# Public Hearing Set On U. S. 84 Bypass

## 1st Phase Appraisal Report Due

The general design of the Littlefield bypass in the U. S. Highway 84 four-laning program in Lamb County will be discussed at a public hearing here June 10, Rhea Bradley, Texas Highway Department resident engineer, announced this week.

The hearing is scheduled for 10 a. m. June 10 at the county courtroom at the Lamb County Courthouse.

Bradley will be on hand at the hearing to show preliminary sketches on the bypass project.

Meanwhile, it was announced by County Judge Pat Boone, Jr. that appraisal work on the first phase of the 84 widening program — from the Hockley County line to three miles southeast of Littlefield — is near completion.

The county judge said appraiser Homer Robbins has indicated he will turn over his report to the county by the end of May. Judge Boone said he hopes to have the report by May 31, when a regular meeting of the commissioners' court is set.

Once the appraisal has been reviewed by the county, it will be sent to the State Highway Department at Austin for review under the 50-50 right-of-way program. This work must be completed before negotiations for right-of-way on the first phase can begin. Officials expect to begin the actual acquisition of right-of-way on the first phase by this fall.

The Littlefield bypass is the second phase of the widening program. Appraisal work on the bypass section is scheduled to begin soon after the public hearing June 10.

Proposed route of the bypass is from three miles southeast of Littlefield south of town to three miles northwest of the city.

The bypass would cross Highway 385 between Crescent Park Motel and NIT Drive in Theatre, then travel west, crossing Highway 54 west of town near the old drive-in theatre.

No overpasses and no access roads are being planned for the bypass at this time, Bradley said.

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## Dial Numbers To Start With Familiar Figures

The first three numbers of all Littlefield telephone numbers should be easy to remember when General Telephone cuts over to dial operation here Aug. 21.

All numbers will start with "385."

That's the same number as one of the highways through Littlefield — U. S. 385.

Littlefield's numbers will be a combination of seven numbers rather than the letter prefix which is used in some dial operations. Lubbock, for instance, has a "Porter" prefix, which comes out with numbers like PO-3-1343.

Each exchange in the Littlefield district will have a different set of starting numbers, so it will be necessary for residents here to dial all seven numbers when they place a call.

District Manager Bob Saunders and a crew of five have been working the past 13 days on assignment of new numbers under the dial operation. They expect to finish the work this week.

For an idea of how the numbers are being changed, here's an example of one switch: The present local number of 331-W will become 385-3006.

Changing of each number requires "line-finder" and "connector" records.

"This is critical work," says Saunders, "because everything has to be right, or the whole operation could be thrown out of kilter."

Connection of thousands of lines later depends on the accuracy of the number assignment work being done now.

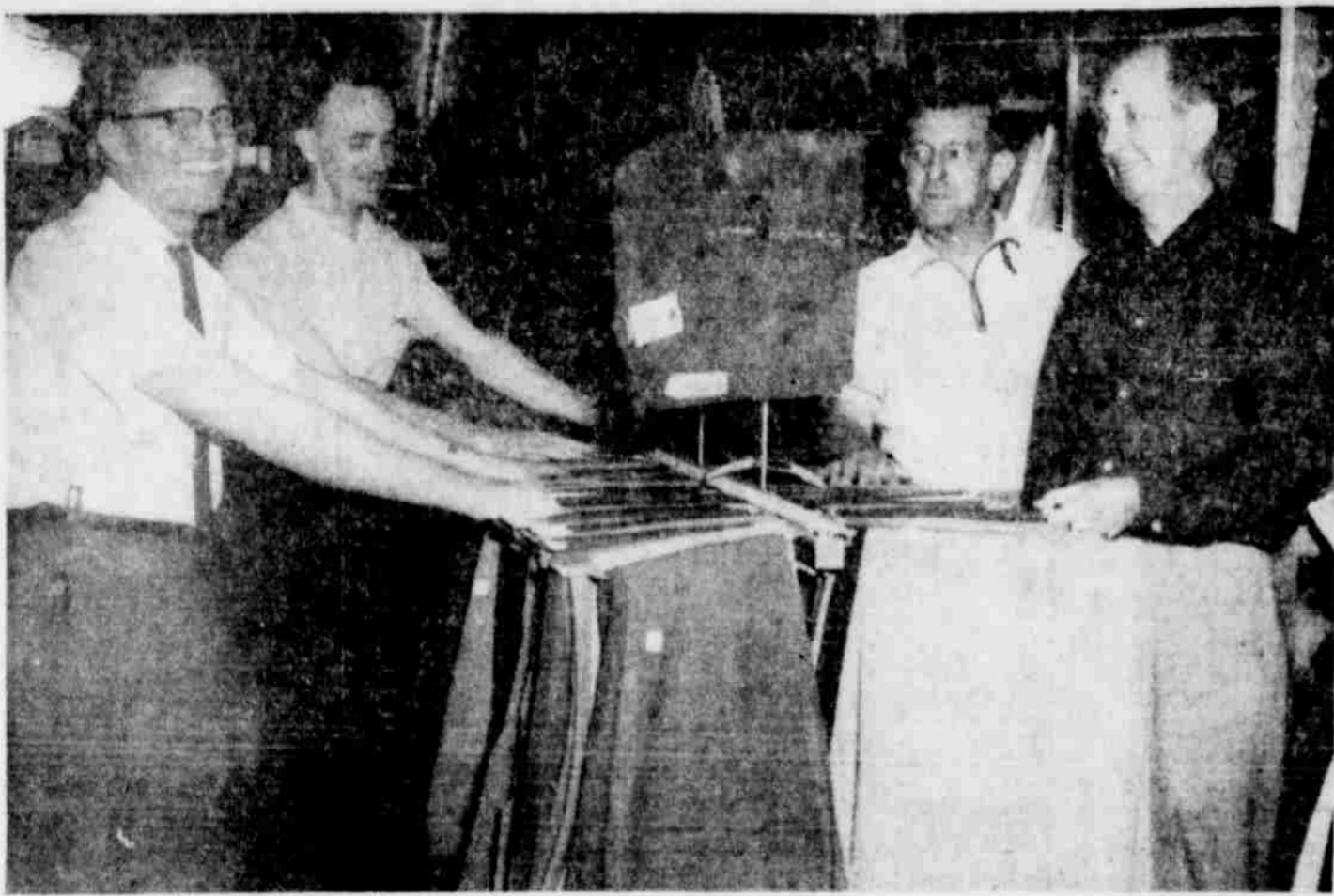

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**Soil Test Fee To Be Increased**

Due to increasing costs of operating the Soil Testing Laboratory at College Station, soil fees will be increased to a simple effective September 1, 1960. County Agricultural Agent W. R. Kimbrough said he had the information on the increase from Director J. H. Hutchison, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The increased costs for analytical chemicals used in the laboratory were listed as the primary cause for the increase.

Even though soil tests cost \$2 beginning September 1, Kimbrough pointed out that the fee spent for a soil analysis is the cheapest and most accurate method for determining fertilizer need, and as a guide in investing more profitably in lime and/or fertilizer.
