Three Local Men Enlist In Air Force Recently

Tideland Dispute Nearing Solution

The Senate April 2 passed the joint resolution confirming the titles of the states to the tidelands for a distance of three miles from shore and in the case of Texas a distance of 10 1/4 miles. The vote was 50 to 35.

Earlier, the Senate had adopted by a vote of 50 to 34 the states' rights substitute offered by Senator Tom Connally of Texas, as modified by an amendment proposed by Senator Spessard Holland of Florida.

The measure now goes to the House which passed a states' rights bill last year, but which must now act on the Senate version.

"I am highly gratified at the passage of the tidelands bill as amended by the Connally-Holland substitute which recognizes the titles of the states," Senator Connally said. "I very much hope that the bill as passed will become law."

The Senate action was a milestone in a long and frequently confusing fight in which both sides have availed themselves of the complicated rules of the upper body of Congress. Here's what happened:

All bills which do not become law during the two-year life of a Congress die with that Congress, and the legislative process must be started from scratch in the next Congress. It was started in the Senate in the present (82nd) Con-

gress on February 21, 1951 when Connally and 34 other Senators jointly introduced a bill confirming the titles of the states to the tidelands. This bill became popularly known as the Holland bill.

The next action of this Congress was in the House which on July 27, 1951 passed what was popularly known as the Walter bill. The Walter bill not only confirmed the titles of the states to the tidelands but also allotted the states 37 1/2 per cent of all revenues received from oil and other leases on the continental shelf, that is, the portion of the ocean bed seaward of the three mile (or 10 1/4 miles for Texas) limit of the tidelands.

The Walter bill was referred in the Senate to the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs which considered various tidelands proposals but took no action.

On January 14, 1952, Senator Connally introduced in the Senate a resolution discharging the Interior Committee from further consideration of the Walter bill and placing that bill on the Senate calendar.

Before this resolution was acted on the Interior Committee, which was controlled by advocates of federal ownership, responded by voting on January 22, 1952, to report an interim joint resolution which postponed settling the question of title to the tidelands but which provided for federal management in the meantime.

When the interim joint resolution came before the Senate, Senator Connally offered, as a substitute for it, the text of the Walter bill.

Senator Holland at this point offered a modified version of the Holland bill as a substitute for the Connally substitute. The chief effect of the Holland substitute was to eliminate the provisions for the continental shelf from Connally's

proposal. The Holland amendment to the Connally substitute was agreed to by voice vote in the Senate, and the substitute as amended was agreed to by a vote of 50 to 34. The joint resolution, which by then contained none of its original language, was passed by a vote of 50 to 35.

When the show-down Senate again spoke as it had once before in favor of recognizing Texas' title to its tidelands.

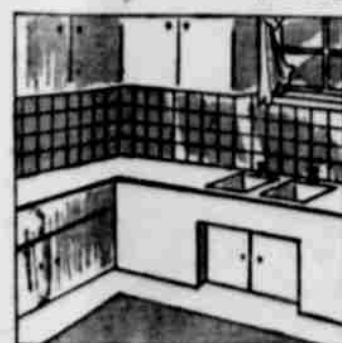

Serving with Air Anti-Submarine Squadron 23 based at the U.S. Naval Air Station, San Diego, Calif., is Vernon G. Whitfield, airman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Whitfield of Star Route, 2, Littlefield.

Since the squadron returned to the U.S. last year after a tour of duty in the Far East conducting anti-submarine patrols, it has been engaged in an intensive training program.

The program consists of new and refresher courses for the men in their respective jobs in ordnance, aerology, and maintenance mechanics and electronics. There is also on-the-job training in loading and handling rockets, machine guns and bombs, and gunnery and bombing exercises.

An additional phase of the training is survival trips into the mountains and deserts of California where the men learn how to snare their own food and use distress signals.

The aircraft manned by pilots and crewmen of Squadron 23 are Grumman Avenger torpedo bombers.

The assistantship will allow Nou \$650 on tuition and \$875 cash yearly until he completes his study towards a Ph.D. He will be teaching four hours a week.

