## Levelland Places Five Wildcats Land Four Men On All-Conference Team

Littlefield's Wildcats, runners up in District 1-AAA grid action, placed four men on the all-district team which was announced Tuesday.

End Leslie Bevel, Tackle Wallace Lee, Guard Bill Wade and Halfback Buddy Jones made the honor team.

Champion Levelland, loser in bi-district action to Kermit, landed five men on the team.

A 12-man first team resulted when there was a tie at an end position.

Third-place Phillips wound up with two men on the honor team and Dumas got one place, while Hereford failed to land a man.

## Lamb Cotton Farmers Approve Quotas For '58

Lamb County farmers approved marketing quotas on cotton by 455-50 Tuesday, joining other farmers across Texas and the nation in continuing government controls.

The vote in Littlefield itself was 169 for, 15 against. Closest vote came at Earth, 55 for, 23 against.

Two-thirds of the nation's voters had to favor quotas for them to remain in effect.

The quotas have been in effect for the last four crops. Under legislative proceedings, the Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim a national marketing quota and a national acreage allotment for upland cotton whenever he finds that the total supply exceeds the normal supply.

Marketing quotas operate through acreage allotments. A grower who exceeds the cotton acreage allotment for his farm is subject to a marketing quota penalty of 50 per cent of parity on the farm's excess production.

## School Board Accepts Gift From QB Club

Littlefield school trustees accepted a gift of \$500 from the local quarterback club Monday night in a regular meeting.

The money was designated toward installation of a laundry at the high school fieldhouse.

School officials indicated the laundry would be installed there either next spring in time for spring practice or next fall before the football season starts.

The quarterback club plans an annual gift of the same amount for the next two years.

In other action, school board members approved a financial statement for November, appointed a census trustee and appointing a textbook committee.

Named census trustee was William Brune of the high school staff. The school census will be taken during January.

The textbook committee appointed by the board will investigate and select textbooks for adoption and use in the school system.

The committee is composed of Supt. Ralph Schilling, chairman; Brune, D. C. Lindley, Rex Gilstrap, Mrs. Floyd Blackwell, Mrs. Brune, Mrs. W. H. McCown, Mrs. Addie Abernathy, Mrs. Aris Belle Burks, Mrs. Glene Gibson and Mrs. Loda Hardin.

## Decision Delayed On Youth Officer

County commissioners discussed at length a proposal to employ a county juvenile officer Monday, but delayed a decision on the request.

County Judge Pat Boone Jr. said the court plans to investigate the need for such an officer further before handing down a decision.

Boone also said he planned to continue his personal investigation into the matter.

The court has been studying the need for a juvenile officer during recent months.

A county-wide committee asked the county to employ the officer after several months of research.

A county grand jury also recommended that the county hire a combination juvenile officer and juvenile probation officer.

In other action at a regular meeting Monday, the commissioners approved a contract for right-of-way procurement for a four-lane highway from the Bailey County line 1.7 miles into Lamb County on Highway 84.

The contract is between the county and the State Highway Department.

It gives the county state participation for up to 50 per cent of the right-of-way cost.

The contract now goes back to the State Highway Department for final approval.

Commissioners also amended the county's Hospital Treatment and Care Program for needy persons.

Under the amendment, the county will pay 60 per cent of the standard hospital charges. (Continued on Page 7)

## CHRISTMAS DAY WILL GIVE MOST PEOPLE CHANCE FOR RELAXATION

Christmas time means a dent in the pocketbook for most people, but it also means a little time off for most, too.

Most of Lamb County will relax Christmas Day. Some folks will get as much as three or four days off.

County officials, except for law enforcement officers, will shut the courthouse down Saturday at noon, Dec. 21. They'll return to work Thursday, Dec. 26.

City employees will take the same holidays. Law enforcement officers will remain on duty, along with the fire department volunteers and a skeleton crew of employees.

Most state and federal offices will close on Christmas day only.

