Graduation will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday night, May 24 in the Bailey County Coliseum.

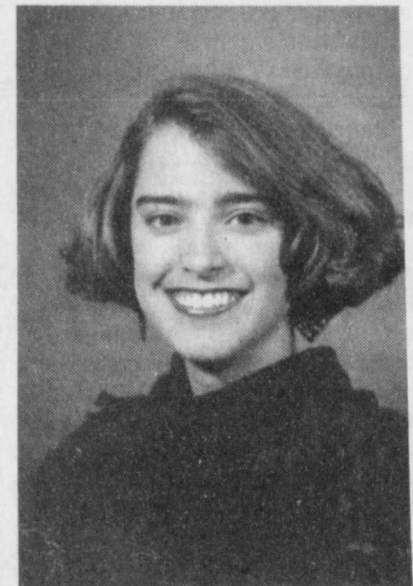

She served as the National Honor Society president; SCAC reporter her junior year; Senior Class president; Leadership Muleshoe, secretary; and Junior Class secretary.

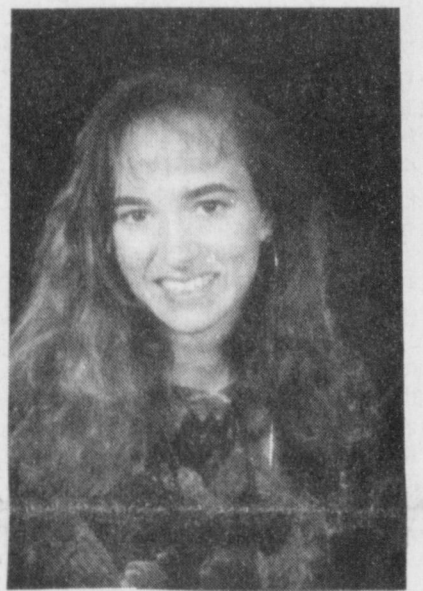
During her high school years, Stacie was a member of the National Honor Society, Student Community Action Club, Future Teachers of America, FCA, and Leadership Muleshoe.

Three Way Pre-Kindergarten Registration Set

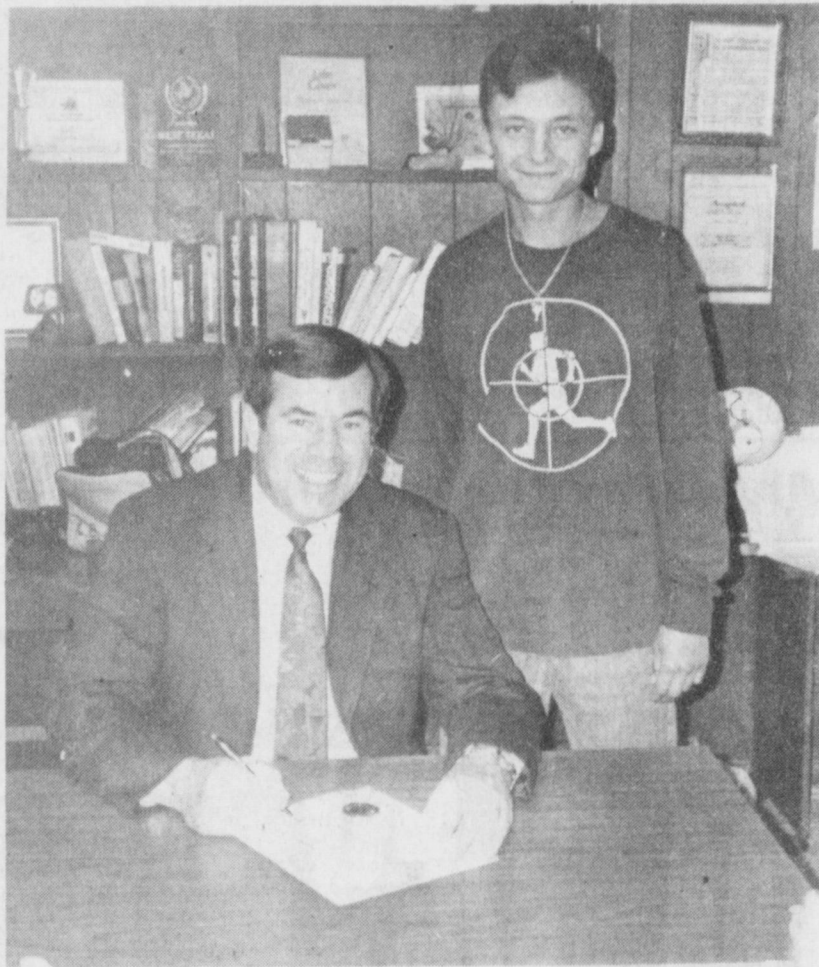

Lazbuddie Students UIL Academic State Champs

Lazbuddie High School had six students qualify for state UIL Academics, which was held on the University of Texas campus at Austin on May 8.

The Computer Science team won the competition on April 23 at South Plains College. The team is composed of Jarah Redwine, Rachelle Rice, and Craig Russell and is coached by Hardy Carlyle.

These students took a written exam at Austin and also computed problem-solving programming on the computer. Jarah Redwine was first place high individual and Rachelle Rice was second-place high individual at the state competition. They also won the 1-A State Championship.

Lazbuddie's Accounting Team won the Regional Champ Team Award at South Plains College with Marisol Godinez finishing first, Socorro Reyes placing second, and Kimberly Smith winning third individually in the Regional Competition.

They qualified for state competition, and Kimberly Smith

was third high individual at Austin. Their total team scores placed first to be named 1-A State Champs in Team Accounting, and they were coached by Marsella Jennings.

"Although the UIL is more often associated with athletic competition, more students compete in the Academic Contests," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL director. "In fact the league began as a Debating League in 1910 and then later merged with Track and Field association to form the basis for the current organization. Each year more than a third of the total participation in UIL activities involved Academic Contests."

Texas has the Nation's most comprehensive slate of academic contests. "Long before the development of other academic-based competitions, the UIL was sponsoring contests in writing speaking, mathematics and science," Marshall added.

