

ADJUSTERS BEGIN LAND INSPECTION IN COUNTY

Loss Proven and Released for Other Crops Reports To Be Made To Federal Crop Insurance Corporation

E. L. Black, administrative officer of the A. C. A., has announced that adjusters started out Wednesday inspecting and releasing the land, dry planted to cotton, and where it is proven there is a loss, releasing the land to be planted to another crop; that the adjusters will make reports of the conditions under which the land is released to the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, and they will determine if there is an indemnity to be paid.

County Near Goal War Loan Drive

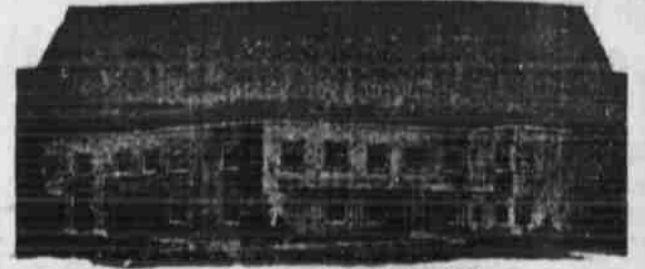

The local soldier's unit is a part of the victorious Seventh United States Army commanded by Lieut. General Alexander M. Patch. The First American Army to taste combat in World War I, the Seventh was born at sea on D-1 of the Sicilian invasion. After sweeping the enemy out of Sicily in 37 days of hard, fast fighting the Seventh became the Mystery Army of the its power in the invasion of Southern France.

From the beaches of the French Riviera the forces of the Seventh Army launched a drive that was to carry them more than 1,000 miles through the heart of Fortress Germany. No other army has fought over so long a route or has liberated so vast an area as the Seventh. During this history making drive which carried it over the Maritime Alps, the rugged Vosges range, across the Rhine and Danube rivers,

the men of General Patch's forces captured more than 650,000 prisoners. This total included only those prisoners taken in combat and does not include the thousands who surrendered en masse when the German 19th Army and German Army Group G capitulated to the Seventh.

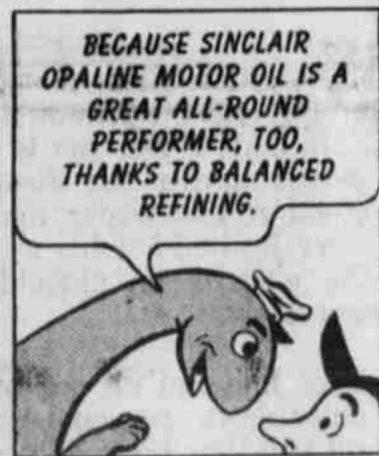

With South Plains Men In The Armed Forces

6TH ARMY GROUP, GERMANY—Medics of the 111th Medical Battalion, veterans of combat in Italy, France and Germany, treated their 46,000th patient when they supported the 36th "Texas" Division and its allied armor and artillery in breaching the Siegfried Line facing General Jacob L. Devers' 6th Army Group.

Litters bearers and ambulance drivers of the 111th braved intense enemy fire to transport casualties from the Siegfried battle-field to the battalion's clearing station. Here medical officers administered aid to wounds and prepared patients for evacuation to hospitals a few miles behind where detailed surgical care would be given. Men who received minor wounds were treated and held for subsequent return to duty.

Included in the 111th Medical Battalion are Pfc. Percy V. Hardin and Cpl. E. D. Parker of Littlefield and Sgt. Travis W. Jaques of Earth.

Sgt. W. C. Reed, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Reed of Antea, in the service 4 1/2 years, and overseas considerable of this time, is expecting to receive a discharge and be home in about a month. Sgt. Reed was stationed in Porto Rico some time, and later stationed in England, France and Germany. He has a daughter, "La Jeanne" a year old, whom he has never seen.

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, ENGLAND—The last bombs to be dropped upon a German target by Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle's mighty Eighth Air Force were released at 11:16 a. m., April 25, on the vast Skoda armaments works at Pilsen, Czechoslovakia, it has been disclosed.

A Littlefield airman, Sgt. Ralph Cauthen, 21, was a tail section machine gunner on one of the 384th's bombers on the historic Skoda mission. He has been with the unit since reaching England in March. Sgt. Cauthen, whose wife also lives in Littlefield, entered the service in October, 1942.

