

# Sudan Man Dies in Train Crash

Aubrey Fulcher, 56, was about 9:55 p.m. Monday his pickup collided with a train at Sudan near the Fe Depot.

Funeral services for Fulcher, a long-time Sudan resident, were held Wednesday at the First Baptist Church at Sudan.

Fulcher was driving south on Highway 101, going into Sudan, when he hit the rear portion of the train's engine. The train was knocked about 100 feet and the victim was thrown from the vehicle. Justice of the Peace J. N. Bowen of Littlefield pronounced Fulcher dead at the scene.

Deputy Homer McHenry, who lives near the crash, said the body was about halfway between the point of impact

Lamb County can accept with the action that set cotton acreage for 1964 at slightly less than that of 1963, at a time when the acreage for Texas was reduced a small bit.

It is evidence that the cotton economy of the South Plains is being recognized in mapping farm program. Lamb county has maintained its planting, rather than following the in-and-out pattern of other areas where cotton is a summer crop. This is a vital and one that must be stressed at every level of the farm, at every opportunity.

With it, the Plains can take a more and more enthusiastic in urging cotton use and in buying of cotton products. It can generate here an enthusiasm that can be extended a long ways. Remember that Eat Beef campaign of the cattle was a few years back. Are you eating more beef?

There may be an appropriate statute for Texas once again to come up for review, the providing capital offense for crimes in the state.

There is an organization in this devoted to abolishment of capital punishment. Approximately it is headed by Don R. Reide, editor of the Huntsville and eye-witness to many executions. Reide's group has been able to get off the books law permitting taking of life, and will not until popular opinion demands

In the light of current happenings, it can be said that if a man deserved execution in the past, Harvey Lee Oswald did, investigation proves out his guilt. But he is dead already, and outside the law by a man who himself may face death in the hands of the state.

The taking of Jack Ruby's life is not restore life to Lee Oswald, as killing did not bring back the warm, vital being of resident Jack Kennedy. Execution is a final, irrevocable act in which one party takes from another the supreme gift of God. As such it is wrong.

Two wrongs do not make a right, no matter how heinous the crime. Almost all of us were witnesses to an execution, because of the TV cameras, and it is a horrible thing. How much more horrible would it have been if Lee Oswald had been marched to his death down death row in Huntsville?

The difference is that you and I as citizens of Texas, would have had our hand on the trigger along with Jack Ruby; in this way it would have been true for all of us.

England long ago did away with capital punishment; and its incidence of murder has lessened each year. It is not a deterrent to crime; conversely, when the state participates in killing itself it spreads the atmosphere that makes murder less a crime.

Life imprisonment, without parole or parole, yes, the taking of life in the name of law is an earthly decision. Texas will do well to be rid of this archaic and immoral law.

# 'LET 'ER RIP' Cotton Flowing Through County Gins

The big story for the Lamb county area in 1964 is going on like a giant battle in cotton fields the county over and at the county's 34 gin plants, all today on a 24-hour schedule.

A slow-starting harvest has moved swiftly ahead the past five days to almost catch the bales-ginned count for the same period in 1962.

Last Friday, when a weekly Texas Employment bale count was made, the bale number was 27,161 for the county. This figure had more than doubled from the Friday before.

But Wednesday, with cotton flowing through county gins at perhaps 6,500 bales every 24 hours, the estimates were that 1962's figure was nearly matched for the same date. A number of gins reported counts well

ahead of 1963 for the same date. The ground-gaining reason is the weather, the beautiful high, dry, sunny phenomenal weather. It, literally, is putting several million extra dollars in 1963 crop money in the bank for Lamb farmers.

A historically dry and warm fall has converted a doleful July cotton crop into one of the best in county history.

The weather story for 1963 had its turbulent weeks last May and June, when damaging hail fanned regularly over the area, causing farmers to replant one or more times. Planting was still going on as June drew to a close, thousands of cotton acres put in more in desperation than in hope.

The only hope was for a long, dry mild fall. If the 1963 fall had been ordered up in

July, hardly anyone would have had the optimism to specify it as well as it has gone.

