1st Lt. Patrick was a glider pilot; was captured September 18th last at the Battle of Arnhem, Germany, and was liberated by the Russians. He went through the campaigns of North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France and Germany. Mrs. Patrick has been making her home with her parents at Lamesa.

Lt. (jg) Clyde Lee has been overseas 2 years and made 35 missions in the Southwest Pacific. He is a naval pilot on a fighter plane, was shot down over Gaudalve, but rescued. Later on he was with the first wave of aircraft carrier planes to go over Tokio. He was on the carrier "Essex."

Lt. Lee was formerly a football quarterback with the Littlefield High school team and a general favorite for several years. He married Miss Nancy Whitaker of Burlingame, Calif., on July 10th last. He arrived in Littlefield early Wednesday, and has been assigned to a naval base in New Jersey, and will go there from here.

## Russia To Fight Japs

Russia has declared war on Japan, effective last night at midnight.

This is the second time this week that new steps have been taken by the Allied nations to bring about the quick defeat of Japan. The first was the bombing of Japan with the new atomic bomb, the world's most destructive weapon.

Announcement that Russia had declared war on Japan was made at 2:04 p. m. Wednesday by President Truman.

Russia made its announcement to Japan seven hours previous to the time the declaration was to go into effect.

Russia's declaration of war against Japan was an outcome of an agreement between the Big Three Powers reached at Yalta, and later at Potsdam, it was confirmed and the time set when it would take place.

## Total of 1.50 Inches Fall Here Tuesday Morning

### Moisture Reported Best General Rain Over Area Since Year 1943

"The best general rain we have had since 1943" was the way farmers around in town Tuesday described the moisture, which began falling heavy here about 4 a. m. Tuesday, and then slowed up to a steady fall until about noon. The weather, however, continues unsettled.

According to the gauge at the West Texas Cotton Oil Company, a total of 1.50 inches fell here.

The rain is reported to have extended west to Fort Sumner, N. M., east to Lubbock, and beyond; and north to Amarillo, extending south to Brownfield and beyond. Moisture is reported from 2 to 6 inches over Lamb County, and it is declared will be a big help to the feed crop.

From Amherst north a distance of seven miles it is said to have rained up to six inches, while north of the sandhills and the northwest part of the County received three or four inches of rain. Moisture was lighter in the south part of the county, and into Hockley County, where from 2 to 3 inches were received. The southeast part of the county received the lightest rain, Spade community receiving only from 1 to 3 inches. The lakes are reported full in the north side of the county, with 4 1/2 inches of moisture reported at Rocky Ford.

The area north of Sudan received two inches, while the town itself got three inches.

Lum's Chapel reported 2 1/2 inches with 3 1/2 inches; Enoch's a good rain; Oklahoma Flats 3 inches and Weckford Barwell Gin Community 2 1/2 inches.

**Wounded On Okinawa Now Recuperating At Naval Hospital**

U. S. NAVAL HOSPITAL, MARE ISLAND, Calif.—Shot in the left leg by a sniper while advancing against the Japs on bitterly-contested Sugar Loaf Hill on Okinawa last May 11 Marine Private Paul A. Miller, 18, of Littlefield, Tex., has been returned here for treatment.

The wound the youthful Texan sustained was so severe that it was necessary to amputate his leg. Miller is now recuperating here while waiting to be equipped with an artificial leg.

"We were advancing slowly at the foot of Sugar Loaf Hill when I was hit," said Miller. "Snipers had been bothering us most of the day. It seemed as though they were firing at us from just about everywhere."

"I believe the artillery, though, was the worst thing on Okinawa. The Japs really had it there. We heard they had five or six regiments of artillery there. Some of the older Marines said they had no trouble believing that."

On several occasions Miller and other Marines went Jap-hunting in the numerous caves that dotted Okinawa.

"We'd flush out a bunch of Okinawans from the caves and usually we would find some Jap soldiers with them," he explained. "The soldiers would try at times to disguise themselves to look like Okinawans, but we generally spotted them."

