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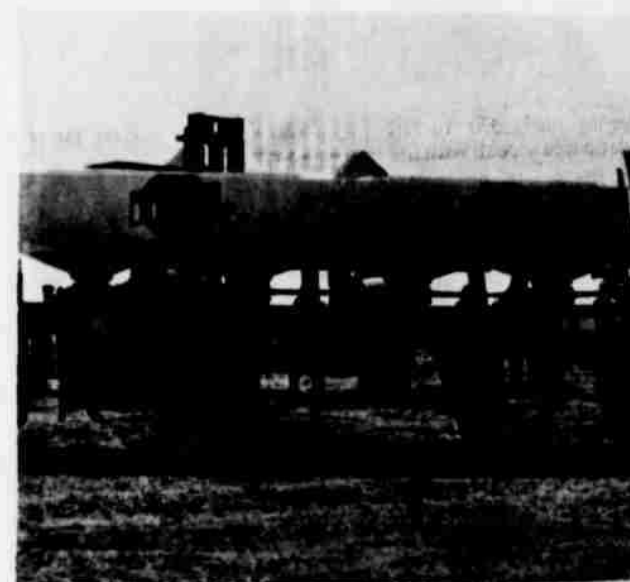
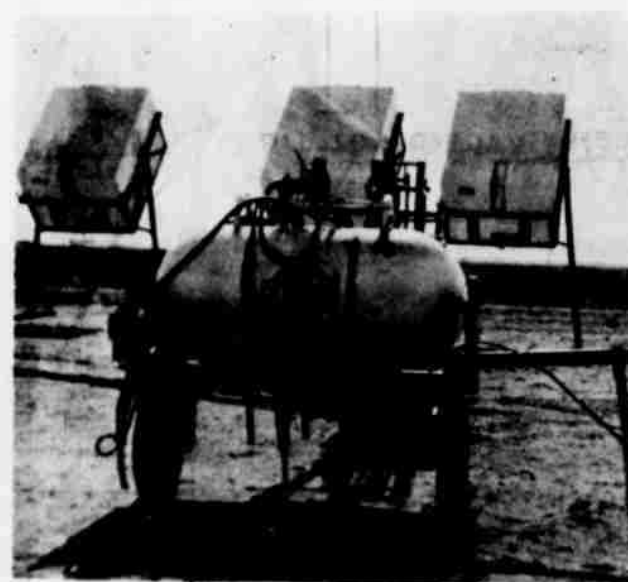

Churches in Littlefield will observe Pentecost with other churches around the world in observing June 6 Pentecost or Whitsunday. The Pentecost message is being given by the presidents of the Council of Churches in many languages in 214 Protestant, Anglican and Eastern Orthodox churches in 90 countries.

Pentecost Sunday comes fifty days after Easter. In the Eastern Orthodox churches, which follow a different calendar for their church year, Pentecost is usually celebrated a week or more later than in western churches, and they sometimes coincide in 1965 the Eastern Orthodox Pentecost will be June 13.

The Church today is losing the power that it had when it was accepted and part of the established church, they assert, "but God never cancelled the promise He gave to the Church. That power is available to the Church today. It is enough to pay the price. The price is to be utterly one with the Lord Jesus Christ—one with His will in order to be one with His victory."

Derivation from the limitations imposed by established power is reopening the power to the power given at Pentecost. The WCC presidents believe the power as "the power to believe, power to hope without ceasing to the end, power to love to the limit, power to work for justice, reconciliation between men, and the power of the coming Kingdom given to us now. It is a pledge of glory and it is available to all who ask."

HEALTH & SAFETY TIPS

Sunshine brings a return of the out-of-doors and its many pleasures and sports. Summer also brings back hot sunshine, high temperatures and cases of sunburn. Vigorous out-of-doors physical activity in the hot summer months is fun for almost all of us but it can also bring health problems.