The fear of an early killing frost gave way to a clamor for one to come by mid-November when several light frosts finally turned bolls and foliage brown.

The fear since has been of wet weather, which would have slowed harvest and damaged yield and grade. There have been only light sprinkles, as an army of cotton strippers, manned early to late, have been turning fields from snow white to brown, bare stalks.

The prospect today is for some sections to be practically through harvest by Christmas week--others to be well towards the end, if the weather holds. South and west of Littlefield, the harvest is well

along, with good yields. Lumsden Gin, west of Littlefield, reported that bales ginned on December 3 were 2 1/2 times ahead of a year ago on the same date. The same situation exists at Whitharral and Bula.

"We're going around the clock at top speed," reports Ross Lumsden, gin owner-operator. "As soon as a trailer is empty, it is hooked up and rolling back to the fields."

J. D. Smith is reported with yields of around 1-3/4 bales an acre on dryland in the Beck community, and Thomas Harris, just west of Littlefield, is reported gathering a bale-to-the-acre on dryland.

Lumsden, who also raises cotton, is getting 1 1/2 bales on June 2-3 plantings, and 3/4 bale on fields planted on June

28-29. Spade, W. O. Hampton Gin reports a full yard of trailers and with bales ginned on December 1 matching last year's figure on December 4.

Dryland farmers in the Bula and Whitharral areas are having a year to mark in their record books. Both started harvest early in November and are in the last 25 to 30 percent of the crop, by ginners estimates, with gin yards stacked full.

At Farmers Co-op Gin in Whitharral, manager J. W. Borders, Jr., reports more than two weeks of peak operation with perhaps 70 percent of the crop in. The Whitharral community "will gin quite a few more bales than in 1964, with the highest yield in years, especially on dryland acres."

There are many reports of better than a bale cotton on dryland, and several of 1 1/2 bales per acre. On irrigated land, some yields are reaching two bales per acre.

Grades are doing well, in keeping with the good weather, but Whitharral--as everywhere--reports slow returns on classing cards, due to the heavy flow of cotton all over the South Plains right now.

At Bula, Glaunch gin Tuesday reported that bales ginned and on the yard had about reached last year's total, with perhaps 25 to 30 percent of the crop still to come in, "but that is coming in fast."

# Criminal Cases Set For Court

Criminal cases have been set for 154th District Court convening in Littlefield Monday at 1:30 p.m. with District Judge Pat Boone, Jr. presiding.

First case scheduled is that of R. G. Sparks, charged with statutory rape and incest. The case was transferred from Parmer County on a change of venue.

Second trial scheduled is an armed robbery case against three defendants in Littlefield last year. The three were indicted Nov. 20, 1962 for the armed robbery of Alonzo Baldares. The defendants are Joe Hernandez, Manuel Trevino and Jose Maria Trevino.

Two of the men--Hernandez and Joe Trevino--escaped from the Lamb County jail in June. They used hair dressing to "grease" themselves, enabling them to slip between bars and out a window in the jail's run-around area.

The pair gave themselves up less than a month later, surrendering to custom officials at Laredo. They were returned to the Lamb County jail to await trial.

Judge Boone said more recent indictments would be called for trial if time permits after these two cases.

Final negotiations are under way for the sale of Caprock Fertilizer in Littlefield to the Chemical Division of Lone Star Producing Company, a subsidiary of Lone Star Gas Company, it was announced Wednesday.

The announcement came from Roy E. Jury, Chemical Division vice president for Lone Star, and Arnold E. Neumann, manager of Caprock and one of its owners.

Neumann will remain manager of the Caprock operation, the announcement said.

Neumann will continue to direct the activities of Caprock after the sale is completed, Jury said.

The properties in the sale include Caprock Fertilizer Company, Caprock Equipment Company and Soil Food Builders, all in Littlefield, an Artesia, N.M., branch of the company and Luna County Fertilizer Company of Deming, N.M.

