CHRISTMAS SALES REFLECT GOOD YEAR

It Was Merry Christmas For Most!

Cash registers in Littlefield were ringing up sales at a fast pace here this week as the Christmas shoppers made their final assault on gift items.

Littlefield merchants reported sales Monday and Christmas Eve as the "best in many years", most of them indicating business volume ahead of the same period last year.

A frigid blast of weather, accompanied by sleet and snow, had slowed down agricultural activities over the weekend. And, as the farmers stayed out of fields, they poured into town Saturday and again early this week to do their Christmas shopping.

Contributing much to the "Merry Christmas" for area residents and merchants was another good crop year, one that blossomed forth with good yields after a slow start. The cotton bale count reached 138,783 last week and it was drastically slowed by the weather.

Yesterday was a "Merry Christmas" for many less fortunate families in Littlefield, too, as the Salvation Army and other civic groups distributed food, candy and toys to needy families.

The "Christmas Cheer" program, sponsored annually by the Salvation Army, served to boost the spirits of many during the Yule season. The organization was the primary distributor of Christmas baskets this year.

Several stores were to be closed today, but the majority closed only for Christmas day. City and county officials reported back to work today, and federal offices were also scheduled to be open.

Chamberlain Rites Held

Funeral services for Lonnie Lawson Chamberlain, Sr., 63, a resident of Spade for many years, were held Monday at 2 p.m. in the Spade Methodist Church. Rev. Hugh Daniels of Idalou officiated, assisted by Rev. Aaron Mitchell, pastor of the Spade church.

Chamberlain, a retired farmer, died at 11 p.m. Saturday in Littlefield Hospital, where he had been a patient the past two weeks suffering from a heart ailment.

Chamberlain moved to Spade from Knox County and had been a resident there except for several years that he farmed near Lorenzo. The Chamberlains moved back to Spade the first of this year when he retired from farming.

Burial was in Littlefield Memorial Park under direction of Hammons Funeral Home.

Car Hits Station, Two Men Injured

A car came calling through a building wall from snow-slick streets Saturday evening did several hundred dollars damage to the Phil Adkins service station-grocery on the Springlake highway and injured its two occupants.

Ronald "Shipp" Stewart and Dale Fields were admitted to local hospitals Saturday night after the 7 p.m. accident.

At Littlefield Hospital, Stewart was reported in satisfactory condition Monday. He had several teeth knocked out and a bruised lip. Fields was reported in satisfactory condition at Medical Arts Hospital.

Adkins was knocked unconscious momentarily when a case of soft drinks on shelving along the crashed wall flew several feet through the air and struck him.

Other merchandise along the wall, soft drinks, canned goods and cans of oil were strewn for 20 feet across the room by the impact.

The front of the car, a 1963 model, extended about two feet into the building, through its frame wall.

Adkins said that the Stewart car was coming east on Irvin Street into Highway 385, just north of the railroad tracks. The driver apparently attempted to stop at the intersection, slid on the slick snow on across it and rolled into the side of the building.

It struck a utility pole at the side of the building, glancing off it into the structure, and probably limiting damage to the building considerably.

"I heard this loud crash, and something struck me, knocking me to the floor and adding me momentarily," Adkins said.

He and a store employee helped remove the two men from the vehicle and get them hospitalized. The automobile had its front end smashed and its dashboard crumpled back against the two men in the front seat.

Two Killed, Littlefield Man Injured in Crash

One of a series of area icy highway wrecks on the weekend killed two persons and put a Littlefield man, H. Clayton Patton, in the hospital with painful injuries Saturday afternoon.

Killed were Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Wesson of Cotton Center, who had been at Spade the past few days. One of the four children in the car, which Wesson was driving, was seriously injured.

The other three children suffered lacerations and bruises in the accident, that occurred a mile southeast of Shallowater. Both vehicles were heavily damaged.

Patton was driving a telephone company pickup back towards Littlefield on Highway 84 when the Wesson car, that was meeting him, spun out of control on the snow and ice covered highway in midafternoon Saturday.

