

Tossing his hat into the ring with an announcement as a candidate for Governor of Texas, Harry Hines, member of the Texas Highway Commission for the past five years, last week raised the curtain on the 1940 gubernatorial contest. Hines, announcing that he would later issue a platform and discuss every issue a platform and discuss paign in full detail, put himself

on record on several burning issues. He pledged himself: 1. Against the sales tax, which

he termed a tax on poverty and opposed to his upderstanding of the meaning of Democracy.

2. In favor of fulfillment of the social security program, including payment of adequate old age pensions, and aid to dependent children, needy blind, the State's part of the teachers' retirement program.

3. The raising of the additional money needed to pay these obligations by cooperative effort with the legislators, spreading the cost without "dealing a death blow to any one group." Hines indicated he will be a con

servative candidate, and declared he will not try to "out promise the promisers," and promised to be a "doer instead of a promiser."

"At no time need you expect Harry Hines to play upon ignorance or emotion in an effort to bait votseed, mostly in carload lots, have ers," he said. "If sound basic fundbeen sold this winter. Many Reasons Why Soil Conservation District Should Be Formed

The work carried out by the conservation district will be

very similar to that already in practice in Lamb county by the Soil Conservation service. The farmers will accept these services according to their own will,

the officials pointed out. Farmers in this section are just beginning to realize the necessity of conserving the soil and water.

Almost three million acres of Texas farm and ranch land went under the soil and water conservation banner for the first time in 1939. That brings the figures for the 24-year old campaign to 16 million acres of crop land protected against loss of soil and rainfall.

Thus Texas is off to a good start in 1940, a year slated to see record breaking advances in conservation as all U. S. Department of Agriculture unite with state and local organizations in a joint drive to protect soil and hold the rain where it falls, Seven reasons why a soil

conservation district should be created in this area are: 1 .--- To take advantage of the opportunity offered by the state and federal government for the protection of all lands against erosion losses.

2 .- To insure maximum production from the hour's work invested in tilling the soils.

3 .- To organize our efforts to establish better farming practices by a systematic planning of all farm operations through the assistance of trained farm management technicians. 4 .- To insure the feeding of

the citizenship of the proposed district without further explooitation of our natural resources. 5.-To maintain our soil fer-

tility by systematic rotations

and cropping plans.

6 .- To save our land for posterity that it may enjoy the benefits and privileges same that we have today.

7 .- To cooperate with each other on land utilization and erosion problems that can not be done by individual practices.

In July a petition was sent to the Texas soil conservation board, signed by 250 landowners in Lamb, Bailey, and Cochran counties, asking that an election be called that the farmers might vote on whether or not a district be formed here.

The election has been set for Saturday, March 9.

In the event a district is not formed, comprising these counties, the Civilian Conservation Corps, with the Soil Conservation Service, will probably be moved from Littlefield. Removal of these units would be a serious set back for Littlefield and the entire section. It is something that warrants serious thought and immediate action on the part of landowners and business men.




