## Crops Need Hot Weather

The County cotton and grain farmers are hoping for good warm weather and clear sunny skies.

The farmers, ginners and ASCS officials are nearly unanimous in saying the extensive rains of last weekend helped in many areas, especially in the dryland areas and caused little damage anywhere to the county's multi-million dollar grain and cotton crop.

Continued wet weather, together with cool temperatures and overcast skies, could deliver a damaging and costly blow. "This year's crop is still dependent on what the weather is between now and the first of November," stated one farmer.

The rains over the weekend, which measured from 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 inches in certain dryland areas and up to three inches in the Spade area, stopped the cotton from opening and the continued cold weather has slowed the maturing. "If we can get some good hot weather now and the cotton starts maturing it won't hurt the grade," an ASCS spokesman declared.

Harvesting of the county's estimated 180,000 acre grain crop is considered to be from 35 to 40 percent completed. The rains brought harvesting operations to a standstill during the past few days, although grain cutting should be resumed today and with weather permitting is expected to be back in full activity by tomorrow.

The rain helped considerably in the dryland areas, as it not only helped the cotton crop in that area which is expected to be somewhat better than a year ago, but also helped put the land in much better condition for plowing.

One dryland farmer stated, "The moisture was needed on the dryland crop at this time to bed it down and keep it from blowing later on. We could have used the moisture to better advantage earlier, but this will help considerably." In the approximately 135,000 acres of irrigated cotton, the concern is also the weather for the next month. "All this rain and cool weather could hurt the irrigated crops, especially the cotton that was irrigated late, but if we can get some good hot weather so that the cotton can mature it will be alright," stated a Spade farmer. Littlefield received slightly over two inches from the rains which brought the total for the month to nearly three inches.

Don Avery, boss of the Littlefield Lions Club, has announced the local club is currently conducting funds to be used in providing relief for the victims of Hurricane Betsy. ### 'Cats Prep For First AAA Meeting

Littlefield's scrappy Wildcats, still searching for their first win of the season, worked hard this week getting ready for the first meeting of the season with a AAA ball club. The 'Cats will journey to Hereford Friday night to meet the beefy Whitefaces, in the final road game of pre-season play.

Still in quest of their first touchdown of the 1965 season, the crew of Coach John Howle's has spent most of this week's sessions on setting the offense to be used in the Friday night encounter. One disappointing factor of the season so far, has been the lack lustre performance of speedster Larry Schovajsa, who has yet to find himself. Against Plainview last week the senior running back gained only nine yards in 12 carries, and was the third leading runner for the 'Cats. Also causing concern in practice this week has been the failure of a passing attack which appears to be necessary since the running game has proven ineffective, so far.

Expressing concern over the 'Cats' poor offensive showing, Head Coach John Howle has indicated the starting line-up Friday night will find Jimmy Burk at the running back post and Schovajsa on the wing, and will include several changes in the line. The bright spot of the season has been the outstanding defensive line play, with Ralph "Catfish" Dangerfield making a strong bid for all district honors, the 180 pound tackle from Bula continues to amaze coaches with his speed, power and ability. Against Plainview he picked up two fumbles in addition to making tackle after tackle. Also showing well and making

his return noticed is Al Mann, the 'Cats only experienced line-backer, who has been out with stomach trouble and returned to action for the first time last week. Elsewhere along the line, the plays of Mike Perkins, Ed Eley, Randy and Kevin Hubson have caused the coaches to sit up and take notice. Against the Whitefaces from the neighboring Panhandle city of Hereford, the 'Cats will be facing a team that will outweigh them and one that last week rolled up a total offense of 413 yards while giving their foes only 113. Against Dimmitt last week the 'Faces completed six of ten passes for 170 yards and two TD's and ground out 243 yards on the surface. If these figures were not enough the Whitefaces will be making their first appearance of the season before the home folks, which will add to the desire of the hosts. Last year the White-

### Soil Conservation Workshop Set

A workshop in Conservation education for Public School teachers in Lamb County Soil and Conservation District will be held next Thursday evening, September 30 at 7 p.m. in the Littlefield High School cafeteria.

All schools within the District will have representatives at the meeting which is being held to outline the need for teaching conservation of our natural resources in elementary and secondary schools.

Information will be made to the teachers regarding local projects and plans such as the program and plan of work of the Lamb County Soil Conservation District. The local conservationist will be identified and sources of information on conservation distributed. Specialists at the workshop will help the local schools adapt teaching units to meet the specific needs of this area.

Representatives from the Soil Conservation Service, High Plains Water District and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will be available for discussions and questions.

### Fire Damages Talburt Home

The farm home of Johnny Talburt suffered damages estimated between \$750 and \$1,000 Monday morning when lightning struck a butane pipe leading from under the house to a butane tank.

