

# LITTLEFIELD DISTRICT UNDOUBTEDLY IN BIG AREAS OF STATE

## Oil Company No. 1 Hobgood East Of Littlefield Shows Promotions Of Good Producer

Littlefield and territory undoubtedly can be included in the big oil areas of Texas.

It has been proven that production can be obtained at shallow depth much more production can be gained by drilling to lower than the 10,000 foot depth or greater has not been disclosed.

The Oil and Refining company appeared to have some sort of recovery from the Clear Fork Lime of the lower Perian at its Hobgood, located eight and a half miles southeast of Littlefield and two miles west of Anton. This well is east and slightly south of Chapel.

A venture drillstem tested at 6,610-40 feet for two and one-half hours came to the surface in two hours and a half and the tool bit as the gas appeared. Recovery was 309 feet of mud cut oil and no signs of formation water.

Flowing bottom hole pressure was 265 pounds. Shut-in bottom pressure, after 22 minutes, was 2,175 pounds.

The prospector had drilled ahead to 6,670 feet and was running a drillstem test Saturday afternoon. It had recovered 36 feet of gas cut mud in a 90-minute drillstem test at 6,530-70 feet. A four-hour drillstem test at 6,570-6,610 feet, gas showed at the surface in 70 minutes.

The well was 120 feet of oil and gas cut mud and 100 feet of mud and no signs of formation water.

## Now Is The Time To Organize Water District

Conservation of water which would blanket the area was urged today by Fortenberry of Monroe, president of the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association.

Hockley and Lamb, are petitioning for designation of underground water reservoirs by the State Board of Water Engineers. Then they can proceed with elections creating districts.

"Every county on the High Plains which depends on underground

water for irrigation should be investigating the merits of forming a district," Fortenberry said. The organization he heads embraces 13 county water users associations, plus the Petersburg Water Conservation Association.

"To protect our water and our

water law, to conserve and replenish our water supply, now is the time to organize water districts," Fortenberry said.

Recent attacks on the underground water law passed in the spring of 1949, together with repeated suggestions to the Texas Water

Code Committee that a state agency regulate water use, make it necessary to form districts to protect the present law, he pointed out. That would refuse charges that the law is unworkable.

To protect the water supply, a

wide-spread program of recharging, well spacing and waste prevention would meet conservation needs, he added.

The High Plains Association is composed of water users associations in Lamb, Lubbock, Hale, Bailey, Castro, Dallam, Brisco, Floyd, Randall, Farmer, Deaf Smith and Crosby counties, and the Petersburg association. It has been identified for several years with the fight to fend off state control of underground water.

## Native Elms Can Be Used For Windbreak And Shade On Farms

Native elms and many of the species that have been introduced into this country can be used to advantage around the farmstead. They make large and stately trees and their rate of growth is rapid. Such trees will not only add beauty to the farmstead but will also provide shade.

In the northwestern section of the state, the Chinese elm is valued as a windbreak tree as well as for its shade. This tree will thrive in other sections of the state, but it is highly susceptible to root rot and for that reason, says Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. & M. College, should not be planted in sections of the state where cotton root rot is prevalent.

The seed of the Chinese elm ripens in the spring and for best results, she says, they should be gathered and planted immediately. By fall, well-tended seedlings should be large enough for use in windbreak plantings. The seed may be saved for planting the following spring, but she points out that many of the seed may lose their vitality and the germination will be low.

The seed of the American elm ripens in the late summer and fall and should be planted immediately. She says when it is not possible to plant either Chinese or American elm seed immediately after they have ripened, to dry them thoroughly, place them in air-tight contain-

ers and store at a temperature of 40 degrees F. until planting time.

She says many seed should be planted for each tree needed for only about one-eight usually grow. The seed should be planted an inch or so apart in rows that are at least one foot apart. The seed should be covered with one-fourth inch of soil and the soil should be firmly packed. The young trees should be protected from birds and animals. After the trees are a few inches high, they may be fertilized the same as field or garden crops. The American elm, she says, sometimes develops a leaf spot but it can be controlled with bordeaux mixture. Elm seedlings are also susceptible to the fungus that causes damping off but treating the soil before planting with formaldehyde will control the disease.

