Newspapers to Sponsor Tennis Meet

Vehicle Tags Reach 11,000 For County

Vehicle registrations for Lamb County at the end of the filing deadline on March 31 were about 2000 ahead of the same period last year, according to figures released by the office of Herbert Dunn, county tax assessor-collector. A total of 11,165 registrations had been issued by the office with receipts of \$243,992.48 with \$146,997.05 going to the county and \$97,015.43 going to the state. For the same period in 1961, the total was 9,101 with receipts of \$196,582.25 with \$123,278.31 staying in the county and \$73,303.95 going to the state. Of the number sold this year 4993 were issued the last week in March.

Work Begins On New Local Business

A new service station will open in Littlefield in approximately three weeks. It is a Hancock station and will be located at the intersections of highways 54 and 385. Hancock stations are operated under the ownership of Signal Oil & Gas with headquarters in Texas and California. The new station will be a "class A" station with a 25 x 32 office, on an area of 141 x 139'. It will have four pumps which will carry various gasoline mixtures for all types of auto engines. The station will also feature several lines of auto accessories and tires. Hancock stations are not known in this area of Texas because most of the existing ones are located in the valley and in the waco area. The company's Littlefield station is the first on the plains and one is also planned for Plainview.

The station is being built by the Kelly Construction of Galveston, which specializes in building Hancock stations. It is hoped that a local manager can be selected and the formal opening will be announced later.

And now, the general sales tax threatens to push more small businessmen to the wall of bankruptcy because these small businessmen do not have the money to collect

this unfair and vicious tax." As governor, Yarborough said he would create a small businessmen's task force to meet monthly with the governor to chart ways of stimulating more small businesses throughout Texas. Calling for an effective water conservation program, Yarborough said, "We have already wasted time and water. But we can start here in West Texas by recharging underground water." Texans Pay Low Prices For Petro

Lower prices paid by Texans consumers for petroleum products point up that our state is traditionally and consistently ahead of others in safeguarding the rights of its people, Railroad Commissioner Ben Ramsey said in Austin last week.

Ramsey, appointed to the Railroad Commission last September, is a candidate for the unexpired term of the late Commissioner Olin Culbertson.

"The primary function of the Railroad Commission," Ramsey said, "is to protect the interest of the public. Success in this responsibility under conservation laws and court decisions is clearly reflected in the lower prices Texans pay for petroleum products. A good example," he said "is that the average price of regular gasoline, excluding taxes, in Texas is five cents per gallon lower than the average nationwide price for the same products. This adds up to a sizeable annual saving to the Texas consumer."

Ramsey noted that a survey of 32 cities in 26 states by the Oil and Gas Journal showed that as of March 20, the average price for the 32 cities was 19.2 cents per gallon, as compared with the average price per gallon of gasoline in Texas of 14.2 cents.

Texas receives some \$414,000,000 a year in taxes from the industries which the Railroad Commission regulates, Ramsey said, and therefore, the Commission "must fairly and judiciously administer the laws and court decisions affecting these industries -- transportation and petroleum -- so as to provide economical and efficient service to consumer and industry." Ramsey, the first Texan to be honored by the voters with six consecutive elective terms as lieutenant governor, said the job as Railroad Commissioner is one of the most important in state government. "It is a great responsibility and challenge," he said "I feel my experience in law and government qualify me for the position."
