### Pfc. Evans Sends Home Pair Of German Boots

Pfc. James Evans, son of Mr. and Mrs. Willie J. Evans of two miles west of Littlefield cemetery, who is with the 242nd service battery, as an anti-aircraft gunner, "somewhere in Europe," sent his father home a pair of German boots, which arrived here Saturday.

Pfc. Evans has been in the service 19 months and overseas seven months.

Pfc. Evans was not able to tell his father where the pair of German boots came from, but Mr. Evans said they arrived packed in a wooden box.

They are of heavy leather, long; the soles are reinforced all over with brass studs, apparently to protect the soles from wear and tear, and also for climbing rough country. They also had metal plates on the boot toes, as well as metal plates on the heels.

Pfc. Evans has written from Nancy, France, but it is not known now whether he is in Germany or France.

### PLANTING AN ASPARAGUS BED

Asparagus, which is one of the most easily grown vegetables for West Texas, may be planted until the end of February, says Miss Vera Crippen, County Home Demonstration Agent.

It will grow in every type of soil which is slightly alkaline, but prefers a well-drained, deep, loose, open porous, light much or sandy loam high in organic matter, and over a clay subsoil. Asparagus is however, rather intolerant of extremely acid soils.

The site should be free of stones and surface clay and the soil prepared with the utmost care before planting the crowns. If available, heavy applications of barnyard or green manure fertilizer should be broadcast and mixed into the soil well in advance of planting. If barnyard fertilizer is scarce, heavy applications directly into the rows may suffice. The rows, or trenches, where the crowns are to be set should be opened 10 to 12 inches deep and six to 12 inches wide.

Miss Crippen recommends Mary Washington and Martha Washington as the two best varieties since both are resistant to asparagus rust. Large, one-year crowns which have well-developed root systems and large well-distributed buds are best for planting. Crowns more than two years old never should be used.

The crowns should be placed in the prepared trench 18 to 24 inches apart in order to give the roots as nearly natural spread as possible. Miss Crippen advises care in separating crowns so as to disturb the roots as little as possible. Depth of planting varies from 6 to 12 inches, but plants in light soils should be set deeper than in heavy earth.