The fire started in the utility room of the home which is located near Hart Camp. Leon Durham, Littlefield Volunteer Fire Chief stated that flames shot up when the firemen chopped a hole in the floor of the room.

Most of the damage was confined to the one room though the entire house suffered smoke damage.

### Two Accidents Over Weekend

Two accidents occurred over the weekend with approximately \$350 damage to the four vehicles involved.

Saturday evening an accident on 6th Street caused \$100 damage to a State Highway Department truck when it was hit by a 1960 Chevrolet truck driven by Calvin Wright. The State-owned truck was parked when the other vehicle ran into it.

The Wright vehicle suffered only minor damage. The second accident occurred at 7:30 p.m. Sunday evening at the intersection of Highways 385 and 54.

A 1965 Ford driven by Leslie Drope, Sudan, was attempting to make a left turn onto Highway 54 and a 1957 Ford driven by Elton Minyard, Littlefield, going north on 385, struck the Drope vehicle in the right side. The collision caused \$100 damage to the Minyard vehicle and \$125 to the car driven by Drope.

Principal Beryl Harris announced yesterday that one senior at Littlefield High School has been named a Semifinalist in the 1965-66 Merit Scholarship competition.

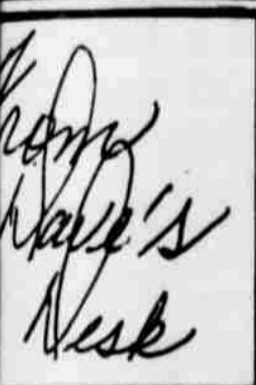
The student cited for her high achievement is Linda Williams.

### MEETING TONIGHT

#### Work Survey Form Deadline Extended

The deadline for the return of work survey forms has been extended through the weekend. Chamber of Commerce Executive Vice President Leon Slaughter said Tuesday afternoon, "The reason for the extension was brought on by the large last minute response to the plea for returns," Slaughter stated, "and, we felt there might be others who would fill out the requested information and return the forms to the Chamber office if given a few more days."

In an effort to help explain the form and the reason for conducting a survey, the Industrial Committee of the Chamber has arranged for a public meeting to be held in the Council Room on the second floor of Littlefield City Hall tonight, Thursday, at 7:30.

C of C President Chic Conway has asked that anyone who does not understand the form or would like additional information in regard to completing the survey make every effort to attend this information meeting.

The industrial committee is stressing that to be eligible to fill out the form you do not have to be looking for employment now, or even be thinking about changing jobs or going to work. The only reason for the survey is to determine how many area citizens would consider employment should the efforts to bring some type of industry to the area be successful.

The fact you have completed and returned a form does not obligate you to anything, however, should the current prospect decide to locate in this area, those who are looking for employment, and have filled out the form will be given first consideration for any job opening.

A representative of one manufacturing firm, with which the industrial committee is working, also stated prior training is not necessary. Should his firm decide on a Littlefield location and open a plant, a complete training program would be put in operation, to train the needed personnel.

In an effort to work with the Chamber of Commerce in helping to bring industry to the area, the school systems of the county have arranged for the pupils to take the survey forms home and to ask their parents to fill them out and return them to the C of C or to the school before the Monday morning deadline. In addition to the forms being available through the schools, they can also be found in all area grocery stores.

Chamber representatives have said they know the workers are available should an industry come to Littlefield, but the Chamber needs something more than their feelings to show the industrial prospects when a work force is discussed. "That is why," Committee Chairman Mancil Hall said, "it is of vital importance that everyone fill out the form and return it without delay."

Monday is the final day, as the results will have to be tabulated and submitted by the week's end.

