## Gas Rationing To Start November 22

Price Administrator Leon Henderson announced Saturday night that nation-wide gasoline rationing would start probably about November 22 with a basic ration of slightly under four gallons a week.

Motor fuel rationing for the country's 27,000,000 private vehicles—patterned after the system now in effect on the Atlantic seaboard will be merged with tire rationing into a single program, Henderson said. He did not explain how this would be accomplished.

## Organization Is Set Up Here For Big War Effort

Lamb County Salvage Drive Part of National Campaign In Schools

All schools in Littlefield and Lamb county will start a special scrap metal drive next Monday, October 5, V. F. Jones, county chairman of the Salvage committee, announced this week.

It is believed by members of the county salvage committee that making the campaign through the schools, more steel, iron and other junk will be collected.

County school students will be a part of a national Junior Army which on October 5 will begin a great attack of salvaging junk for the government's factories.

F. O. Boles, county superintendent, announced that every school in the county will make a great drive. Plans for each individual school will be made by school administrators.

F. A. Hemphill, Littlefield superintendent, announced the following plan for the local schools:

"Forty tons of scrap steel and iron before the first front" will be the slogan of local students as they join the National Junior Scrap Campaign which begins next Monday.

"Complete organization of the faculty and student bodies is being effected this week in order that the local schools may do their part in getting in the much needed iron for the National War Effort.

"Pupils bringing in iron and steel will be paid in war savings stamps, and prizes for individual and group honors will be granted.

"The high school pupils, under the direction of their teachers, will gather 17 tons; the central, primary and Negro schools will gather 15 tons, five tons, and three tons respectively."

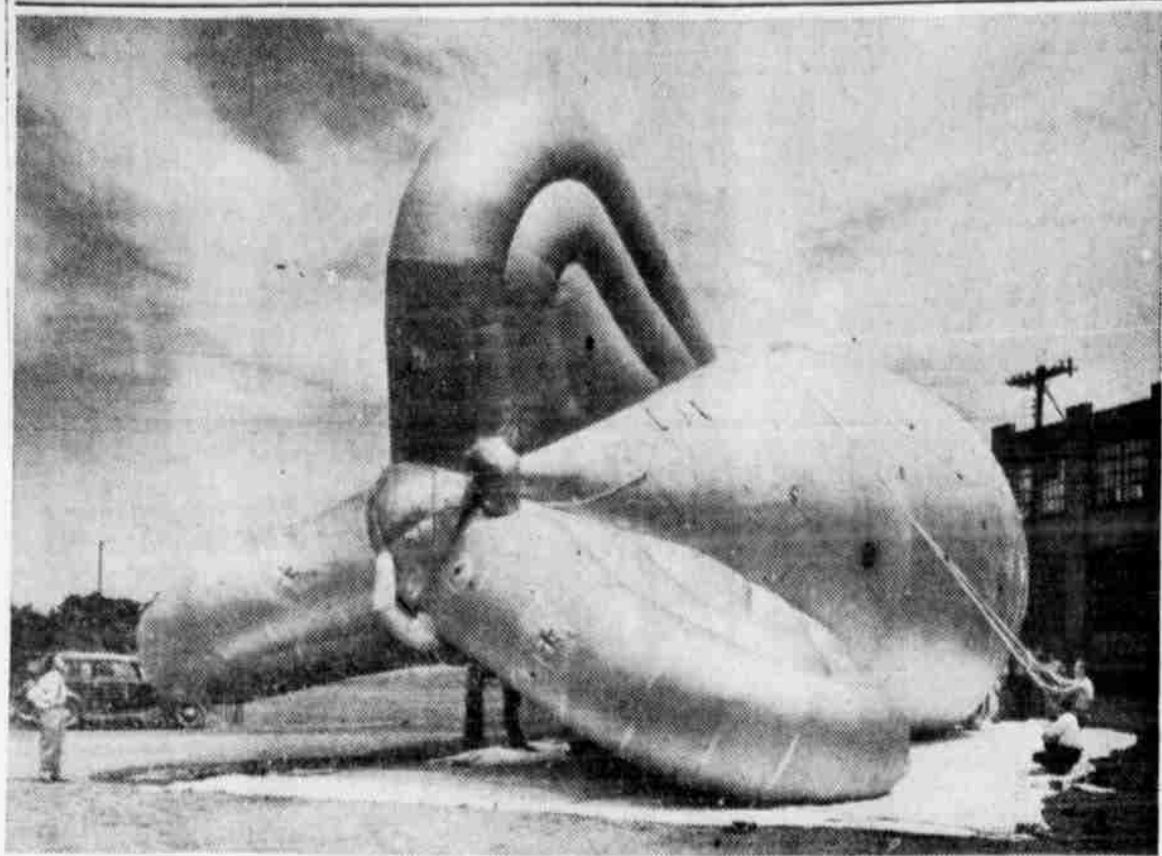

Henderson announced, will be a basic requirement for obtaining both tire and gasoline rations.

