Million Dollar Hail Strikes Lamb County's Young Cotton Grain

Storm Sunday Dims Outlook

Littlefield and a part of Lamb County were hit Sunday afternoon by a hard driving wind, rain and hail storm that left about one million dollars in damages to the area's young cotton and grain crops. L. D. Aten, ASC county director, said that the damage will not run quite that high in the end because many of the farmers are going to replant in cotton or plant soy beans on their cotton acreage. He added that the grain was young and would come out of the damage.

Bill Kimbrough, Lamb County Agent, said that much of the halled on cotton has a chance of making, if plenty of warm weather and calm days follow. Kimbrough made a complete survey of the damages Tuesday afternoon. He estimated that between 14,000 and 15,000 acres were hard hit by the storm.

A spokesman for the SCS office, which also made a survey of the damages, said the hail seemed to follow a three mile wide path across the county, hitting heavily in spots and lifting in others. The spokesman said one farmer in the Springlake area lost 640 acres of cotton but added that he was going to replant in soy beans.

Buster Owens, Western Cotton Oil spokesman, said some of the farmers are going to leave their cotton alone in hopes that it will come out while others are already replanting.

He said a report received by his office reported that about 4000 acres of cotton had been completely halled out at Enochs. Crops were hard hit about a mile west of Whitharral and covered an area about three miles wide and six miles long.

The storm hit the county first between Springlake and Earth and continued south along Highway 385, hitting the Rocky Ford area, the Country Club and on into Littlefield.

The savage storm dumped more than two and a half inches of rain on parts of Littlefield, mainly on the west and south portions of the town. The rain gauge at Western Cotton Oil measured only 1.33 inches of rain.

Hail fell so heavily in most portions of Littlefield that it completely covered lawns and piled up in two feet drifts under the roofs of houses. A six-foot hall man was constructed by a group of youngsters in Crescent Park.

The 75 mile per hour winds tore down power lines, tress, a carport, a barn and several power poles west of town.

Electric power was off in most of Littlefield for about 30 minutes and in a

Joaquin Jackson, State Highway Patrolman, investigated the accident which occurred on Highway 84 northeast of Littlefield near the cemetery.

Jackson said Bales had been talking to Littlefield Police and heard over the police radio that a horse was seen running loose northeast of town. He said Bales got in his car and went out on the road to see if he could find the horse. Bales turned around after going some distance on the highway and didn't see the animal.

Just north of the cemetery Bales apparently didn't see the horse which was either walking or standing on the right side of the road and his car hit the animal in the left rear tearing off the left leg and flank of the animal.

Jackson said the horse was knocked 90 feet from the point of impact. On impact the horse was thrown up on the right front of the car and into the right front of the windshield.

The car continued 405 feet from the point of impact and came to rest against a tree at the north edge of the cemetery.

City Policemen T. and Cooper, who had also gone north on the road to look for the horse came upon the accident almost immediately.

Bales was taken to the Littlefield Hospital.

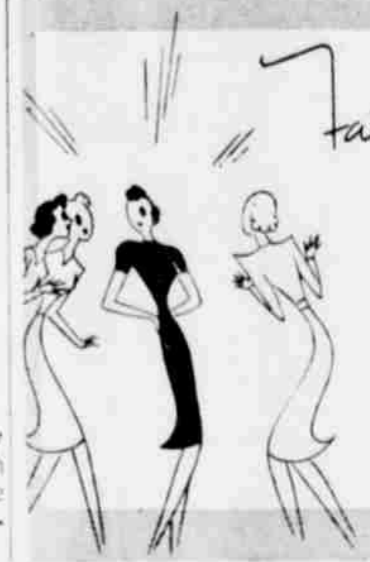

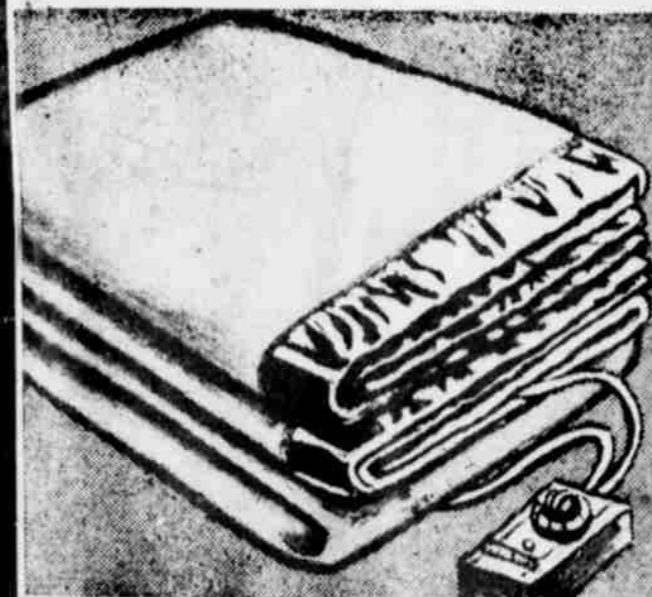

For months the two injured boys, Jimmy Nix, and Jimmy Love, lay near death in a Lubbock hospital, and for weeks they lay unconscious.

