#### Fire Destroys Littlefield Bowling Alley



Fire of undetermined origin broke out in the Littlefield Bowling Alley building on Phelps Avenue early Friday morning, completely destroying the bowling alley equipment, and burning the entire interior of the structure, including roof, leaving only standing the brick walls.

Considerable damage was also done to the building next door, which houses the Army Surplus Store, and also considerable damage by fire, smoke and water to the merchandise.

Both these buildings are owned by Fred Gerlach.

The loss in each building was partially covered by insurance.

The fire department answered a call about 1:30 a. m. to the scene of the fire, and believing they had extinguished the blaze, returned to their homes. Shortly thereafter, however, a second alarm was turned in, and the fire boys returned to the building.

The fire is believed to have started in the rear of the bowling alley building.

These are two views of the fire late last week which gutted the bowling alley building, which was occupied by the Littlefield Bowling Alley. The fire did extensive damage to the building adjoining on the east side, which is owned by Fred Gerlach. The fire also did damage to the stock of the latter building, which is an army surplus store.

**Cotton Acreage Decision Reached**

A Senate-House conference agreed Thursday to allow cotton farmers to ignore acreage planted this year in determining allotments for any future marketing or acreage controls under federal farm programs.

The agreement ended a long argument between senators and representatives over conflicts between bills passed by the two houses to guard against possible surplus farm production.

Dropped from the measure was a Senate provision that would have allowed wheat, corn and rice farmers also to ignore 1949 plantings. Also dropped was a House-approved provision that would have credited cotton farmers with acreage they diverted to wartime crops.

**Remains Of Plains Men enroute to U. S.**

The U.S. Army have announced that the remains of 6,785 Americans who lost their lives during World War 2 are being returned to the United States aboard the United States Army Transport Barney Kirschbaum.

Armed forces dead were originally interred in temporary military cemeteries in France, Belgium, Holland,

Luxembourg and England, are among those being brought back to this country.

