Expect To Start At Once; To Care For 240 Members

Additional Project Of 200 Mile Line To Be Submitted

As announced by O. K. Woodall, manager of the Lamb County Electric Cooperative, a rural electrification project covering 120 miles to take care of about 240 new members, over a scattered area of north part of Hockley County, all over Lamb County, and along the west line of Hale and east line of Cochran County, has been approved by the Rural Electrification Administration, St. Louis, Mo.

Mr. Woodall added that members on the proposed line were secured before the war started, hence the maps, plans and lists are all ready to go ahead. As the average electric bill amounts to \$4.30, this will mean an increase in revenue for the Cooperative of about \$1000 monthly.

A project in this area, which includes a number of short lines, and aggregating in all about 110 miles, with Taylor & Montgomery of Lubbock in charge, will be completed this week, according to Mr. Woodall, who added that he hoped they could at once start on the new 120 mile project.

The local organization is also working on a third proposition to present 200 mile additional project to the Rural Electrification Administration at St. Louis, and will have their application ready to submit in about two weeks.

The local office was first advised by the St. Louis office of the above approval, and also received a telegram from Congressman George Mahon giving this favorable news.

New Water Well Now In Operation

As announced by W. G. Street, City Secretary, the water was turned on from one of the new City wells Tuesday morning, which will provide the citizens with additional water at the rate of 500 gallons per minute.

"We believe our water troubles are over," stated Mr. Street, who said the other well under construction would be turned on in September, providing they were able to secure materials necessary.

The large cement water reservoir with a capacity of 200,000 gallons has been completed.

L. A. Robison Dies Suddenly

Local War Veterans Endorse Charter Ratification

Immediate ratification of the San Francisco Charter without reservations or revisions is the recommendation of most Texas veterans.

Richard New post number 301 of the American Legion in its meeting at Littlefield on July 23, 1945, adopted a resolution endorsing immediate ratification of the Charter. The Legion does not want this resolution ruined by reservations as was the case with the League of Nations following the last war. We believe our

we believe the resolution by our post accurately reflects the sentiments of all Texas veterans. The resolution is as follows:

"Whereas although the United Nations Conference which was concluded on June 26 at San Francisco in remarkably short time, has prepared a charter and the blueprint for an organization designed to accomplish world peace; and

Whereas, although we recognize that it is not a perfect plan, we believe that it is the best that could be done at this time and under

existing circumstances; and

Whereas we believe the San Francisco Charter should be ratified by our government without reservations or revisions but that revisions for improving it should await the experience that will come from using it; and

Whereas we believe that the World Security Organization ought to be put into operation as soon as possible; and

Whereas we believe that immediate ratification by our Government enhance the prestige of our nation

in World Affairs and will encourage the governments of all nations to promptly ratify the charter, and that it may hasten the end of the Japanese War and save the lives of American men; Now therefore

Be it resolved that this American Legion post Number 301 assembled in a meeting at Littlefield, Texas on this 23 day of July, 1945, do hereby express our hope that our government will ratify the San Francisco Charter immediately and without revisions, which is in accordance with the wishes of our

President, Senators Vandenburg and Connally, and other leaders; and

Be it further resolved that we endorse the setting into operation of the world security organization as quickly as possible and

Be it further resolved that copies of this resolution shall be sent to the President, to the Secretary of State, and to Senators Tom Connally and W. Lee O'Daniel, and to the Texas Members of congress, and that a copy shall be sent to the 5th District Commander and be presented for appropriate action at

the next 5th District Convention.