He plans to enroll in October to begin his doctorate in mathematics, as he graduates from McMurry in May with a double major of math and secondary education and a double minor of physics and German.

Juri came to McMurry in Sept. 1950 and has attended both summer and winter since his arrival in order to complete his work as soon as possible. While a student, he has been a member of Future Teachers of America, Science Club, Jaycees, Kiva, men's social club, and Kappa Delta Pi, national education society, for which he served as president this year.

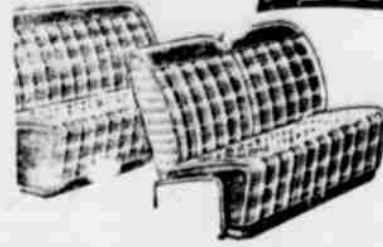
During his stay on the campus, he estimates that he has made some 150 speeches at civic and church events throughout West Texas concerning his home-land and foreign relations of the United States.

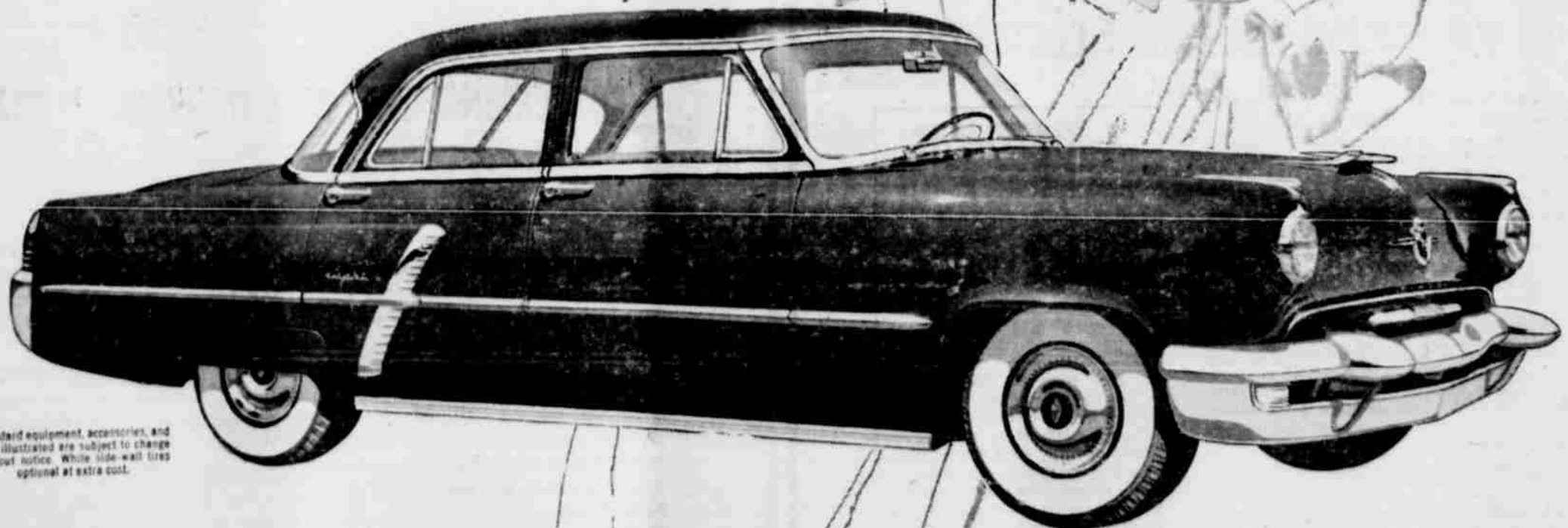

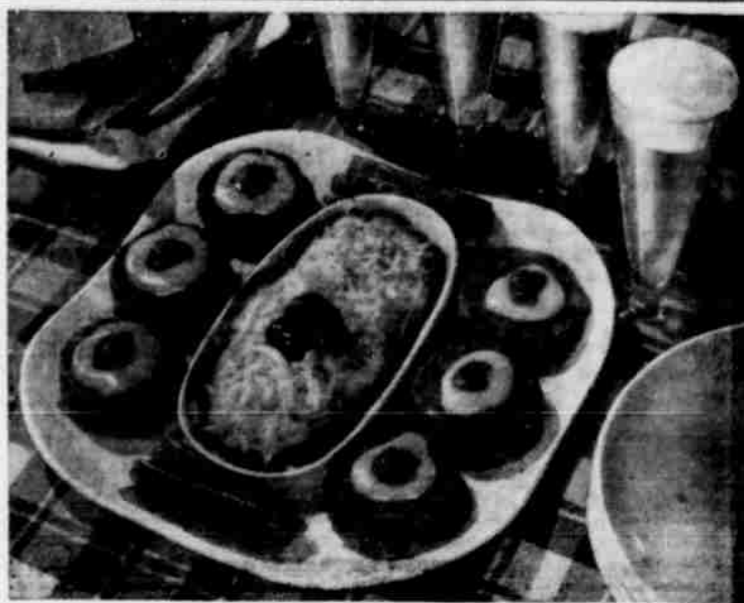

2535 Texans Killed In 1951

Texans have a lot to brag about but there are some things that should shame them if they have any feeling for humanity.

Last year, 2535 of our fellow Texans met a premature death and over 70,000 others were injured on our own streets and highways. In this, we are one of the leaders of the nation but I don't think anyone would want to brag about it!

Whose fault is it; who is to blame? The careless? The reckless? The speeders? The drunks?

Of course! But maybe we're all a little bit to blame. Maybe we just haven't been working hard enough at this job of accident prevention.

The Texas Safety Association, your State coordinating body for safety activities, plans to step up its

program this year and your full cooperation is earnestly sought. The situation is grave and we dare not let up on our efforts now. Your help is needed.

How can you, as a citizen, help? You can observe the traffic laws of your State. You can support the program of our police departments in their efforts to make our community safe. You can discourage drunk driving on the part of your acquaintances. You can see that your car is always in good operating condition. You can support our traffic courts by urging stiff penalties for traffic violators. In these and many more ways can you help our community to do its share in making Texas a safer place in which to live.

Control And Prevention Of Polio

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which is always more prevalent during the summer months.

Until recently it was generally believed that this infection is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis is primarily another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must emphasize clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the housefly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate community sewage disposal cannot be secured it is important that at least an