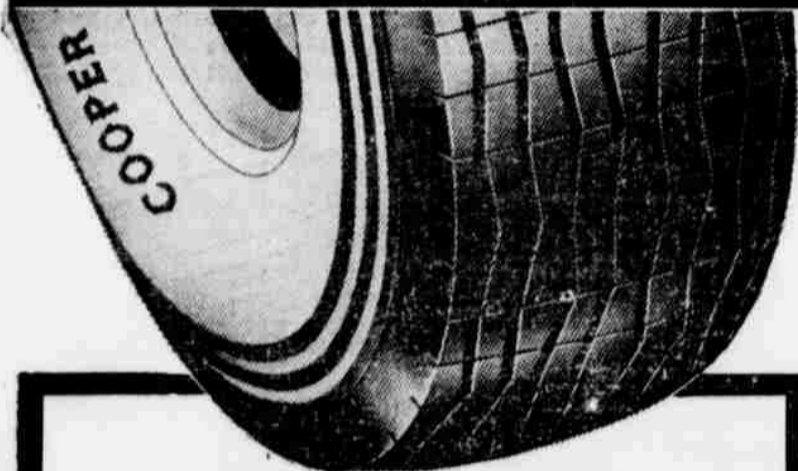

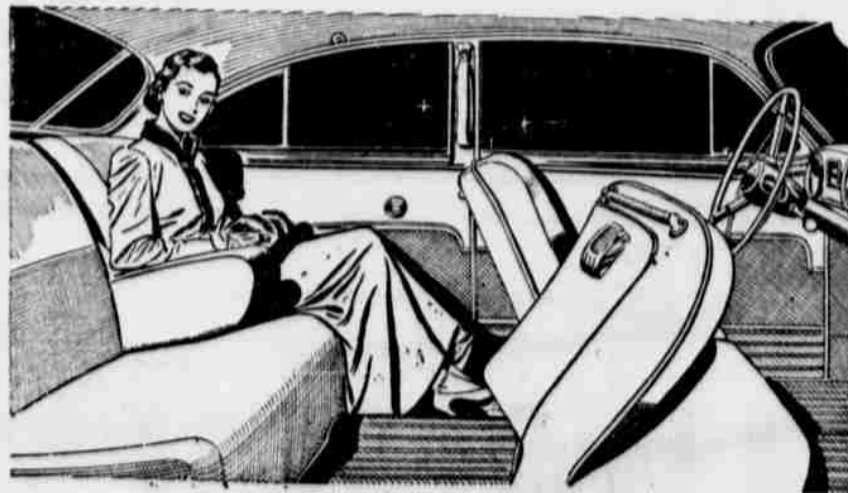

The longer wheelbase allows a "cradled ride," as passengers are nearly centered between the axles. The new shock absorbers also allow greater road clearance and reduce sidesway.

Interior design of the Plymouth provides many driver and passenger comforts and conveniences. Sedans have the rear door hinged from the center post for easy entrance and exit. The seats, front and rear, have a three-pillow cushion while seat backs have a full pillow on each side and three vertical pipes in the center. Imitation leather kick pads are carried around the seat bases and on the door

base. New, more rugged window regulators close or open windows with half the number of turns formerly required. Instrument panels with a new grain finish have been redesigned and relocated for ease in reading gauges. The glove box latch has been improved for more easy opening. A new, easily operated vent window lock has been designed to reduce the theft of articles from parked cars, and the ignition cable has been heavily

armored from the ignition switch through to the engine compartment as a safeguard against car theft.

A new automatic electric choke, of the same type used on other Chrysler Corporation cars, has been added. Among the outstanding innovations is the combination ignition and starter switch which completely eliminates the stater button. The car starts by turning the ignition key

## Canadian River Project Pushed

Mayor Lawrence Hagy was delegated Saturday to confer with Gov. Beauford Jester on a request that Texas cooperate with other states now engaged in seeking formation of a basin-wide commission for the Canadian river dam project.

The proposed commission would handle jurisdiction of the dam project. Other states in the movement to create a United States commission on the Arkansas, White and Red River basins would be Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Colorado and Kansas.

A meeting to discuss the proposed eight-state commission was held Friday in Amarillo. Conferring with Mayor Hagy were N. A. Graham of Tulsa, chairman of the Oklahoma Waters Resources board; John McCarty, president of the Panhandle Water Conservation authority; and H. R. Robbins, regional director of the Bureau of Reclamation.

Meanwhile, in Washington, Rep. Eugene Worley (D-Tex) introduced a bill in the House to give congressional consent to three states for drawing up a

compact for appointment of Canadian river waters. The bill for Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico would provide that the federal government have a representative at negotiations between these states to report to Congress. The compact would not be binding until it had been approved by the legislatures of the three states.

## Meade F. Griffin of Plainview Appointed Justice of Texas Supreme Court

Meade F. Griffin, Plainview attorney, whom Gov. Beauford Jester has appointed to the Texas Supreme Court, has an excellent legal background.

Highly respected among lawyers with whom he has worked in Plainview for years, and with a record of fine community and country service Griffin will make a most valuable contribution to Texas tribunal.

An alert, lean native Texan he works hard at any job he assumes.

Griffin has been a resident of Plainview for 28 years. He first practiced law at Plainview with the late L. S. Kinder and Judge C. D. Russell. In 1923 he was elected county judge of Hale County. After serving two terms he was elected district attorney of the 64th Judicial District, serving for eight years and retiring voluntarily in 1934. He has practiced law at Plainview since—except for the three and a half years he served with the United States Army during World War II.

He served as chief of the plans and training division at Camp Shanks, N. Y., a staging area for the New York Port of Embarkation, until May 1945, when he was detailed to the judge advocate general's department. He went to Wiesbaden, Germany, and served as chief of the prosecution sub-section, war crime branch. He was separated from the service Dec. 9, 1945, as a colonel of infantry, and retained his connection with the reserve corps continuously.