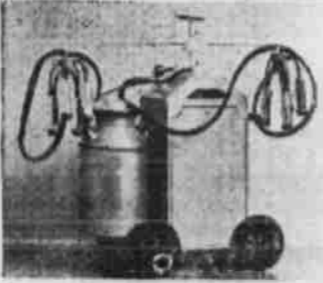

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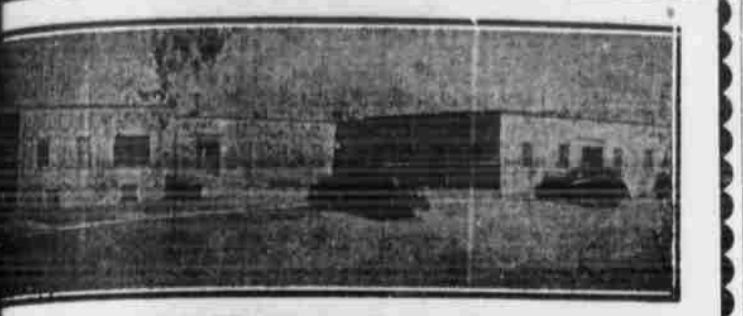

Lieut. Dunnagin has seen action in France, North Africa and Italy. He reports to El Paso August 21, and believes he will be sent to the South Pacific.

With South Plains Men In The Armed Forces

S-Sgt. Dan J. Clark, 28, son of Mr. D. J. Clark of Olton, Texas, has been assigned to the occupational air force in Europe as a member of the 99th Bombardment Group, 546th Bombardment Squadron, a veteran B-17 Flying Fortress unit of the 5th Air Force.

Sgt. Clark has served 16 months overseas as an Armorer.

The 99th Group is now assigned the task of maintaining the peace of Europe after assisting in winning the victory. During its more than 26 months of action overseas in Africa and Italy the group participated in 395 successful bombing missions against enemy targets.

More than 5,000,000 pounds of bombs were dropped on enemy installations in Africa, Sicily, Italy, Germany, Austria, Hungary, Rumania, Greece, Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia.

The Distinguished Unit Citation was awarded the group for outstanding performance on a mission of July 5 1943, against a Nazi airfield at Gezbini, Sicily. A cluster was added to this citation following the group's blasting of an important enemy target at Wiener-Neustadt, Austria, Apr. 23, 1944, against heavy opposition of Jerry fighters and anti-aircraft fire.

Lieut. Morrie E. Williams, son of A. W. Williams of Olton, arrived home Thursday from two years overseas service. He is home on 30 days furlough.

The brothers have not seen one another for 7 years. It is hoped Pfc Williams can visit his brother in Olton.

"No carrier shall reserve, assign or allocate seating or sleeping space on a passenger train more than 120 hours in advance of scheduled departure time of such train. No carrier shall issue a ticket for a reserved seat or sleeping space on a passenger train more than 120 hours in advance of scheduled departure of such train, except in the case of tickets for reservations made prior to the effective date of this Order which have not been picked up."

OFFICE OF DEFENSE TRANSPORTATION
GENERAL ORDER 53

"On and after 12 o'clock noon, July 15, 1945, no common carrier by railroad or sleeping car company shall operate or transport any railway car containing sleeping space or sleeping accommodations to a point a distance 450 miles or less from the point of origin of such car, such distance being measured by the shortest distance by railroad over which sleeping cars are operated between such points. Each common carrier by railroad shall forthwith cancel all reservations for space after 12 o'clock noon on July 15, 1945."

What about Travel now.... under the new Government rulings?

The Government has curtailed civilian travel by ordering the railroads not to make reservations on passenger trains more than five days in advance of departure and by banning sleeping car service on trips of 450 miles or less.

A lot of people are assuming that, with the European war over, the travel situation on trains should have eased up by now.

But they are finding out that it's harder than ever to get space. They're asking themselves, "Why?"

The reason is simply that the railroads are being called upon to repeat a job of moving over 3,000,000 soldiers. But this time it is to be done in 6 to 9 months whereas originally it took more than 2 years to move these men.

The railroads are still operating with the same number of passenger cars that they had when the war started. Building new passenger cars has not been permitted since Pearl Harbor.

Many Pullman cars have been converted into

hospital cars, and, of course, more Pullmans and coaches than ever are being withdrawn from civilian service to use in the movement of men to the Pacific.

The great bulk of traffic for the Pacific funnels into 4 railroads to ports of embarkation in California. Santa Fe, with its improved facilities, is carrying a large part of this traffic.

