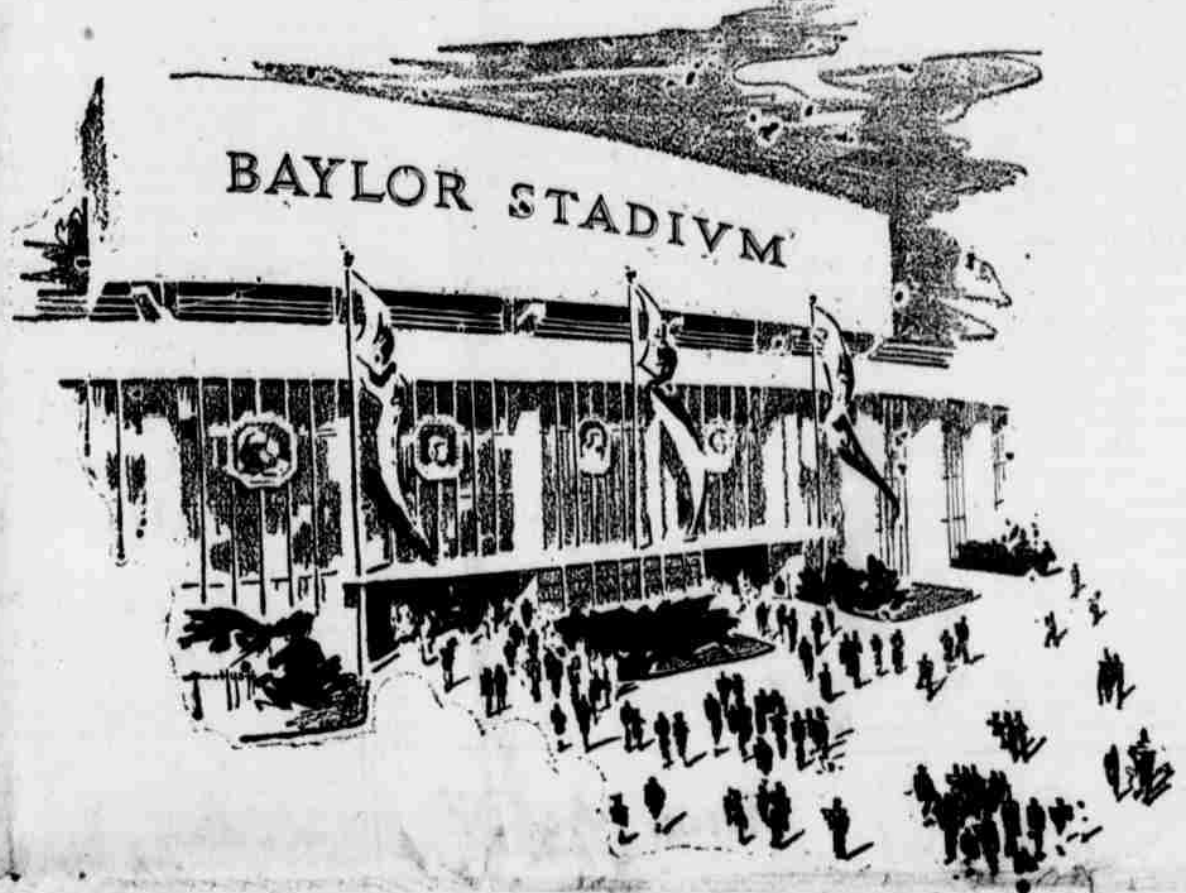

BULL LAKE PHILOSOPHER EXPLAINS WHY HE DOESN'T KEEP FARM RECORDS; DOESN'T WANT TO KNOW WHAT HE LOST

Editor's Note: The Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Bull Lake may be speaking for himself but we doubt he's speaking for most farmers in his letter this week.

Dear editor: Was talkin with a government man the other day and he was complainin about the way I keep my farmin records, wanted to know how he was gonna give me a crop allotment if I didn't know what I'd been plantin for the past five years on every foot of land I got.

"Trouble with you farmers is you don't keep proper records," he complained. "If you'd be more business-like, you'd be a lot better off," he added, although I didn't tell him if we was he'd be worse off, as he might not have a job if we was as efficient as he thought we ought to be. In fact, I have some times thought it would be an interesting experiment to have all the agricultural experts swap places with farmers for a year, just to see what would

happen. Might cut down on the crop surplus, if nothing else, as raisin a crop from a tractor seat is different from raisin it fom behind a desk, and once I got to be a expert, it might be hard to ever get me back to farmin.