Patton's vehicle smashed into the car in the middle. Mr. and Mrs. Wesson were thrown to the pavement.

The adults were killed at the scene. Their son, Ernest Wesson, Jr., 11, was most critically injured and was reported still in critical condition in Methodist hospital, Lubbock.

Patton, also in Methodist, lost several teeth, suffered severe mouth and face lacerations, a deep gash in his left knee and extensive damage to his left ankle and ligaments about his ankle.

His pickup careened to the ditch and overturned after the crash.

As Patton described it, the Wesson car came at him on

the slick highway "changing ends." He was unable to stop his vehicle, which he said was traveling at moderate speed. Patton has been a General Telephone service employee here for several years. He is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Amos Ward of Littlefield.

Rash Of City Wrecks Logged

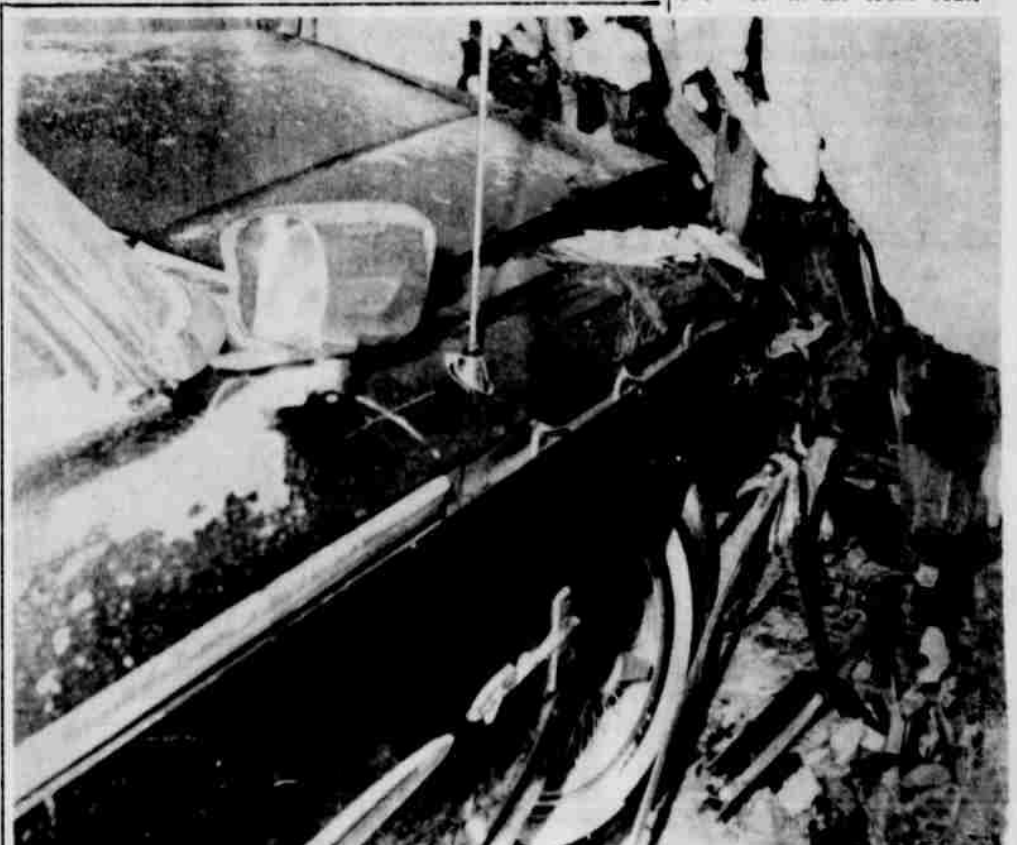
A rash of minor city accidents continued during the Christmas week, with city police checking two Monday, one Sunday and two Saturday.

Youngsters in the neighborhood placed the sacks and each evening lighted the candles. Everyone joined in some part of the job.