UIL Academic Contests cover several subject areas including Math, Science, Business, Language Arts, Journalism, Speech, and Theatre. Recently, contests in
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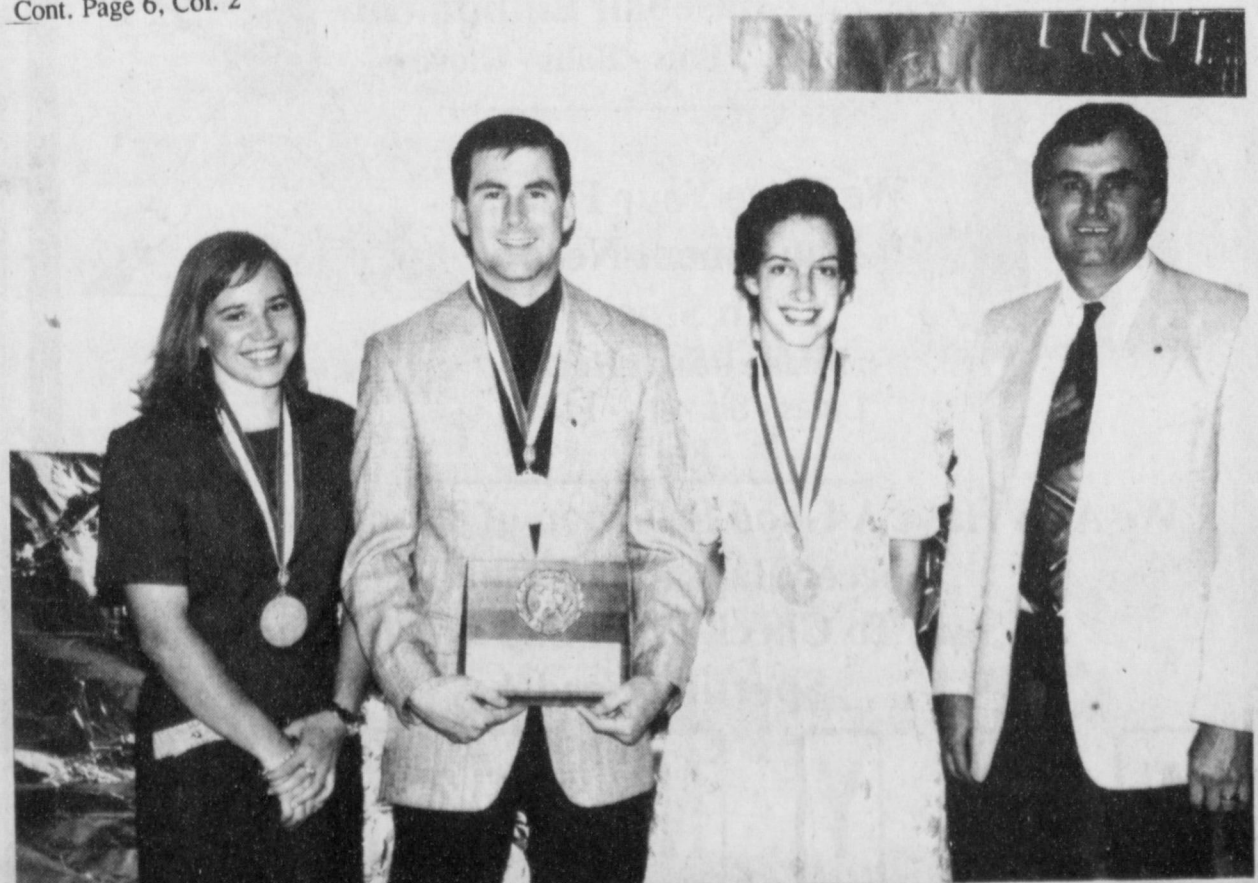

Did you ever have one of those dreams where you felt like the walls of a room were closing in on you? That's the way it feels dealing with school finance. The decision of the Texas Supreme Court in Edgewood I narrowed the walls a bit, the Edgewood II decision narrowed them even more. Things became even more cramped after Edgewood III.

Proposition I was an attempt by the Legislature to expand the walls 'get a little more room to solve the school funding crisis. But the voters told us in clear and convincing terms that Proposition I was not a way out of the shrinking room.

On May 3, the House and Senate Education Committees sent out a call to the people of Texas to come forward and help us find a way out of the incredible shrinking room. While many of the critics of Proposition I who claimed there were alternatives failed to show up, many earnest, well-intentioned and thoughtful Texans did.

Members of the Legislature, statewide luminaries such as Tom Luce and many ordinary citizens came forward to present their proposals to a joint meeting of the committees. Proposals included eliminating or redefining the word "efficiency" in the state Constitution, creating a state income tax, consolidating school districts, creating a constitutionally dedicated education fund, allowing voters within CEDs to vote on their creation and establishing a CED tax rate and a state property tax on commercial property. There were 42 presenters in all.

While many of the presenters wanted to talk about philosophy and education reform, the rules of the meeting were that presenters were asked to offer proposals to deal with the tax policy issue. Even so, the meeting went from 2 p.m. to 11:30 p.m.

I, for one, have long advocated defining the word "efficiency" in the Constitution and placing an objective equity standard in it. As I have written in this column, it takes a two-thirds vote of both houses of the Legislature to put a constitutional amendment before the voters. Previous attempts by the Legislature to redefine the term "efficiency" or create an objective equity standard have always failed. That's because at least a third of the Legislature believes that any change to the Constitution would retreat from the gains it believes have been achieved in our state courts.

I'm adamantly opposed to massive consolidation. Such a drastic move would destroy many West Texas schools and, in turn, drag down communities with them. I'll fight consolidation all the way.

Tom Luce suggested that we could meet the Supreme Court's requirements for an equitable system by committing the state to fund at least 75% of our educational system. He argues that would

lessen our reliance on the property tax as a method of finance which has created the inequity.

He's right, but there are two problems with his suggestion: It would require a \$3 billion tax bill.

It also would do nothing to keep property-wealthy school districts from increasing their taxes only a small amount, allowing them once again to create vast disparities in the ability of school districts to raise revenue.