Wood from the elm is hard, heavy and tough and can be used for many things on the average farm or ranch. Miss Hatfield adds attractive furniture can be made from it.

County Extension agents will furnish complete information on these programs.

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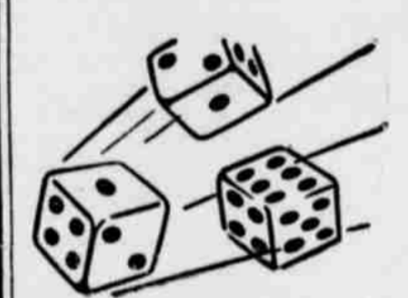

## Storage Time For Irish Potatoes Depends On Place

Home gardeners will soon be digging and storing their spring Irish potato crop. The length of time they can be stored will depend upon where you store them and the condition they are in when they are dug, says J. E. Hutchinson, associate extension horticultural specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

He says let the potatoes mature before digging them. Potatoes can be dug before the tops die, but they should be mature if you expect to keep them in storage for any length of time. Here is a simple and easy method for checking maturity. Press the thumb against the skin of a few potatoes, if the skin is tough and doesn't break easily, the crop is ready for harvesting.

If excessive rainfall has occurred just prior to harvest, you are likely to find the potatoes covered with water blisters (elevated white spots) on the skin. Hutchinson says harvesting should be delayed until these blisters have dried. If the potatoes are harvested when they are "sappy" or "blistered" heavy losses may result from rotting.

He says you can do a good job of digging the crop by running a middle buster or turning plow under eight to ten inches deep under the row of potatoes. The skinned or damaged potatoes should be separated from the good ones when they are picked up. Use the damaged potatoes first for they will not keep well in storage. He points out that potatoes should be handled almost as carefully as eggs and as soon as they are picked up, they should be placed in the shade to prepare blistering.

A cool, well ventilated cellar makes a satisfactory storage place for potatoes, provided it has an overhead vent for ventilation. The door and vent should be open at night and closed during the daytime. This practice will help keep the cellar cool.

If the potatoes are stored in buildings or under them, good cross ventilation is a necessity. When potatoes in storage are exposed to light, they will turn green and are undesirable for human consumption. Hutchinson says it is best not to spread the potatoes on a floor or on the ground. They'll keep better if placed on a slatted false floor with about four inches of air space under it. Small poles or hay placed under the potatoes will help for what you want in an arrangement that will permit the air to completely circle the potato.

Plenty of ventilation will pick up moisture and keep the potatoes dry and will reduce the storage losses from rotting. He says there isn't much point in producing potatoes if they are not handled and stored properly.

## Farmers Urged To Make Applications For Needed Help

South Plains farmers who will soon need migratory workers have been urged to contact the Lubbock Texas Employment commission for assistance in solving their labor problems.

Manager B. T. O'Connell said Wednesday that both the workers and farmers will be benefitted if the farmers in this area begin soon to make application for their labor needs for cotton chopping.

"Sufficient laborers are available, if they know they will have work in this area," O'Connell said. "Otherwise they will move elsewhere."

"If some farmers with vacant houses make applications now and provide housing, facilities will be available to attract additional workers."

Workers so placed in farmers houses would be self-sustaining. They would not receive any wages until work is started unless the farmers want to begin making payments.

Other farmers who have made application early will get first choice on crews as they become available, thus assuring themselves of getting their field work done on schedule, O'Connell said.

Preliminary surveys indicate picking in the Rio Grande valley will be under way by July 1. O'Connell said this might prove disastrous to the local area.

Should the workers in East and Central Texas finish chopping by June 30 and move directly to the valley, the South Plains then would be short of labor.

Early applications, however, will permit the Employment office to notify other TEC offices that work is available here.

# LOVE and MARRIAGE

The Slick Pompadour, the Come-on Smile, And Everything Else That Figures in the Deal

How can you know if it is really love? A public affairs pamphlet addressed to teen agers warns them that "falling in love" just doesn't happen—you grow into love. And, we might add, when love stops growing it ceases to be love in its richest sense. For love, especially married love, deepens with the years.