Local schools will dismiss Friday, Dec. 21, and resume classes Monday, Jan. 6.

Banks will close at noon on Dec. 24 and reopen at 9 a.m. Dec. 26.

The Chamber of Commerce office will be closed Dec. 25-26.

# Production Of Guard Rail Near At Tellyer Company

## Huge Press Set Up At Pipe Firm

Tellyer Pipe Co., Littlefield's newest industry, soon will go into full production of heavy-duty highway guard rail, company officials announced this week.

The announcement came after the company set up a 330-ton press designed to fabricate the rail.

The press is the largest of its size and use west of the Mississippi River.

A 100 by 100-foot building already was going up around the huge press early this week. Workers had poured the foundation for the structure.

**Expansion Planned**

The manufacture of highway guard rail here is the first in a series of steps planned by the company in a million-dollar expansion program on the South Plains.

Most of the expansion will be done in the Littlefield plant, where some 100 persons eventually will be employed.

Tellyer Pipe is a division of American-Marietta, largest producer of culvert and drainage pipe in the world.

The big press already was turning out 13½-foot-long pieces of guard rail early this week. It was installed last week.

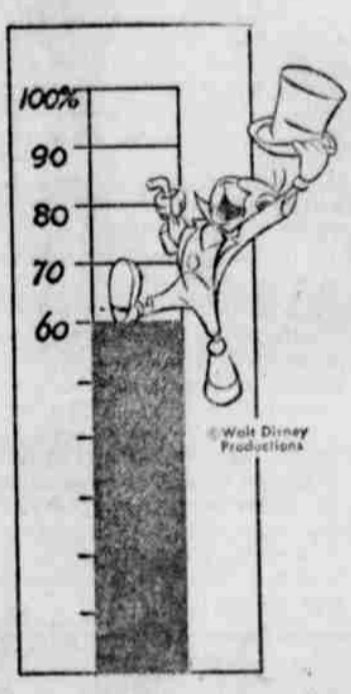
**New Building Soon**

Cold winds hampered operations Tuesday, but the company planned to construct the new building around the press as soon as possible.

Corrugated riveters and other metal fabrication machinery will be installed in the new building.

The press takes a flat piece of 12-gauge steel 19 inches wide and 13½ feet long and bends it into shape in the manufacture of guard rail.

## City U.F. Total Hits \$11,555

Lamb County United Fund contributions edged past the 60 per cent mark to almost 65 per cent Wednesday, reaching a total of \$18,246.

About \$1,750 had been collected since Saturday as a cold front and high winds moved into the area Tuesday morning and stalled activity most of the day.

Littlefield's contributions came to \$11,555 Wednesday, toward a goal of \$13,880.

The windy weather dimmed Olton's kick-off Tuesday. Campaigners were working Wednesday morning, but no report had been made. Olton's goal is \$4,200.

Three towns in the county had completed their drives early this week. Two of them reported they had topped their goals.

Hart Camp collected \$193, topping its goal of \$180, while Springlake's final count was \$1,581, above a goal of \$1,500.

Pleasant Valley reported it had finished its drive with \$200, short of the community's \$320 goal.

No report had been received in Littlefield from Fieldton. Earth's only report toward a \$2,575 goal was \$300.

Spade, Sudan and Amherst continued to edge nearer their goals.

A report from Spade Wednesday showed a total of \$746, shy of the community's goal of \$975.

Sudan was only a little off its goal Wednesday, reporting total contributions of \$2,400. The town's goal is \$2,675.

Amherst raised its total to \$1,273 Wednesday. The Amherst goal is \$1,675.

UF officials said the county-wide campaign had slowed considerably this week because of workers being busy with their own jobs.

"It still looks like we'll reach the county's goal, however," UF Board Chairman J. E. Chisholm said.

Four agencies will benefit from the drive—the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, the Boy Scouts and the Girl Scouts.

## Gin Fires Erupt As Big Winds Hit

A blustery cold front moved into Lamb County Tuesday, setting off a rash of fires and sending temperatures well below the freezing mark.