Luce said that one way to achieve the state's 75% commitment would be to take all commercial property away from local school districts and let the state tax it to fund its increased share of the school finance system. This suggestion may sound familiar. The governor last fall suggested the very same split tax base.

There are three problems with this proposal: First, it would require a constitutional amendment. Second, it would very likely abridge bond covenants of every

school district in the state relying on ad-valorem taxation of commercial property to support their bond payments. Third, taking property out of individual school districts so that it can be taxed by the state and redistributed among all school districts takes us right back to Sherwood Forest. It's Robin Hood all over again.

Since that joint committee meeting, another proposal has surfaced that would allow the education commissioner to de-annex enough property from the property-wealthy districts and annex it to property-poor districts so that the wealth per student in every school district in the state would be about \$280,000. While I'm the first to admit this is a "novel" approach, it accomplishes two important goals:

It achieves equity and avoids consolidation.

Almost every presenter at the joint committee meeting told us that on May 1, voters sent this or that message. I don't know who's right. All I know is that without a constitutional amendment the options available to the Legislature to address three Supreme Court decisions are fewer now than ever before.

Propane Organization Opposes Clinton Energy Proposal

The Clinton Administration's proposed energy tax will unfairly penalize Texans, and especially rural Texans, warns John B. Danks, executive director of the Texas Propane Gas Association. Among the hardest hit will be Texas communities dependent on agriculture.

"Propane customers will see the cost of their propane fuel rise 2.38 cents per gallon under the proposal," he said. "This will increase these families' home heating, cooking and water heating bills, and if they are farmers, the cost of farming operations and maybe even transportation costs."

Added to that, he said, will be an additional 7.5 cents for a gallon of gasoline, 8.3 cents more for a gallon of diesel and about 4.6 percent more for each kilowatt of electricity, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture. Average production costs on a typical 1,300 acre Texas cotton farm will increase to between \$2,500 and \$2,800, or a minimum of \$2 an acre in direct costs. The Texas Railroad Commission estimates the proposed energy taxes will cost the average household anywhere from \$301 to \$475 a year in direct and indirect costs.

Because the Texas economy, including agriculture, is energy-intensive, Texans will pay a disproportionate amount of tax over those states that have a service economy, Danks said. In addition, Texans—especially rural Texans—do more driving from town to town than do any other Americans. And, many rural Texas families fall into the middle-and lower income categories, which are hardest hit by the tax because they spend relatively more of their income on energy than families with higher incomes.

"No tax should so

disproportionately fall on one segment of the country over another," Danks said. "During these next crucial weeks as Congress debates the issue, rural Texans should make known in Washington their feelings about this unfair energy tax proposal."

The Texas Propane Gas Association represents more than 800 propane marketers, suppliers and producers who serve 1 million Texas customers. Propane, a by-product of natural gas and petroleum, is a source of energy used for heating homes, cooking, drying clothes and heating water. It also has a wide range of agricultural applications, such as grain drying, and is the world's most widely used clean-burning alternative motor fuel. TPGA is a member of the Affordable Energy Alliance, a broad-based coalition of companies and business organizations opposing British thermal unit (Btu) taxes.

Facts About Breast Cancer

One in approximately every 10 women will develop breast cancer at some time in their lives. However, only 15 to 20 percent of women age 50 or older have regular mammograms, and a much smaller percentage have regular physical exams.

According to Rodolfo Martinez, M.D., oncologist/hematologist on staff at Methodist Hospital, few symptoms signal early breast cancer, but early detection and treatment of the disease can greatly reduce mortality rates at any age.

"When breast cancer is found in its earliest stage, the chances for survival are very good," said Dr. Martinez.

The American Cancer Society and the National Cancer Institute recommend breast self-examinations, regular physical

checkups and mammograms to help with the early diagnosis of breast cancer.

Following are guidelines for this three-point protection plan.

If you are 50 years of age or older:

- * Examine your breasts monthly;
- * Have an annual breast exam by your physician every year; and
- * Have a yearly mammogram.

If you are 40 to 49 years old:

- * Examine your breasts monthly;
- * Have a breast exam by your physician every year; and
- * Have a mammogram every 1 to 2 years.

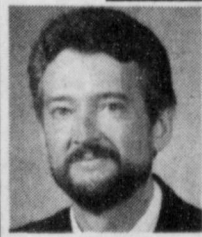
If you are 20 to 39 years old:

- * Examine your breast monthly;
- * Have a breast exam by your physician at least every 3 years; and
- * Have a baseline mammogram when you are between the ages of 35 and 39.

A parable starts in the "here and now." I read that and then began to re-read some of the parables. The first one I came across was the parable of the sower. The "here and now" when Jesus was telling this story was the first century. Would Jesus tell it a bit differently in our twentieth-century "here and now"? I wondered.....

"A sower went forth to sow." Of course, he had already prepared the soil with a Toro lawn tractor. After sowing the seed, being careful to follow the instructions on the back of the seed packages, he waited to see what would come up.

Unfortunately, some seed never came up at all. It had fallen outside the rows. The

birds, and one hungry ground squirrel, made a hasty meal out of that seed.

On the other hand, some seed came up quickly -- too quickly. A shallow root system combined with hot South Plains sun plus a powerful bug spray (which was supposed to kill bugs but not plants) contributed to the early demise of most of it. What was not scorched outright was trodden under the feet of the sower's children.

All in all, the crop would have been most disappointing had it not been for several seeds which fell in rich soil and grew into fine, healthy plants. With the help of good fertilizer and a little bloom-set the plants produced abundantly.

Well, what do you think? Personally, I think the story loses something in the modern version. Probably the older rendition is just as timely and less dated. It still makes its point sharply and clearly: God's harvest is coming. God's word has been planted in our hearts. How fertile is the soil there?

News From Congressman Larry Combest

As the financial impact of the president's budget on farmers reached debate last week among those of us on the House Agriculture Committee, my remarks were directed at how the Clinton plan has shifted money from the farmer to the food stamp recipient. President Clinton is asking farmers to absorb an unfair burden of \$3 billion worth of cuts in farm programs while he increases the spending on food stamps by \$7 billion 200 million. Food stamp spending has more than doubled in 10 years.