Mr. Jury said that the actual purchase of the properties is subject to satisfactory finalizing of the details. Negotiations for the sale have been underway for several months.

The Caprock operations will become a part of the Chemical Division's existing system of sales and service centers located at Pittsburg, Gainesville and Vernon, Texas, and Tonkawa, Oklahoma, Mr. Jury noted.

The parent company, Lone Star Gas, has been a major producer and distributor of natural gas throughout central and eastern Texas for over 50 years.

Its Chemical Division is relatively new. It has under construction at Kerens, in Navarro County, a chemical fertilizer Trinity River Plant complex that will come to some \$25-million. This complex will include a nitrogen plant and an ammonium phosphate plant.

The Caprock system is the Division's major entry into West Texas.

Caprock operates over West Texas, western Oklahoma and eastern New Mexico. The company produces or distributes a

complete line of agricultural fertilizers.

Neumann declined to speculate on the possible expansion of Caprock operations under its new ownership.

The Caprock company opened operations in Littlefield in March, 1958, after it was built by Longhorn Construction Company of Sulphur Springs, a company of W. S. and C. H. Tyler and Neumann. The company has built a number of fertilizer

plants over the south and southwest.

Neumann took over Caprock's operations, which have been steadily enlarged to make the company a major southwest fertilizer producer and distributor.

The Caprock Equipment Company, operating from Littlefield, supplies equipment for the application of fertilizers. The Soil Food Builders is an organic division of the operations.

Neumann is a native of Oklahoma who came into the fertilizer business in 1946 and who operated plants in Oklahoma and at Sulphur Springs before joining Longhorn Construction Company in 1955.

Along with his busy schedule of developing the company's operations, Neumann has been active in a number of civic projects and is a vice president of the Littlefield chamber of commerce.

He voiced pleasure at remaining in Littlefield. "My family and I are at home and very happy in the community, and look forward to continued residence and participation in a fine and developing city," he said.

The change will not affect personnel of the Caprock company, he emphasized.

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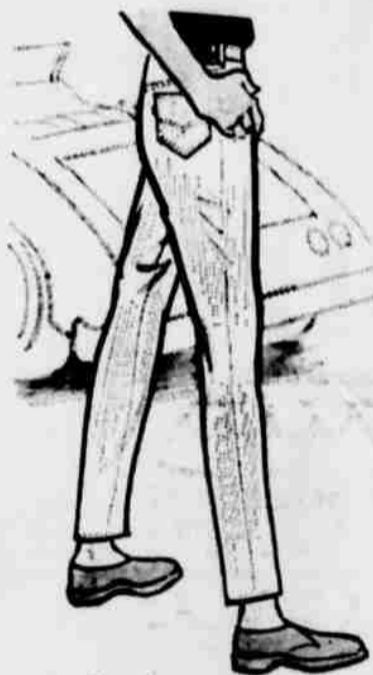

averaged 1 1/2 bales per acre on dryland with Rilecot 90 seed. Raymond Austin is turning out 1 1/2-bales cotton on dryland, a yield being matched or almost matched by a number of growers around the community.

Possibly the best report around comes from Jimmy Cannon at Bula who skip rowed his dryland crop and has gathered two bales to the acre.

"It's a good year and we're ahead everywhere," reports Claunch Gin manager Jack Speck.

Elsewhere over the county, the peak is expected to be reached in "another week or so and it will stay at peak until we're through," one gin-ner estimated.

Farmers are having trouble finding enough trailers to match the accelerating harvest schedule. A Littlefield tire dealer reports an extended-hours schedule to handle calls for trailer tires.

Another bright spot in the 1963 harvest is the cotton seed price that Wednesday was at \$51 a ton, a price good enough that return from the seed will more than pay for ginning. The seed price has fluctuated from \$49 a ton to \$56 a ton over the season.

Up to now, the vicissitudes of weather have restored the damage they did last spring. Three weeks more of fair weather will be the finest Christmas present Lamb county can receive. Its "white Christmas" will be much more than a holiday spectacle.