Two gin fires were reported Tuesday, one at the Bula Gin, owned by Jack Kendrick, and another at the Farmers Gin at Olton, owned by Shorty Silcott and Louis Hair.

At Olton, Hair said the fire destroyed a seedhouse and damaged about 10 small bales of cotton. Hair estimated the loss at \$7,000.

At Bula, Bookkeeper Betty Tiller at the Kendrick gin said about 65 bales of cotton and three trailers were lost in a fire there. The damage was estimated at about \$10,000.

Tuesday night, a house for Mexican laborers burned at the F. J. Bryson farm nine miles south and two miles east of Littlefield.

Local fire department volunteers said one house burned and another next to it was damaged. The fire apparently started when a butane stove exploded. No one was hurt.

Tuesday afternoon, firemen put out a fire in a cotton trailer on Hall Avenue.

Hair said the fire at his gin started from sparks blown from the burr pit. Plainview and Olton firefighters worked against the blaze for about six hours.

Winds which were estimated at 60 m.p.h. in gusts hampered fire fighting at both Olton and Bula.

Most gins throughout the county shut down their operations during the worst of the winds.

The fire at the Bula Gin started about 9 a.m. Tuesday, when the winds carried sparks from (Continued on Page 7)

Two men were fined and given jail terms here Tuesday on charges of driving while intoxicated.

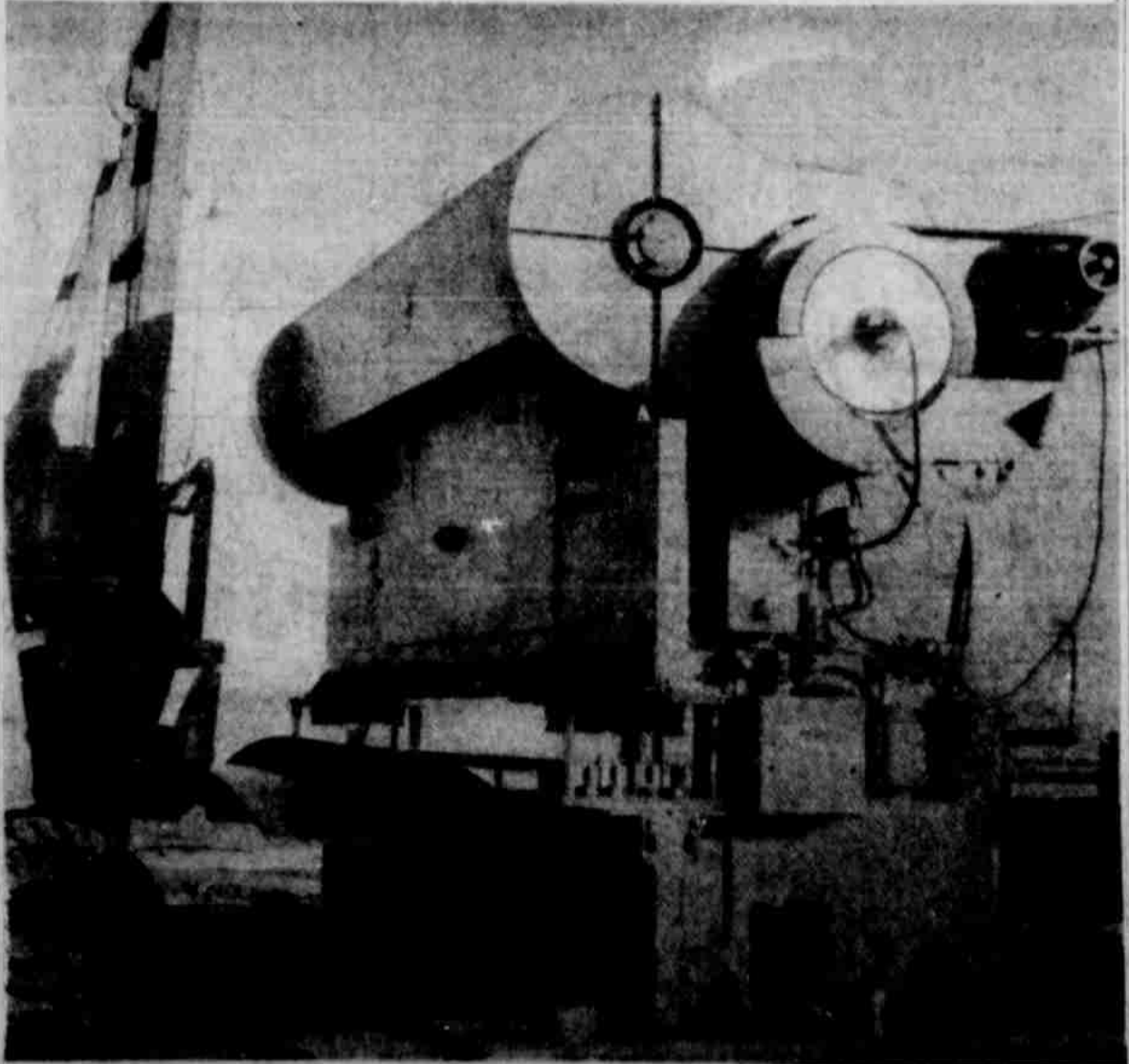
The men are Nathan Brown, a Maple, Tex., Negro, and Charles Howell, a Lubbock white man.