In a Capitol Hill committee room those line-by-line numbers translate into severe farm income reductions. In West Texas, the numbers will be devastating to farmers and the communities whose economy must rely on whether it's a break-even or a bumper year at harvest.

Farm programs are a contract between farmers and government to compensate the grower for the use of his land and livelihood in exchange for the government's international trade, land conservation and production goals. For generations, farm programs have proven their ability to make American food and fiber products the most abundant, economical and stable sources the world over. Cutting \$3 billion from farm programs will hurt consumers and rural communities, but it will hurt farmers first.

The president claims his budget package will eventually reduce the deficit. To the contrary, it blatantly increases spending then shifts it from one federal program to another. I have always supported across-the-board reductions in government spending. You have encouraged me with phone calls and postcards by repeating that one simple message: cut spending first.

You and I understand, but many in Washington, D.C. need to examine what the spending problem actually is.

During the past several years, farm programs were scaled back as part of the "contribution" farmers have in effect made to reduce the deficit. In fact, as recently as 1990, farm programs absorbed cuts of 20 percent. Just imagine if other federal spending programs had shared the burden of cuts with the agriculture budget, we would not be in the budget mess that we are in now.

Instead of a shared sacrifice, farm programs are again targeted for more cuts by the number-crunchers while social programs are substantially increased. When the president's people in Congress voted for his budget plan, they stuck the Agriculture Committee with a set of numbers from the White House. Instead of a harvest of budget savings, the president's plan is slash-and-burn clearing of farm country.

In addition to the loss of government support, the Clinton Energy Tax will cost farmers more in fuel for the tractor, natural gas to run irrigation pumps and anhydrous ammonia fertilizer for the crops.

Americans agree about shrinking the yearly deficit and the interest on the accumulated national debt. We can do that if we hold spending increased just to the rate of inflation and population. However, President Clinton cannot reduce the deficit by cutting spending in one place and increasing it in another.

Until other programs are subject to the same budget reductions as agriculture has borne, I will strongly oppose further farm program reductions. Shouldn't agriculture be about farmers feeding more people, instead of feeding people more food stamps?

The 25th Anniversary Texas Special Olympics Summer Games will be held at the University of North Texas in Denton, May 19-21, 1993. Eighty-five Area 17 Special Olympians will join over 3,000 of their fellow athletes from throughout Texas as they compete in gymnastics, track and field, Equestrian, aquatics, tennis, golf, softball, soccer, and basketball.

The Area 17 athletes, hailing from Lubbock, Slaton, Roosevelt, Lamesa, Wolfforth, Plainview and Abernathy, range in age from 12-72. In addition to the competition, they will also enjoy the opportunity to stay in the college dorms or hotels, march in the parade of athletes as part of the Opening Ceremony, try their hands at the many activities in Olympic Town, and dance the night away at Thursday night's Victory Dance.

As a special treat, athletes and spectators at the Opening Ceremonies will hear a rendition of the 25th Anniversary theme song, "Strive On, Special Olympian." The song, whose lyrics were written by Lubbock's own Jim Bertram, will be performed by local artist Mike Turner, the composer of the music.

Antihistamines: The Old And New Generations

(NU) - More than 40 million Americans suffer each year from the runny noses and itchy, watery eyes characteristic of upper respiratory allergies. Many of those affected will seek relief by taking a common cold or allergy preparation that contains an antihistamine.

Preparations containing an antihistamine help suppress allergy symptoms by blocking the effects of histamine, a substance produced by the body that plays a major role in allergic reactions. In addition to their benefits, antihistamines may cause side effects that should be considered before taking this type of medication.

First generation, or "traditional," antihistamines, some of which are available without a prescription, can pass from the bloodstream into the brain, producing sedation and impairing the ability to think clearly.

According to NARD, the national association representing 40,000 independent pharmacies, a medication's ability to cross the blood-brain barrier is an important determinant of its effect on alertness and performance. Easy entry of chemicals into the brain, such as with traditional antihistamines, can cause a range of "felt" side effects, such as drowsiness, and "unfelt" side effects, such as impaired judgment, slowed reaction time and impaired motor function.

ment, slowed reaction time and impaired motor function.

When activities that require mental alertness and concentration are considered — work performance, school performance and driving, for example — the effect of traditional antihistamines may be troublesome and even potentially hazardous.

The newer, second generation antihistamines, which are currently available only by prescription in the United States, have difficulty crossing the blood-brain barrier. Consequently, they tend to cause less unwanted central nervous system side effects.

All currently available over-the-counter antihistamines contain traditional antihistamines that cause sedative effects.

If you suffer from allergies, ask your independent pharmacist about over-the-counter medications available to help with the symptoms. Your pharmacist can explain what's available, advise about adverse side effects and drug interactions, and offer important advice about both over-the-counter and prescription antihistamines. If over-the-counter allergy preparations make you too drowsy to drive or perform your daily activities, see your physician about a prescription for one of the second generation antihistamines.

current issues and events and computer science were added last year.

The purpose of the UIL Academic Program is to use competition to develop students' high order thinking skills. "A primary objective for league directors is to maintain a high correlation between what is taught in the classroom and what is required of students involved in Extracurricular competition," said Janet Wiman, UIL Academic Director. "Consequently, as much emphasis is placed on the educational context of the contests as is placed on the contests themselves."

Students who compete at the UIL State Meet also qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. This year, the TILF is awarding more than \$700,000 scholarship grants to 534 college students who compete at the UIL State Academic Meet.

In 1993-94, the TILF expects to award an estimated 550 new and renewed grants, valued at more than \$700,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals and families. The TILF receives over \$500,000 in annual donations and has over \$2,000,000 in endowed funds.

