Over 100 **Hear Land Specialists**

Explanations of the Lamb County Soil Survey began in Littlefield Tuesday with over 100 persons attending the meeting held in the Community Center.

Several area soil specialists and agronomists were on hand to explain the various phases outlined in the book which gives a complete breakdown of the soils throughout the

Thurlo Branscom of Pleasant Valley served as moderator and introduced the various speakers for the evening.

Billy Gunter, area agonomist from Lubbock, explained the soil survey stating it is "an inventory of the land resources showing the sands, loams, medlum sands, etc.," "The survey shows the dis-

tribution of the soils on maps. making them easy to read and have meaning," he continued, "and with the soils in orders and groups," "It took over two years to

make this survey of Lamb County," Gunter said, "with 10 different men working to determine the texture, depth and type

of soil,"
"This survey is very important to farmers," Gunter explained, "as it will show the soil on each individual farm thus giving the producers a better understanding of the land," He also stated that about 80 per cent of the state has now been surveyed.

"We must learn how to make the best possible use of our land," Gunter continued, "Because we now have eight acres of land for every person living in the United States, but this figure will rapidly reduce as the population expands." He said that in China today there is less than a quarter acre per


Pep Schools Tell Opening Schedules