Sgt. Paul L. Pinkerton of Littlefield, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul L. Pinkerton of Omega, N. M., and formerly of Littlefield, probably has traveled more than any of the other men in his group. Sgt. Pinkerton entered the service in Lubbock early in 1942 and went across in November, 1942. He landed with the Allies in North Africa on D-Day, Nov. 8, 1942, with the initial invasion force. He was on duty as a mechanic in North Africa and followed the Allied forces through Tunisia, into Sicily and into Italy. After a few months in the Italian area, Sgt. Pinkerton went to the China-Burma-India theater in February, 1944. He was a member of the famed "Flying Crows" fighter squadrons, one of the most travelled squadrons in the AAF. Sgt. Pinkerton worked on P-40s in North Africa and on P-47s in India and China.

He served at Chengtu near Chungking, at Sian in Shensi province near Peking and near Ledo in India where the famed Ledo road was built, keeping the P-40 and P-47 planes in shape to blast the Japs in the CBI until late last year. He returned Jan. 16, 1945, returning to the states through Australia and back through the Pacific, completing a round trip around the world of some 34,000 miles. He has a brother in the Navy and another in the Army.

In civilian life Sgt. Pinkerton was associated with an oil company in Littlefield. He is a graduate of Littlefield High School. His wife is the former Miss Eddythe C. Padgett of Sudan. He has a two-year-old daughter whom he saw for the first time upon his return.

AN AIR SERVICE COMMAND DEPOT, ENGLAND—Working at the Air Service Command's largest source of aircraft supplies in Europe, Cpl. Benson A. Dowden, of Route 2, Littlefield, Texas, has been commended by Brigadier General Morris Berman, of San Antonio, Texas, commanding general of Base Air Depot Area, for his "close and conscientious cooperation" in sustaining the aerial knockout blows at Germany.

Stationed at a vast Base Air Depot "store," where customer combat organizations send 7,000 high-priority orders each week, and whose merchandise consists of some 75,000 airplane parts and accessories, Cpl. Dowden and his fellow supply technicians have handled a record-breaking 100,000 tons since the first of the year.

Cpl. Dowden is the son of the late Mrs. Minerva L. Dowden, Rt. 2, Littlefield, Texas.

A soldier since Feb. 4, 1942, he has been overseas with the Air Service Command for 15 months. Before entering the service he was employed as a farmer.

AN AIR SERVICE COMMAND POST, ENGLAND—The promotion of Hassel C. Tubbs from Private First Class to Tech. Fifth Grade was announced today in England by Brigadier General Morris Berman, Commanding General, Base

Air Depot Area, Air Service Command.

T-5 Tubbs is serving as a clerk with the Air Service Command, the organization that backed the air war in Europe by furnishing the supplies, engines and aircraft for the final aerial offensive that brought Germany to her knees.

He is the son of Mrs. V. M. Tidton of Route 2, Littlefield, Texas. Before entering the army in December 1942, he was employed by Amherst Produce as a clerk. He attended Littlefield High School. Brothers and sisters in the service: Alvis Tubbs, A. S. Navy, San Diego, and Nowlin Tubbs.

H. J. R. No. 11 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office.

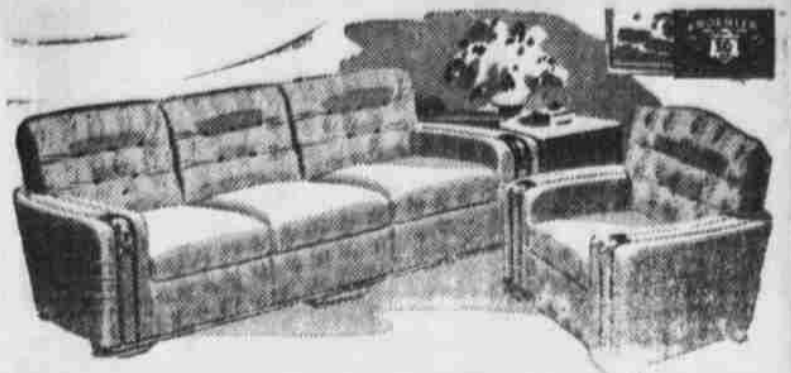
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of rail-ways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of its regular or called session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D., 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self-enacting, and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election, issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