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Holocaust Survivor Special Guest High Plains Chapter Ex-Prisoners Of War

Helene Shiver of Lubbock was guest of the High Plains Chapter of the American Ex-Prisoners of War on Wednesday, May 12, at Muffins Restaurant in Lubbock. Mrs. Shiver was a 13-year old teenager from a wealthy Jewish Bulgarian family, the only child surrounded by every luxury that could be provided, when she was taken prisoner by the Nazis.

Hers was the tragic story of a close-knit Jewish family who had gathered at her home for a birthday for her grandfather. There were places set for 109 of her relatives in the dining room which she remembers as really a banquet hall. She had been out riding horses with her grandfather and was still in her riding habit with boots on. She had been given some miniature pictures of her father and mother that day which she had stuffed into her riding jacket pocket.

Then a noisy clatter arose outside and suddenly they heard gunfire and the doors were knocked down, when the butler refused entry to the invaders. The chauffeur had already been shot in the driveway for refusing them, and soon the butler joined him in that fate.

In the terrible confusion, one of Mrs. Shiver's infant cousins began to cry upstairs, and one of the upstairs maids came rushing down to ask its mother to come up, and she was shot. The mother was refused permission to go to her baby, and upon that horrible occurrence, all 109 of the Shiver family members were herded off to boxcars to begin what became the most horrifying set of occurrences anyone could imagine.

The crying infant was left upstairs as they were captured, and to this day, she does not know what became of the baby.

Mrs. Shiver told in detail of the forced labor, starvation, invasion of privacy, torture and death, that anyone could imagine. During the years that followed that day in 1942, every family member died, leaving her the sole survivor of her huge, wealthy family.

The only possession she was left with was the miniature pictures that she had managed to stuff into her riding boot, and during her captivity, she never took her boots off.

In 1945 the American G.I.'s liberated their dachau, and one of the infantry soldiers saw the beautiful dark eyes shining from the face of Helene, who by this time weighed only 76 pounds, was 16 years old, and had seen and been subjected to every form of deprivation imagine.

This Gi spoke to Helene, and helped her to be taken care of, and became her special friend. He later was able to return to Germany and made her his bride and brought her eventually to the United States. Mrs. Shiver used the occasion to impress on each ex-prisoner of war present that this was why they fought, were wounded, were captured, and some died.

She told of seeing three American airmen who had been shot down while on a bombing raid. These three were brought into the public compound and the Jews were made to watch their torture. Over a period of days or weeks they were daily tortured until they died, and she personally wanted to convey to each ex-POW there how much she appreciated what they had done for her and all the Jews. She ended her story with the admonition to all there to "stand tall as you can" and you can overcome anything with pride. That although she lost all her family and their immense wealth, the property was nothing.

The loss of her family was irreplaceable, and yet she was the victor because she survived and her captors did not. The human spirit

and their reliance on God can overcome anything.

All of the Ex-POWs named above were prisoners of Germany. The only member of the chapter who was a POW of Japan, Eloy Cardenas of Muleshoe, was unable to attend due to a death in the family. Also absent were Charles and Anne Miranda, Earth. He was a Swiss detainee.

Scale Insects Attacking Area Live Oat Trees

A small insect, Lecanium scales, can pose a big threat to live oaks and now is the time to apply a pesticide to infested trees, says County Extension Agent, Curtis Preston.

Lecanium scales are most prominent on twigs and small branches during the spring and early summer. A single infested twig may have more than 100 scales on it, although fewer scales are more commonly present.

These scales are hemispherical in shape and dark brown. They are about one-eighth to one fourth-inch in diameter.

Lecanium scales damage trees by reducing vitality and causing dieback of infested branches. While they are most damaging to live oaks, they also occur on red oaks, the county agent said.

Eggs are produced underneath the hard-shelled female during late spring and hatch in May. The immature insects then feed on the underside of leaves during the summer. They migrate to twigs in the fall and overwinter there. There is only one generation a year.

Eggs are hatching now on the South Plains. Scale insects are most susceptible to control at this time, Preston said, and insecticide treatments will be most effective if applied now. Heavily infested trees may require two applications two weeks apart.

Insecticides recommended for control include orthene, dursban, sevin, malathion and diazinon. Through coverage will improve the effectiveness of sprays. Always read

and follow insecticide label instructions carefully, the county agent cautioned.

Farm Credit Reports Good First Quarter

The Tenth Farm Credit District reported strong financial performance for the first quarter of 1993. Operating results reflected net income totalling \$37 million, according to Arnold R. Henson, chief executive officer.

The district's combined income was up \$43.6 million from the \$6.6 million net loss for the same period last year. The loss in the prior year resulted from a one-time charge of \$20 million for postretirement benefits, in accordance with new financial reporting requirements.

Henson attributed the improved earnings to continued net reductions in nonearning assets, lower cost of funds and improved credit quality.

Nonaccrual loans declined 11.9 percent in the first quarter, down \$14.3 million from year-end 1992 levels. The district operating results included \$8.4 million earned through collection on the residual assets of the Federal Land Bank of Jackson (Mississippi) in Receivership, which were acquired in July 1992.

Henson also announced a one-half percent reduction in the variable interest rate from 8.2 to 7.7 percent, effective June 1, for Federal Land Bank Association loans.

"We see many signs of economic improvement in the district," said Henson. "Improving rural land values and the continuation of favorable interest rates are behind the good results that many of our member-borrowers are reporting. These factors are also contributing to an increased demand for new loans."

The Tenth Farm Credit District comprises the Farm Credit Bank of Texas, 48 Federal Land Bank Associations in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas; and 17 Production Credit Associations in New Mexico and Texas. Combined loan volume at March 31, 1993, was \$3.5 billion and assets totalled \$4.2 billion.

Nationally, the Farm Credit System reported combined net income of \$397 million for the first quarter. Gross loan volume remained relatively stable at

Savings Bonds Semiannual Rate Set At 4.78%

The semiannual market-based rate for United States Savings Bonds, in effect from May through October 1993, has been set at 4.78 percent, the Treasury Department announced today. The rate is 85 percent of the average market yield during the preceding six months on Treasury marketable securities with five years remaining to maturity.

The new rate, down from the 5.04 percent semiannual rate of the November 1992 through April 1993 period, reflects the general decline in market interest rates over the past year.