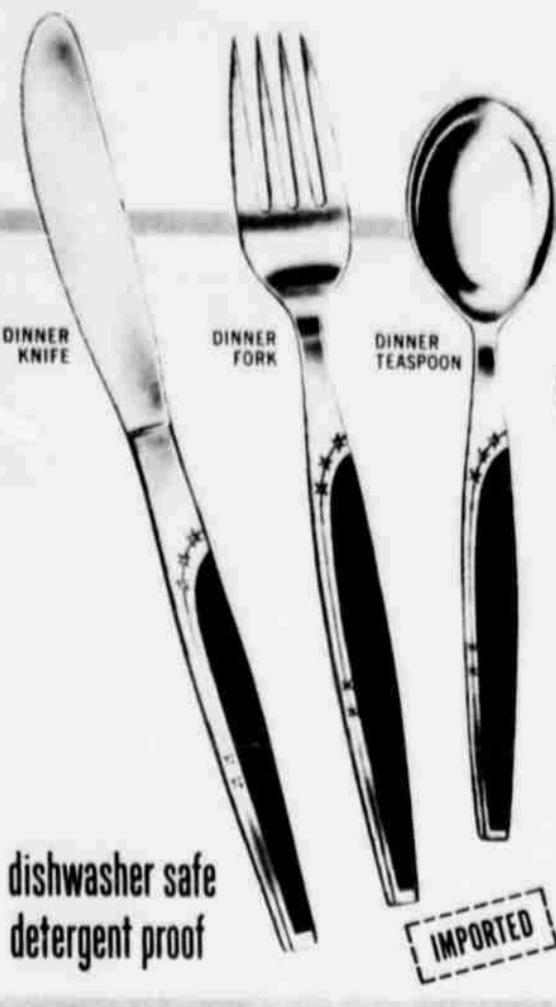
Have a careful medical checkup prior to starting a program of vigorous activity, such as returning to the tennis court or the golf course for the first time after the winter hiatus. Plan your more vigorous sports and games in the cooler parts of the day, mornings and evenings.

Become acclimatized to the heat by graduated approach to exercise. Don't play too much too long for the first few sessions in the heat. Take frequent rest periods. Don't be ashamed to sit down on a bench and rest while awaiting your turn at the tee. Take a few minutes for a rest break between sets of tennis.

Wear white clothing to reflect the heat, loose and comfortable to permit heat escape and permeable to moisture to prevent heat loss via sweating. Drink enough water to replace loss from sweating. Since frequent drinks of water, sipped half a glass, are better than gulping large quantities. Watch yourself and the others in your party for signs of heat exhaustion. Don't try to be "the cool one." If the heat begins to get down, stop, rest and cool.

Remember that the temperature and humidity are even more important than the sun. Heat exhaustion and heat stroke can occur in the shade on a humid day.

