# Poll Tax Heads County Ballot

## Clayton Opposes Poll Tax Repeal

It's vote time for Lamb County citizens Saturday, along with the rest of Texas, on four state constitutional issues, the central one being whether or not they want to continue a poll tax as a requisite for voting.

Voting will be in all 17 boxes of the county, the same as in any general election. Election time is from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday, November 9.

The four issues deal with the poll tax, with increasing Texas money available for aid to state needy, a local bill for Jefferson county and the fourth proposition, to increase by \$150-

million the amount of money in the veterans land loan fund.

Only a small portion of the more than 4,500 eligible voters are expected to go to the polls Saturday. Records show 4,150 persons paid their poll tax to be eligible for 1963 elections and there are 500 or more over-60 residents who are not required to pay the tax.

Only 334 persons have paid their poll tax for the coming year, indicating a wait-and-see attitude on the upcoming Constitutional Amendment election which includes the poll tax issue.

Only the poll tax issue has stirred much interest over Texas, and in Lamb County.

It is proposition number one on the ballot, and it provides to amend the Texas constitution "so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting . . ." It also would authorize the legislature to provide for registration of all voters, in lieu of the poll tax system for voters.

Gov. John Connally has declared in favor of the poll tax on the grounds that federal legislation is going to abolish it in election of federal officials--

the President, U.S. senators and congressmen.

Connally says "chaos" will result different laws governing state and federal elections.

State Representative Bill Clayton, Springlake, has taken a stand against repeal of the voting requirement, and voted in the legislature against submitting it as an amendment.

Clayton argues that the registration law that would replace the poll tax requisite is not strict enough to guarantee any abuses in elections. Lamb County Republicans took a firm stand against repeal

of the voting requirement in a county meeting two weeks back.

State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake issued a statement to the Lamb County Leader this week concerning his reasons for urging a vote against the repeal of the poll tax.

The poll tax issue is included in one of the proposed Constitutional Amendments in Saturday's election. Rep. Clayton was 1 of 27 members of the Texas House who voted against submitting the amendment to voters.

"Payment of the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting prevents ignorant, corrupt and disinterested citizens from voting," claims Clayton, "But the low fee does not prevent any citizen who really wants to exercise his rights from taking a stand at the ballot box."

Clayton says that the question of having to pay a vote carries no weight. "If the poll tax is repealed, we simply substitute .25 cents for the \$1.75," points out the Lamb County representative.

He added that it is possible the registration fee could be declared unconstitutional if an amendment to the U.S. Constitution is ratified, but the 58th Legislature passed an anticipatory voter-registration law which still provides for registration of those voting for Federal offices.

Clayton points out that abolition of the poll tax could result in depriving the public schools of Texas of between 1.5 to 2 million dollars annually. One dollar of the tax now goes to public schools, 50 cents to the state and 25 cents to the county. "It took a long time and hard struggle to get a statewide system of voter registration in Texas and it was not achieved until it was written into the Constitution in mandatory form."

"The poll tax receipt is a badge, both to the responsible citizen and the qualified elector," adds Clayton. He claims repeal of the tax would result in the registration of hundreds of thousands of potential voters who "can be controlled."

Clayton lists seven things he predicts will happen to the state government in the next 10 years if the poll tax is repealed: (1) Repeal of the Texas right-to-work law; (2) personal or corporate state income tax, maybe both; (3) a stronger civil rights measure than is pushed by the Federal government; (4) liquor for sale by the drink; (5) pari-mutuel gambling; (6) enactment of a state wage and hour law; (7) repeal of the 1963 registration act.

"If these things happen, we will see a further decay of the moral standards in Texas. It will discourage industry from coming to Texas and it will leave avenues open to corrupt state government," states Clayton.

### 34 Absentee Votes Cast

A check at the Lamb County Clerk's office Wednesday showed that a total of 34 absentee votes had been cast in the Constitutional Amendment election coming up Saturday.

Absentee voting closed Tuesday. The number of votes cast absentee could be considered a good total for this type election. Not too much interest has been generated over the proposed amendments.