Then why are there so many divorces? One reason is that while love by its very nature continues to grow, human being often stop growing at some period of their lives. You have seen mature men with doll wives, and fine women with playboy husbands because, though they may have started together on the same plane of love, one or the didn't develop his capacity for shared affection and experience.

The pamphlet to which we referred is called, "So You Think It's Love!" and was written by Ralph G. Eckhart for the Public Affairs Committee. The author posts signs reading, Beware of the romantic pattern"—the boy meets girl infatuation blared from radio, television, movie, and magazine illustrations. Instead of counting pulse beats when you start dating, the pamphlet advises: "We know now that a happy marriage is not so much dependent upon "finding" the right person as becoming the right person. People used to say that opposites attract each other. Now we know that the kind of person we are determines the kind of person we attract and are attracted to.

"To the degree that you believe there is a 'one

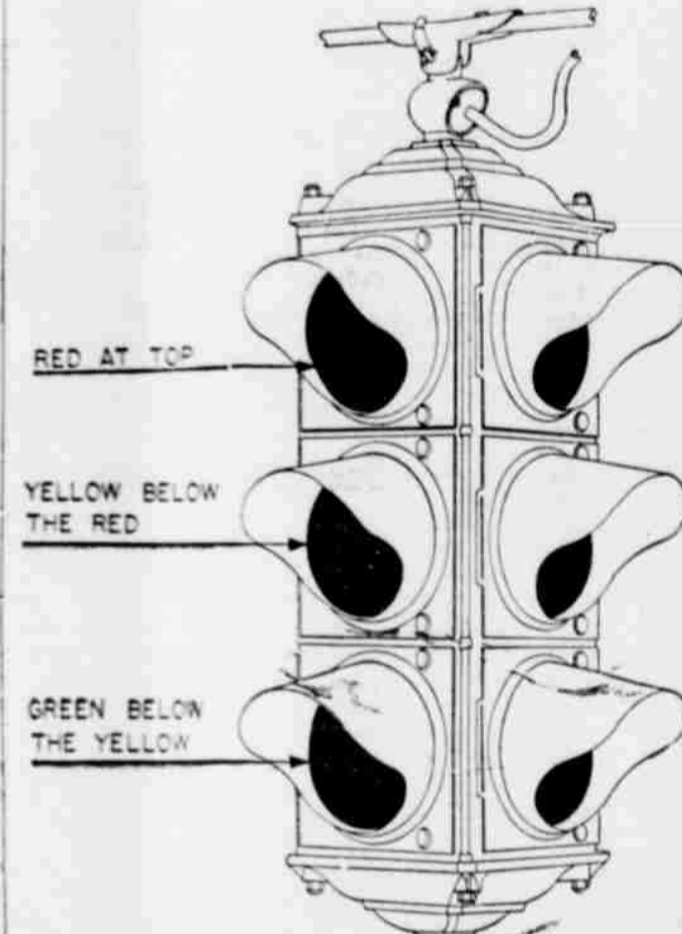
and only,' meant for you, you feel insecure. How in the world can you know which one it is, and how can you be sure that, like ships, you won't "pass in the night"? But if you believe that a happy marriage results from being the kind of person who will attract the kind of person you want to marry, then you don't have to wait around for three, five or ten years until the 'right person' comes along. But you can begin today to be the kind of person whom more and more people like to be around and whom eventually a great many people might like to have as a mate."

Mr. Eckhart says that surveys show the best chances of staying married come with choosing someone who can be depended on, who is even-tempered, thoughtful, kind, considerate, helpful, friendly, honest and affectionate. Yet haven't you seen many a lad or young miss with these qualities shining all over them passed up for someone with a slicker pompadour or a come-on smile? Unfortunately, this has been true ever since the days of Aesop—but it is only the "now and then" truth which gets the headlines. In the vast majority of successful marriages attraction has been coupled with admiration for each other's sterling qualities.

