A heartfelt plea for the land, the soil, water and wildlife is the dominant note in Bedichek's new book, "Karankaway Country."

for which it would be hard to find a parallel anywhere else in the world, concentrated in so little room."

Opposes Oil Exploitation
Bedichek is obviously not in sympathy with all that is happening to his beloved Karankaway country, the land and waters where the fierce and bloodthirsty coastal tribes once lived mainly on fish and oysters (and sometimes human flesh), and departed "via bayonets and bullets." He says: "Interests engaged in the exploitation of these natural riches sometimes get in each other's way. Already under the impact of river silt (much of it due to river dredging), industrial wastes, oil slicks, and whatnot — under these smotherings, greasing and poisons — oyster production has dwindled

to one fifth of what it was a few years ago."

"Oil is an extractive industry; when it's done, it's done, leaving wreckage and ruin and poisonous rubbish behind for later generations to clean up. On the other hand, the fish-and-oyster industry, like agriculture properly practiced, is self-renewing, a profitable investment going on and on forever, yielding steady and dependable returns, living and letting live."

Tells Story of Crane
Bedichek then tells of the fight for survival of the whooping crane, making its last stand on earth in an area set aside by man as a game refuge but which to the whooper, "a wild, wary bird, tottering on the edge of extinction" must seem Pandemonium. Bedichek details the intimate

lives of Pete, Jo or Josephine, Old Crip and Petunia in their mating, and its somewhat uncertain results, then mourns the processes that threaten the whooper.

"When the divine mold is broken by the interference of man, Nature 'so careful of the type, unsuited to be thwarted; an impudent hand inserts a period before the sentence is complete, and the veritable Word of God is scorned and silenced. No court will pardon a criminal on the plea of his attorney that the person he murdered would eventually have died anyway; and certainly nature doesn't pardon man his wantonness because in the course of time a given species either dies or merges by imperceptible degrees into another form as the deft hand of the Maker may alter the mold it

self—all in good time."

Explains Animal Habits
And so it is with soil and water, as the following chapter titles suggest: "Dust," "Goats in Excess," "Goats in Moderation," "Silt," "Little Waters," "Diseased Rivers." And not to make the preaching a boresome bone-bruising session on a hard bench, this wily naturalist entertains and enlightens with stories of coon habits, bay-shore rabbits, frustrated dogs, swifts and scissortails.

Bedichek, with the objective eye of a naturalist, sees all of Texas as a whole in need of a co-ordinated soil and water saving program which would — not just incidentally — save the wildlife. The big river dam systems he views as a stopgap, and urges "a unified soil-water saving and flood-control

plan on a comprehensive scale within one geographic unit."

Purely Texas Problem
"No federal authority to impose unified development need be created since the major river systems are already under one central authority," he says, after labelling the entire problem in Texas as intrastate.

"And unless the state assumes and discharges this obligation, natural unity will be split and the Legislature will become an arena for a battle of those blocs now foreshadowed by voluntary organizations."

The only way to have a healthy river (and by inference, a healthy, productive soil) "is to find out what it was like before it was corrupted by man and his machines, and base treatment on re-

storing, rather than further corruption of it," Bedichek advises Texans. This plan would carry water and soil conservation to the spot where, a drop of rain first reaches the earth.

This naturalist's conclusions are based on 20 years of observations, not only the Karankaway country, but far inland to the "little waters." Bedichek has been known to most Texans for many years first of all as a school man and one of the prime movers in the great Interscholastic League. In his second cycle of life work, he is emerging as a prophet with a sense of humor, as well as a delightful nature writer.

