The decoration was the first awarded at the new Navy hospital at Santa Margarita Ranch, Oceanside, Calif. It was presented before several hundred hospital staff members by Capt. Joseph L. Schwartz, (MC) USN, medical officer in com-

Dirickson was landed on Guadalcanal in November, 1942, with Marine Raiders during the crucial stages of the battle for the strategic island.

He assisted in the establishment of front line hospitals and aid stations which treated wounded Marines and sick and injured island natives.

The Presidential award cites Navy and Marine men on the island for routing all enemy forces and seizing a valuable base within the ene-

"The courage and determination displayed in these operations were of an inspiring order," it adds.

Dirickson was on duty at the Naval Hospital at Pearl Harbor during the Japanese sneak raid of December 7, 1941. He recently was promoted to his present rate while on duty at the San Diego Marine Base. Transferred to the Oceanside Hospital, he supervises work in the maintenance department.

Dirickson entered the service in April, 1941, at the age of 17. After spending 21/2 years overseas he was granted a leave and came home in October.



#### Postal Rates Go Up Sunday Midnight

Postal rates went up at midnight Census Forms

It is estimated that the increase will bring in \$96,000,000 more revenue annually.

The out-ow-town letter rate of cents an ounce remains unchanged, as does the rate of 6 cents a half ounce on air mail to and from the armed forces outside the continental United States, but practically everything else will cost more.

Here are the principal increases affecting the average mail user: The local letter rate is increased

from 2 to 3 cents an ounce. The domestic air mail rate is increased from 6 to 8 cents an ounce. Every parcel post package will

Money order rates are increased Some examples: one cent to \$2.50, 6 to 10 cents; \$10.01 to \$20, 13 to class was purchased by Garlington- 22 cents; \$80.01 to \$100, 22 to 37

> Registration fees are increased about one-third. These increases range from 5 cents (15 to 20 cents) for an indemnity limit of \$5 to 35 cents (\$1 to \$1.35) for \$1,000 indemnity.

The 2-cent-an-ounce increase in the domestic air mail rate applies to

Under the rate revision, Alaska continues to be included in the continental United States as far as civilian air mail is concerned, but outside the continental United States for mail to and from the armed forces.

Heretofore, all air mail to and from Alaska has taken a rate of 6 cents an ounce. Under the revision, the civilian rate becomes 8 cents an ounce, and the military rate 6 cents a half ounce.







#### "A" GAS COUPONS VALUE UNCHANGED BY REDUCTIONS

Value of "A" gasoline coupons has not been changed by the reduc-tion of "A" rations from three to two gallons a week for this section of the country, the Office of Price Administration announced today in answer to a great many inquiries concerning the reduction.
