The parade will form at the south end of Phelps Avenue in front of the courthouse and will move north to the Santa Fe station.

After the parade, a drawing is to be be held at 4:30 on fourth street between XIT and Phelps when \$300 in gift certificates will be given away. Stores which are participating in the big bicycle give-away program will start registering customers immediately after the parade. Murray explained that stores which are participating in this big program can be identified by displays of the bicycle give-away page advertisement appearing in this paper.

Registration for the gift certificates will take place all day Friday.

Altogether, 32 bicycles are to be given away, the drawings to be held on December 23. Only boys and girls of school age may win, but older folk may register in the name of children, Murray explained.

"We want everybody in our trade territory to register for the bicycles at each of the stores participating," Murray said. "We know there are going to be 32 happy boys and girls on Christmas morning, because all these bicycles are fancy, beautiful bicycles."

The bicycles, incidentally, will be ridden in the parade by the merchants.

After the parade Santa Claus will set up his headquarters on a vacant lot on Phelps, and Murray says Santa is inviting all his little friends to come by and visit with him. In fact, Santa will be in his booth most of the time from then until December 23 when he will return to the North Pole to get ready for his traditional all-night ride to deliver presents.

Altogether, \$1,800 worth of gift certificates and bicycles wil be given away by Littlefield merchants in one of the biggest Christmas promotions ever staged here. The gift certificates, of course, will be good for merchandise at participating stores.

School age and older persons may register for the bicycle drawings, but the committee points out that the bicycles may go only to children.

"Adults who do not have children may register in the names of relatives or neighbor children." Murray said. "since the bicycles will go only to school-age boys and girls."

All schools and other organizations in this area are invited to send floats to Littlefield for the parade. The

parade is only the kick-off to the entire Christmas Stockin' Festival. Other events will be staged between now and December 23, and stores are going all out to put everything in readiness for the Christmas trade. Bargains galore will be offered.

Christmas street decorations have been completed and will be officially turned on for the first time Friday night, although practice "runs" will be staged each night. The decorations are mounted to permanently-installed equipment, and each unit is rigged with its own special switches and controls.

Still later the Chamber's Christmas Stockin' committee will announce plans for the annual Christmas home lighting decoration contest to be launched early in December.

Murray said a sub-committee is drawing up plans for this feature of the yuletide program and prize money and rules will be announced soon.

"Altogether we are expecting this to be the biggest year ever for Littlefield in its Christmas Stockin' celebration," Murray summed up, "and we expect to see the streets lined with people long before the parade gets under way."
