CHRISTMAS SALES REFLECT GOOD YEAR

It Was Merry Christmas For Most!

Cash registers in Littlefield were ringing up sales at a fast pace here this week as the Christmas shoppers made their final assault on gift items.

Littlefield merchants reported sales Monday and Christmas Eve as the "best in many years", most of them indicating business volume ahead of the same period last year.

A frigid blast of weather, accompanied by sleet and snow, had slowed down agricultural activities over the weekend. And, as the farmers stayed out of fields, they poured into town Saturday and again early this to do their Christmas shopping.

Contributing much to the "Merry Christmas" for area residents and merchants was another good crop year, one that blossomed forth with good yields after a slow start. The cotton bale count reached 138,-783 last week and it was drastically slowed by the weather. Yesterday was a 'Merry Ch-

ristmas" for many less fortun-ate families in Littlefield, too, as the Salvation Army and other civic groups distributed food, candy and toys to needy familes.

The "Christmas Cheer" program, sponsored annually by the Salvation Army, served to boost the spirits of many during the Yule season. The organization was the primary distributor of Christmas baskets this year.

Several stores were to be closed today, but the majority closed only for Christmas day. City and county officials reported back to work today, and federal offices were also scheduled to be open.

Adkins was knocked unconscious momentarily when a case of soft drinks on shelving along the crashed wall flew several feet through the air and struck

Other merchandise along the wall, soft drinks, canned goods and cans of oil were strewn for 20 feet across the room by the Impact.

The front of the car, a 1963 model, extended about two feet into the building, through its frame wall.

Adkins said that the Stewart car was coming east on Irvin Street into Highway 385, just north of the railroad tracks. The driver apparently attempted to stop at the intersection, slid on the slick snow on across it and rolled into the side of the building. It struck a utility poll at the

side of the building, glancing off it into the structure, and probably limiting damage to the building considerably.

"I heard this loud crash, and something struck me, knocking me to the floor and addling me

momentarily," Adkins said. He and a store employee helped remove the two menfrom the vehicle and get them hospitalbound. The automobile had its front and smashed and its dashpoard crammed back against the two men in the front seat.

Two Killed, Littlefield Man Injured in Crash

end killed two persons and put a Littlefield man, H. Clayton Patton, in the hospital with painful injuries Saturday afternoon.

Killed were Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Wesson of Cotton Cenpast few days. One of the four children in the car, which Wesson was driving, was seriously injured.

The other three children suffered lacerations and bruises in the accident, that occurred a mile southeast of Shallowater. Both vehicles were heavily damaged.

Patton was driving a telephone company pickup back towards Littlefield on Highway 84 when the Wesson car, that was meeting him, spun out of control on the snow and ice covered highway in midafter-

noon Saturday.
Patton's vehicle smashed into the car in the middle. Mr. and Mrs. Wesson were thrown to the pavenient.

The adults were killed at the scene. Their son, Ernest Wesson, Jr., 11, was most critically injured of the chil-dren and was reported still in critical condition in Methodist hospital, Lubbock.

Patton, also in Methodist, lost several teeth, suffered severe mouth and face lacerations, a deep gash in his left knee and extensive damage to his left ankle and ligaments about his ankle. His pickup careened to the



Youngsters in the neighbor-hood placed the sacks and each evening lighted the candles. Everyone joined in some part



ONE-ARMED GRID EPIC:

Littlefield Man Figuredin **Dramatic Football Story**

ball leather is dimming into Christmas chimes, the great stories of football take a special place for sports writers and commentators.

One of these stories was recounted first by the famed vi-brant voice of Bill Stern -- dean of all sportscasters -- and printed by him in a popular book. It is about a one-armed boy who loved the game and played it hard enough to become an All-American, remembered well today in many grid annals.

This story comes home periodically to a greying, still-athletic Littlefield man who had a great part in the career of All-American Ellis Jones of Tulsa University, and who was cited by Stern in the story of gridiron courage.

The two, Ellis Jones, and Jack Christian of Littlefield, had many things in common besides friendship.

Both of the men have just one

Both come from Abilene -where Christian coached and urged Jones on into football -- and they both have distinguished football careers.

But Christian, who was all-Southwest conference at Texas A and M College, finds the greatest satisfaction in retrospect in the career of the discouraged youth he brought into the game at Abilene, and who went on to write a record of courage.

This part of the story started in 1932, the year that Christian graduated at A and M and came iome to Abilene as varsity line and freshman coach for Abilene high school where five years before he had been an All-State guard.

A week before the season, Christian, who was doing a summer job, caught his left arm in an ice cutting machine and it was first time the Sandies lost a severed.

This was deeply discouraging to an athlete, but in a few days he was out at his coaching duties. A short while later he met Ellis Jones.

This youth had shattered an arm in a fall from a tree. His family's religious beliefs barred medical treatment, the arm did not heal properly and soon required amputation.

Christian visited the saddened youngster in the hospital, cheered him by talking football and comparing notes. Later, freshman squad.

The next year, 1935, he found the way and became a squad standout, an All-State lineman as had Christian, and also elected to go to Texas A and M.

The generosity of a wealthy Abilene man made college possible. But Christian warnedhis protege of possible problems at A and M, one of them that he could not become a part of the cadet corps with a disability. Aggie coaches turned him down for football. Jones came to Christian discouraged.

Christian, then at Colorado City as head coach, had a suggestion. Tulsa University had an assistant coach, Buddy Brothers, who had played at Texas Tech and later coached at Lub-bock and who had just one arm. Christian called Brothers

and Jones went off to Tulsa, where Henry Frnka was head coach and Tulsa was riding a winning crest. Jones made the varsity his sophomore year, played in a bowl game as a junior and in the

Sugar Bowl as a senior, captaining that game for Tulsa. He also was a new All-American. That day's work got him voted outstanding game player, a fit-ting finale to his unique grid car-eer. Jones is a ranking geolo-gist with a major oil company to-

Christian's own football career had many good moments. He was a member of the 1927 Abilene team that went to the state finals in the upper class of competition, when Texas had just two classes for teams.
