Lamb County Victory Loan Drive will get underway in Littlefield Friday morning, though it is officially scheduled to start Monday, October 29. The quota for the county is \$470,000, of which \$185,000 are to be purchased in E-Bonds.

Littlefield's overall quota is \$170,950, of which \$75,475.50 is the E-Bond quota.

Final arrangements for the drive will be made Thursday, when the local Rotary Club, with G. O. Stone, county chairman for the Victory Loan drive, in charge of the program, will be hosts to chairmen of the various cities and communities in the county, at the regular weekly luncheon meeting.

C. E. Smith, Plainview, regional director, and George Benson, Lubbock, member of the State War Finance Committee, will attend the meeting and make talks in the interest of the drive.

Special guests expected for the occasion are Captain Robert Hite and his mother, Mrs. Lena Hite of Earth.

## ELECTRIC RATES ARE REDUCED

Southwestern Public Service Company has announced another reduction in electric rates in Littlefield. It is the second voluntary rate reduction made by the electric service company in one year's time. The new rate starts at 6c per kilowatt hour and graduates down as low as 18/10c per kilowatt hour.

When the Southwestern Public Service Company took over the operation of the electric system in Littlefield in September, 1942, the top rate was 10c. On October 1, 1944, the top rate was reduced to 7 1/2c.

## Good Oil Showing in Lamb County Test

Humble No. 1 Arnold, southeast Lamb county exploration, in northwest quarter of section 120, R. M. Thomason survey, and one mile west of the first oil well in the Anton field, had drilled below 5,856 feet in dolomite, and was reported to have over 700 feet of oil, and no water in the hole.

Humble Oil & Refining company has filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas to drill No. 1 Campbell, in northeast Hockley county to 10,000 feet, starting as soon as a large rotary rig can be moved in and put in operation.

The project was started to drill to 6,000 feet. It is in northwest quarter of section 116, block A, R. M. Thomason survey. It had reached 6,075 feet, in dolomite, and had suspended operations to move in the large rig.

So far as had been reported it had not developed any shows of oil or gas in drilling to that depth. It is one mile due south of the initial producer in the Anton field in extreme southeast Lamb county.

## 2nd Lt. Curtis Lee Home Discharged

2nd Lt. Curtis Lee, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Lee of Yellowhouse Switch, of the Air Forces, who has been stationed at Euphrata Air Field, Euphrata, Wash., as a pilot on a B-24, arrived home Wednesday last week, honorably discharged. He received his release at Amarillo on October 11.

Lt. Lee has been in the service for about three years, and was ready to go overseas with a crew, scheduled for the South Pacific, when the Japanese was declared over.

He will return to his studies at Tech College in the spring, and in the meantime will help his parents on their farm.

Lt. Lee is a brother of Mrs. D. L. Freeman, formerly superintendent of nurses at the Littlefield Hospital.

## Expect to Complete Raising Necessary Funds This Week

Meeting of Investors Being Called For Monday Night October 29

Plans are about complete for the organization of a home building savings and loan association for Littlefield.

Following a recent meeting of a group of business men, a committee made a canvass of the business section and received pledges of \$1000 each from 25 business men toward the project, which is being sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

The Committee in charge, having gone into the matter with Knox Thomas, head of a similar association at Lubbock, decided to send a delegate to the regional district headquarters of the Federal Home Loan Bank, Little Rock, Arkansas.

Mayor A. C. Chesher accordingly made a trip to Little Rock, and discussed with Hugh D. Wallace, regional district representative, the proper method of organizing such an association here. Mr. Wallace suggested that the association should have an original investment of \$75,000, and outlined the necessary procedure for organizing.

Mr. Chesher returned to Littlefield Wednesday of last week and called a meeting Thursday night, reporting his findings. It was decided at this meeting to raise the amount suggested by the Federal Home Loan Bank official.

Considerable more funds have been pledged, and it was expected that the figure of \$75,000 would be completely pledged by today (Thursday).

A meeting of the investors is being called for Monday night, October 29, at 8 o'clock, at the office of the Chamber of Commerce in the City Hall, when the organization will be completed, and directors elected for management of the association. All investors are urged to attend and share in the election.

The association has been named The First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Lamb County.

In an interview with a Leader representative, Tuesday, the committee in charge explained that the profits from the organization are divided among the investors in proportion to the amount of investment; that there is no liability on the part of any investor, and the government guarantees all investments up to the amount of \$5000 to any one investor; the funds are handled under government supervision and all investors are insured under the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, so that investments are guaranteed against loss in this way, and the profits from the investment are divided equally among the investors according to investment.

This program is fostered by the government to encourage savings and home building, according to the committee in charge.

Mr. Sessums will interview veterans and their dependents or their representatives; furnishing general information pertaining to disability and death compensation and pension, Hospitalization, Out-Patient service, Government Insurance, Vocational Rehabilitation, Education or Training, Guaranty of Loans, Readjustment Allowances and other benefits to which veterans or their dependents may be entitled by law administered by the Veteran's Administration.

