## LEASE BUILDING FREE TO COUNTY

In Case Election Carries, To Vacate City Hall At Once

Following the filing of an order at Olton, calling for an election Tuesday, June 15, to determine if the County Seat of Lamb County shall be changed from Olion to Littlefield, the City Commission, in a meeting Wednesday morning at the City Hail, entered into a lease contract with the County Commission to lease the Littlefield City Hall for a term of 10 years, with the option of an additional 10 years, at no cost to the County, for the as a Court House,

The City Commission further agreed to vacate the present City Hall immediately if the election carries in favor of this city.

The petition asking that an election be held was presented Wednesday afternoon of last week to the Commissioner's Court, Judge L. R. Crockett ordered the election after a vote was taken, and all commissioners agreeing that the election petition be granted.

The Littlefield City Hall is a modern solid brick fireproof structure, and was erected in 1930 at a cost of \$50,000.

Mr. Burgess comes to Littlefield highly recommended with many years experience in promotion work. He is 31 years of age, married,


and has a six weeks' old son. He was reared near Lubbock and after graduation from the Texas University, spent three years as in-structor of Spanish in a school near Lubbock



### Growing Broomcorn For Profit

By G. B. ALGUIRE Few crops grown on the Plains. f properly handled at harvest time, are more profitable to farmers than broomcorn, particularly since it is a cash crop cultivated similar to other sorghums and matures in about fixty five days, Planted early, it be harvested before inbor demands are pressing for the major crops, which assures maximum returns to growers at minimum expense. This crop also furnishes la bor employment much needed many, well in advance of the general fall work.

Growers who fail to realize profits from growing broomcorn, too seemingly irrevelant but which, if ignored, will defeat what othervise, could be a profitable venture, Good so as to obtain a properly spaced uniform stand is the first essential tep and should be carefully considered if best results are to be ex pected. Seed from reputable seed growers should be obtained as these usually are of unquestioned purity. Seed grown one year only from pure stock can also be recommended if they are properly matured, the company's oil, Seed recleaned from seed piles oband mixed and should, under no panicles, and weighs around 50 than any other single factor, pounds per bushel.

ing of the plants in the field, Sucsful growers prafer planter plabored 3-16" and under-rimmed with enough holes in plates so that vice. the planted, properly rationed, will drop about 75 seed per rod. It is most important to space broomcorn evenly about four to six inches anart. If planted too thick the brush likely will be short and spiky or if planted too wide the brush will be too long and course under avevarge growing conditions. A little time spent in adjusting planting equipment to properly space broomcorn seed in the rows is reflected in higher prices for more desirable length brush and is absolutely essential if desirable straw is to be grown. Brush having 14 to 23 inches ed at the hospital Tuesday of last of fiber is usually in best demand by broom manufacturers and growers should strive to meet trade de-

nands in this respect. Despite however the best endeavors, to plant properly, weather conditions during the growing perod, also play an important part in broomcorn culture and over these, growers have no control further than intensive cultivation to conserve moisture and stimulate a continuous healthy growth of the plants. But this may be said: Close attention to the suggestions above enumerated will assure growers a definite step toward a profitable harvest if anything like normal growing conditions prevail, The best time to plant is from May 15 to June 15 after the ground has be-





### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

H. J. R. No. 26-A HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for assistance to destitute children and for the pay-ment of same not to exceed Eight Dollars (88) for one child or Tweive Dollars (\$12) for the children of any one family per month; further providing that the Legislature may mpose such restrictions and regulations as to it may seem expedi-ent; providing that the amount to be expended out of State funds in any one year for such assistance shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000); and provid-ing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United Sates financial aid for assistance to destitute children; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof, and prescrib-

ing the form of ballot.






