The house-to-house Cancer campaign conducted by more than 150 volunteer workers Tuesday evening exceeded the goal as \$1,350 dollars was collected within the two hour period of the drive.

Mrs. H.A. Mitchell chairman of the house-to-house portion of the drive stated, "We are extremely pleased with the results of the residential portion of the Cancer drive, we had set a goal of \$1,000 and were pleasantly surprised when we totaled up the results of the drive."

Women's clubs, civic clubs and many individuals participated in the drive which resulted in the entire residential area being canvassed.

The \$1,350 collected in the house-to-house campaign brought the total to almost \$3,000 collected in Littlefield during the Cancer drive as the business man portion of the drive conducted last week with Mrs. T.L. Dunlap, reported collections of \$1,657.

Mrs. J.R. Fain, county chairman for the drive said that almost \$4,000 had been collected of the county's goal of \$7,000. "We have had reports from only two other communities in the county and they have totaled \$963 and there are five other towns which are still in the process of conducting their drives."

Mail Schedule Outlined For Patrons

The U.S. Postal Service, the only catch now is you must get your letters into the post office by a certain time if you want your letter to go through, ZIP code and all, in good time. According to Littlefield Postmaster TA Henson, there is only one West bound dispatch daily and two daily dispatches of mail going East.

All West bound mail is sent out of the local post office in time to meet the 8:39 a.m. West bound train, and is sacked up in the post office at 8:15 a.m.

On all mail going East it is necessary for it to be in the Post Office prior to 5:15 p.m., or 6:15 p.m. depending on the destination, Mail bound for Central and South Texas is tied out at 5:15 p.m. each day and is placed on the 6 p.m. East bound train for Brownwood and points south. All other East bound material is sacked up, beginning at 6:15, and is picked up by a Star Route carrier that comes through Littlefield, going East, about 11 p.m.

In the case of East bound material, all mail posted after 6:15 p.m. is held until the following afternoon, West bound mail, if posted after 8 a.m., is held until the following morning.

Mrs. Dave Tullis, teaching in the Title I program also submitted her resignation. All the teachers whose resignations were accepted had been required by the board prior to the acceptance of their resignation. The resignation submitted by Edwin Hall elementary counselor or had been accepted by the board at their March meeting.

The hiring of teachers for the coming year was one of many items acted on by the board at a four hour meeting which included the seating of new board members and the election of Pat Downs as president of the board for the coming year.

County Soil And Water District Receives Award

The Lamb County Soil and Conservation District was selected as the Outstanding District of Region I at the 21st annual Fort Worth Press Awards Program.

Area I comprises 51 counties in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains area.

The Lamb District will receive their award of \$300 based on their selection at the Area I awards banquet which will be held in Hereford, May 17.

The award was based on the overall program and activities of the District including information, program, long range program, plan of work, community service, conservation practice application and conservation leadership.

The Lamb County District supervisors are Merrill P. Brigrance, Olton, chairman; Herbert Dolle, Littlefield, vice chairman; Wesley H. Mudgett, Sudan, Secretary and Weldon Barton, Earth and Edward Mitchell, Spade members.

The soil and water conservation district supervisors direct the conservation activities of the various agencies and groups into a coordinated effort.

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Boll Weevil Control Program A Success

All entomologists on the Technical Advisory Committee of the massive diapause, boll weevil control program coordinated since 1964 by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., continue to agree that the program has been highly successful. Westward migration of the pest has been stopped. And the two years of spraying have reduced overwintering weevils to an average of about five per acre, and the 1966 spray operation is expected to cut the overwintering population to less than an average of one weevil per acre.

This information is not new to those close to the control program, but it was reiterated in Lubbock April 14 when the technical advisory group, made up mostly of entomologists, met with the program's area-wide and steering committees, composed of cotton producers on the Plains. And a bona fide success story is always good to hear, even for the second time.

The group also discussed the 1966 spraying operation, but postponed making firm decisions pending answers to several questions. First, they will need to know the distribution of those few remaining weevils over the control zone. This will determine the acreage it will be necessary to spray.

Second, it is still not known how much of the cotton in the control zone will be planted to the various skip-row patterns. For instance, with aerial application being the only practical spray method, cotton planted two-in, four-out will require three times as much ground to

The accident caused approximately \$50 damage to each of the cars involved in the accident.

placing Buster Owens and then Price was elected vice-president.

In other action the board approved the summer maintenance plans as outlined by Superintendent Paul Manning. These include the painting and reconditioning of a portion of the seats at the stadium and painting of portions of the outside of the primary school building and work on the interior of the buildings.

Ex-Communist To Speak At Local Church

Rev. J.B. Cagle, pastor of the Littlefield Missionary Baptist Church, has announced that Major Pedro Diaz Lanz, an ex-communist, will speak at the church Sunday at 7:30 p.m.

Major Lanz resigned as Commander-in-Chief of the Cuban Air Force under Fidel Castro. He denounced Castro as a communist via newspaper, radio and TV, and was immediately warned by friends that his life and the lives of his family were in danger. Shortly before July 4, 1959, he and his wife slipped out of Cuba in a sail boat and arrived in Miami, Fla. on Independence Day. The Red radio in Cuba denounced him as a traitor and launched an incredible campaign to discredit him.

The CIA asked Major Lanz not to inform the American people of the facts about communism in Cuba under Castro. He appeared before the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee later and denounced Castro as a communist.

In October of the same year, Major Lanz flew over the city of Havana, dropping leaflets warning the Cuban people of the

terrible days ahead if they did not wake up and stop Castro before it was too late. It was during this raid that Castro's gunners killed and wounded several people in the street of Havana, trying to shoot down the B-52s of Major Lanz.

Major Lanz warned the U.S. Government of the possibility of missile bases in Cuba and later warned that underground missile bases were not removed. Every warning he gave to the U.S. Government concerning missiles, Russian troops and Castro has been denied, then admitted.

Further warnings relayed to him by patriots inside Cuba have been his mission.

Since his conversion to Christ, while in this country, Major Lanz has intensified his effort to "Warning and Winning" for the cause of God and Country. He is a much sought after speaker, and his message has been a real asset to the cause of liberty.

A cordial invitation has been extended to the public to hear Major Lanz at the Missionary Baptist Church Sunday night.