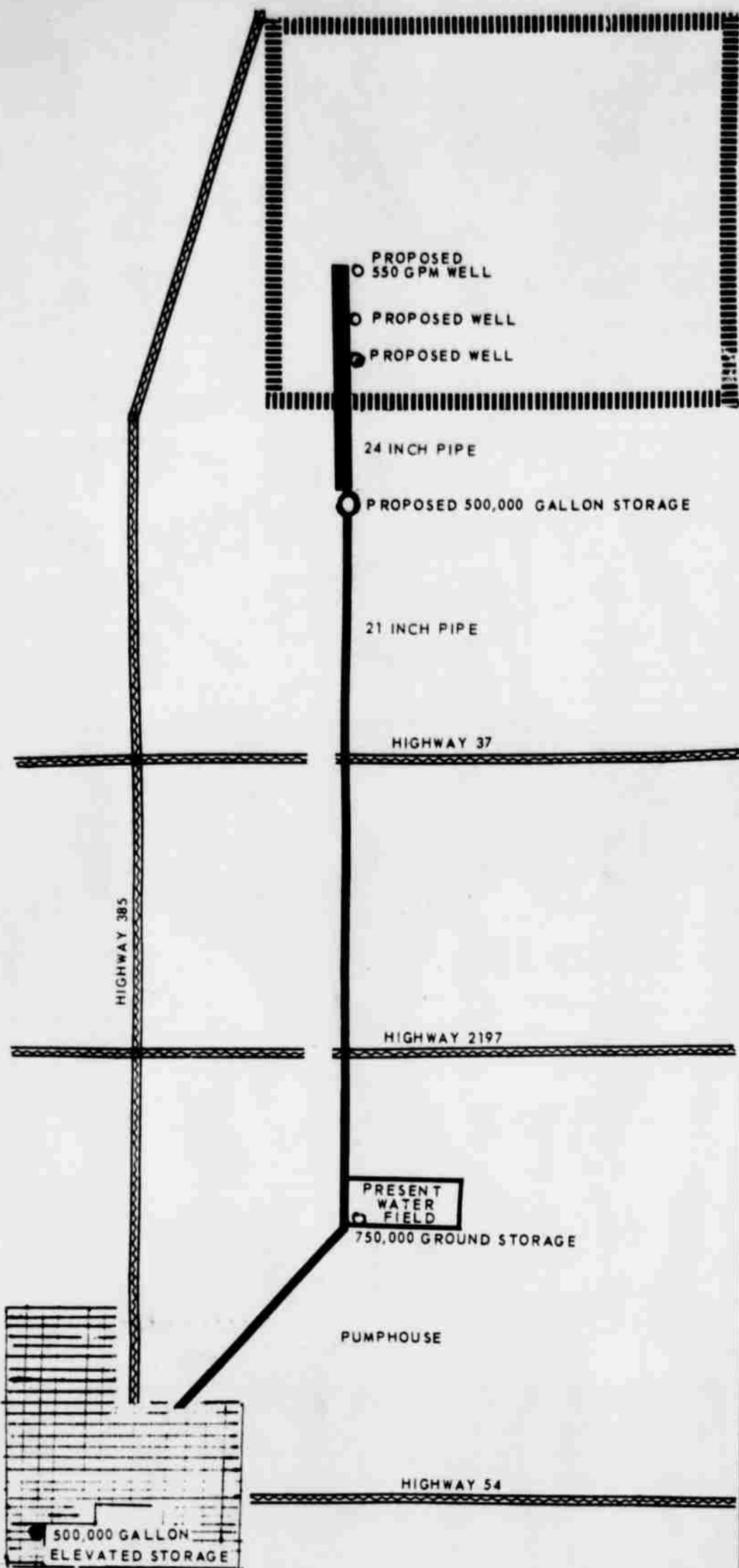

HERE IS SANDHILLS WATER PLAN -- Bids are to be opened Dec. 12 for two major phases of the newly-approved Littlefield water system -- a 24 and 21-inch pipeline to the sandhills water field and enlargements in the in-city distribution system. The big item, as shown on the map, is some 72,000 feet of pipeline from the new water field directly to the

city limits. Other big items include a 500,000-gallon elevated storage tank in the city, larger water mains and lateral lines over the city. Citizens voted a total of \$938,000 for water-works improvement. The in-city program has been estimated at \$220,000 and the field development and pipeline at \$575,000. Not all of this latter, however, will be in the Dec. 12 bid.