She is a native of San Andres Island, in the Caribbean Sea. The island is two miles wide and seven miles long.

"On it are 7000 coconut palms and 6000 people," Miss May said. She pointed out that the people are Negroes, speak English and have been Baptists for more than 100 years and probably descended from survivors of an English ship that was captured by pirates.

"There is buried treasure on the island and also on a small island, New Providence, 50 miles away. I know the treasure is there because my great grandfather found a vast treasure himself," Miss May said.

A Baptist missionary came to the island more than one hundred years ago and practically all the people were converted. However, he did not stay long enough to teach them much about Jesus and His work so it was not until eleven years ago that the people on San Andres really learned about the kingdom of God and began working for the Lord.

At that time Mr. and Mrs. C. W. McCollough, Southern Baptist missionaries, began work on the island. At the present time seven natives of the island have been or are being trained in Baptist schools in Louisiana and Texas in preparation for returning to the island to work among their own people. Last September the

first of these seven, Miss Combie Jay, returned and at present she is the head of the Baptist school there.

Miss May is a sophomore at Wayland. She is preparing to study English in the Baptist school on San Andres.

On Thursday morning the women of the day circles of the First Baptist Church met in the home of Mrs. Kenneth Reast. Her home was decorated in the Yuletide motif. On the piano, set in a fluff of angels' hair was a sugar plum tree with tiny angels hanging from its branches. 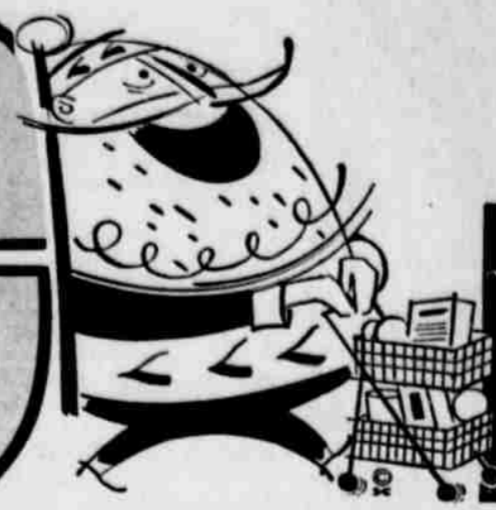
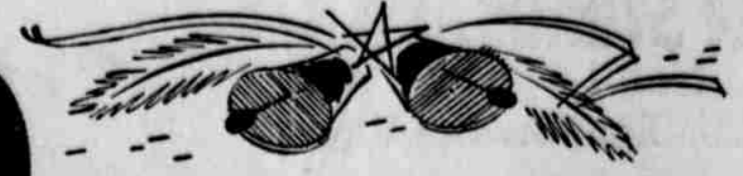