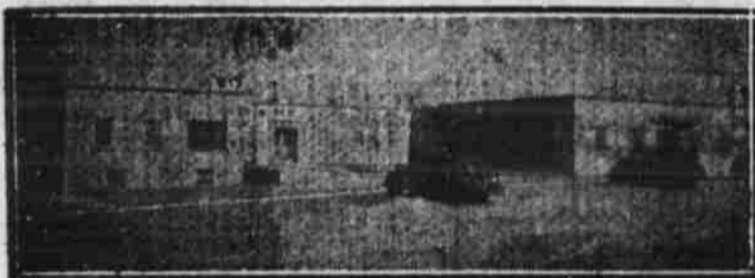

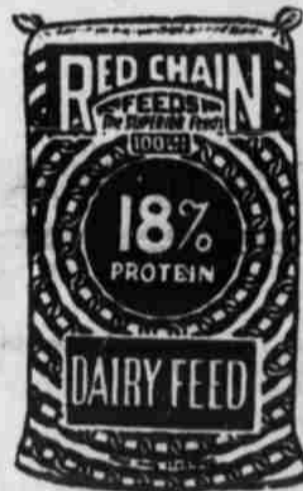

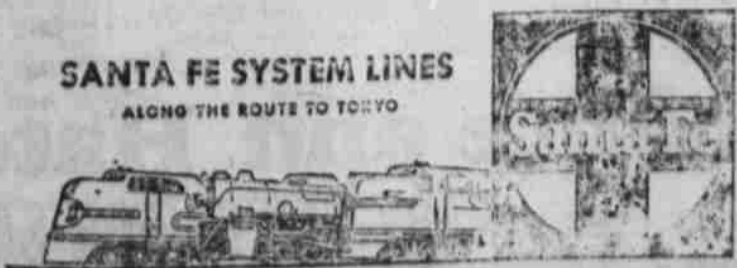

Sgt. Pollard's letter may interest to his friends here, and is publishing it as follows:

Hipolstein, Germany,
May 18,

Folks: I received your letter 12 days ago. It was the quickest I can get a letter from you—12 days. Glad to know every day is going on so nicely, and you keep it up."

The weather is very good here. It is with brilliant hot sun all day long. I suppose you are now using the name of the war we are now in. You can't

find it on the map, likely, but we are I believe, about 25 miles north of Nurnberg, which I know can be found on your maps. The climate here seems to be a lot like our own, and not too much rain, at least not so far.

"All is swell here, and at last we have a chance to relax once in a while. Sure is good to have all the battalion around close together again too. There will be a lot of men get out from over here to go home, but I'm afraid I can hardly make it, the way my points add up. Of course, you can never tell about that though. I don't expect to go to the Pacific either, but that is another one of those kind of questions. You never know anything you might say when in the Army, as the orders come to us from away on up.

"As you have known for a long time, our outfit has been with the 4th Infantry since we came over to France. The Fourth landed D-Day and I believe has as good a record as any division over here if not better. I am proud that I was at least a very, very small part of such a grand outfit. If ever an outfit deserved a break, its those foot

weary soldiers, who bore the brunt of the fighting, and to them I take off my hat. Through France, Belgium, Luxembourg, and Germany, we were right with them, through rough sledding and we had some good times along with some of it also. Thank goodness, though, it is over over here, and I only wish it would end all over the world very soon; then all our boys who have been gone so long could return to good old civilian life. Of course, we can never forget so many of those heroic men who gave their very lives just to bring peace. We must never forget those. They did their share and then some, but yet we have those men back home who talk of the sacrifices they've made. They've paid a good price all right, but how about the men who died. They gave everything.

"If there's ever any interesting clippings in the home papers, that you think might interest me, how about including them."

FIRST USE FOR THE GIANT AUSTRALIAN GRAVING DOCK



H.M.S. Illustrious, one of the aircraft carriers of the British Pacific Fleet, was the first Allied fighting ship to use Sydney's new \$30,000,000 dock, largest in the South Pacific. Announcement of the ship's identity at the subsequent formal opening ceremony was news to Australians because combat-conscious Sydney harbor residents never discuss the shipping movements they see from their windows. The Japanese submarine raid on the harbor in June 1942 helped to drive home the lesson about careless talk costing lives.

The citation accompanying the award reads:

"Flying at night as well as by day, at high altitudes over impassable mountainous terrain, through areas characterized by extremely treacherous weather conditions necessitating long periods of operation on instruments . . . requiring courageous and superior performance of his duties to overcome, he accomplished his mission with distinction . . ."