But I can tell you why farmers, at least why I don't keep farm records.

In the first place, it's a lot of trouble. Ain't many farmes got secretaries, and writin down all your own figures is out of our line of work. Ain't many business men who'd have any better records than I got if they didn't have anybody to keep em for em.

But the main reason, if you want to get to the bottom of it, is that we don't want to know how we're comin out. If all the farmers in the country kept accurate books on what they was doin and makin, the country might face starvation on account of so many farmers quittin to get into something profitable. I don't mind worryin with a crop all year, fightin the weather and the weeds, usin up my equipment and myself to boot, and haulin it to town and askin some body what it's worth, since I was the fellow that raised it and

wouldn't have no idea myself, and I don't mind takin home what I get and startin all over again on another year's crop, but I just don't want any accurate figures on my operation starin me in the face. Like it is now, I can say well I come out pretty good on cotton this year I guess, made a little on cattle, and so forth, but if I had an accurate set of books showin to the penny my profit and loss, it would take all the fun out of farmin.

You can call me lazy and triffin and backward, but the fundamental reason I don't keep books on my farmin operations is that I just don't want to know how bad the financial situation out here is. Them experts can carry record-keepin too far, and undermine the entire farmin situation.

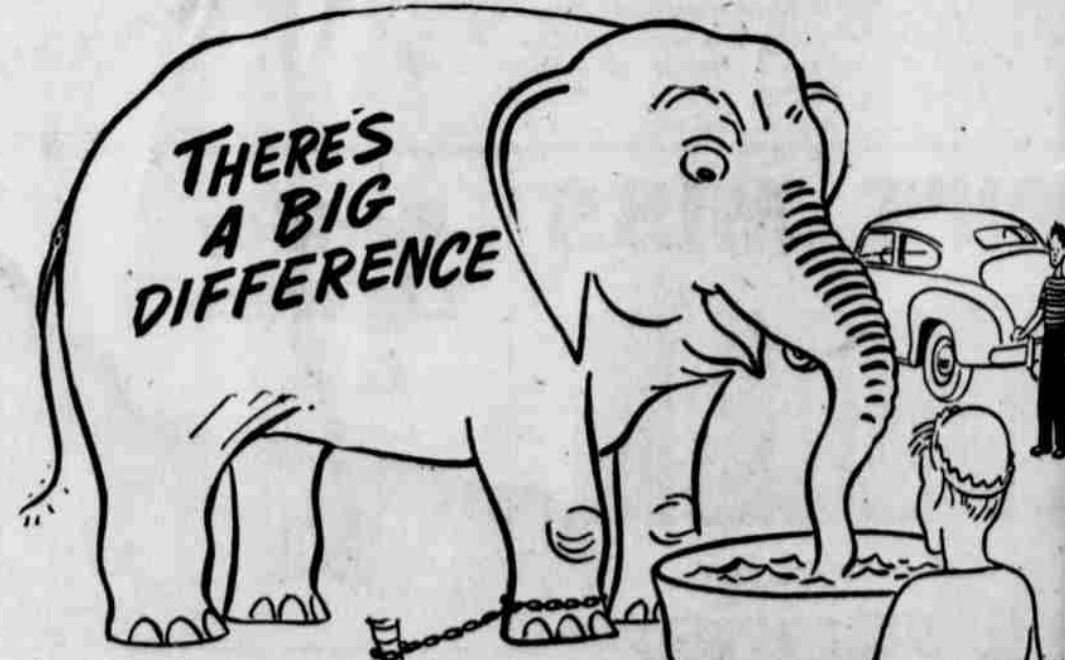

# PATRONS RECEIVE LETTER FROM SCHOOL BOARD

The following letter has been mailed to the patrons and taxpayers of the Littlefield Independent School District:

As far as teachers, transportation and other operating requirements are concerned. "No provision is made for physical facilities such as buildings, equipment, and other capital investments. This part of our public education program is left entirely up to the individual school districts and their taxpayers. "Recognizing that we are only four elected representatives, your school board is anxious that you as patrons and taxpayers be advised of the present problems which your district faces,

the requirements for new facilities and equipment which are vitally required to correct those problems and the approximate cost of such improvements. We sincerely believe that if you have a clear picture of these conditions you will be in a position to judge the proper action which should be taken. "Attached is a resume of the present condition of our educational plant in which we are attempting to educate our children and an estimate of the minimum facilities which are urgently needed. "In a following letter we will give you estimates as to the total costs for constructions needed and the increase which will be required in taxes to take care of same. "Please study this information carefully and keep it handy so that you may be fully informed as to the actual conditions and that you may give us the benefit of your opinions on the matter when the time for action comes."