He was born in Cottonwood, Callahan County, Texas, May 17, 1894. He moved to the Plains with his parents in 1924 and settled near Tulla. He received his BA degree from the University of Texas in 1915, and his law degree in 1917, leaving the university to enter the first officers training camp at Leon Springs, San Antonio.

He is serving under the Texas State Bar Association appointment on the committee on courts buildings in Austin.

The Griffins have two children, Mariellen, a student in Plainview High School, and Fred, in elementary school.

Jester appointed Judge Griffin as a member of the state hospital advisory council in 1948. He is a Mason and a member of the Episcopal Church, the American Legion and Rotary.

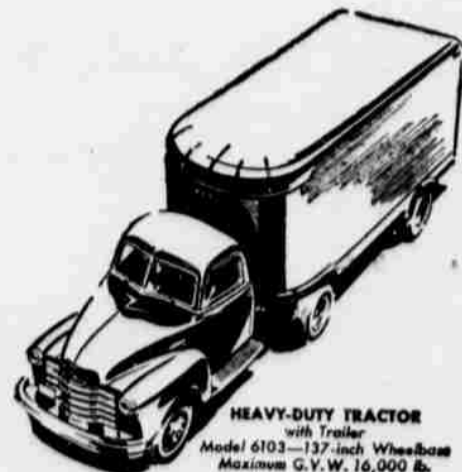

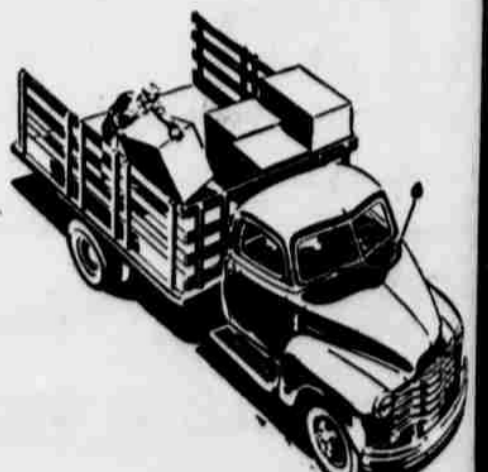

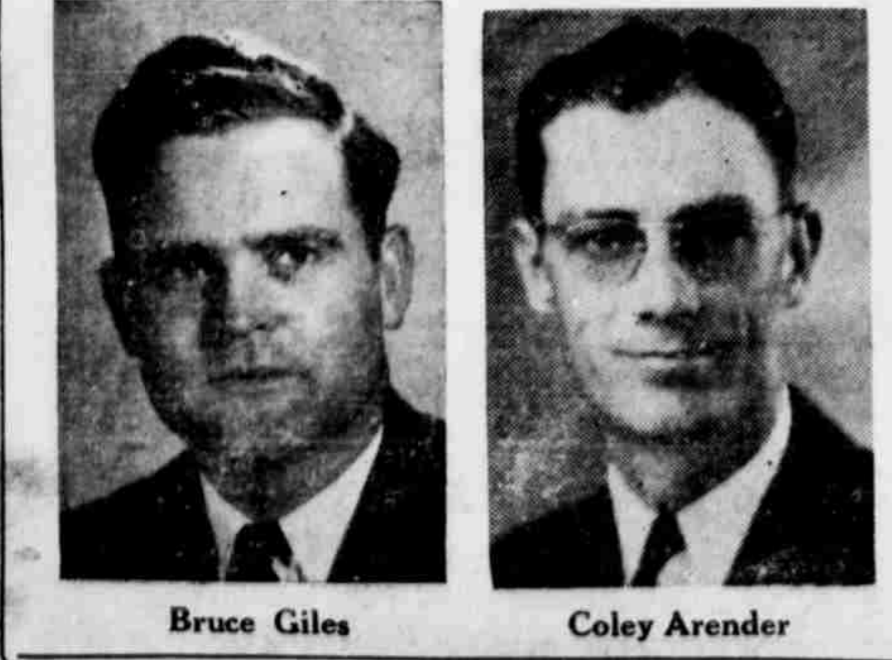