Jimmy Nix is at home, he can walk, plays pool, rides around with his father, and was able to start reading "get well" cards about five weeks ago. Jimmy tires easily, but he's happy to welcome his friends who come by quite often, and mightily thankful to be alive.

Jimmy Love is still in the Amherst hospital. He would have returned to his home last week until he had a flare up of pneumonia. The tube was removed last week. He can now recognize his parents and sometimes speaks to them... sometimes he speaks to his friends who visit him.

A few weeks ago he was taken for a ride in his wheel chair outside the hospital. He saw and recognized the family car and wanted to get in it and sit for awhile.

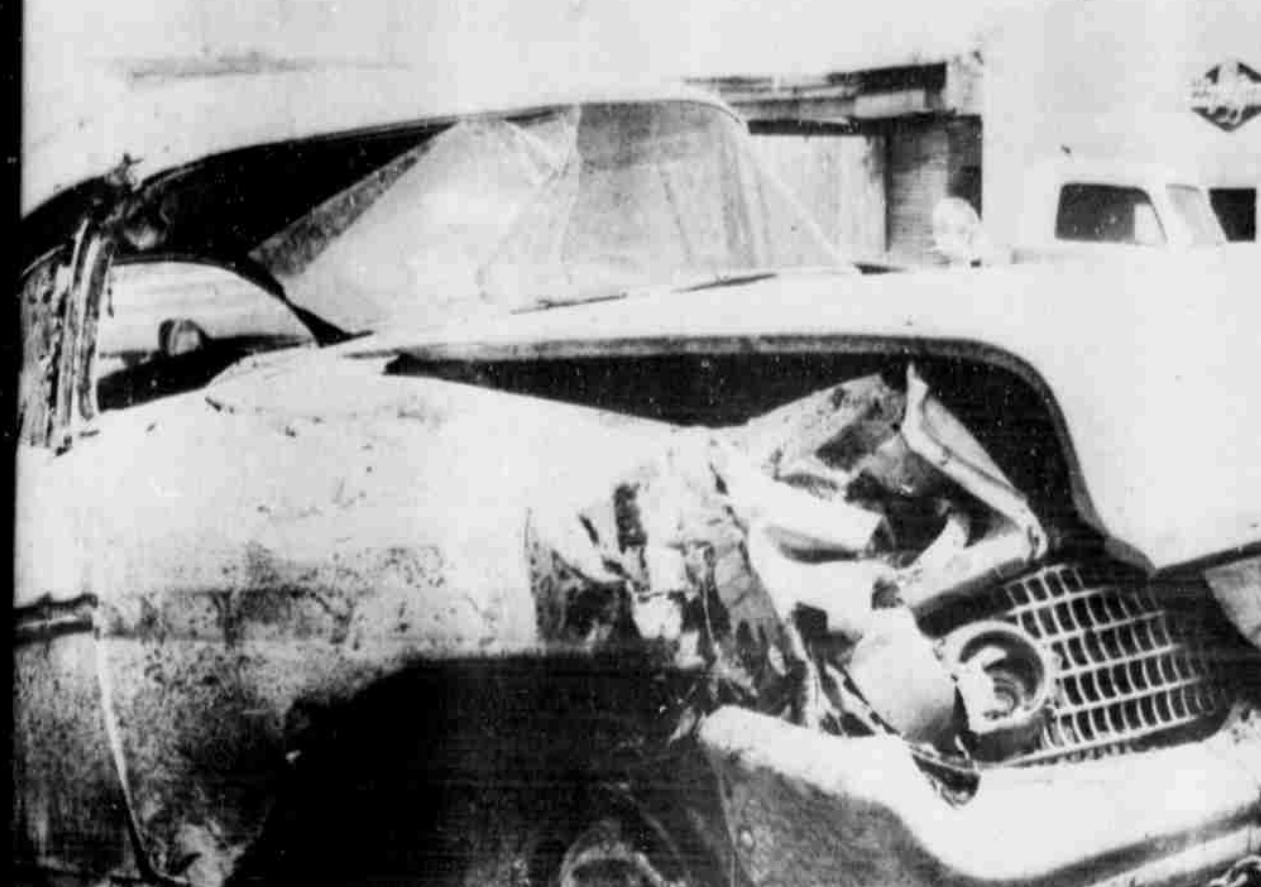

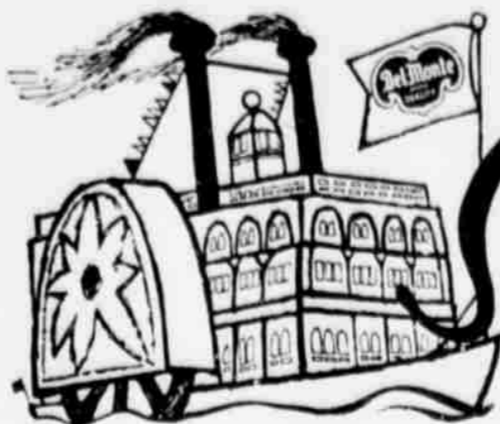

corn planted on level land produced a higher yield than the same amount of sloping land in a conservation study by James C. Water Engineer of the Plains Research Station. The water was applied to the benches which had a total application of 5.795 inches of water. The yield of 5,795 bushels of grain sorghum was a gross return of \$12.69, at \$9 per bushel. The net return of \$3.79 was 28 percent of the cost of water. The water was applied on May 5th and replanted on May 26th, in an irrigation comparison test at Halfway. These tests followed the same plan as that used on grain sorghum. Ten and nine-tenths inches of irrigation water was applied to the benches and number one slope. Seventeen and nine-tenths inches of irrigation water was applied to slope number two. The run-off was none on the bench, 2.7 in./A. on slope number one and 5 in./A. on slope number two. Twenty-five per cent of the water was wasted on slope number one and

dim view of having "another study group", recalling that the last one had come up with a payroll tax plan that never caught fire. Texas voters, they pointed out, selected their legislators to write the tax laws and will hold the legislators responsible for the outcome. Members of the committee made it clear that they don't intend to dictate to the Legislature. But they do hope to be able to indicate some possible paths of compromise among the various plans for which the legislators have shown favor.

Committee is to meet July 6 to write its report for the special session. DOWN THE DRAIN? Some Legislators are fretting over the loss in state revenue resulting from the Legislature's failure to pass a tax plan during the regular session. Here is the way they see it:

1. Bills passed by a simple majority vote take effect 90 days after the close of the session. If a tax bill had been passed in the regular session, it would have taken effect the last of August and money from it would be accruing September 1 when the new fiscal year begins.