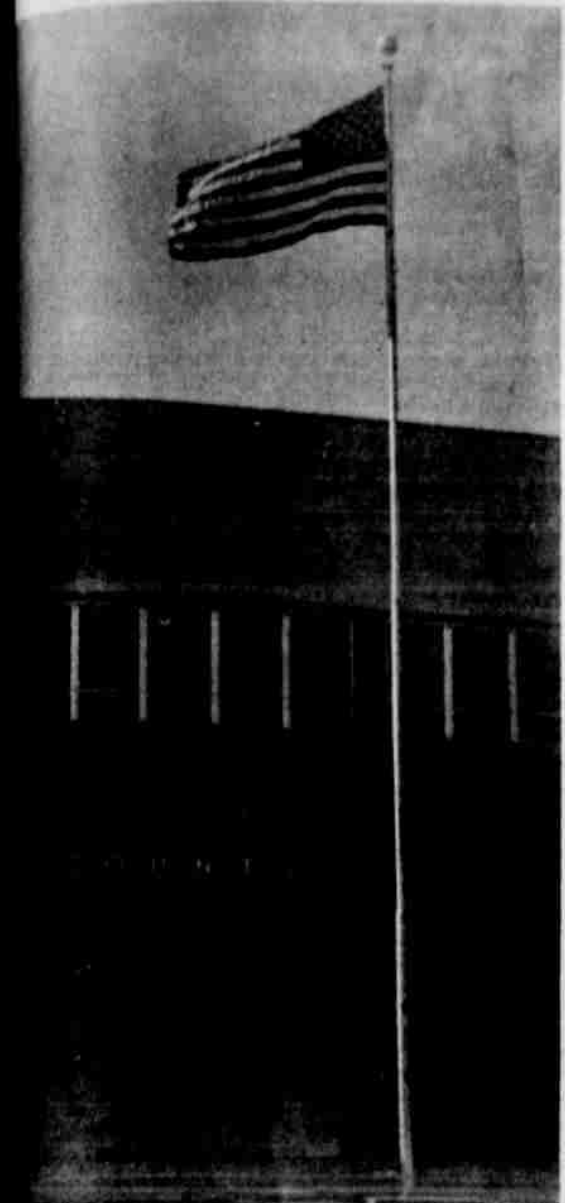
Neighborhood projects are not new to the street, which has held block barbecues and other functions.

She removed a juniper which was obstructing the view and replaced it with roses. She has also added 3 new climbing roses, 50 dahlias, asters and 2 dozen mums. "It keeps one busy," Mrs. Haire said, "for there are so many insects to combat."

Mrs. Haire has remodeled the inside of her home by painting, adding new curtains and completely remodeling the kitchen.

Mrs. Haire has been a member of the home demonstration club for 24 years. She has served as president, secretary and reporter for her club. She still finds time to sew and continue to improve her skills by attending training meetings and entering the local dress reviews. She takes a lot of pride in the things she does and says, "If its worth doing, it's worth doing well." "Her results show it," reports Mrs. LadyClare Phillips, County home demonstration agent.

ONE-ARMED GRID EPIC:

Littlefield Man Figured in Dramatic Football Story

In the season when the football leather is dimming into Christmas chimes, the great stories of football take a special place for sports writers and commentators.

One of these stories was recounted first by the famed vibrant voice of Bill Stern-- dean of all sportscasters-- and printed by him in a popular book. It is about a one-armed boy who loved the game and played it hard enough to become an All-American, remembered well today in many grid annals.

This story comes home periodically to a greying, still-athletic Littlefield man who had a great part in the career of All-American Ellis Jones of Tulsa University, and who was cited by Stern in the story of grid-iron courage.

The two, Ellis Jones, and Jack Christian of Littlefield, had many things in common besides friendship.

Both of the men have just one arm.

Both come from Abilene-- where Christian coached and urged Jones on into football-- and they both have distinguished football careers.

But Christian, who was all-Southwest conference at Texas A and M College, finds the greatest satisfaction in retrospect in the career of the discouraged youth he brought into the game at Abilene, and who went on to write a record of courage.

This part of the story started in 1932, the year that Christian graduated at A and M and came home to Abilene as varsity line and freshman coach for Abilene high school where, five years before he had been an All-State guard.