When bonds are held for five years or more, yields at redemption are the average of semiannual interest rates declared during the time held, or the guaranteed minimum rate, whichever is higher. For Savings Bonds issued

on or after March 1, 1993, the guaranteed yield is 4 percent. Interest is compounded semiannually from the date of issue and for EE Bonds issued since March 1, accrues monthly. The Savings Bond semiannual rate changes each May 1 and November 1.

Federal income tax liability on bond interest earnings can be deferred until a bond is redeemed or reaches final maturity. Bonds are exempt from State and local income taxes.

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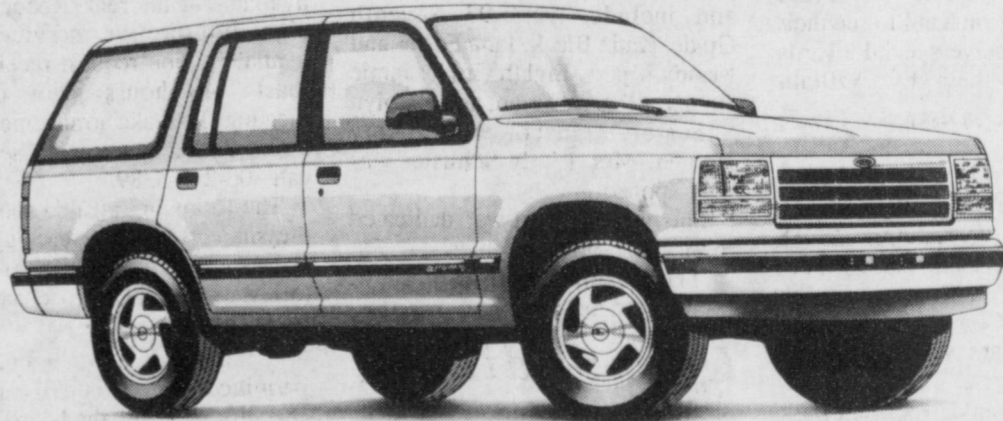

For sources of stress that cannot be changed, such as a death, divorce, or deadlines, Cox

recommends the following:

- * Reach out to others for support.
- * Take good care of yourself--rest, eat right, exercise.
- * Make time for enjoyable activities.
- * Learn to relax.
- * Pace yourself; do not push yourself too hard.
- * "These types of activities can make a person more resilient to stress and depression," Cox said.
- * While relaxing seems like it should be easy, it is difficult for some people.
- * "People under stress often spin their wheels by constantly reminding themselves of what they need to do better and faster," he said. "The best action is to take your mind off the stress."
- * Cox recommends a few minutes of relaxation at least three times a day using these techniques:
 - * Keep eyes closed.
 - * Picture an enjoyable scene--beach, mountain, vacation.
 - * Maintain the scene and actually feel it--smell the sea, feel the breeze and sun.
 - * Think soothing thoughts.

Hotline Yields Leads On Ambulance Chasers

A toll-free hotline to report "ambulance chasing" has given State Bar investigators more than 50 solid leads during its first month of operation. Bar leaders say at least 175 people have called the hotline, which was installed on March 19, to forward a complaint or ask for information.

"Roughly a third of the calls we get are worth investigating," said State Bar General Counsel Jim McCormack. "That's a pretty good ratio, considering that the hotline is brand new and many people don't know it's available." McCormack said 33 leads have been sent to the Bar's Regional Counsel offices for investigation and an additional 20 will be followed up by Austin investigators.

The hotline was installed as part of the Bar's campaign to fight "ambulance chasing," called improper solicitation under Bar rules and barratry in the Texas Penal Code. In March, State Bar leaders were joined by local bar associations, defense and trial bars in a 10-city news conference that launched the campaign.

"In addition to barratry, people have called about receiving letters from lawyers following car accidents and to comment on lawyer advertising," said McCormack. "We explain to the caller that letters and advertising aren't violations of Bar rules. We do like to review the content of letters, though, to make certain lawyers aren't misrepresenting themselves." About 40 percent of the hotline calls have been unrelated to solicitation or advertising, he said.

"We hope to keep the toll-free number in front of the public, so that any possible misconduct will be referred to us," said Dallas attorney Harriet Miers, president of the State Bar. "Lawyers may not make uninvited contact with potential clients, either by telephone or in person. In addition, lawyers may not employ others to make such contact."

McCormack said that many of the leads received thus far by Bar investigators relate to "runners," who are employed by lawyers to contact potential clients and bring in the business.

"It's extremely important that people make note of names and phone numbers, especially when a person other than the attorney is involved," said McCormack. "Often, it will take considerable work to trace the runner back to the lawyer--but with enough information, we can catch the attorney and initiate discipline proceedings. In some areas of the state, 'running cases' for lawyers has become a lucrative cottage industry."

Miers said punishment for attorneys who engage in improper solicitation can range from reprimands to suspension or even disbarment. And, since ambulance chasing violates state law, lawyers or their runners may face criminal charges as well. And while the average person thinks of accidents as the primary target for "ambulance chasing," Miers points out that improper solicitation is a violation for any type of legal case.

"We've heard reports of people being contacted when they're the defendant in a divorce case--sometimes even before they've been served papers," said Miers. "Any potential client who is or may be in litigation can become prey for persons who engage in this distasteful behavior."

McCormack said an incident doesn't have to be recent for the Bar to investigate it. State Bar rules of conduct have a four-year statute of limitations.

"If someone knows of an incident at any time, we may still be able to pursue it," he said. "And be assured, we want to know about it."

Senate Passes Bill To Create Care Provider Referral Act

The Texas Senate met Monday morning and passed CSSB 589 by Sen. Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth which creates the Health Care Provider Referral Act. The bill attempts to address concerns regarding conflicts of interest in the form of doctors--or other health professionals--referrals to services and facilities in which they have an investment or ownership interest. The bill prohibits health care providers from referring patients to a health care facility in which the health care provider is an investor. The bill now goes to the House.