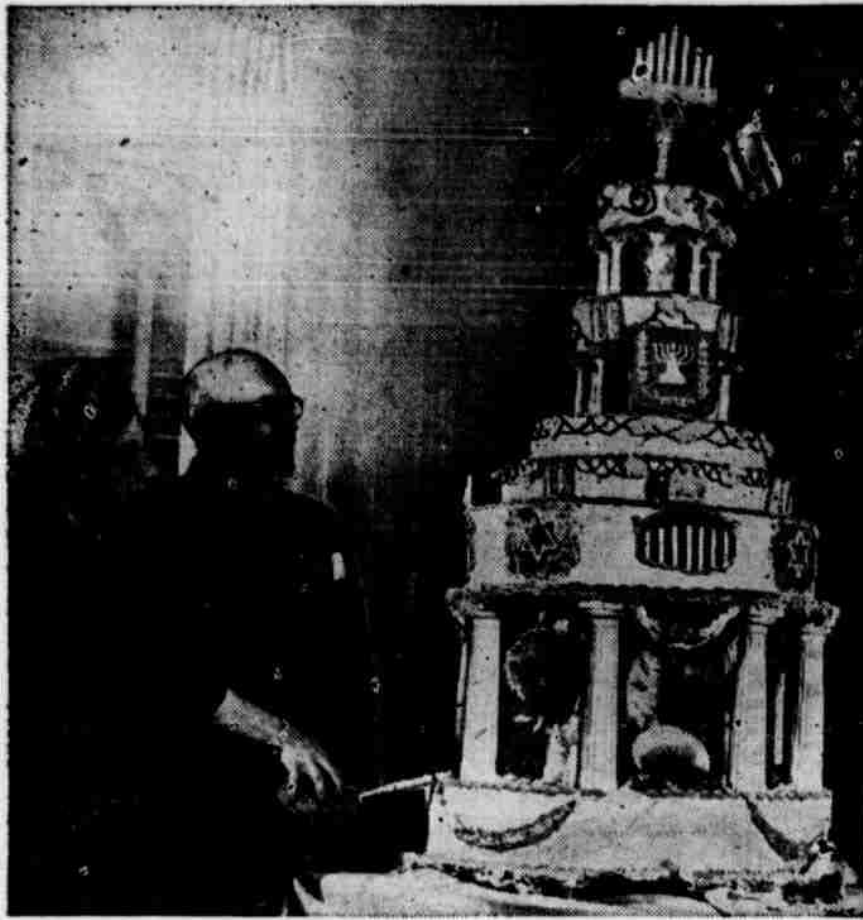
### Young People Gather At Wilson Sunday

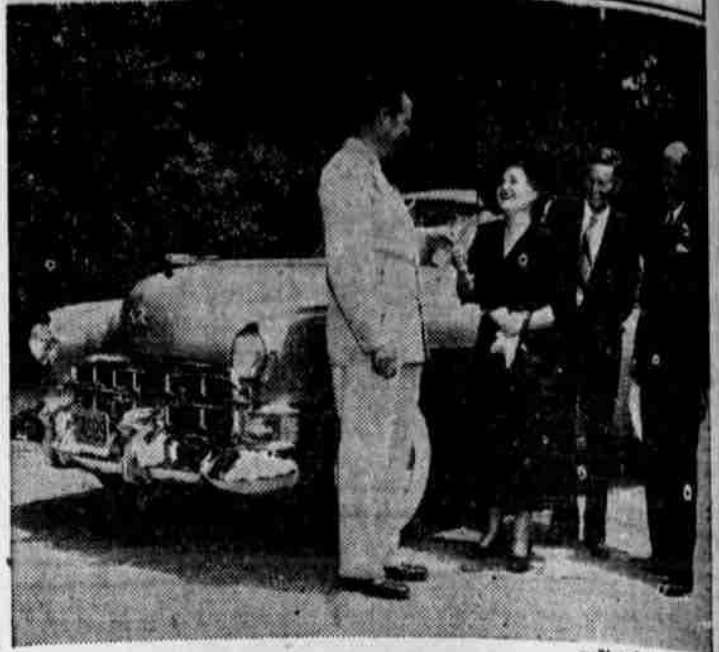