A week before the season, Christian, who was doing a summer job, caught his left arm in an ice cutting machine and it was severed.

This was deeply discouraging to an athlete, but in a few days he was out at his coaching duties. A short while later he met Ellis Jones.

This youth had shattered an arm in a fall from a tree, his family's religious beliefs barred medical treatment, the arm did not heal properly and soon required amputation.

Christian visited the saddened youngster in the hospital, cheered him by talking football and comparing notes. Later, Jones showed up for Christian's freshman squad.

The Stern book, titled "Bill Stern's Favorite Sport Stories," recalls how the coach who had lost an arm cheered on the youngster who was finding his loss a tragedy. "You can be a great football player," Christian told the boy when other squad coaches were shaking their head dolefully.

The youth saw action, late the next year tried for the Abilene varsity, one of the crack football outfits in Texas. He fared poorly, but kept plugging with steady boosts from his lone-armed coach.

When Jones once was dropped from the varsity squad he came back to Christian's freshman outfit, always working to master the game. The two spent countless hours perfecting techniques for using one good hand, and one stout partial arm. It was valuable therapy for both and not even the coach expected all those pep talks to come true.

But they did.

In his junior year, through squad injuries, Jones got into varsity action a little.

The next year, 1935, he found the way and became a squad standout, an All-State lineman as had Christian, and also elected to go to Texas A and M.

The generosity of a wealthy Abilene man made college possible. But Christian warned his protegee of possible problems at A and M, one of them that he could not become a part of the cadet corps with a disability.

Aggie coaches turned him down for football. Jones came to Christian discouraged.

Christian, then at Colorado City as head coach, had a suggestion. Tulsa University had an assistant coach, Buddy Brothers, who had played at Texas Tech and later coached at Lubbock and who had just one arm.

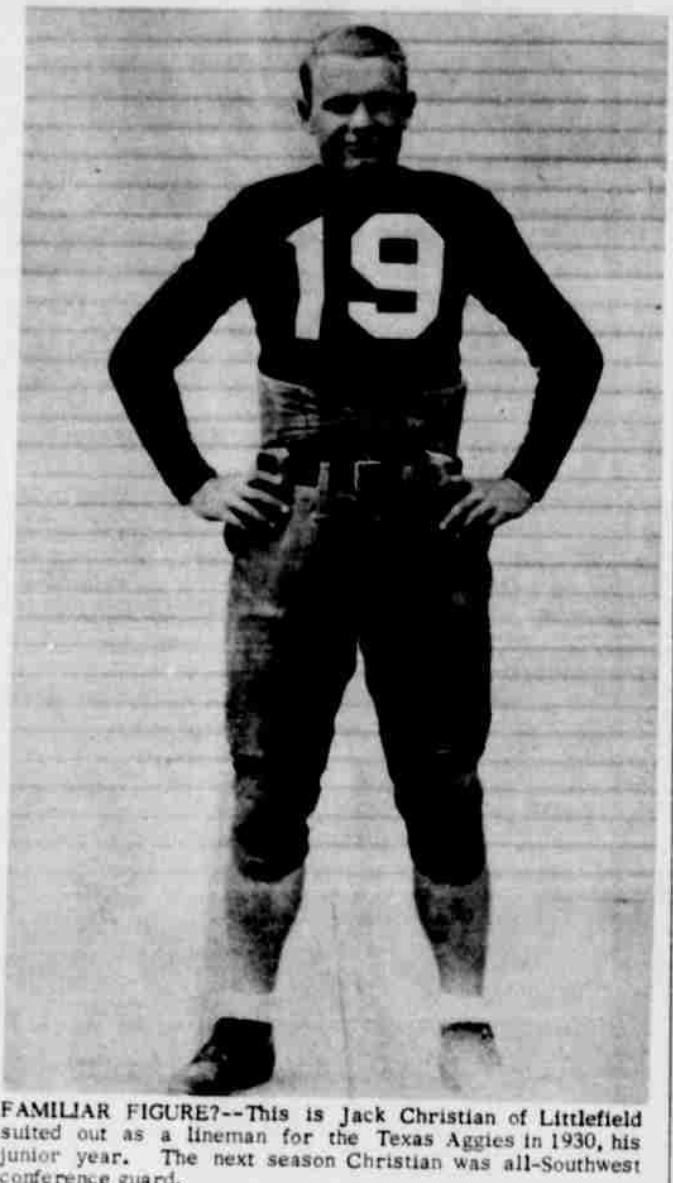
Christian called Brothers and Jones went off to Tulsa, where Henry Frnka was head coach and Tulsa was riding a winning crest.

