\$3 billion shortfall in the budget for the state would make several changes necessary.

He said he is asking input from people in 96 cities in West Texas, and asking for their suggestions on ways to amend the budget shortfall.

He suggests that one of three methods may be used to alleviate the shortage of funding. One is an increase in sales tax, income tax, or broaden the current tax base.

He said the budget needs to be checked carefully to see what can be cut out.

In speaking of the school legislation, and efforts to make more funding available for educational purposes, the official said, "Schools cannot solve our social problems."

Also, Milner believes that the possibility of a state lottery will be coming up again, with more intensive discussion of that possibility.

He said, "The State Chamber is trying to improve the business climate of Texas. All Chambers can and need to work together.

"All of the Chambers of Commerce in the state need to be getting input from your members for our legislators."

The executive staff of the Texas Chamber is currently touring the West Texas region to gain input to help formulate the state organization's legislative agenda prior to the meeting of the 72nd Legislature in January 1991. According to Milner, "Input is crucial if the Texas Chamber is to represent the interests of all Texans before the Legislature." Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

The group also approved selling t-shirts for Mule Days, which is scheduled for the second weekend in August.







Thompson said, "Wound inhazardous for some people to fections, while they can be quite serious, are more obvious to the victim from the outset then are food-borne illnesses. A person with a cut or puncture stays aware of the injury while a person preoccupied with dining and entertainment may be taken by surprise, possibly after ingesting dangerous amounts of Vibrio-contaminated seafood. Therefore, most of our warning is aimed at the unsuspecting person who might be tempted to, try raw seafoods."

> Thompson explained that Vibrio bacteria occur naturally. The freshest seafood may contain the organisms, just as other meats or poultry contain other harmful bacteria if served raw, improperly cooked or mishandled.

Thompson said that normal cooking procedures easily kill Vibrio, and re-contamination of the seafood after cooking can be prevented with the same cleanliness precautions (hand and utensil washing) necessary to avoid other food-borne contaminants.

Thompson added that eating raw seafood species other than ovsters, clams, and mussels is not generally popular in Texas. "But our growing ethnic populations, some preferring raw or lightly cooked seafood,

It rained all afternoon that we were there. The barracks were all burned whenever the camp was liberated, but two have been rebuilt and furnished to show the living conditions. They said that the rooms that were to hold 200 were filled with as many as 1600 people.

If the buildings were not properly cared for the offenders were hung by their hands for an hour or worse. Henry did not particularly want to show us this and I can't blame him, but it is a part of history.

Manuel, in France, said that the tile for the outside was getting scarce so no buildings were torn down and rebuilt from scratch. This seemed to be the practice through Europe.

DAY THIRTEEN - FRIDAY June 22, 1990

We left Augsburg for Munich the third largest city in Germany. It has a population of two million people. On the way out of Augsburg, Henry explained how they were taking care of their garbage. They were making an artificial hill, it would be covered with dirt and trees and bushes would be planted to make it a part of the landscape. The BMW and the Air Bus is

manufactured in Munich. Henry told us about the four

last rulers of Germany, Ludwig I, Maximilian II, Ludwig II, and Ludwig III. Later we saw one of Here we saw the furnaces and the gas chamber.

Back from here we walked down a manicured lawn and flowers to two places with marble markers where over 1000 people were buried. We also saw the "blood ditch" where the Soviet officers were killed. A very unusual monument stands just behind the main buildings that are the original headquarters. This was a moving experience for me and for everyone. It was not a bizarre experience, but a meaningful one. This type of situation could happen to any country if we are unaware of who our leaders are. We stayed until five and drove back into Munich to pick up those who stayed and shopped.

We were in a light rain all afternoon and as we drove from Munich to Staffelsee for the night. Our hotel was in a beautiful village south of Munich and not far from Oberammagau. The 'hotel had small rooms, but the lounge, restaurant, swimming pool were large and charming.

Tonight, however, it was the fate of four of us to stay in another hotel as they had overbooked so as our group leader, I felt that Sharon and I should be two to move. The room was o.k. but I felt like no one else was at the hotel. They took us over in a car with our luggage. I was so tired it didn't matter. I ended up not sleeping, but I survived. We went back to the hotel at 6:15 the next morning.