In addition, tires on all cars must be submitted every 60 days after rationing starts for on-wheel inspection to insure that proper care is given them.

The 35-mile speed limit on all highways and streets was decreed in an official ODT order. It did not carry enforcement or penal provisions but Eastman said he would request the governors of all states to make it effective through proclamations or otherwise. The governors will be asked to call upon state and local officials for strict enforcement.

The speed limit was ordered effective October 1, for all vehicles except trucks and busses operated by common carriers over regularly scheduled routes and for the latter October 15.

Motor vehicles operated by the Armed Forces or under their direction were exempted, as were cars driven in emergencies for the protection and preservation of life and health or for public safety. The latter must be held to reasonably speeds consonant with the emergency existing.

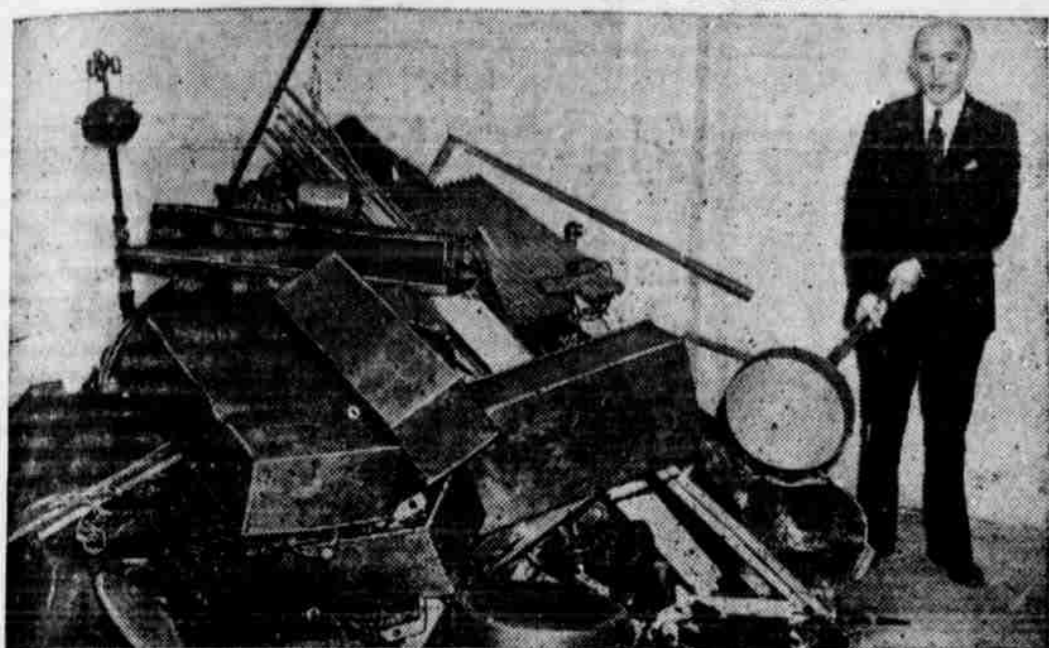

Applicants should be at least 17 years old and have a high school education or its equivalent. They'll have to pass a mechanical aptitude test to qualify.

The fledgling weatherman (or weatherwoman) will be known as junior observers in meteorology, and will draw down \$120 a month while they're in a three month's course of instruction on weather observing, weather coding, and the plotting of weather data on maps.

The ones who make the grade in this training course may be rapidly promoted, with duty in Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico.