Lamb County's 34 compares favorably with a total of 62 cast in larger Lubbock County.

### C-C Elects 4 Directors

Joe Montgomery, Cephas Glover and Ken Rotan have been elected as new directors in a recent poll of Littlefield Chamber of Commerce members, while Kenneth Reast was reelected to the board.

Gene Garrison, C of C manager, announced the results of the mail-ballot election Tuesday afternoon.

The new directors officially take office Feb. 1, as will the new officers who are to be named this week. Directors were scheduled to meet Wednesday afternoon to select officers for the new year.

Don Bell, Jack Wicker and Troy Armes were the directors whose terms expired along with that of Reast. Their terms of office conclude Jan. 31, the end of the Chamber year. Armes is currently serving as president of the Chamber, and Jerry Sanders is president-elect.

## Anton, Whitharral Salute Cotton

### Anton Crash Kills Woman

A shattering two-car collision at Anton about 11:45 a.m. Wednesday resulted in the death of a Redessa, La., woman and injury to four other persons.

The name of the victim was not released at press time Wednesday, pending notification of relatives. The woman was dead on arrival at Littlefield Hospital, while two passengers in the same vehicle were reported in fair condition at the hospital.

Names of the injured here are Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Whitley of Mentone. Taken to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock were a couple identified Wednesday at noon only as "Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins" of Lubbock. This condition was not known.

The accident occurred at the intersection of US-84 and FM-168, the scene of several fatalities in the past few years. No other information was available at press time.

Anton, Whitharral and Peps--three Lamb County neighbors--were among the communities participating in a high Cotton Promotion Week parade at Levelland Tuesday.

It was the longest parade in area history, stretching for 17 miles, and the theme was a short but effective idea--Promote Cotton.

Some 15,000 people, not counting about 2,000 in the parade, watched the long line of marchers, floats and vehicles go by for one hour and 50 minutes. The lineup of bands (eight of them), sheriff's posses, and all kinds of vehicles related to the cotton industry extended from the south edge of Levelland to the Terry County line (12 miles) when forming.

Clever floats of all types were in the parade, and many took a swipe at synthetics. The Pep FFA chapter had 12 cotton trailers loaded with lint and pretty girls, and the words "Farmers Union" were spelled out on the wagons.

Quantity was stressed for this first annual event, but there was plenty of quality, too, in the seven-mile long parade which had the theme of buying and wearing more cotton. The Hockley County Cotton Promotion Week continues through Saturday.

Events of the week included a fashion show, costume ball, posters, merchandise exhibits, sports events, farm exhibits, sky writing and a sewing exhibit.

Anton and Whitharral had big parts in the parade. Jerry Biffle, chairman of the Anton Cotton Week promotion, reported about 72 units from that community that participated, including floats and business and farm vehicles.

The Anton High School marching band, under direction of Carroll Bundrant, was in the parade along with Anton FHA and FFA units. Martha Morton, FFA sweetheart, was featured on one unit as were a number of school queens from other communities.

"Cotton Around the Clock" was the theme for a float sponsored jointly by women's clubs at Anton. The eye-catching float had models dressed in cotton styles for all hours of the day. The Anton Garden Club, 1950 Study Club and Anton Study Club sponsored the float.

"Let's Go Steady With Cotton" was the slogan used for the FHA entry. Pretty FHA girls with cotton corsages rode in a convertible which had cotton slogans displayed all around the car. Citizens State Bank also had an attractive float emphasizing the importance of cotton.

### Absentee Voting Starts In City

## Former City Employee Draws Fine, Probation

Cleta Nell Williams, former Littlefield police department dispatcher, was fined \$250 and placed on two-year's probation in U.S. District Court at Lubbock Wednesday after pleading guilty to embezzlement charges.

Judge Joe J. Fisher sentenced Mrs. Williams to six months in a hospital-type institution, then suspended the sentence on a two-year probation period. She had pled guilty Monday on two counts and was fined \$250 on the first count.