A son of Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Bass of Littlefield, Miller entered the service in May, 1944. He served overseas for six months as a member of the 22nd Regiment, Sixth Marine Division.

"Goodnight and sweet dreams,

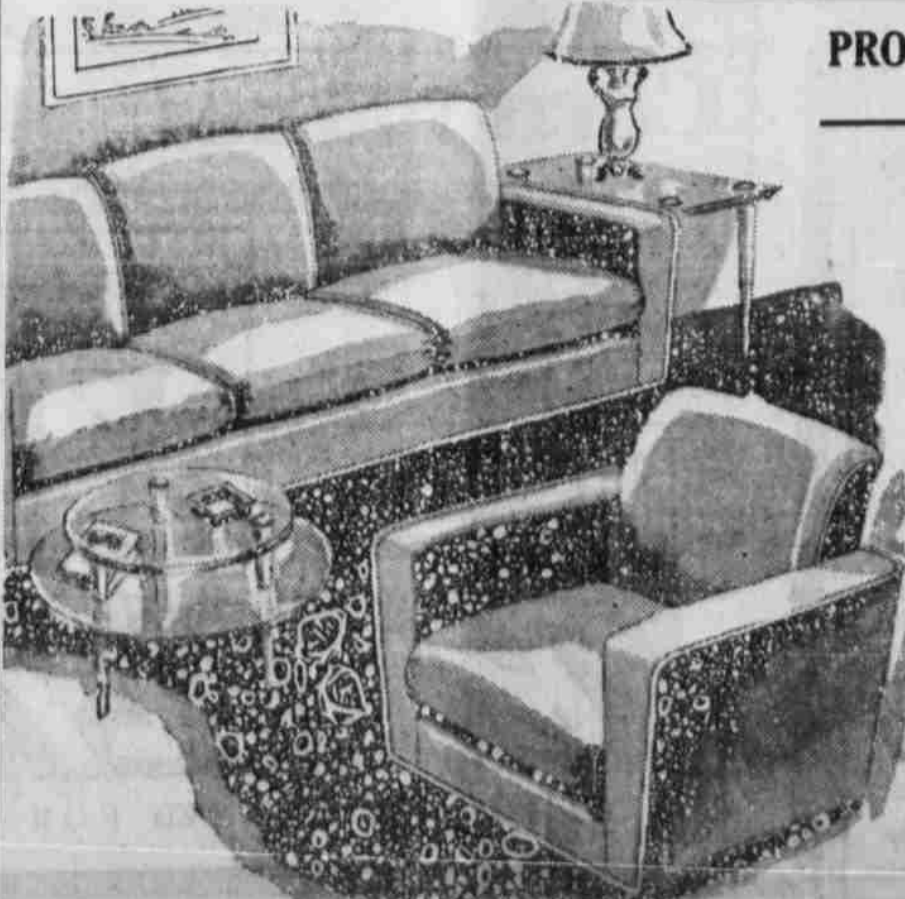

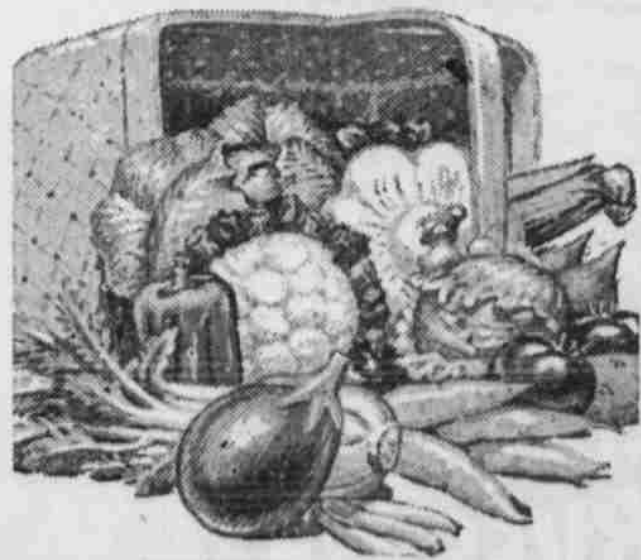