### Vote Set On Cotton Quotas

Lamb County cotton farmers will cast ballots next Tuesday on marketing quotas for the 1964 crop. A number of polling places have been designated and were published in Sunday's County Wide News. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., and all persons engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963 are eligible to vote.

A sample ballot is shown at right. At least two-thirds of the growers voting must approve the quotas if they are to continue in effect.

The vote is not on allotments. No matter how the vote turns out, cotton allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support. Support will be available only to growers who do not exceed the allotments for their farms.

If quotas are approved; marketing quotas and acreage allotments will be in effect; excess cotton on a farm where the farm allotment is exceeded will be subject to a quota penalty; price support at a level within the range of 65 to 90 percent of parity will be available to growers who do not exceed their farm allotments.

If quotas are not approved; no marketing quotas and no marketing quota penalties will apply to the 1964 upland (short staple) cotton crop; farm acreage allotments will continue if effect; price support at 50 percent of parity will be available to growers who do not exceed their farm allotments.

If a cotton producer has any questions about his eligibility to vote or if he wishes additional information about the cotton program, he should see his ASC county committee.

**LOOK OVER YIELD**-- Frank Moore, Hale County farmer, and Delbert Langford, associate agronomist at the High Plains Research Foundation, look over results of the "Langford Farming System". The system is said to be certain in increase production and profits.

"If the mills go to synthetic, it will be hard to get them back to using cotton," Langford said. "We have to attack the problem before it gets out of hand. Nothing will be available to replace the income provided by cotton in this area."

Although the cotton research isn't completed, the scientists feel their 6-year findings may keep the High Plains cotton farmers in business.

## Anton Laborer Dies In Mishap Near Wolfforth

A 35-year-old Del Rio man who was working in the Anton area was killed Saturday night when he was thrown from his car and dragged beneath it following a car-truck collision at the intersection of US-62 and FM-1073 at Wolfforth.

The victim was Aldegundo A. Martinez, 35. A passenger in Martinez's car, Jose Maria Morin, 33, also of Del Rio and working in Anton, suffered lacerations of the chin and heel when he was thrown from the careening car.

Morin was taken to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock for treatment. Uninjured in the accident were Alfred Gomez and Jesus Garcia, also both of Del Rio and working in Anton.

The truck, owned by State Line Trucks of Seminole, was being driven by Lenard Dean Williams of Denver City. A Texas Highway Patrolman said the truck was heading east on US-62. Witnesses told him the Martinez car was going north of FM-1073 and stopped at a stop sign.

