#### Plant A Garden

There must be one million gardens in Texas this year. To do this, there must be an increase of at least 10 per cent. So if you had a garden last year, make it 10 per cent larger this year. If you did not have a garden last year, have one of some kind this year.

There are several reasons for this:

The requirements of the Army will be greater, for there will be more soldiers to feed, and more in distant places. For every man overseas, food for 270 days must be allocated.

Our Allies will need more.

There will be larger numbers of liberated people to feed.

Civilians will need more vegetables to compensate for decreased civilian supplies of some other foods.

In order to meet this goal, everyone must do his part. If you do not have a large space, you can have a box garden, a tub garden, a frame garden, or a small open garden. If you have a larger space, plant as much space as you can.

You will then have all you need of fresh vegetables, have some to conserve, and also have some extra for the persons who, for one reason or another, cannot have a garden.

Plant the garden early, or as early as it is practicable, so as to give it a good start and have earlier and more production. Plan it well, have a variety of green and yellow vegetables in the right proportion for the number in the family.

So get ready for the garden. Here are some things that you can do:

Buy your seed early, so that you will have them when you need them. Also buy those adapted to West Texas.

Select good garden plots and prepare them properly. Use more and better fertilizer.

Protect gardens from insects and diseases.

#### Youth Welfare

A seven-point wartime program for the protection of young people is laid down in a pamphlet, "Citizens of Tomorrow, A Wartime Challenge to Community Action," just issued by the Office of Community War Services of the Federal Security Agency. The pamphlet recommends cooperative effort of public and private agencies to meet the problems caused by the big increase in the number of young persons working on farms and in war industries.

The seven points in the program are:

Livable homes where families can feel that they "belong."

Good health protection.

Broad-scale education.

Opportunity for recreation and social contacts. Work training and experience that will help

them learn how to work and what work they are

Experienced welfare assistance for those who get into trouble or in event of death, illness, or other family misfortunes.

Law enforcement safeguards to forestall dangers that might result from inadequate control over school attendance, jobs, and amusements.

The pamphlet contains a check list showing specifically how a community can make use of available community services in meeting the needs of young people in wartime.



PROCESSED FOODS-Book IV, blue stamps A8, B8, C8, D8, and E8 are good for 10 points each, valid February 27 through May 20.

SHOES—Book 1, stamp No. 18 expires April 30. Book III, stamp one with airplane picture is good for one pair indefinitely. A new stamp to be designated later will become valid May 1 for one pair of shoes.

GASOLINE—(Coupons must be endorsed on front.) "A" coupons, 3 gals. each, with No. 11 and and succeeding stamps in "A" book lasting three months instead of two of previously. previously announced to expire March 31, and Stamp 31, which betion date on two sugar stamps will will be needed. permit consumers to buy sugar as it retailers, customary at the end of

sugar for home canning purposes until February 25, 1945. For any sugar over and above this amount, which the ration board will mail upon request, is to be used. More than one application may be made during the year for home canning sugar, but the total issuance cannot exceed 20 pounds per person. Consumers should apply for sugar only as it is needed.

When sending an application for sugar for home canning to the local board, spare stamp No. 37 from Book IV should be attached to the application form for each person applying for sugar. The OPA has asked applicants not to send their ration books. If the ration board approves the request, it will mail coupons or certificates for the sugar and keep the application on file at the ration board. If more sugar is ! needed later, a second application may be made, but it must be made to the board where the first appli-cation is on file," Mrs. Settle emphasized.



He stated that the four other Czechs ,who enlisted with a Czech squadron of the RAF with him at Montreal, Canada, in September, 1941, and trained with him at Moncton, New Brunswick; Calgary and Medicine Hat, Alberts, and Victoria-ville, near Montreal, Canada, and crossed over with him, were still going strong in Spitfires and Stirling Four Engine Bombers over enemy territory after 16 months of service in the war zones. Kokes was the only one of the five who had not taken out his naturalization papers to make him an American citizen, and it was for this purpose that he returned to United States in April of last year, so that he might join the American Air Forces. In July he was made an American citizen, and was transferred to the American Air Corps. He was stationed at Keesler Field until recently when he was transferred to Lubbock Army Air Field. He expects to be transferred to another post soon. He says he got "lots of kick" out of the missions over enemy territory, that he had lots of fun along with his work, and that as soon as "they are ready, I am ready to go again.'

A-C Kokes has an interesting past life. He was reared by his grand-parents, at Brezova, Czechoslavakia, but left there at the age of 14, coming to Chicago, where his par-ents, Mr. and Mrs. John Kokes, had settled. He had graduated from high school in Europe, speaking three languages, Czech, Polish and Hungarian, but not a word of English Therefore, he was obliged to start to grade school in Chicago to learn English, and finished the eight grades in one year, following which he attended high school for two years. At the age of 17, while workng for Joe Schumaker, who owned a private airport, this man gave him lessons in flying. This led him to joining up at Montreal, Canada, in September, 1941, along with four other Czechs from Garry, Ind., in a Czech squadron of the R.A.F. at the age of 18 years. This same group trained in Canada together, went overseas together, and remained together the 11 months that Kokes remained with the Czech squadron. These flyers all plan to return to the United States and join the

American Air Force. A-C Kokes related when he and his four buddies completed their training in Canada that a party was given in their honor at the Czech mission at Montreal, and that after visiting his parents at Chicago, they went to Halifax, from which port they took off for England, which trip by troop convoy, escorted about one-third the way by the British Coastal Command, took six days, arriving in Waterloo, England, on October 15, 1942, and from there proceeded to Torhilla Shrosbhere, 310th Czech Squadron base, 20 miles from London, where they were assigned to a fighter squadron, he to pilot a Hurricane, while the other four were assigned Spitfires and

Their work for the first month were sent on two missions, after which he said "it was regular routine work."

An experience, deserving of recognition, is recorded by A-C Kokes

as follows:

"While at Camp Sunday, December 15, 1941, about 5 a. m., three German bombers were returning from bombing England-it was a foggy day-we couldn't see anything much, but with the help of the radio, we got in contact with the three Ju 88's. There were five of us-Sgt. Pilot Elbert Gaydos, Sgt. 20,000 feet, and we dived at them from 30,000 feet, and started blasting away with our eight powerful machine guns mounted in the wings of each of our planes. (Each plane is equipped with eight machine guns.) We finally got all three saw two burst into flames, one of which fell in the ocean, and the other into the hills, with the thirda cloud of smoke-crashed on the southeast coast of England. I had a camera, so went down and took pictures. Not one of the crew (pilot, co-pilot, bombardier, gunner) which make up a crew on a Juss, could be recognized. The other two enemy planes had met the same fate. We had 40 machine guns in the five ships and sure poured it to them. They were dead before they landed.

"Anytime we would see one of our buddies shot down, it would make us more angry, and we would go after them harder than ever.

Sgt. Joseph Chabak, who operates a four-engine bomber, and a "buddy" of A-C Kokes, who has had a number of missions over Berlin, is expected to return to the United States shortly to be transferred to the American Air Corps.

Kokes' uncle, Stephen Osusky, was for 11 years Prime Minister of Czechoslovakia, and held this office when war broke out. Germany overrun Czechoslavakia in 1939, Fearing for the safety of his grandparents, Kokes in 1939, through the Inter-national Red Cross, made inquiry as to their welfare, and later in 1943 learned they were O.K.

Kokes believes it will take another year to conquer Germany, as he