# WONDERS NEVER CEASE: SAWMILL AT PLAINVIEW

## Sawmill At Plainview

Great is the Panhandle of Texas. You never know what to expect next in this great country. A new industry is being established in Plainview, and of all things! It is a sawmill! What are they going to use for wood? Mesquite or Russian thistles? Hardly. That sawmill is going to have the choice of the timber lands; those big sturdy redwood trees from California. It happened this way: a company has the contract to furnish the government a lot of redwood lumber at plants scattered throughout the Southwest. Requests were sent out giving specifications of buildings and lots necessary. It so happened that Plainview had exactly the layout demanded. Within a period of a week from the time the request was received, a lease had been made and ere long the sawmill will be in operation. The layman wonders why a sawmill here on the Plains until he discovers that much freight is saved when the logs are shipped from California, processed in transit and delivered to the war plant. A large amount of redwood is being used in all of the government plants in this section.—Canyon News.

## Warning: Ergot Poisoning

A threat to the livestock industry this fall is ergot poisoning which already has brought losses to Panhandle ranchers.

Ergot is a fungus disease which often affects the heads of many native grasses, rye, and other small grains during wet seasons. Dr. H. Schmidt of the Experiment Station Division of Veterinary Science explains that the fungus not only causes abortion but also may cause sloughing of the hoofs, horns, ears and tail.

Dr. Schmidt, together with other veterinary authorities and pathologists from Texas and Oklahoma, recently made a range inspection trip in the Panhandle. They found that Canada wild rye, Virginia wild rye, and Western wheat grass in the vicinity of Canadian are heavily infested with the fungus disease (ergot). The fungus was also found as far south as Gray

County.

Upon the invitation of County Agricultural Agent John O. Stovall of Hemphill county, approximately 50 ranchers who had suffered livestock losses met with the state and Federal officials.

Since there is no effective antidote for ergot poisoning, the diseases must be prevented by stopping consumption of infected grasses. George W. Barnes, animal husbandman for the A. and M. College Extension Service, recommends these general precautions:

Cut for hay before the plants head out meadows likely to become infected. Or cut the infected heads and remove them from pastures and meadows. Avoid feeding hay which contains infected heads. Provide livestock with an abundance of clean forage during the fall and winter when heads are softened by moisture and other forage is covered with snow. If necessary, remove stock from infested ranges.

## Care For Electrical Appliances

A large percentage of the service calls made by repairmen who work on electrical equipment can be traced to trouble in cords and their connections.

"Cut down on service calls by handling cords and appliances carefully," is the advice of Mrs. Bernice Claytor, specialist in home management for the A. and M. College Extension Service. "In storing or using appliance cord it is best not to kink or bend it sharply," she says. This causes the fine wires inside to break, making the cord useless. A cord should never be jerked from an outlet or appliance by the cord itself.

"Grasp the plug firmly when you are connecting or disconnecting the cord," the specialist suggests.

It is not advisable to overload any outlet with several extension cords, because the appliance may be damaged as a result.

Taking good care of electrical appliances is in line with the Victory Demonstrator's pledge signed by thousands of rural homemakers in Texas, for it will make them last longer and give better service.