Jones made the varsity his sophomore year, played in a bowl game as a junior and in the Sugar Bowl as a senior, captaining that game for Tulsa. He also was a new All-American.

That day's work got him voted outstanding game player, a fitting finale to his unique grid career. Jones is a ranking geologist with a major oil company today.

Christian's own football career had many good moments. He was a member of the 1927 Abilene team that went to the state finals in the upper class of competition, when Texas had just two classes for teams.

Abilene that year beat Amarillo in state quarter finals, the

first time the Sandies lost a game on their old Butler field, Waco finally stopped Christian's romping team, 21-14, in a game Christian captained.

Jack was team place kicker also, turning in a perfect point-after record for his senior season.

Every member of the Abilene starting varsity got college offers and members went on to make squads at Texas Christian, Southern Methodist, Texas University and the University of Southern California and Texas A and M. Christian met his old teammates regularly in SW conference play.

Aggie coach D. X. Bible influenced Christian's college decision. He made the freshman squad, was singularly cited by Bible at the season's end and invited to go with him to Nebraska, where Bible was transferring as head coach.

Bible later came back to Texas U. as coach and longtime athletic director.

Matty Bell, another big SW conference name, came to coach at A and M.

Christian stayed at A and M, saw lots of action as a mobile 195-pound guard and was all-conference his last year.

His arm accident came months after his graduation, and wrote him into his service as a cavalry officer, a commission he got on graduation.

But not to football. Jack was at Abilene four years, at Colorado City four years, then left football to join the Texas Company as a petroleum distributor.

But not quite. He officiated for some 20 years, until 1957, working some top Texas schoolboy games and some SW conference games.

Then, during World War II when coaches were almost nonexistent, he filled in at Spur, where he had a Texaco business. He found time daily to coach the Spur team, won a district championship one year, was runner up another.

The Christians moved to Littlefield in 1946, where he is Texaco consignee, along with an active civic career. He has twice been Rotary president, at Spur

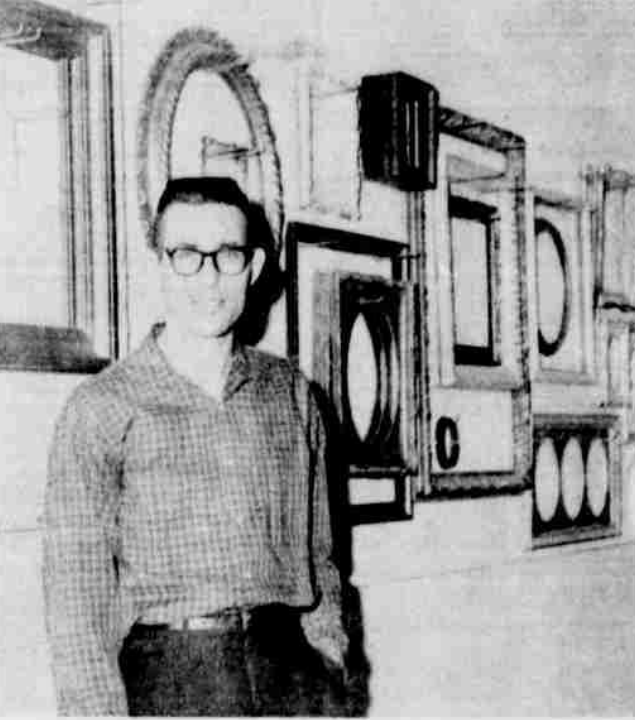