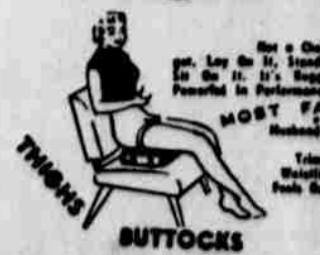

## TRF Research On Irrigated Wheat Begins

Irrigated wheat research for 1958 got under way at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation last week, after a delay of 1 1/2 months from the normal planting date. The delay was due to bad weather. Seven varieties are being studied at the Station. They are Comanche, Concho, Crockett, Early Triumph, Tenmarq, Westar, and Early Wichita. Each variety is planted in 100 ft. plots 9 1/2 feet wide.

Each plot is repeated four times. Douglas Owen in charge of the planting, said there was some residue of fertilizer from the 1957 season. One half of each plot will be top dressed with nitrogen and the other 1/2 of each plot will be left unfertilized to compare yield results.

Fertilizer tests on wheat include all possible combinations of rates and ratios of application. Nitrogen will be applied in 40, 80, and 120 pounds per acre, phosphorus in 40 and 80 pounds and potash applied at 40 pounds.

The two varieties of barley under study at the High Plains Station are Cordova and Wintex.

Dr. Johnny H. Davis, associate head of the station said, "the wheat research at the station is designed to determine the best varieties for the area and the fertilizer applications to determine which will produce the most economical results."

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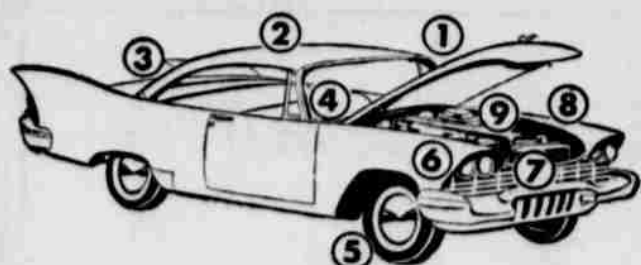