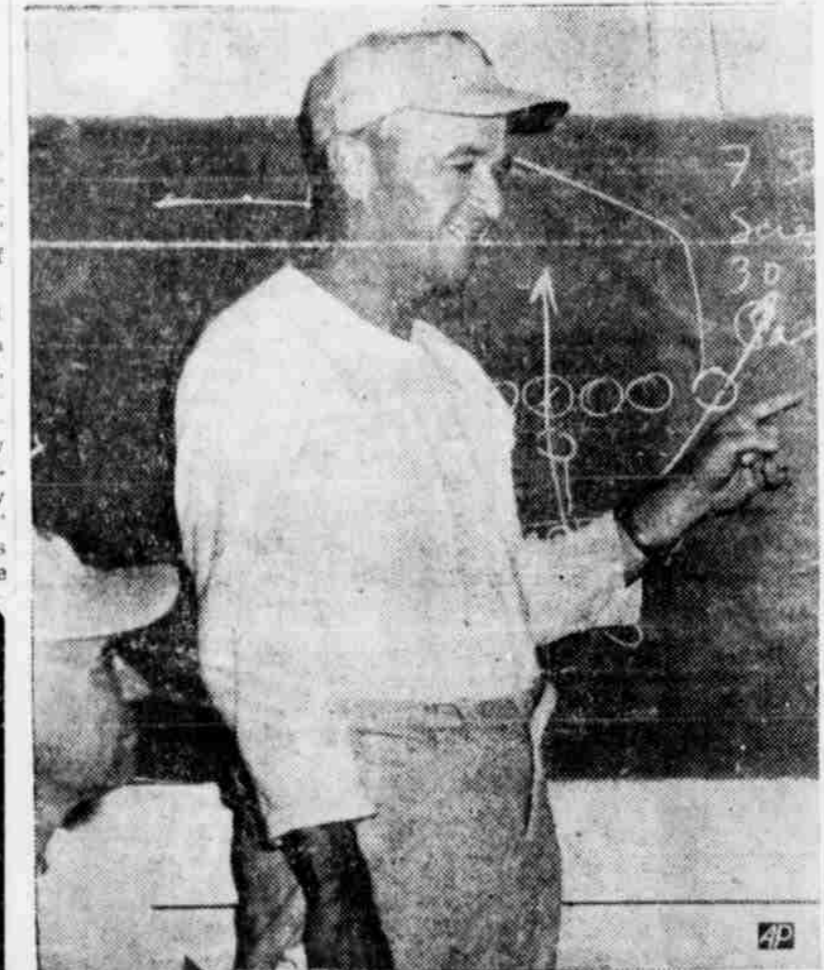

Freedom or Regeneration

The grave danger to the American democracy from within in these "years of high and perilous stakes" was ably defined by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower recently in his address at Texas A. & M. College.

The danger is all the greater because it is insidious, and free people are assailed by uncertainty, suspicion, prejudice and fear. As in Germany during its years of extreme inflation, there exists a fertile soil for the techniques of subversiveness that generate falsehood, fear, misunderstanding and defeatist propaganda. On these waves of history, there often have ridden dictatorships in the lust for power.

General Eisenhower aptly stated that "the core of all our problems—the contest that encompasses all lesser disputes and conflicts among men—is that of freedom against regimentation." He recognized that voluntary association involves some abdication of individual freedom in the public interest "to the will of the majority or the decisions of the leader." Yet the sum total of these concessions adds up to the partial mastery by the central governing authority.

Every group effort, the soldier-educator reminded, is subject to abuse by those who lust for power over their fellow men, and each abuse is a step closer to dictatorship. No matter how large the majority in favor of dictatorship, it still is tyranny, degrading to human dignity. Hitler, it may be recalled, rode a popular wave to power in Germany.

Today these perils are cloaked by popular confusion, ignorance and the cares of daily life that can blind people to a creeping danger. They can profit from the reminder that "we tend to drift apart into our separate recesses of suspicion and prejudice when victory in the struggle depends upon understanding and unity." America can close ranks against a foreign foe; it must have the same solidarity at home.

General Eisenhower's penetrating analysis of the threatened decay of freedom through neglect pointed to our unawareness of crisis. Symptoms are our failure to exercise the freedom of the ballot, and the freedom of assembly to discuss public questions. It was a pertinent question asked at College Sta-

tion: How many exercise the right to scrutinize and debate proposed legislation?

But despotism moves in when free men lose faith in themselves and surrender, bit by bit, their responsibilities to leaders of pressure groups. It is difficult in a complex, industrial civilization for free men to know clearly their responsibilities.

On this score the Columbia president pointed to the educational system as a means for fitting the people to the times, its freedoms and its opportunities. If the schools fail and degenerate into "mere propaganda mills," the cause can be lost. Schools and colleges, free of partisanship, can fulfill a role that politics has not filled.