One word of comfort to the young person whose marriageable qualities aren't all on the surface—you can't imitate the "wolf" or the "temptress" if you tried—and in acting out of character you may miss the chance to win a mate with your own more lasting charms.



## Knowledge Of Traffic Signals Will Make Auto Driving Safer

What do you know about highway traffic signals? If your knowledge is limited to the fact that you go when the signal shows green and stop when it shows red, you can make the problem of traffic control an easier one for your public officials by knowing more about traffic signals.

You can bring about uniformity of traffic signals by learning to identify the standard traffic signal and then encouraging your officials to use only standard types when they install new signals or replace existing non-standard signals. Wouldn't it be much easier for you to understand the indications given by traffic signals if they were all of the same design in every town and state? In fact, standardization of traffic control signals is considered so desirable and important that the Fiftyeth Texas Legislature specified that all highway traffic signals installed in Texas after 1947 shall conform to National standards.

**Fixed-Time Signal**  
The sketch will help you identify the most common type of a standard fixed-time (stop and go) signal for suspension over the center of the highway. To be standard each face must have at least three lenses, with red at the top, yellow below the red, and green below the yellow. Additional lenses, showing arrows and walk-wait, may be added at complicated intersections to provide for special movements of traffic. The standard position of lenses is not only helpful to every motorist, but it is especially helpful to the color blind who can not tell whether to stop or to go by the difference in brightness of the lenses when they cannot distinguish colors.

**Non Standard Signals**  
There are a large number of traffic signals in use today that were installed before the present standards were adopted, and they do not conform to present standards. Unfortunately there are some local units of government who still buy non-standard signals without the yellow lenses. Some of these two section signals show both red and green at the same time they are changing color, which is not only confusing but also hazardous.

You can also help with the problem of traffic control by understanding the functions of traffic signals and their limitations.

A well designed and operated traffic signal installed on the basis of factual studies of the number of vehicles and pedestrians, accident, speeds, delays, and physical conditions of the location can render invaluable service in the smooth and safe flow of traffic. On the other hand, an unjustified, ill designed, ineffectively placed, improperly operated, poorly maintained signal is not only a waste of public funds, but it causes unnecessary delays to traffic, disobedience of signal indications, use of alternate routes, and often, an increase in accidents.

### Portable Freezer To Be Available

Texas farmers, ranchers, and urban garden owners may soon quick-freeze their own fruits and vegetables by one of the best commercial methods.

A compact, portable quick freezer for homes and small locker plants will be perfected this summer by University of Texas Engineering Dean W. R. Woolrich.

The unit will have approximately the same proportions as a five-gallon ice cream freezer. Home quick-freezing of fruits and vegetables in stainless steel wheel covers, and a hand-brake warning signal.

## Home Freezers Becoming Part Of Food Preservation Equipment

Home freezers are fast becoming a part of the food preservation equipment in rural as well as city homes. This method of food preservation is enabling the homemaker to do a better job of providing the family with fresh vegetables the year-round. A good supply of vegetables is needed for balancing the diet and according to Louise Mason, extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A. & M. College, home freezing or using a freezer-locker box to store surplus vegetables for later use is one sure way to have them when they are needed.

Miss Mason says there are several factors that will have a bearing on the quality of the frozen vegetables and these should be kept in mind when vegetables are being prepared for freezing. Speed is important and there should be no delays from the time the vegetables are gathered until processed and stored.

She points out that vegetables begin to lose value and flavor as soon as they are gathered. During the summer months, she says it is

best to gather the vegetables early in the morning, but be sure they have reached their peak in flavor and texture, for freezing does not improve their quality.

It is necessary to scald vegetables in boiling water, before freezing to prevent loss of quality and to preserve the vitamin content. Freezing alone does not stop the enzyme action in vegetables and if they are not scalded, this action will cause undesirable odors to develop along with the loss of flavor and color.

Each vegetable, she says, requires a different scalding time and she suggests that you see your local county home demonstration agent and get a copy of B-175, Frozen Foods. This bulletin is new and on how each vegetable should be handled from the time it leaves the garden until it is ready for storage.