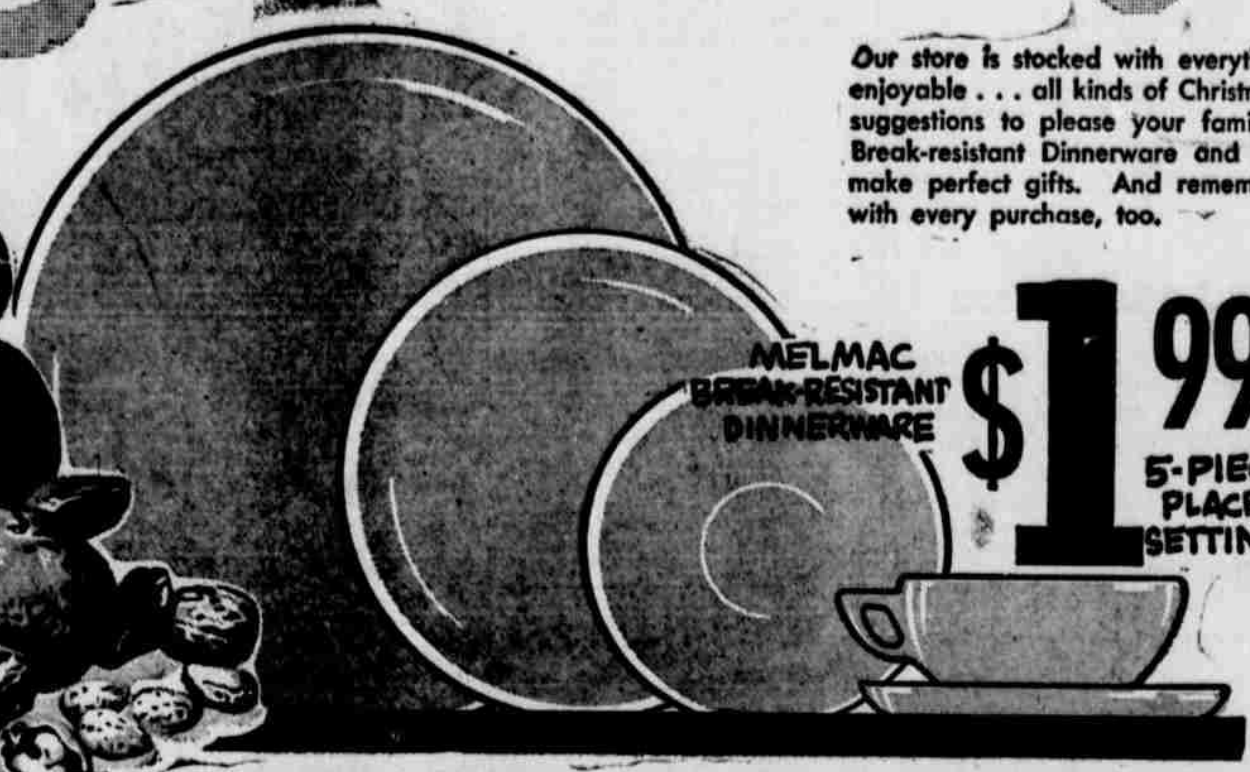

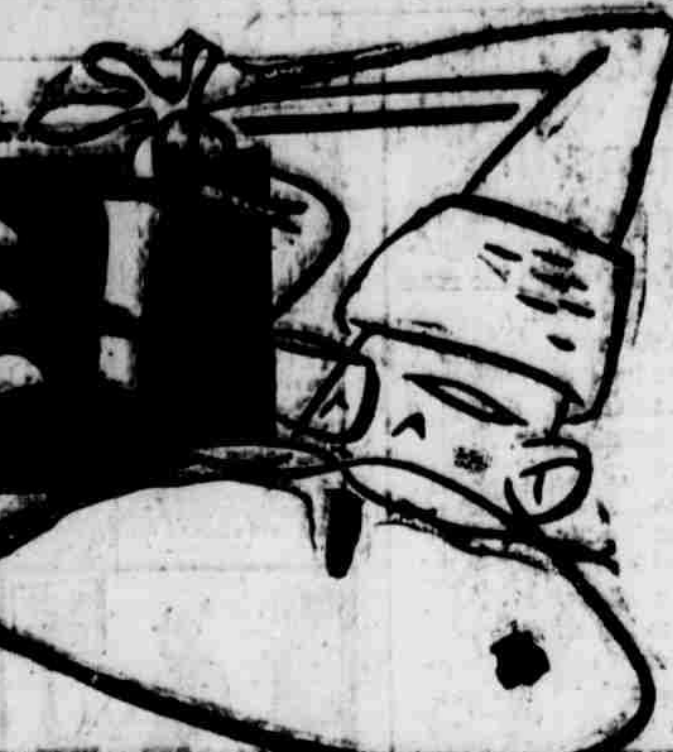

### 41,000 Miles Of Oil Well

Suppose all of last year's oil drilling in this country had taken place in one spot. The hole would have gone the impossible distance of 41,412 miles, or 5 3/4 times through the earth.  
 All this drilling has made it possible to steadily increase our known oil reserves during years in which consumption has soared to almost unbelievable levels and has set new record after new record. And looking for oil is mighty costly proposition these days. For one thing, only one wildcat well in nine finds oil at all—the other eight are just useless holes in the ground. Really big strikes, of the headline making nature, are extremely rare. On top of that, the wells get deeper and deeper, and costs tend to rise geometrically when that is the case. And the price of everything the oilmen must buy, from labor to casing, has gone skyward.  
 Yet since 1925, the cost of gasoline has risen a mere 12 per cent—a small fraction of the increases registered by most commodities. Putting it another way, in 1948, the average worker earned enough in an hour's time to buy seven gallons of gas—today that same hour of work will buy nine gallons. So, measured in terms of work, gas is actually cheaper than it used to be—in addition to being of much higher quality.  
 The oil people have been telling us that "with today's gasoline you're driving a real bargain." The facts back them up.