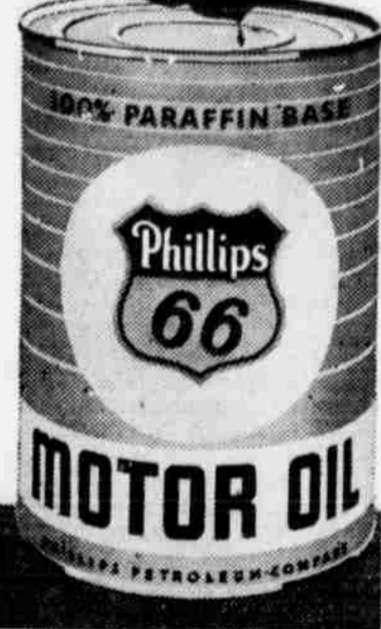

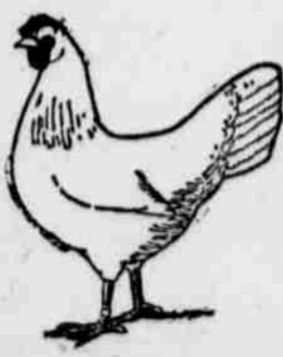

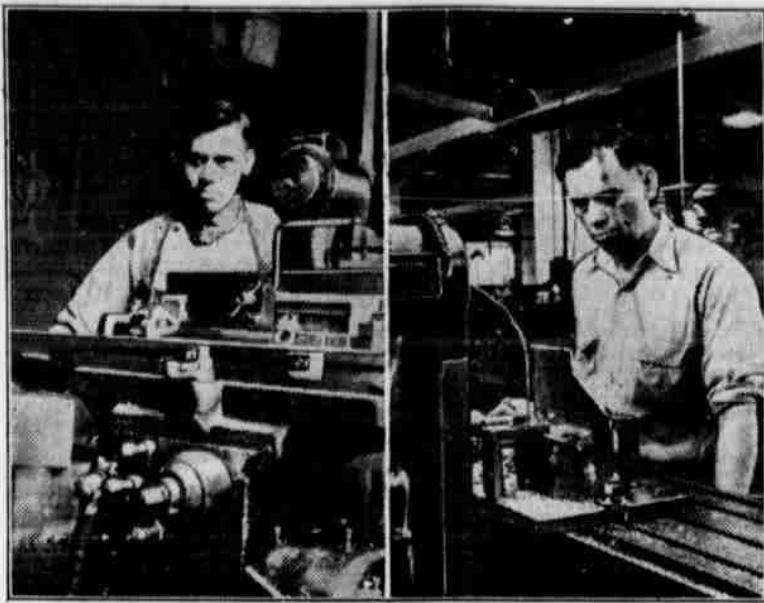

These unusual pictures show George Tucker of Detroit doing almost the identical armament job today that he did in World War I.

The picture at the left shows Tucker in 1917 at a milling machine in a Fisher Body plant which was engaged in building of warplanes. When this picture was taken Tucker was milling a propeller fitting.

At the right is Tucker at his job today—again operating a milling machine on aircraft manufacture in a

Fisher plant. The machine at the left was small in comparison with the one Tucker operates today, and all machines were driven off a main-line shaft instead of each having an individual motor as at present.

## Gov. Stevenson Proclaims October 4-10 "Fire Prevention Week" In Texas

Gov. Coke Stevenson has formally proclaimed October 4 to 10 as "Fire Prevention Week" in Texas.

Citing the urgent necessity for preventing fires during time of war, Gov. Stevenson said, ". . . the production of materials essential to the prosecution of the war by our nation is taxing the capacity of industrial plants, and curtailment of production because of fire becomes a menace to our own safety . . ."

The governor called upon Texas citizens and various local organiza-

tions to emphasize the danger of fire and to encourage fire prevention.

Commenting on Fire Prevention Week, Marvin Hall, state fire insurance commissioner, suggested that every Texan accept individual responsibility in adopting fire prevention measures at home and at work.

"According to the official proclamation," Hall said, "Fire Prevention Week has special significance this year. The defense of factories,

farms and homes against destruction by accidental fires is essential to the war production program and conservation of vital resources.

"There is another reason why we must devote more attention to preventing fires. We are now receiving dividends of lower insurance rates—the result of preventing fires. In

order to keep the low fire insurance rates now in effect, it will be necessary for us to prevent fires in the future."

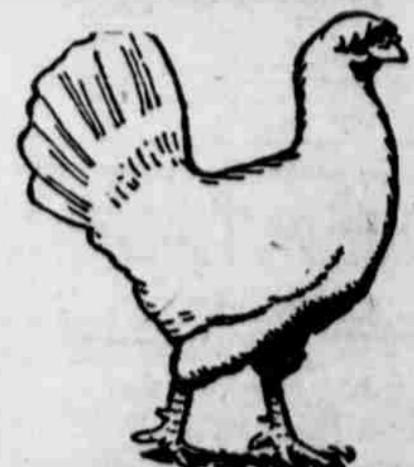

### Draft Boards Instructed To Reclassify Men

The Texas Selective Service System will give full cooperation to the recent action of the War Manpower Commission to increase the urgently needed war production of copper, critical non-ferrous metals and lumber within this state, Gen. J. Watt Page, state director of Selective Service, announced last week.

He said: "The War Manpower Commission has called for uninterrupted production and maintenance operations in all non-ferrous metal mining, milling, smelting, and refinings, and all logging and lumbering activities carried on within the states of Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Wyoming, California, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, New Mexico and Texas.

"Pursuant to a directive received from National Selective Service headquarters in support of this objective, Texas local boards have been instructed to reclassify out of Class II-A or Class II-B into a class immediately available for service, or out of Class III-B into Class III-A subject to the usual rights of appeal, any registrant who leaves a production or maintenance occupation in any of these activities without presenting satisfactory evidence

to his local board that his separation did not adversely affect the war effort."