These institutions of free learning can sponsor open forums, along the lines of the American Assembly which is being formed at Columbia University. These forums of free discussion and debate can utilize the best talents of education, industry, labor, agriculture, the professions, religion and government.

Education thereby would afford the people the liberation of the truth, based upon sound knowledge which stems from free inquiry and discussion. This mission of free education is vital when "the future of democracy is clouded as never before."

Emphasis was given to a fundamental truth at A. & M. in the statement that the duty of the free citizen can not be fully and heartily discharged unless it is clearly and adequately understood. There is, to be sure, the threat from abroad which General Eisenhower cited. An essential of our security from armed strength should be universal military training, which, the general unequivocally approves.

But no armed force can prevail without an enlightened, vigilant and responsible people at home to safeguard their country from insidious perils from within. That portion of General Eisenhower's address which stressed the domestic problems of democracy commands particularly the full, sober consideration of the people. The soldier-statesman is confident that the people will be enlightened and awakened, and "will emerge all freedoms intact, into an age of peace among nations."

Carl Schulte, are taking part in a nation-wide effort for 100 per cent attendance in all congregations affiliated with the American Lutheran Church on Sunday, November 19.

Invitations are being mailed to all members of both churches, asking them to make a special effort to be present in church with the whole family on that Sunday. Such an effort was attempted last year resulting in having 85 per cent of the membership of the whole church being present in church on that day.

"Loyalty Sunday," as this particular day is called, was begun last year in the American Lutheran Church to stimulate interest and loyalty to their church and to their Lord. As stated, the result was an attendance of over 85 per cent of all members of all churches, or over 495,000 people. It is hoped that the number of worshippers who will demonstrate their loyalty this year will be greater than that of last year, coming nearer to the 100 per cent goal. This is thought to be the only effort of its kind undertaken by a major denomination.

Reports from the 2010 congregations of the American Lutheran Church are gathered in each area, and are sent by wire or telephone to the church headquarters at Columbus, Ohio. From there, reports on total attendances will be sent to newspapers all over the country through the wire services. The congregations are located in 34 states, the District of Columbia, and in Canada.

State Baptists Elect Littlefield Pastor

The Rev. Lee Hemphill, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Littlefield, was named second vice-president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas in the annual meeting which ended Friday in Fort Worth.

A Fort Worth layman, William Fleming, was re-elected president and Dr. Ellis L. Carnett, also of Fort Worth, was elected first vice-president.

Rev. D. B. South, San Antonio, and Rev. Roy Johnson, Canyon, were renamed recording secretaries and J. Earl Mead, Dallas, corporation secretary.

Resolutions passed included one expressing appreciation for "the growing attitude against the liquor traffic."

The Committee on Christian Education recommended that the executive board of the convention examine the feasibility of naming an assistant executive secretary to give his time to study educational problems in Texas.

The recommendation was prompted, the report said, because of the growing competition from state tax supported schools.

It was announced that 3,755 messengers (delegates) attended, making the convention the largest ever held.

George J. Mason made his final report as executive secretary of the Baptist foundation. Mason is retiring, but will continue as "good will ambassador" for the foundation which administers endowment funds. He is to be succeeded next July 1 by A. B. Culbertson, Fort Worth attorney.

The Littlefield minister honored by the Texas Baptist general convention has been pastor of the First Baptist Church here since 1943, coming to this city from Dayton, Texas.

He assumed the pastorate of the First Baptist Church in Dayton following his graduation from the Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth in 1936.

Mr. Hemphill is married and the father of two children, Rosa Lee, 14 and Hilton, 8.

The election of the Littlefield pastor to the important church post was attributed by friends to his activity in general convention work and to the progress of the Littlefield church under his guidance.

Since Mr. Hemphill assumed the pastorate here the membership in the church has more than doubled and now embraces more than 1100 active resident members.

The election of a man from a city the size of Littlefield to the vice-presidency of the state Baptist organization constitutes an unusual honor and recognition not only for Mr. Hemphill but also for his congregation and for the city.

The Littlefield minister previously had served on several state church committees.

As third ranking officer of the convention Mr. Hemphill will work with the president and other officers in forming plans and directing policies of the church organization.

The 1951 annual meeting of the general convention will be in Houston next fall, the Littlefield minister said on his return home.