Commercial Metals Purchases Spradling **Iron And Metal**

Commercial Metals Company (NYSE) has purchased the assets of Spradling Iron and Metal, a secondary metals processing facility in Lubbock. The purchase was made from Johnny Spradling who founded the business two years ago.

In announcing the purchase Harry Heinkele, president of Commercial Metals Secondary Metals Processing Division, said Spradling would remain as manager of the facility which will operate as Commercial Metals Company-Lubbock.

Located on Interstate 27 north of the airport, the facility will remain a full service scrap yard purchasing ferrous and nonferrous metals including aluminum cans, according to Heinkele.

Commercial Metals Company, headquartered in Dallas, has been a metals recycler for 75 years and currently operates 28 recycling locations across the Sunbelt. "This facility will be our 29th location," Heinkele said, "and the second time we have had an operation in Lubbock. Commercial Metals operated a plant in Lubbock for 25 years but we lost our location when Interstate Highway 27 was widened in 1986. We are very pleased to be moving back to this fine city."

Heinkele said, "While CMC will operate this full-service facility as in the past, additional equipment will be added to the already existing auto masher


The first call using the new telephone system is to be made from Shoup's general store and post office in the canyon's only town, population 2.

It's to be placed by Joe (Dean Miller, president of the Idaho Public Utilities Commission, to Gary C. Byrne, administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration (REA). He is speaking to a rural development conference in Denver sponsored by his federal agency headqauartered in Washington, D.C.

"Installation of the modern telephone system marks the end of an era," Bryne said. "which started early in this century in the United States. It was slowly extended to rural areas, then accelerated following the end of World War II, to assist in farm progress and rural development."

The REA, which began making rural electric loans in 1935, was authorized by Congress in 1949 to develop a similar program for rural telephony. Since then, the U.S. Department of Agriculture agency has approved about \$8.9 billion in insured and guaranteed loans for more than 1,000 rural telephone systems nationwide.

Another USDA agency, the Forest Service, installed the single telephone line in the canyon, which crisscrosses the Salmon River, in 1931. It sold the line in 1952, which was then called antiquated, to its users for \$1. They have maintained it since, frequently scaling the cliffs to repair the line broken by avalanches, forest fires and storms--and even rockslides touched off by the bighorn sheep



TMA Urges Texans To Make "Living Wills"

The Texas Medical Association encourages all Texans to execute "living wills" so their wishes for continuing or terminating life-sustaining treatment will be known to their families and physicians in case of a serious injury or terminal illness.

A living will may be obtained free from TMA by writing Texas Medical Association, Living Will, 1801 N. Lamar Blvd., Austin, Texas 78701.

A living will is a directive to physicians specifying that a patient does not want extraordinary life-sustaining procedures continued in cases where terminal or irreversible illnesses prevent them from being able to communicate such wishes at the time. Such documents also may include designation of another

Had Nancy Cruzan executed a living will stating that she did not want extraordinary lifesustaining measures taken on her behalf in case of terminal or irrversible injury or illness, her parents would have been allowed to discontinue lifesustaining treatment. Cruzan was in a car accident in 1983 that has left her in a type of coma called a persistent vegetative state. The U.S. Supreme Court on Monday upheld a Missouri ruling barring Cruzan's parents from discontinuing life support on grounds there was no "clear and convincing evidence" that Nancy Cruzan would have wanted treatment discontinued.

In that ruling, however, the court recognized that advances in medical technology, while saving thousands of lives, can condemn some to survival in vegetative conditions. The court's decision upholds the right to decline extraordinary life-saving measures through instruments such as living wills.

will, may execute a directive regarding life-sustaining treatment. Directives may be executed by patients under 18 years of age by the patient's parents, legal guardian or spouse, if the spouse is an

adult. Once a directive has been made, it should be filed as part of the patient's medical record so his or her physician is aware of the patient's wishes. A directive may be revoked by the patient at any time, even in the final stages of a terminal illness.