This all adds up to the fact that only a very limited amount of space is left over for civilian travel.

Of course we like to accommodate our friends and make new acquaintances. But you, too, agree that the troops and materials needed to whip Japan *must* come first.

New cars are now on order. Santa Fe has enough new chair cars on order to seat 3186 people. 16 new lunch counter-diners are also on order. A substantial number of new sleeping cars will be placed in service on the Santa Fe as soon as War Production Board orders permit.

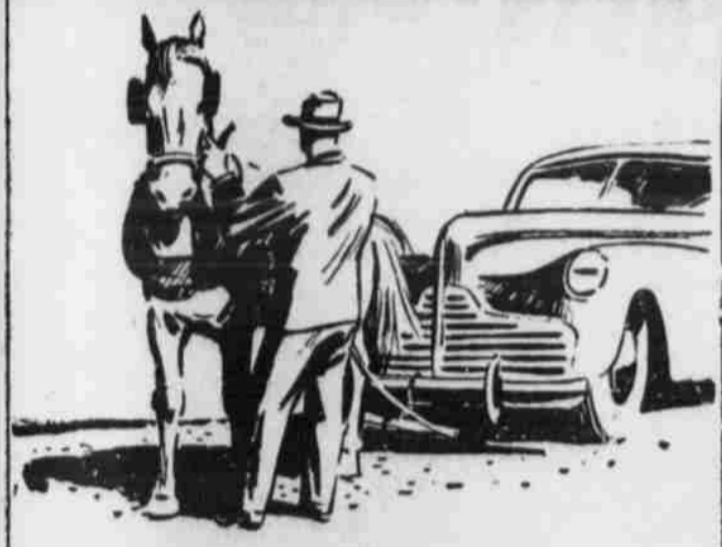

Imprisoned In 11 War Camps

Sgt. Leland A. Parker, of Tyler, and a visitor in the home of Rev. and Mrs. Jack Power here last week, has the unusual record of being interned in 11 Prisoner of War Camps during the period from February 17, 1943, when he was captured in the invasion of North Africa, and confined in a prison camp in Tunisia, and April 22, 1945, when he was liberated by the Russians from the German Prison Camp at Luckenwalder, Camp 3-A, 30 miles south of Berlin.

Speaking of the Russians, Sgt. Parker had nothing but the very best to say for them. "The best buddy I ever had" was the way he described the Russian to a reporter from the Leader office, adding:

"The Russians are rough and rugged. We were actually with the Russians 3 or 4 days, following our liberation, in their mopping up operations, but they made us keep behind them and would not let us take part for fear we would get hurt. We were their guests of honor. They either gave us food, or took us to a German home and demanded we get the best and be kept and fed for the night. They gave us bicycles, and we went sightseeing on the bicycles. I finally quit that, however, as I got sick riding around every day on a bicycle, and turned into an American evacuation hospital about May 15; left for home June 10, and arrived in the States June 18.

Sgt. Parker, son of Mrs. Lillie Parker of Tyler, was first taken prisoner in the North African invasion February 17, and imprisoned in Sfax Camp, Tunis, North Africa; later taken to Camp in Sicily; later moved from there to Camp 59 near Sivellagnana, Italy. Italy capitulated on Sept. 8, 1943, and on Sept. 14, the entire camp of 1200 prisoners escaped into the Italian mountains. The Fascists kept on fighting, and several hundred of the prisoners were re-taken within a few days and sent to German Camps. Sgt. Parker was fortunate to evade the Fascists, and was able to keep free and lived with an Italian family for 5 months from Sept. 20 until Dec. 28, when he was recaptured and put in another Camp in Italy. He, however, escaped and went back to the family he had been living with.

stayed with lived down in a valley, in a rough section, where there were no roads, and you couldn't drive automobiles; that the main method they had of working the land was with oxen. He said there were many farms in Italy where there was not an animal on the place, and they would plow the land with a big forked hoe.