Advice and assistance will be given in executing forms, and developing evidence necessary to make claims and to render such other service as may be needed.

**SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON**

By CONG. GEO. MAHON

Figures make dry reading, but I believe the following will be of interest. A few days ago the House, on the recommendation of the Appropriations Committee, rescinded fifty-two billion dollars (\$52,000,000,000) in appropriations — money which had heretofore been approved for war spending. The biggest slice was recovered from the Army—thirty billion (\$30,000,000,000). From the Navy seventeen billion (\$17,000,000,000) was recovered. The remaining amounts were subtracted from other agencies.

In money, World War I cost us twenty-six billion dollars. Total expenditures for World War II, including the money spent on national defense just prior to the war, will exceed three hundred and forty billion dollars. The amount of money being recovered now as a result of the end of this war is twice as much as the cost of World War I. And these figures do not take into account the greatest cost, the cost in human life.

Recently a visitor from Lubbock told me that he planned to attend the Sunday morning service at a certain Washington church. I cautioned him to arrive at the church by 10:30 or he probably could not get a seat. He later reported that he followed my instructions, but was only able to get standing room in the rear of the church. The minister of this church began last Sunday a system whereby he will conduct two identical services on Sunday mornings, one at 9 o'clock and one at 11. This practice is already being followed by a few other churches in the city. There are many churches in the city where people have difficulty in getting seats at the 11 o'clock hour.

But unfortunately the people of Washington are not breaking any records for church attendance. Only 80,000 out of a population of well over one million in metropolitan Washington attend church on Sunday. According to a report recently made, 23 per cent of the white children of public school age attend religious services on Sunday; the attendance rate for negro children is 30 per cent. There are 500 churches in Washington, of which 161 are colored.

For weeks there has not been an issue of a Washington paper that did not carry some kind of story in regard to the atomic bomb. Many have been the speculations as to the future of the bomb. One editorial writer had this to say, "The atomic bomb is here to stay—but are we?"

Two of the former members of his band previously played on Grand Ole Opera over USM, Nashville, Tenn. It is the plan for the group to meet at Nashville and secure a spot on that station.

If they can all get together again they will try and get a radio program worked up.

**Sudan Wins Over Morton 13-0**

The Indians kicked off to the Hornets in the game Friday night. The Hornets took the ball and marched back to the goal line, but the drive lacked two inches of making a touchdown. The Hornets held the Indians back in their own territory and then started rolling again. This time their drive was successful. Bobby Salem, right halfback, plunged off tackle from the 5-yard line for the first Hornet touchdown late in the first quarter. Waymon Bellar's conversion was wide and the score was 6-0 at the end of the first quarter.



## "Boxes From Heaven" Is New Proposal in Air Express Service

DALLAS, TEXAS—Development of a free-fall cargo container which will be useful in delivering air express freight to small towns and communities not equipped with airport facilities is revealed in the U. S. Steel News, employee publication of United Steel Corporation subsidiaries.

In a now-it-can-be-told article entitled "Boxes from Heaven," the magazine relates the contribution made by the Corporation through one of its subsidiaries, the Gerrard Steel Strapping Company, in fashioning a container used by the army to drop supplies without the aid of a parachute.

Although the box is made of wood, it is steel strapping that makes it impact proof. The steel has sufficient elasticity to absorb the shock of the fall without breaking.

When dropped from great heights, the box does not crack open or explode, tho it sometimes rebounds as much as 30 feet.

The box, equipped with a wire cutter which enables it to be opened in 22 seconds, was used by the army to deliver such articles as gasoline, ammunition, food, medicine and rifle parts.

"Boxes away!" may well become the slogan of the peacetime bombardier since the container in effect will place all towns on an air express line. The box also will be invaluable in dropping supplies to isolated communities in time of floods or forest fires.




(Continued From Page 1) and, effective October 1, 1945, the top rate has been reduced to 6c. The new reduced rate is already in effect and will apply to October use. The two rate reductions which Southwestern Public Service Company has made in Littlefield since this country entered the war were designed to bring the rates in line with those elsewhere in the territory served by the Company. The lower steps of the rate scale down to 18/10c per kilowatt hour.

Southwestern Public Service Company has operated the electric system in Littlefield for only three years, all of which has been during war time, but has operated in other cities, towns and communities in the Texas Panhandle and in New Mexico for more than 20 years and has long followed the policy of voluntary rate reductions as frequently as possible, inconsistent with the maintenance of adequate and reliable service. The Company is now busily engaged in a broad program of increasing its power plant and line capacities to provide for the increased use of electricity which it feels is bound to come through the industrial and rural expansion of this territory and

through the increased use of electric service in homes and business establishments when new electrical appliances an apparatus become available.

While prices in general have risen during the war, and will probably

continue to rise, the Southwest Public Service Company has demonstrated its ability to reduce rates the result of increased production and efficiency and hopes to be able to continue the program in the future.