2. If a bill is passed by a simple majority in the special session--say about August 10--it will not take effect until November 10.
3. A \$340,000,000 tax bill covering the 24-month period would raise money at the rate of about \$14,000,000 a month. But between September 1 and November 10, nothing would come in from the new bill. This waiting period of two months, would mean the loss of some \$35,000,000 in state revenue which would have been raised if the same bill had been passed earlier.

and store keepers to get ready overnight to charge all sorts of new taxes. NEW WORLDS TO CONQUER--With the election of John Tower as U.S. Senator, exultant leaders of the Texas Republican Party feel they have a foot solidly in the door. Beyond the door, that they hope to swing wide, is a two-party Texas with the GOP sharing political power in Texas on a roughly equal basis. New goals are being carefully considered. All but one (Travis) of Texas' big metropolitan counties went for Tower, as well as large sections of West Texas. In these areas, except where a very popular Democrat is entrenched, the Republicans can be expected to bid for places in Congress, the Legislature and even county jobs.

First test is due in Bexar County where Congressman Paul Kilday is due to resign to become judge of the Court of Military Appeals. Bexar County went for Tower last month. Under the present law, Kilday's successor will be determined in a one-shot high-man-wins special election, probably next fall. There is some talk of trying to get the Legislature, during its special session, to pass a law which would require a run-off in special congressional elections. This would reduce Republican chances.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN, Tex. -- Texas tax debate continues! Not as lively now as during the legislative session -- but many voices are being heard. It's a sort of "speak now or forever hold your peace" period. Some type of tax bill, undoubtedly the biggest in Texas history will have to be passed in July or August, and those with something to say are rushing to get in their licks. Legislators report that the small-scale "great debate" is proving very helpful in stirring up opinions from previously silent constituents. They're hoping to discover enough home district reaction to guide them to a swift, sure solution when they return for the special session July 10. Eight Central Texas lawmakers, in a reply to Gov. Price Daniel's report to the people, say that raising \$341,000,000 in new revenue will require a "broad coverage tax."