Woolrich has designed his new machine in a vertical, bucket-like shape. It may be operated only when needed and is easily cleaned.

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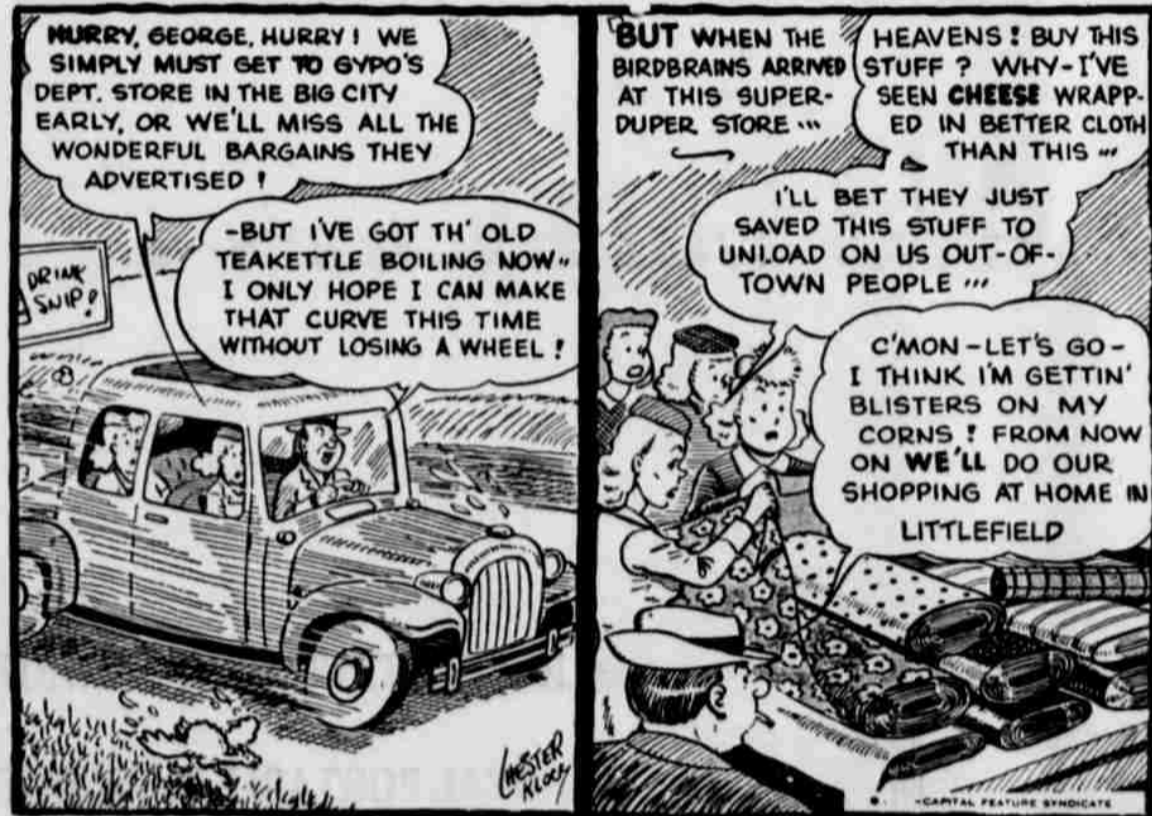
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# Support Price On Grain Sorghum To Be Announced So

## Senate Passes Bill Increasing Capital Stock Credit Assn. Legislation O'Ked By House On March 23 Last

Congressman George Mahon advised early this week that Department of Agriculture officials had informed him that all the papers had been prepared for an announcement of the support price loan on grain sorghum.

The announcement has been held up for weeks pending Senate passage of a bill increasing the capital stock of the Commodity Credit Corporation. The Senate acted on June 6, passing the bill which the House had had approved last March 23.

Mahon stated that Presidential approval of the pending measure was expected soon and that within a few hours after the President signs the bill the grain sorghum loan will be announced. He said that the support price on grain sorghum might possibly be announced before the end of the week.
