MEXICALI SPAGHETTI BAKE

- 1/4 pkg. spaghetti
- 1 lb. ground chuck
- 1 large green pepper, minced
- 1 No. 2 1/2 can tomatoes
- 1 Tablespoon salt
- 2 teaspoon chili powder
- 1 No. 1 can ripe olives, pitted (optional)
- 1/4 cup olive oil or salad oil
- 1 large onion, minced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 No. 2 can cream style corn
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

In large skillet, saute chuck in oil until partly browned. Add

onion, pepper and garlic and cook until chuck is full brown. Add rest of ingredients, except spaghetti, and simmer 30 minutes. Add cooked spaghetti and cook slowly one hour.

MEXICALI SPAGHETTI BAKE (For 40 persons)

- 1 1/2 pkg. spaghetti
- 10 lbs. ground chuck
- 6 large green peppers, minced
- 6 cans No. 2 1/2 can tomatoes salt to taste
- 1/2 bottle chili powder
- 1 cup salad oil
- 6 large onions, minced
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 6 No. 2 can cream style corn
- 1 Tablespoon black pepper
- 1 Tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Combine as directions above and cook accordingly. Mrs. Farmer finds serving this meal with toasted garlic bread and green salad makes a delicious fall meal.

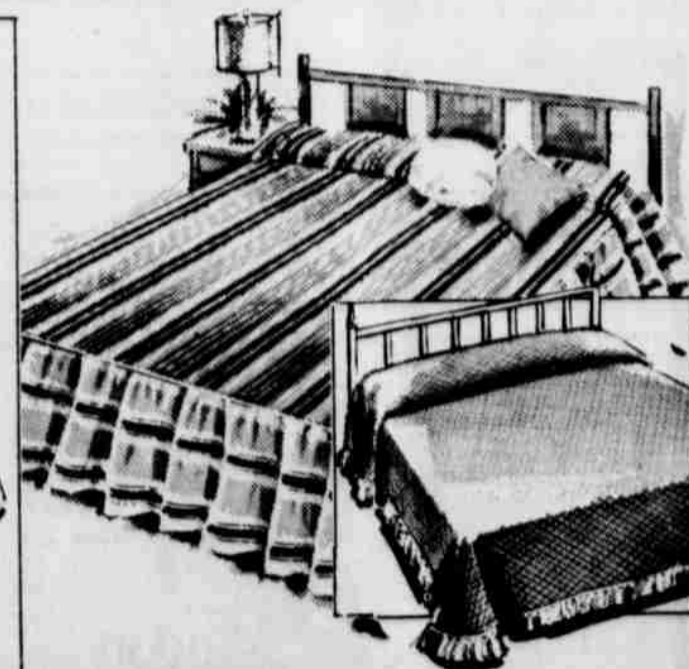

Murder Is Contagious And Newsboys Are Carriers

Are latent passions being fanned into flame by newspapers? Are TV's cameramen, focusing the world's eyes on screwballs, inciting others to riot? Does radio, bringing home the distant beat of jungle drums, impel us to unwise interventions?

Is campus promiscuity encouraged by "ladies' magazines" preoccupation with sex? Yes, four times, yes.

In the old days, home brew would ferment naturally, relatively harmlessly.

Today mass media supply the reagent which makes the whole mess toxic.

Dr. Frederick Wertham, one of the world's foremost authorities on criminal violence, believes that murder is as contagious as measles, and newsboys are carriers.

"The massacre at the University of Texas was definitely connected with the much-publ-

cized butchery of eight student nurses in Chicago; more mass killings can be expected."

On the credit side of that ledger, it was a published newspaper description which led to the identification and arrest of Speck in Chicago.

It is the restraint of the press which, to this day, has not related the goriest details of those Chicago killings in a conscientious effort to avoid pre-judging potential jurors.

And it was radio broadcasts which warned many innocent away from the Texas tower that bloody afternoon and mobilized others.

Yet Texas' Senator Yarborough says, "Every night, TV programs stress homicide. Murder is viewed as 'entertainment.' Every day's newspapers emphasize — sometimes exaggerate — violence. We are a Frankenstein building a monster which can destroy us."

Secretary Robert Weaver, the

first Negro member of the President's Cabinet, finds the press guilty of mislabeling certain individuals as "civil rights leaders" or "civil rights spokesmen," when they are, in fact, neither.

"To be identified as a leader, one should have an effective organization behind him. Instead, too often it's the person who makes the most noise who gets the most attention; the individual who can devise the most militant cry or who articulates the most far-out position."

A generation ago, we did not know about an overthrow in the Congo until it was an accomplished fact.

How much such blissful ignorance is a blessing, I don't know. I do know that we had more friends in the days before we sought to make everybody else's trouble our own.

Certainly, I do not want Government arbitrarily to inhibit our hard-won freedom of press.

It is the ability of an uninhibited newshawk to holler his head off when he sees chicanery, injustice or malfeasance which has helped us remain a last citadel of liberty . . .