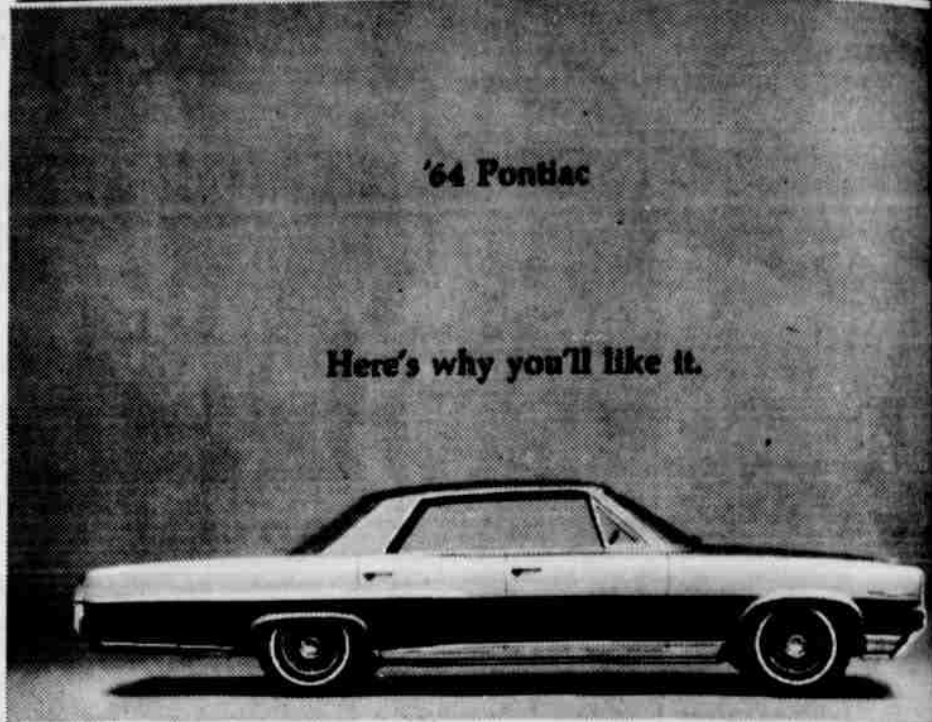

Surveys show that in the United States we have left only 450 million acres of good land, and 100 million acres of the productive soil is still subject to erosion.

There was, at one time, nine inches of top soil that would produce or grow food, fat and fiber. The top soil through erosion has been reduced to only six inches and, therefore, what's left must be saved at all costs.

Everyone should become interested and be a member of the great soil saving army, not only farmer but city dwellers, too. They are also affected by ero-

sion. Silt chokes streams and fills reservoirs; it pollutes water supplies and depletes storage and it destroys wildlife and recreational values.

## Spade School Holiday is Announced

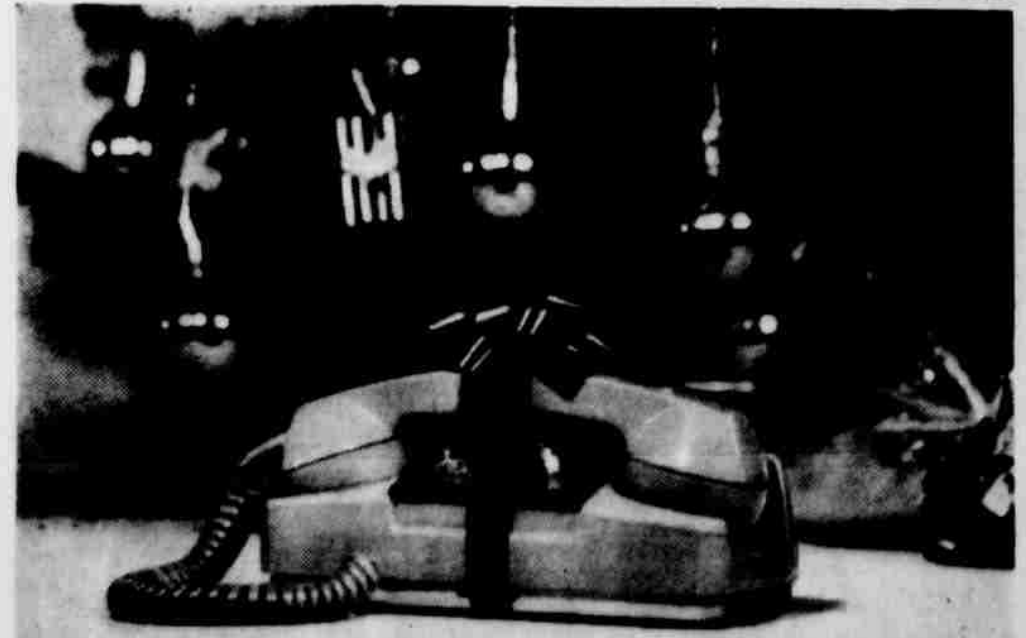
The Christmas holidays for the Spade School have been announced. School will dismiss Friday afternoon, Dec. 20 and will resume classes Monday, Jan. 6.