Mrs. Williams was accused of misappropriation of \$434.71 from the Littlefield City-County Federal Credit Union, of which she was a former acting secretary.

The amount includes a \$122.18 check to which she allegedly forged the signature of County Atty. Curtis Wilkinson and made payable to herself. Wilkinson is president of the credit union.

Police Chief F. A. Fitzgerald, a director in the union, discovered a discrepancy in the records in July. Mrs. Williams, 31, was relieved of her

## Waylon Jennings Has New Record Released

With the release of a new record, "Love Denied", on Oct. 1, and the listing of this record in the "Best Bets" column in last week's Cash Box magazine, a local resident, Waylon Jennings, is getting closer to the top in the recording field. Waylon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Jennings of Littlefield, was born and raised here, attended Littlefield schools and began his singing career on the local radio station at the age of 12. From the time he was very small he was constantly picking a guitar and singing. "Love Denied" is the first recording in the popular field Waylon has made, and seems to be heading for the top, according to Cash Box magazine. It is on A&M label and was written by Bill Tillman of Flagstaff, Ariz. It is backed by "Rave On", which is one of several Buddy Holly tunes he has recorded. All his other records have been in the western field.

Waylon became a radio announcer at the age of 19. He worked at the local station before going to KLLL in Lubbock, where he spent about three years. He also worked at KDAV, previous to a year's tour which took him to all parts of the nation. He has also appeared on numerous television stations, including Lubbock.

At present he is working as a night club entertainer at Frankie's Cocktail Lounge in Scottsdale, Ariz., where he has been for about 18 months, and fills in at a radio station there, when he is not traveling to various places to entertain.

Jennings is a songwriter as well as a recording star, and he plays almost any kind of instrument.

"Never Again" and "Another Blue Day" were both written and recorded by him. They were released previous to the present release.

Jennings' father is manager of Reed's Hancock Station here. They also have three other sons, Tommy, who is in the Army and also a musician, playing mostly a lead guitar; James, 17, at home, who assists his father at the station; Phillip, 8, who wants to follow Waylon's footsteps, and is begging for a guitar.

Mr. and Mrs. Jennings have mixed emotions about their son's career as most parents probably do. They are proud of the progress he has made but have tried to talk him out of this type career since he was very small.

The Jennings think there are too many heartaches, and too much worry involved in the "show business" life. They also worry about him being on the road so much, flying from one place to another, and some of the other undesirable factors that go with being a celebrity.

Waylon had a close call several years ago when he had a plane reservation with the late Buddy Holly. The "Big Bopper" asked Waylon to take a train and let him have the plane seat. Waylon did and the plane crashed, killing Holly, the Bopper and another recording star on the tour.

As it is with most young men in pursuit of a career they love, these things do not bother Waylon Jennings. He tried to give up this type of career a number of years ago, working in a lumber yard for six months, but he soon returned to the music business for good.

His record sales attest to the fact that a lot of platter lovers are glad he made that decision.

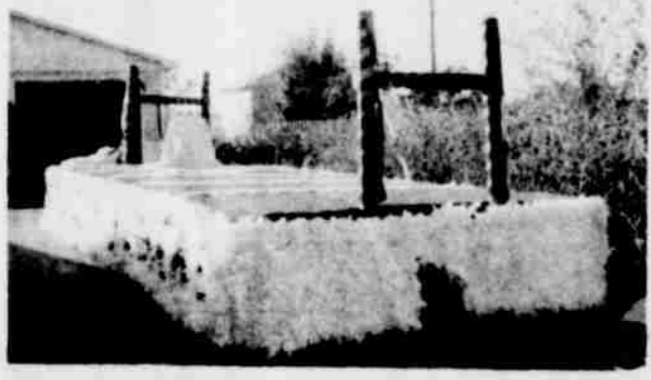

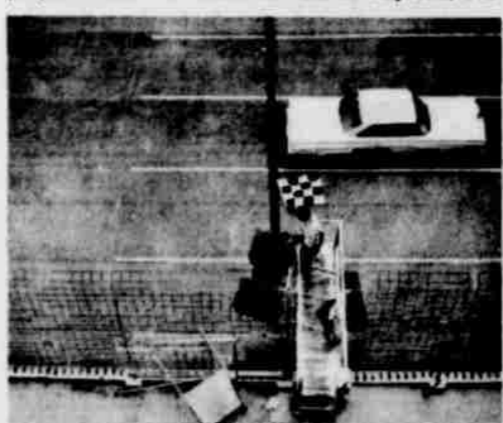

Dear Secretary Freeman:

It was quite disconcerting to have your trip to our country cancelled at the last minute Sunday and it left a whole lot of people with disturbing questions.

It was important to the people of Lamb County that you were coming for a first hand report of our feelings on the farm program. We felt that your visit would be important to you and your associates in Washington, quite important.

Undoubtedly, at Lubbock you would have met some hostile questions, and these could have served some valuable purpose. You would have heard much more, however, in the way of constructive suggestions from sincere, concerned people whom the farm program is a positive and vital thing.

The impressions you would have received at Lubbock would vary sharply from those of the industrial and metropolitan press, whose judgement of farm matters is far amiss. Our "experts" would have been men whose hands touch the soil, and whose feet are on the ground.

Their thinking would have served your department well; it would serve the Congress well; it would serve the President well.

Now, you will not get it, direct and unadorned. Should you come to Lubbock next week, those hundreds of substantial farmers who would have met you Monday -- and hundreds of them came not knowing you had cancelled -- will not be there.

We can only hope that there was big reason for your recall, reason that bore a vital need of the country. If President Kennedy feared only a contrary political reaction from good, honest Texas citizens calling you home, then what most he fear from our world enemies?

It would seem that an ex-Marine with a distinguished combat record and wounds, and an old sailor who also almost died at the hands of our enemy, could have faced up to a crowd of unarmed West Texas farmers!

The cotton industry is an important segment of the economy, and it has troubles. They are not insurmountable and they have been met, and solved, in recent years. They can be again, but the solution must require a steady look at them, and a positive attitude towards solution. This will not, cannot, come just from charts in Washington. Somebody in command position must take a look at the front lines, and no one should be more qualified than you.

If this occasion should ever come, you will find the finest quality folks you'll find anywhere, and you'll enjoy it. You won't find a large number of them again to greet you, but you can accomplish your purpose by coming earlier and leaving later. It is hard to compress the facts on any industry into two quick hours. Stay a couple days and the farm program for West Texas will come through more clearly than any farm program today is making its way through the political fog that hangs over Washington.

# Wildcats, Lobos To Vie For Golden Trap Friday

Littlefield and Levelland, a longtime grid rivals, will meet in Wildcat Stadium Friday in an important District I-AA contest. Kickoff time is 7 p.m.

The reason the contest is important in the district race is both teams will be trying to climb out of the league cellar—an unusual position for either club. Both sport 0-2 conference marks.

The big bonfire will launch pre-game activities tonight at 8 on Wildcat Stadium parking lot. The usual Friday pep rally is scheduled at the high school gym at 8:30 p.m.