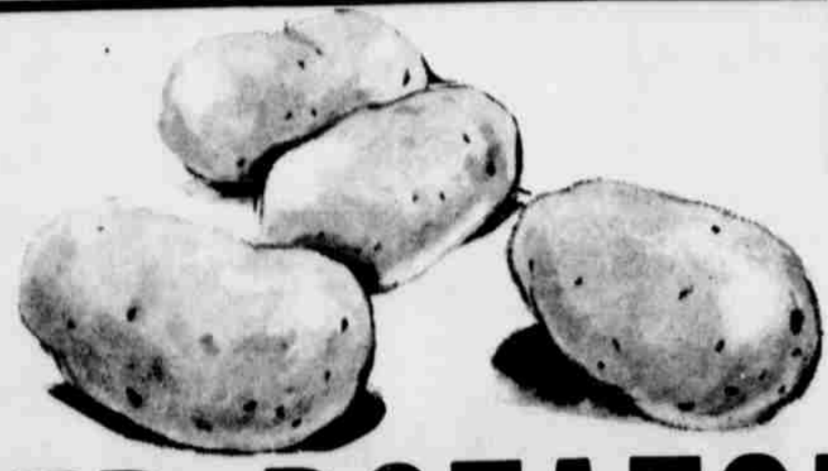

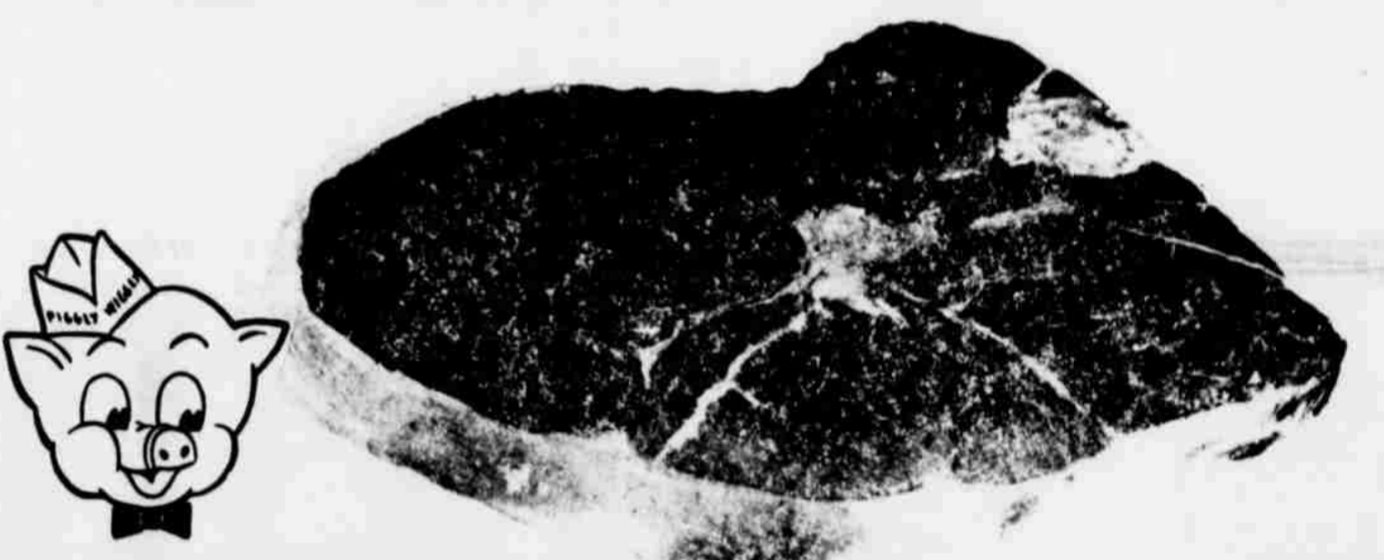

Watson Lies
 In the manager of the office of your sister works," he began, "the benefit of all concerned, I would convince her to..."
 "Why?" demanded the other man. "I've done something wrong?"

 "It turned out, the girl had done no such thing. In short order, Watson found himself facing a law suit for defamation of character. The court held him not liable for his mistaken statement was "privileged" by the circumstances. The court pointed out...

Watson had had good grounds for believing the girl guilty, and had spoken to her brother with definite purpose.
 Defamation law, like the Ninth Amendment, forbids you to bear false witness against your neighbor. It also forgives what might be said the clean lie—told in all fairness, on reasonable grounds, without malice.
 Thus, in another case, a man was accused for wrongly blaming a schoolboy for indecent conduct during recess. His statement, made primarily to the principal, was based on seemingly reliable information from his own daughter.
 But, to be privileged, the statement must be made in the line of duty. It must be one which the speaker has a legitimate interest in making, and the hearer a legitimate interest in hearing.
 A court found no such interest under the following circumstances: A middle-aged woman heard a report, later proved false, that a certain prospective bridegroom was an ex-convict. Although she was not a relative of the bride, or even a close friend, the woman took it upon herself to pass along this tid-

Such later for defamation, she was held liable for having been too quick to soil an innocent man's good name. The court saw no reason to wrap the mantle of privilege around something so close to plain and simple gossip.