approved pit type toilet be constructed and properly maintained.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use and protected from flies, filth, and insects. All eating and food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the State Law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rate and mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same sanitary standards that are necessary in community life. Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Excreta from noses and contacts should be handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typhoid fever or bacillary dysentery.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.

To Make Your Vote Count Attend Convention

(As a public service, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has prepared a series of two articles that emphasize importance of individual participation in party precinct conventions in a presidential election year. This is the first article—Editor's Note.)

In the past a very small portion of Texas voters have had any direct influence—upon the election of the President and Vice President of the United States.

They have voted in primary elections, and a few of them in general elections. But they voted for Presidential Electors—not the candidates themselves.

Those candidates—the party nominees—had been selected three or four months before the general election itself.

And, even then, they had not been selected by ballots of individual voters, cast in an election.

Their nominations originated way back there in May at party precinct conventions.

Here is how it works:

The precinct convention names delegates to the party's county convention.

The county convention selects delegates to the state convention.

The state convention selects delegates to the national convention.

The national convention nominates the presidential and vice-presidential candidates of the party.

It is, therefore, necessary that the individual voter take part in the precinct convention to most effectively make his own vote count in election of the President and Vice President.

Because such a relatively few voters usually attend Precinct conventions, the vast majority have had little moral right to complain about any administration's policies.

Here are some questions and answers to point up fundamental facts about the Presidential Precinct Convention:

Q. When will it be held?

A. On Saturday, May 3.

Q. At what hour?

A. The law requires that it be held between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. outside the largest cities, it usually is opened at 2 p.m. The County Chairman of the party is required by law to file a list of times and places with the County Clerk at least ten days before the convention day. This list must be posted on the Court House bulletin board.

Q. Who can take part in the Precinct Convention?

A. All qualified voters who live within the voting precinct.

Q. Must each person show proof of his rightful vote in the Precinct Convention?

A. Yes. He must bring with him to the convention, his Poll Tax receipt or his Exemption Certificate.