Coach John Howle was a big committal about his starting

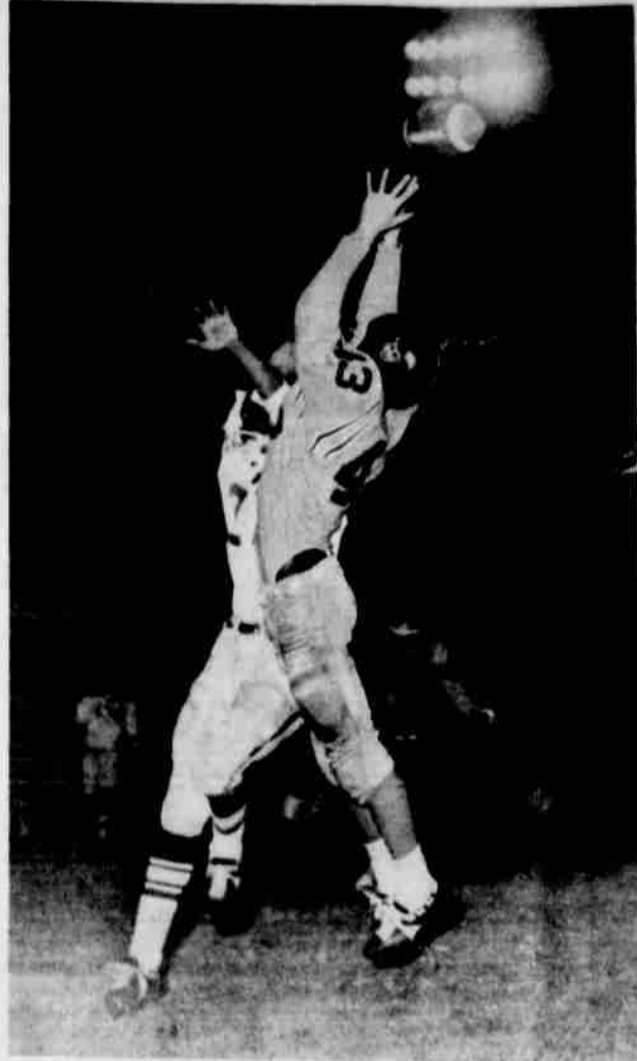

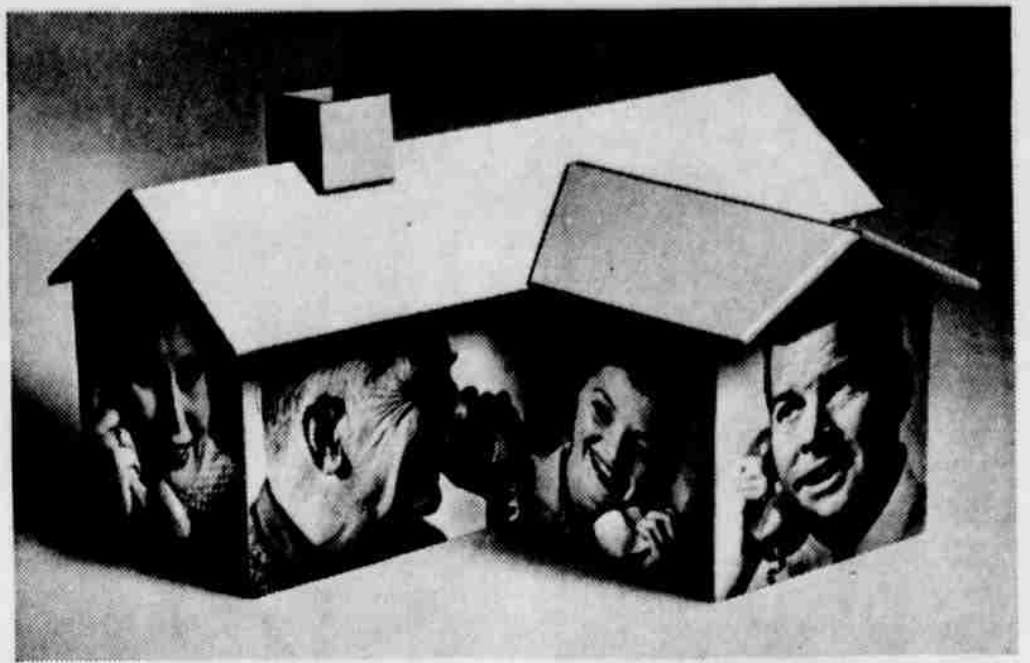

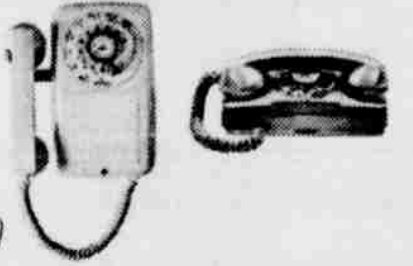