The Senate Education Committee met Tuesday afternoon and passed CSSB 7 by Senate Education Committee Chairman Sen. Bill Ratliff of Mt. Pleasant. The bill, which is an attempt to meet the

June 1 court deadline, allows a portion of the commercial property of the richest school districts to be transferred to nearby less affluent districts. The intended result is that richer districts will still be wealthy enough to maintain their curriculum, but not so excessively rich that they subject the entire state to further legal challenges.

On Wednesday the Senate met and passed CSSB 7 by Sen. Bill Ratliff. Also passed was SB 1377 by Sen. Bill Ratliff, which is a companion bill to CSSB 7. SB 1377 sets up a committee on student learning to make recommendations to the state board of education. This bill includes tests to measure student performance and academic excellence indicators to measure

individual school and school district performance. Both bills now go to the House.

On Thursday, the Senate passed CSHB 1368 by Rep. Elliot Naishtat which requires security devices for certain rental dwellings. Currently, Chapter 92 of the Texas property code requires a landlord to install a "security device" upon request from a tenant. The bill does not apply to hotel or motel rooms or housing operated by an accredited college or university.

The Senate Criminal Justice Committee met on Friday morning and passed HB 1776 by Rep. Ron Wilson of Houston. The bill would allow Texans who pass a

criminal background check and a proficiency course to carry a concealed handgun. The issue was put on hold last month by Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock after Gov. Ann Richards threatened to veto the bill. The bill has now been resurrected and could be taken up by the full Senate as early as Monday.

The Senate stands adjourned.

Lazbuddie Longhorns Roll By Christoval

In last week's six-man football action, the Lazbuddie Longhorns stunned the Christoval Cougars Saturday when they defeated the Cougars 42-6.

Playing Saturday afternoon at the Sands Mustang Stadium at Ackerly, the Longhorns led on the scoreboard all the way. The Longhorns made their first score and went on the scoreboard when Leland Brockman returned the opening kick off 80 yards into the end zone. Brockman's point after kick was good and Lazbuddie led 8-0.

Brett Thomas completed 15 of 22 passes for 209 yards and five touchdowns.

The Christoval Cougars pulled

within two points (8-6) of the Longhorns when Mike Riojas scored on a one-yard run. Lazbuddie came back and scored three touchdowns in the second quarter, all on passes from Thomas to Matt Cozby. The plays covered 10-17 and 27 yards and made the score 26 to 6 at halftime.

Scoring once in each of the last two quarters, a 20-yard pass to Brockman and a 10-yarder to Cozby; the eighth ranked Longhorns defeated the second ranked Cougars 42 to 6.

"I think all 12 of our guys did a super job," said Lazbuddie head football coach Mark Scisson. "The kids got after them. We were the underdogs in this thing. That was

the best defensive game we've had. It makes this long trip well worth it when it comes out like that.

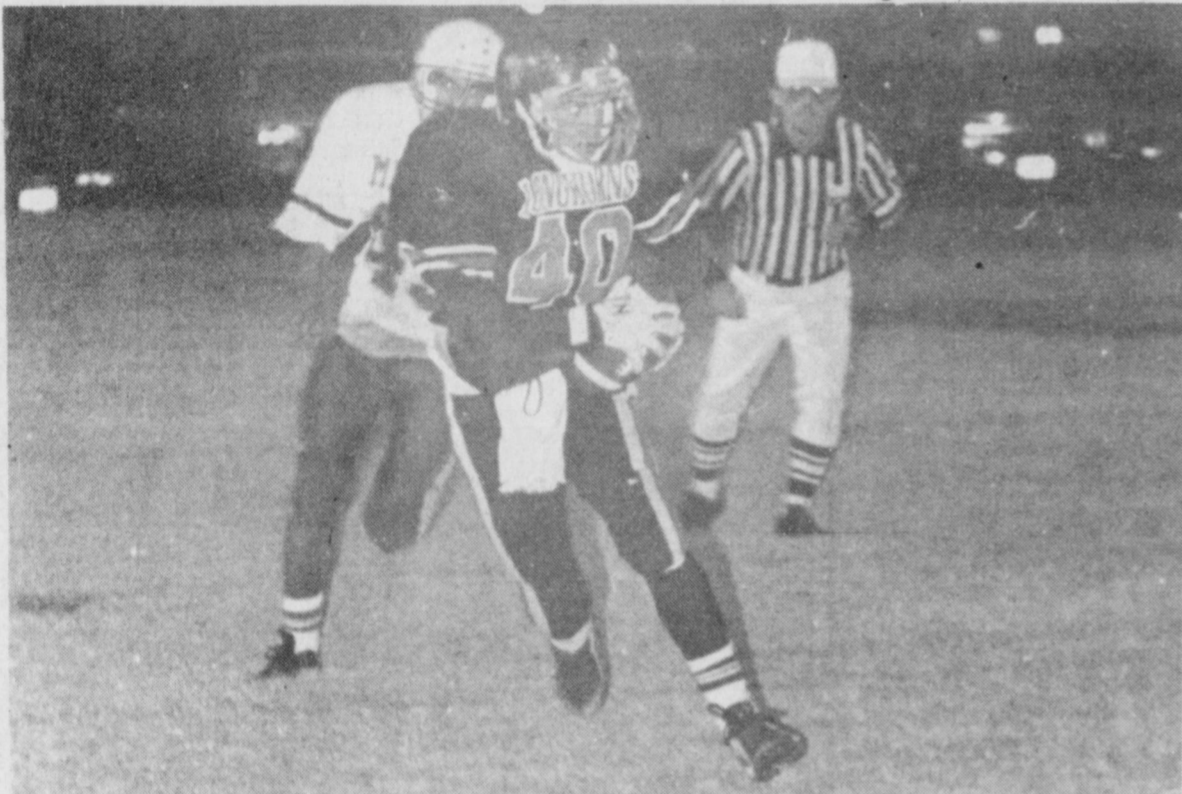
"I told the kids that this game could earn us some respect. We were the underdogs, and people were counting us out. We'll get some respect after this," Scisson continued.