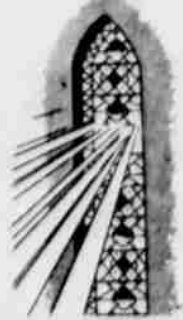

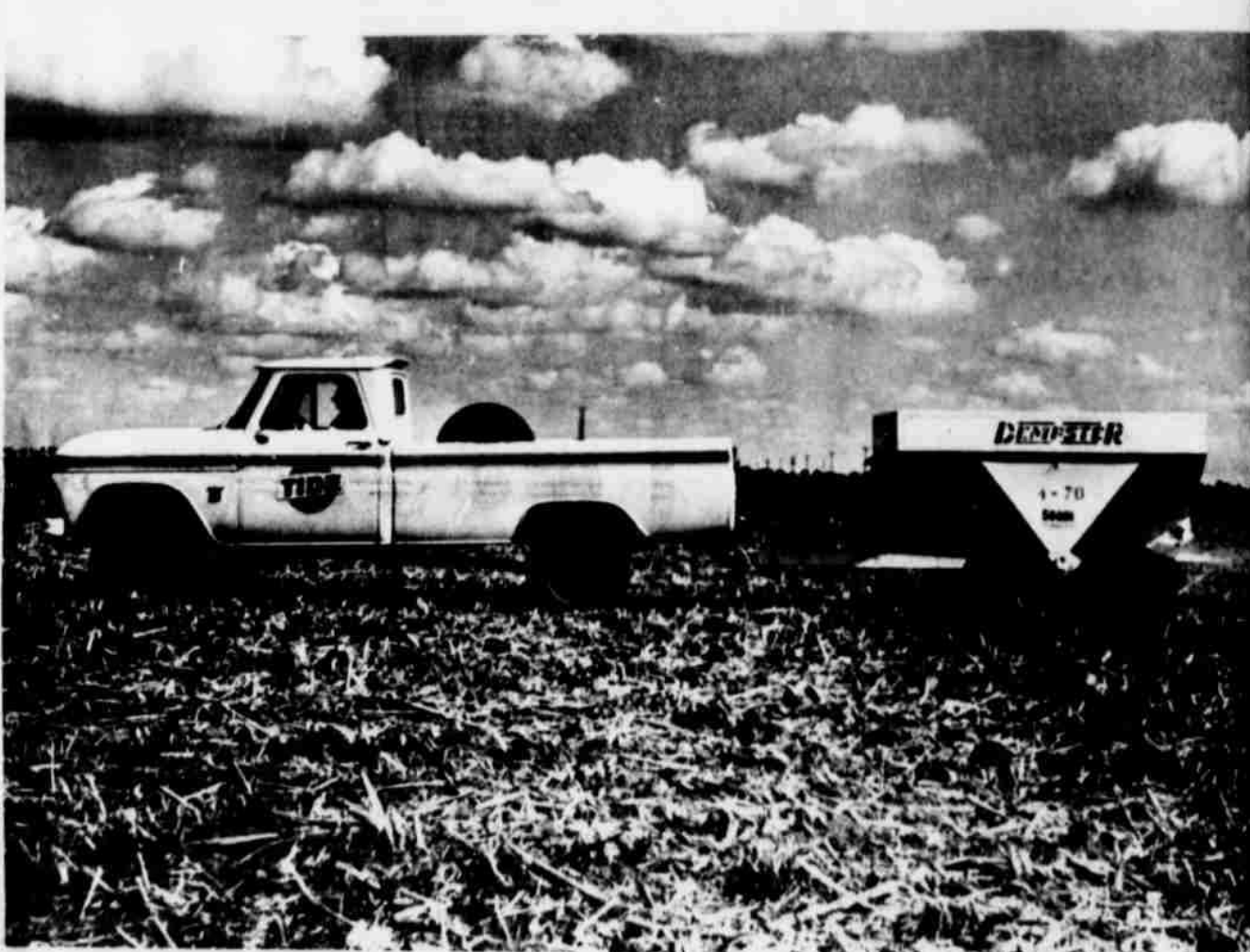

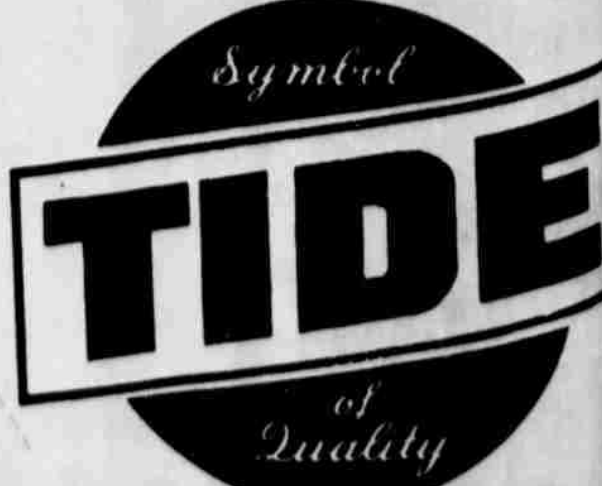

The right side of the heart receives blood from the pumps through the lungs which releases carbon dioxide and receives oxygenated blood from the lungs and sends it to the arteries into the body. The sides of the heart are acted by valves which permit flow in only one direction. Whenever one's heart is unable to circulate blood properly, he has heart disease. Factors that may influence the heart's health are diet and weight, exercise, smoking, infectious diseases, and stress.

- Eat less in the hope you will live longer to eat more.
- Don't experiment with special diets, if your physician thinks you need one, he will prescribe it.
- Exercise regularly, if you have heart trouble your physician will set activity level.

 The fact the 1965-66 becomes effective October 1, 1965, before the next meeting and that this ordinance establishes appropriate said budget requires that ordinance be immediately effective upon its passage and option and the rules and ordinances to be read and hereby suspended and the ordinance shall be in full effect from and after the passage and adoption of reading and publication in fifteen days in the County Leader.
