Torches Are Dangerous

For twenty-seven years, Karl H. Von Wiegand, has stood in back of the European and Far East firing lines, and called the score. He is recognized as Dean of political observers and foreign correspondents, When Von Wiegand sums up a situation, or makes a prediction, he is very much considered in Rome, Berlin, London and all the capitols.

In a recent article written in Paris. Von Wiegand tries to visualize Spain's political future and its influence on the Americas. He points out the racial ties between Spain and the Latin Americas, as well as the traditions and common heritages which will affect the lives of many people outside of

If we were asked to cite a shining example of a Fine Journalist, we would promptly name Von Wiegand who has walked with dignity and calmness, through paths strewn with intrigue, feuds, corruption and the blood of innocent millions. Through it all he has never lost his balance, nor has he wayered from his mission as an observer and news gatherer.

At times when everyone was more or less under suspicion - Von wiegand has retained the respect of rulers, cabinets, and the people whom he gathers the news for.

We do not know of a single keyman in Europe, who is in a better position to render real service than is this well informed news gatherer. He should be able, and no doubt will give us, an accurate and unbiased account of conditions and developments.

Perhaps - it would be best for us to receive our impressions through the experienced and far-seeing eyes of such men as Von Wiegand, rather than to absorb a lot of propoganda eminating from self-concerned sources.

These are dangerous days, when it behooves all of us, to be most careful in arriving at conclusions. We must watch our sources of information and be very slow to spread gossip, rumors and incendiary news matter.

A Century And A Half

The New York World's Fair, which opened on April 30, commemorates the 150th anniversary of the inauguration of the first President, George Washington, who took the oath of office on the balcony of Federal Hall, at what is now the corner of Wall and Nassau streets, New York

Many people have doubtless wondered how the capital of the new nation was located in New York, in the first place, why it remained there so short a time, and how it came to be moved to the brand-new city of Wash-

The new government was the successor to the inefficient Continental Congress, which had been knocked about from pillar to post from the beginning of the Revolution, finally meeting in New York from 1785 on, So although the Constitution of the new government had been drafted in Philadelphia, the President and Congress elected under it had to go to New York to take over from the old government.

The Constitution provided that the first Congress should determine upon a permanent location for the capital of the new nation. New York wanted to be it, but it was a small city, much smaller than Philadelphia.

The Southern members of the first Congress wanted the capital in their territory. So they agreed to give the nation ten miles square on the Potomac, in exchange for their support of Alexander Hamilton's plan for funding the national debt. Congress voted to move the capital to Philadelphia for ten years and then to the new city.

New York has got along pretty well without being the capital of the nation, Indeed, it probably has got along better than it would have done if its interests had been centered on polities. It had 15,000 population when George Washington was inaugurated. Now it has seven and a half million people and is the largest and wealthlest city in the world.

Instead of depending on government New York has grown without the aid of government; indeed, the city contributes to government far more in proportion to its numbers than any other part of the nation.



Pres. Roosevelt Signs \$549,000,000 War Appropriation Bill

With a speed which surprised the capital, President Roosevelt signed into law the \$549,000,000 war department appropriation bill, and immediately thereafter the army high command placed a record-breaking order for 571 warplanes at a cost

of more than \$50,000,000. Moreover, Secretary of War Woodring, declaring that he wanted to assure the American people as to "readiness and adequacy" of the army, disclosed steps to weed out the over-aged and physically unfit among the service's 12,500 of ficers.

These developments occurred on the same day that Great Britain announced conscription, and two days before Chancellor Hitler's scheduled speech replying to President Roosevelt's recent request for peace guarantees.

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Fort Sam Houston, Texas, April 29.-The War Department has announced that a number of appointments as second lieutenant in the Regular Army, less the Air Corps, will be made in the near future from honor graduates of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps. Appointments will be confined to honor graduates in the senior Re-serve Officers' Training Corps division of institutions, other than medical, that offer a college degree upon satisfactory completion of four years' college work, and to Jorps graduates of Class Ml inst tutions. However, honor graduates of Class MI institutions to be eli-

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gible must belong to the graduating class of a senior college or university and have been selected by the president of the institution as honor graduate for scholastic excellence. A board of Regular Army officers will be appointed to examine the candidates and recommend selections for appointment. It is contemplated that this board will visit certain institutions at the earliest practicable date for the purpose of examining applicants.

Honor graduates desiring to ap-

pear before this board for the purpose of competing for this appointment in the Regular Army should communicate with any Professor of recommended. Military Science and Tactics or with the Commanding General, Eighth Cooper apartments.