Prior to the game, the Longhorns knew that they would have to slow Christoval's power rushing attack to have much of a chance. The Longhorns not only slowed it but they called a halt to the rushing early in the game.

Scisson stated that the Christoval Cougars were bigger than the Longhorns and was probably the toughest team the Longhorns faced since they played Hancock last year in the play offs.

All parents and fans are encouraged to attend and show their support.



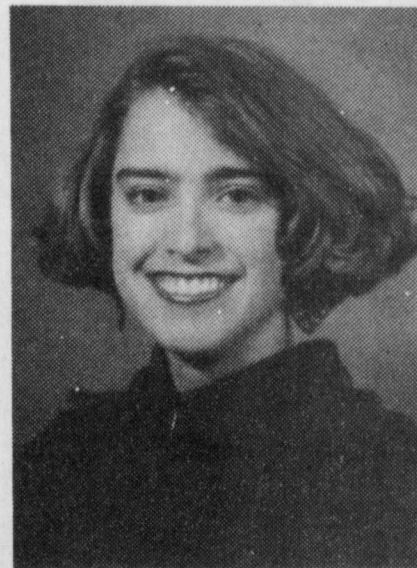

King candidates included: Octavio Perez, King; Micheal Smith,

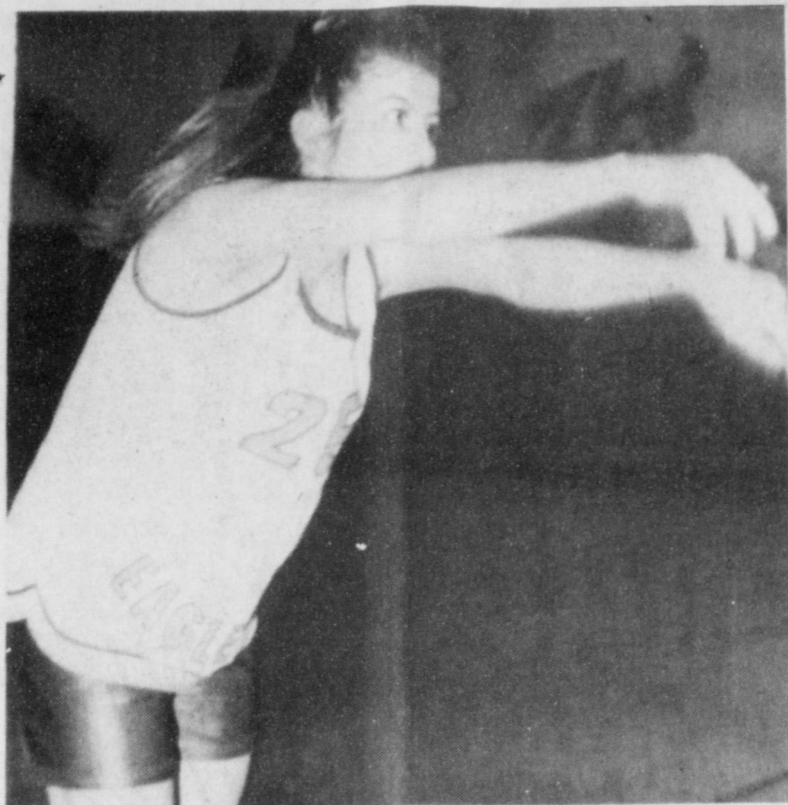

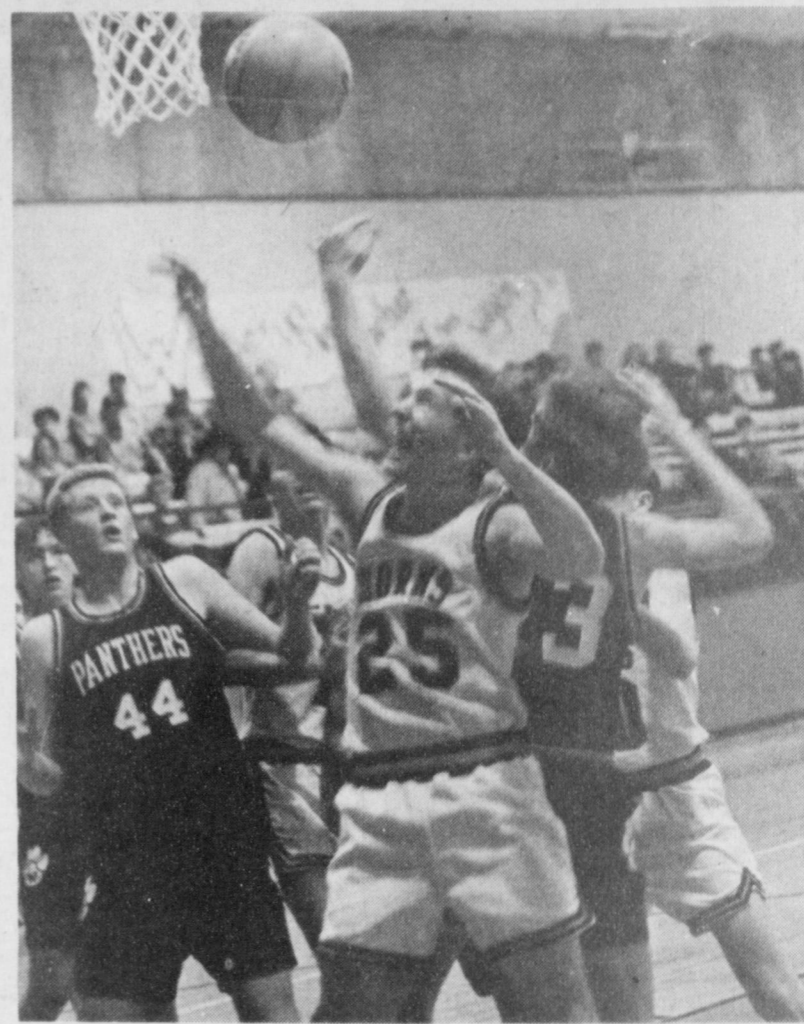
Tony Ureste ran wild for 336 yards and six touchdowns for the Cotton Center Elks.
