## LAMB COULD LEAVE 19TH.

# Redistricting Discussions Cause Concern

The redistricting discussion, currently underway on the floor of the Texas house, has caused much concern among residents of Lamb, Bailey and Floyd counties, who will be removed from the 19th Congressional District of Congressman George Mahon, and put into Congressman Walter Rogers' 18th District.

State Representative Bill Clayton told the Lamb County Leader Wednesday morning he had no idea of how the debate would come out, but said, "It doesn't look good at this point, we will fight as hard as we can to maintain our current district, but will be fighting by ourselves, to a large extent." Clayton said the prime reason for the proposal to move the three counties out of the 19th District, is to give more population to the 18th District, which according to the earlier ruling by the courts is short, and the only direction from which this needed population can be picked up is for the 18th to dip into the northern portion of the 19th.

Because of the vast difference in the economy base of the two districts, the people of the three counties have expressed much concern over the final outcome, if they are removed for the 19th where the basis of the economy is similar district wide.

Clayton said, "Since Monday I have received numerous letters, wires and phone calls questioning the proposed move and asking that I fight to keep Lamb and Bailey in the 19th." Clayton went on to say, "It is the feeling of most of the people in the area, as it is mine, that no change should be made, but all I can do at this stage is to offer an amendment to the recommendation, asking that Bailey and Lamb be returned to the 19th, and if we are successful in getting the amendment in, it will then have to pass a house vote. What the final decision will be is anyone's guess, right now, I think a move out of the 19th would not be good for either county."

In all, the proposed change would remove Lamb, Bailey and Floyd counties, but would allow Hale county to remain a part of the 19th. In addition it would take out Crosby, Mitchell and Dickens counties, and move them to the 17th, while adding Midland county to the 19th. This move would cut the population of the present 19th District from 424,774 to 422,571, and would be successful in separating Ector and Midland counties which have been used by both political parties as a "football" in the various political races for the past several years.

In closing his conversation with the Leader, Clayton said, "Our best chance for staying where we are is by Hale county agreeing to be moved, and I don't really think they will agree to that, so it looks like we are in for a long hard fight."

The battle over the redistricting of the state has been saved for the end of the legislative session because of the fight that is expected.

## LFD. Post Office Gets Approval For Remodeling

The General Service Administration has approved projects worth approximately \$75,000 worth of improvements to the Littlefield Post Office.

According to Littlefield Postmaster T.A. Henson the improvements will include rewiring of the building to include fluorescent lighting, air conditioning throughout the building, and re-painting the outside.

The offices now occupied by the Civil Service Commission and by the Federal Housing Authority in the basement of the Post Office building will also be remodeled.

According to a telegram received by this newspaper from Senator Ralph Yarborough the General Services Administration will issue the bids with the bids scheduled to be opened by June 17.

The project will be reserved for small business, and the bids will probably be let by the General Services Administration office in Lubbock.

## Fire Damages Vacant House

A fire in an unoccupied house at 617 W. 1st Monday afternoon caused approximately \$750 damage to the interior and roof.

The house owned by L.B. Stone, while not rented at the present time was completely full of furniture at the time the fire broke out at 1 p.m. Monday afternoon.

Littlefield Volunteer Fire Chief Leon Durham said the cause was unknown at this time but was being investigated. He said the largest damage was done to the walls and ceiling of the house and the furniture was damaged by smoke.

The firemen controlled the blaze within minutes and kept the fire from breaking out in the living room of the house.

## Two Young Drivers Fined For Speed Chase In Town

The Littlefield police were involved in two high speed chases of teenage boy drivers Sunday night with one starting at 6th and Phelps and the other at Anton and ending up in Littlefield.

The first chase started at 6th and Phelps when Stanley Black, 18 of Muleshoe started from a red light with squealing tires and was chased by a patrol-

man. Black, driving a 1965 Oldsmobile then went through the red light at 5th and Phelps turning right and then went through three stop signs on 5th at LFD, Herral and at the Levelland Highway where he turned right and headed south.

After going five miles on the highway Black turned west and sped between two and three miles where he turned north on a dirt road to highway 54, about two miles west of Littlefield. In the meantime a Texas State patrol car had also taken up the chase.

Black then came east on 54 to Sunset where he turned north and then east again on seventh. The highway patrol car turned on 6th to cut him off and the car was finally stopped at 6th and Barton.

Corporate Judge Robert Barton fined Black \$210 on charges of speeding, driving with no lights, operating a vehicle in a manner to endanger life and property, running three stop signs and one red light and failure to stop for the police. Barton also fined Black's companion in the car, Gene Atkins, also of Muleshoe \$25. The fines were paid by the boys' parents the following day.

In the other chase Sunday night, Oscar L. Tomlison, Spade, is in the city jail under \$1,000 bond following his being picked up by Littlefield police on the Levelland Highway after a chase that started in Anton with Tomlison eluding the deputy sheriff there.

Tomlison has pleaded not guilty to the charges against him which include consumption of liquor by a minor, liquor law curfew, running a stop sign, running a red light, profanity to the arresting officer and driving in a manner to endanger life and property.

He is also being held on an order from the Anton police.

## Commissioner's Court Lets Three Bids For Equipment

The Lamb County Commissioner's Court passed six orders at their end of the month meeting held last Friday in the Lamb County Court House.

The first three orders passed were in regard to letting bids for new equipment for the county. The first bid was awarded to the Lubbock Grader Blade Co. for an electric magnet nail machine for a bid of \$3,193. The Lubbock firm was the only bidder.