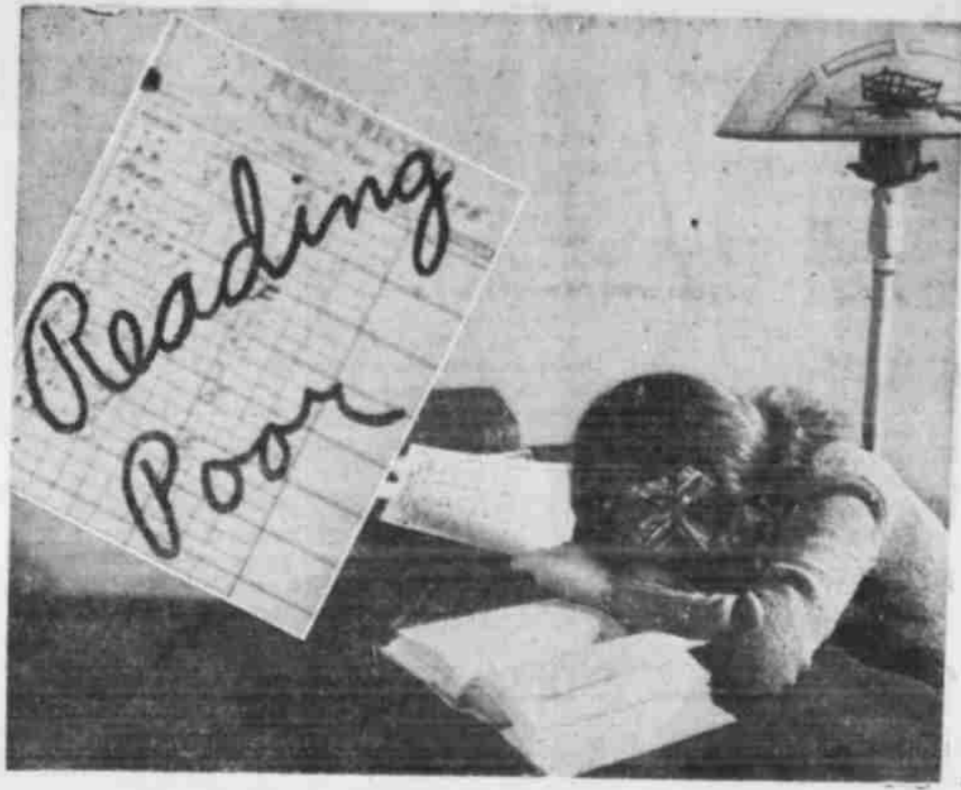

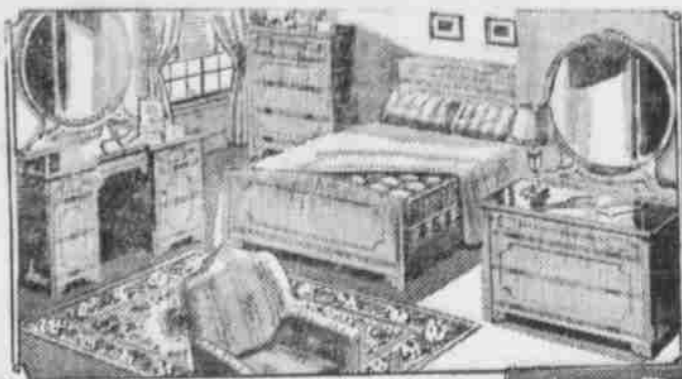

### Senate Passes Bill Increasing Teachers' Salaries

The Senate last week passed its first piece of major legislation of the 49th session, to raise the salaries of some 15,000 rural aid teachers approximately \$300 annually. The vote was 26 to 0. The measure was similar to House bill three, which was passed by the lower House body in the opening

days of the session. The exception was the Senate reduced a provision for \$60 maintenance per teacher to \$30. The bill will now go back to the House for concurrence.

The measure, in addition to boosting teacher salaries and setting a \$30 per teacher maintenance and operations top, also increases school bus transportation aid one dollar per scholastic and raises the amount of tuition \$7.50 which is equivalent to one month's apportionment.

### Sgt. Willard Hill Is One Of Group Cited By President

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England.—Serving and adjusting bombsights and automatic pilots on Eighth Air Force B-17 Flying Fortresses is the delicate and exacting task of Sergeant Willard R. Hill, 26, Littlefield, Tex., aircraft mechanic serving with the 96th Bomb Group.

The success of 1,000-plane missions striking key Nazi military and industrial targets depends upon the accurate adjustment and painstaking care of the equipment on which Sgt. Hill works, bombing equipment formerly listed by the Army as highly secret. His duties include constant flying, checking the proper functioning of the equipment, and training flying officers in its use in battle.

The Littlefield mechanic serves a group which has been cited by the President for bombing key Focke Wulf fighter plane factories which had been removed to Posen, Poland, supposedly out of day-bomber range. The group is a unit of Third Air Division, itself cited by the President for the England-Africa shuttle-bombing of Messerschmitt aircraft assembly plants at Regensburg, Germany.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman B. Hill, Box 1221, Littlefield, Sgt. Hill worked on his father's farm before entering the Army. He is a graduate of Army Technical schools at Midland, Texas, and Minneapolis, Minnesota, finishing his training in January, 1943.

### Production Credit Association Make Steady Progress

Texas' 36 farmer-stockmen production credit associations increased their member-owned capital and accumulated earnings by almost \$500,000 in 1944 and are making steady progress toward full member ownership, according to the annual report of the Production Credit Corporation of Houston.

Gip Hudson is the Littlefield field representative for the Plainview PCA.

Farmers and ranchers now have \$3,446,560 invested in the capital stock of the associations; earned surplus is \$2,724,304, and these two items combined amount to more than half of the total capital and surplus in the associations.

Income from government capital for all 36 associations was 8 1/2 per cent of the associations' total income last year, compared with 52 per cent in 1934, according to President Virgil P. Lee of the supervisory corporation for associations in Texas.

The Texas PCA at San Angelo now has \$256,700 in member-owned stock and accumulated earnings of \$560,000 after having paid stockholders a 5 per cent dividend out of last year's earnings.

Total cash disbursements in 1944 were \$49,370,864, with cash collections of \$51,246,784. In 11 years, net losses on \$406,248,000 in loans have been less than one-tenth of one per cent, the report shows.

At the end of 1944, there were 26,350 members in the 36 associations. Loans outstanding were 10,902 for \$20,386,316—a reduction under 1943 due to the improvement of the financial position of members.

"Members are showing interest in retaining their stock, buying additional stock, and speeding up the complete ownership of the associations by farmers and stockmen," Lee said. "A large number of associations are now nearing that goal."