This order, General Page pointed out, permits a worker to change jobs so long as that change, in the

opinion of the registrant's local board, does not adversely affect the war effort and that by changing he can increase production.

General Page emphasized in this connection that no classification is permanent and that the Selective Service regulations make it mandatory that each classified registrant reports to his local board in writing, within 10 days, any change in his occupational status.

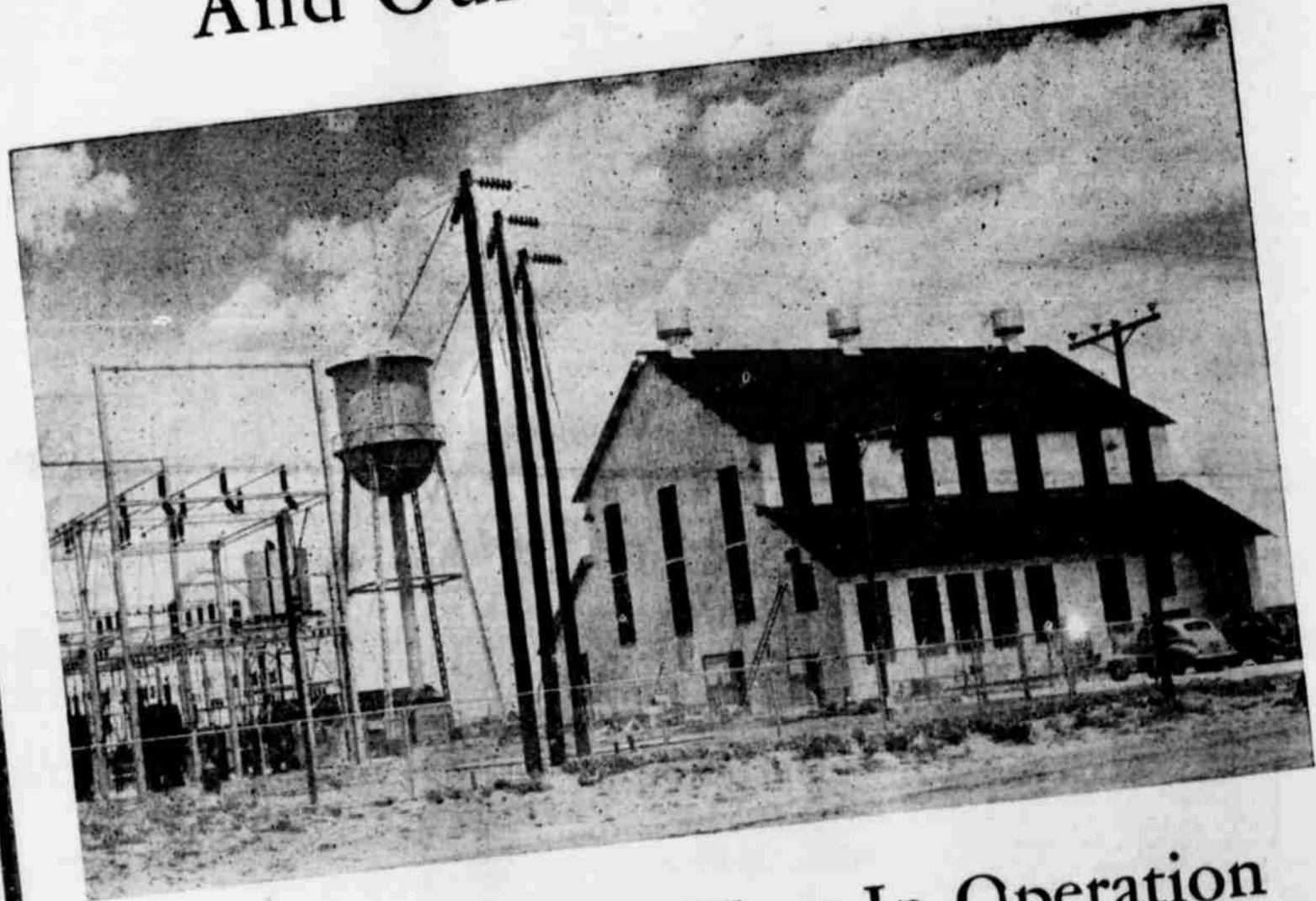