The Plains Machinery Company of Lubbock was awarded the contract for a new equipment trailer. The bid was for \$1,544.23.

A Lubbock firm also submitted the low bid for a pneumatic tire roller for the county. The West Texas Equipment Company was awarded the contract for a low bid of \$2,101.25.

The fourth order concerned the payment of \$397 to the Southwestern Public Service for their part in the road widening project.

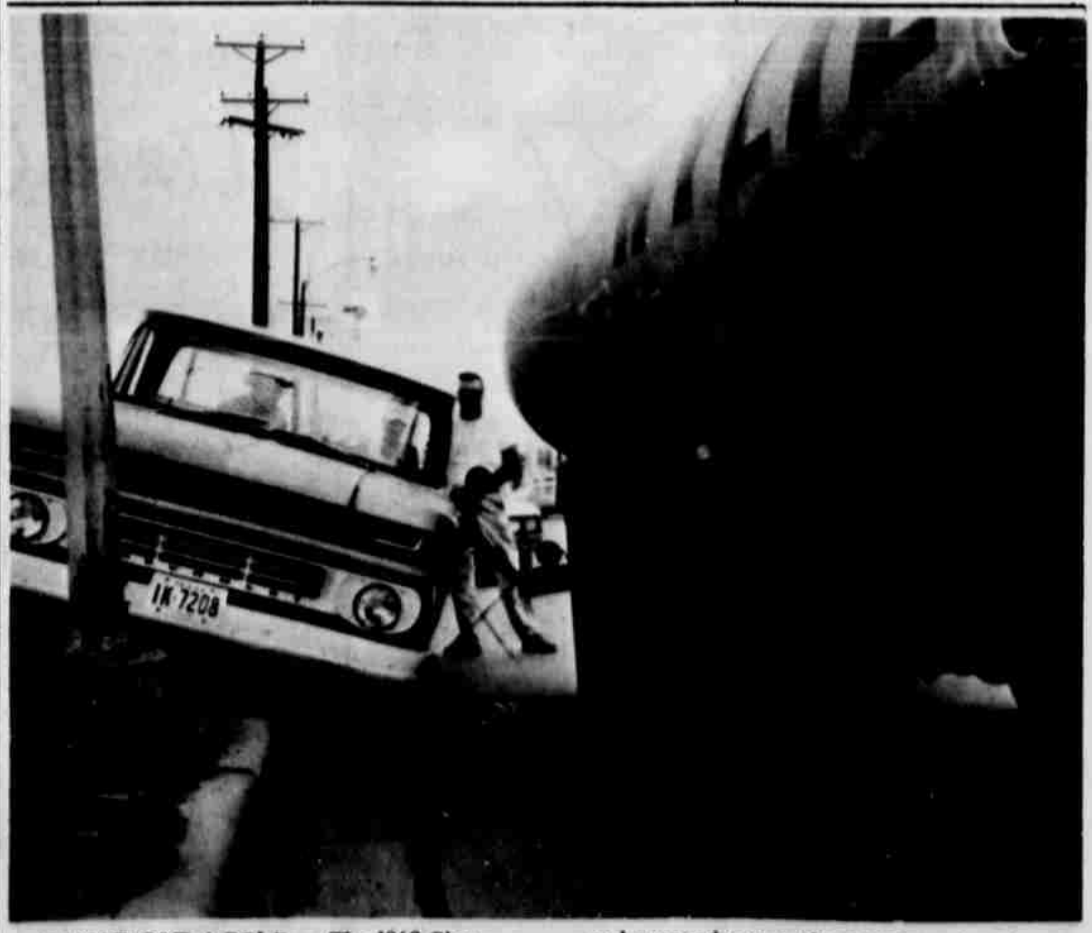

**Sales Talk**

"This suit will wear like iron," the friendly salesman assures you. It doesn't really wear like iron, but you entitled to a refund?

Obviously not. Even though the salesman exaggerated, any sensible person would have taken his statement with a grain of salt. The law doesn't require absolute honesty by a seller for the simple reason that people just don't expect it.

"It always has been understood, the world over," observed Oliver Wendell Holmes, "that such statements are to be distrusted."

Of course, salesmanship can spill over into fraud. Although the dividing line is not always clear, there are several factors that weigh heavily in the law's balance.

For instance: Was the seller stating a fact or only an opinion? "This car will last



for the next five years" is usually just the seller's opinion, not a specific guarantee. But "This car is only five years old" is factual. By and large, the law expects statements of fact to be accurate.

Also, a seller has a greater duty to be truthful when there is a relationship of trust between him and the buyer. Thus, tall talk by a seller is held to be fraud, not salesmanship, because he happened to be the buyer's trusted adviser.

And a seller with technical knowledge of the product, not available to the buyer, must stick closer to the truth—because the buyer is more likely to rely on what he says. Moralists may argue that a seller should be held to total truth, plain and unvarnished, under all circumstances.

But, after all, it isn't necessarily a question of saint and sinner. Buyers, too, often stretch a point in the process of bargaining. If sellers exaggerate, buyers belittle. What the seller calls a peach, the buyer calls a lemon. The Bible (Proverbs 20:14) puts it this way: "It is naught, it is naught, saith the buyer: but when he is gone his way, then he boasteth."

He was pastor of First Baptist Church, Plainview, for five

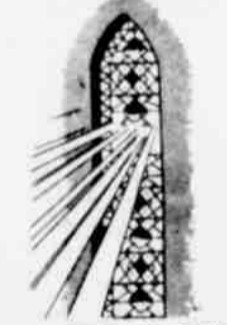