Although five of the eight voted with the governor during the session, several objected to a "hit and miss" tax approach. Some say that people in their districts object to selective taxes on grounds that "it's not fair to tax my product and not my neighbor's." IN THE WIND - A number of new approaches to tax plans already battered around during the regular session are being worked on by lawmakers during this interim. Among plans being considered are these:

1. By Rep. Charles N. Wilson of Trinity (sponsor of the 2 per cent sales tax passed by the House last session) -- a new sales tax that would be linked, Siamese - twin fashion, with a corporation income tax.
 2. By Rep. George T. Hinson of Mineola (a frequent sponsor of legislation favored by the governor) -- a 2 per cent tax on everything selling for \$5.00 or more, with the usual food and drug exemptions.
 3. By Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas - selective excise taxes of 2 per cent on a long list of items, but generally exempting the bed rock necessities of life.

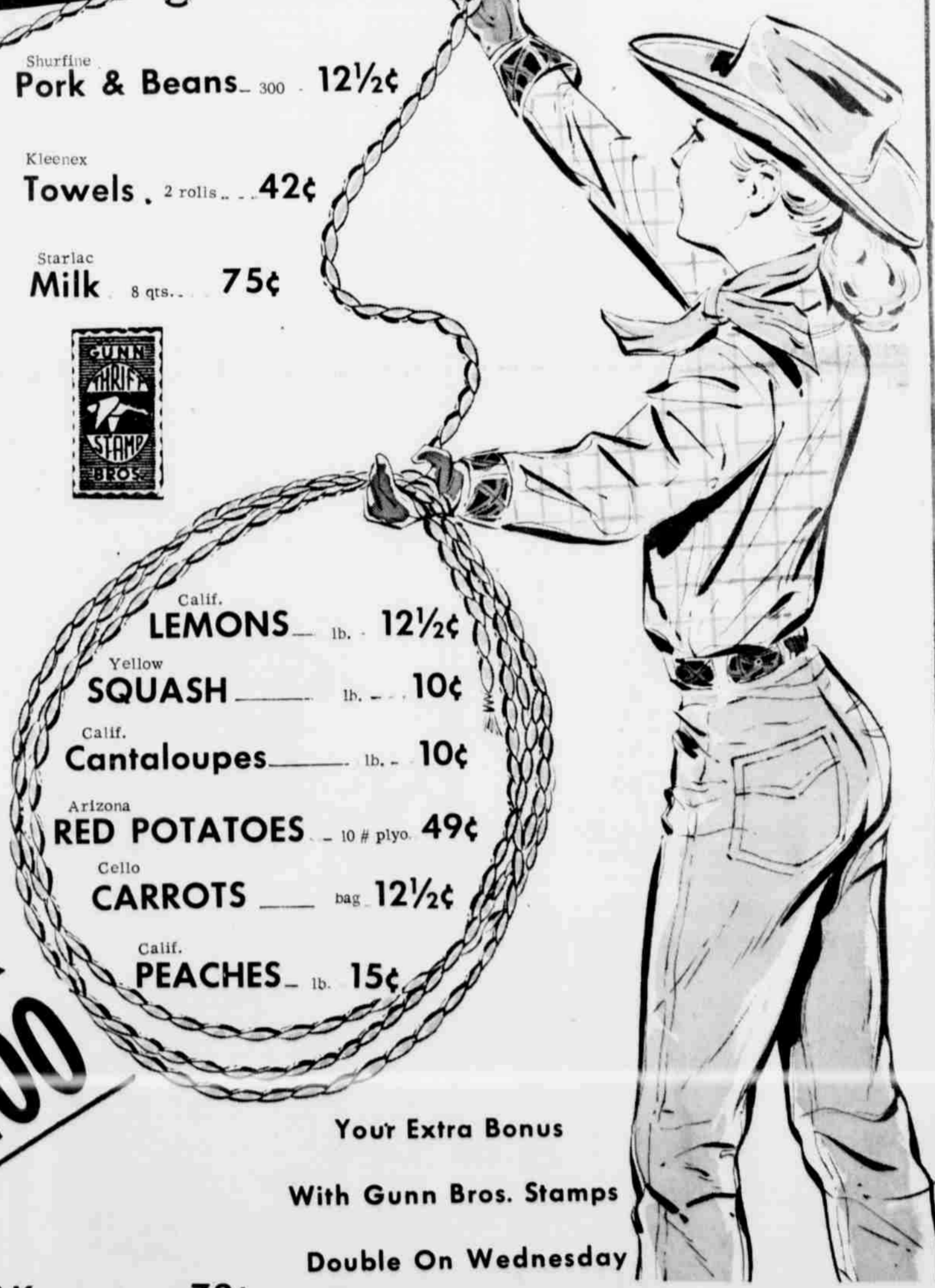