The Germans picked up Parker again March, 1944 and kept him in an Italian camp until June, when they transferred him to Stalag 7-A, at Mauseberg, Germany, where he was imprisoned until September, 1944, when he was sent to Stalag B-3 at Frestenberg, Germany; and was later marched from there to Stalag 3-A at Luckenwalder, Germany, from where he was liberated by the Russians on April 22, 1945.

When asked how he fared in the Prison camps, Sgt. Parker stated that it "was pretty rough", adding that the main thing they lacked was food, and that there were so many fleas and lice they couldn't sleep when they did go to bed, so they didn't care about going to bed.

The eleven prison camps, in which Sgt. Parker was imprisoned, included 3 North African, 5 Italian Camps and 3 German camps.

Sgt. Parker is wearing several decorations, including Combat Infantry badge and ETO Ribbon with two major battle stars.

He accompanied Rev. Jack Power from Decatur to Littlefield recently and was a guest in the Power home for several days.

Neal Montgomery Gets Air Medal

S-Sgt. Neal R. Montgomery of Littlefield, who is a senior gunner on a Guam based B-29 Superfortress, writes his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Montgomery, that he has completed 21 missions over Japan comprising 310 hours of combat flying. He has been awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement in aerial flight.

Sgt. Montgomery said in his letter that on several missions the smoke was four or five miles high, fires were visible up to 200 miles and that at times the fires were burning so brightly that Jap anti-aircraft gunners didn't use searchlights since the Superforts were plainly visible from the fires below. He said that on one mission they received a flak hole only three feet from his position in the plane but that the Jap fighter planes do not approach them very often. He is the only Texan in the crew and was attending Texas Tech. before entering the Air force in 1943.

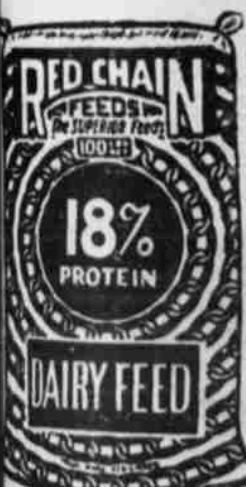

Mrs. Rhodes has five brothers in the service, four of whom have been reared in the Rhodes home. They are:

Pfc Frederick Mitchell, who served in the European area as a paratrooper, was wounded, and has been a patient in the McCloskey Hospital, Temple. He underwent a head operation recently, when a plate was put in his forehead. He was due to receive a medical discharge Aug. 1.

Louis Mitchell Mo. MM 1-C, stationed in the Pacific;
Spurgeon Mitchell SC 1-C, now at Pearl Harbor;
William Dale (Billie) S 2-C, who just recently left for overseas; and
2nd. Lieut. David R. E. Mitchell, with the Infantry, stationed at Camp Hood, Texas.

Hicks right leg was broken before he got out of the plane. The bomber was passing over a heavy flak area and probably was struck by anti-aircraft fire. The co-pilot had both arms broken. One other crew member was known to have gone through the ordeal alive.

Lt. Hicks managed in some way to get to a Czech home after his plane fell, where he spent the night, and where the woman of the house kindly offered to cook him breakfast, and otherwise was kindly toward him. Suffering from his leg he was not hungry for food at the time, but stated that he was sorry he hadn't eaten for following his being taken prisoner he nearly starved to death.

At the Czech home, Lt. Hicks said, he was unconscious part of the time, and when he came to, a German boy about 12 years of age was standing over him with a long knife ready to cut his head off, when the Czech woman stopped him, thereby saving the flyer's life.

As a prisoner he was given sawdust bread and grass soup, and lost 50 pounds from December until April 29. His broken leg did not get any medical attention until 23 days later, when it was put in a cast. However, it was not given the proper treatment, and the bone is now said to be perishing, and may possibly have to be amputated.

Lt. Hicks told relatives here that everything you hear of German cruelty to prisoners is true.

Miss Lanelle Ivy of Hale Center and Lieut. Hicks were married on June 26th last at the First Baptist Church, Hale Center. Mrs. Hicks is making her home at McKinney, while her husband is a patient in the General Hospital at that city.

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