### Six Tests On Spending

J. Cameron Thomson of the Committee for Economic Development suggests six pragmatic tests to apply to every demand for new or increased federal expenditures. Here they are:  
 1. Does the request fill a real need?  
 2. Is it a need which only government can supply?  
 3. Must the need be met by the federal government?  
 4. Will spending by the federal government meet the need to a degree to make it worthwhile?  
 5. If it is an extension of an existing program, has the spending on this program been efficient?  
 6. Must the spending be done now?  
 If those tests were applied, and the honest answers firmly acted upon, we'd see a startling drop in the federal budget.

### Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN, Tex.—Pleas for Bascom Giles' release are mounting. Latest activity is a petition signed by 103 Austin citizens, filed with the State Board of Pardons and Paroles. Earle Ed Burkhalter, member of the Travis County Parole Board for the past five years, submitted the request. hopeful that Giles can be home for Christmas.

Giles is serving a 6-year sentence, in Huntsville, for his part in the veterans land scandals. He was eligible for parole last April. However the Pardons Board contended that his release "would not meet with community acceptance." Burkhalter's petition is the result of that statement.

Burkhalter said that he knew Giles only casually and had not consulted any of Giles' friends or relatives when he started the petition. He did say, however, that he felt that Giles' wife and family were being punished beyond the intent of the law.

"Mr. Giles has taken his medicine without pursuing the generally accepted course of taking advantage of all the technicalities of the law," Burkhalter commented. "He made restitution in civil procedures of all the money that was asked of him by the state's Attorney General."

In commenting on the petition for release, Rogan Giles, son of the former Land Commissioner, stated that the petition "confirms reports we have been receiving from all over the state, that Dad should be treated just like anyone else and be paroled."

Three of the nine members of the corrections board, the policy-making group for the prison system, recently said that Giles should be paroled. They praised his spotless prison record and termed him an "excellent risk" to society. One member, Lewis Nordyke of Amarillo, described Giles as a "political prisoner."

Giles entered the Huntsville prison on Jan. 10, 1956. As a trustee he earns double time. There, fore, without parole, he will be discharged Jan. 21, 1959. Also he has made several blood donations, each of which entitles him to a 30-day commutation.

In view of these earnings Giles already has completed the three-year sentence given him in his jury trial. The balance of his time is the result of a guilty plea that followed the jury trial.

Prison officials state that he has been a model prisoner.

**PEACE AND QUIET HERE** — Legislators have left. And Christmas decorations are going up in the State Capitol.

But Christmas in the Capitol, as elsewhere, may be a bit blighted this year by thoughts of upcoming bills.

Before adjourning, the lawmakers passed a \$325,000 appropriation to pay second session expenses. Four different special funds had to be tapped to scrape it up.

This, added to State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert's forecast of a \$20,000,000 deficit by 1959 heightened lawmakers' gloom and dissatisfaction at session's end. Some predicted they would have to come back in January to pass a tax bill.

Gov. Price Daniel said "no" to another session. Even if the comptroller's forecast proves correct, said Daniel, the 1959 session can take care of it. But the governor said he had real hopes that a rise in oil production would bring in more revenue and avoid the deficit.

**ACCOMPLISHMENTS QUESTIONED** — Seven major bills were passed in the two special sessions called by Governor Daniel this fall.

First session turned out laws on water planning, lobbyist control, crime study and practice before state agencies.

Second session turned out three laws aimed at strengthening local control of schools, particularly in regard to segregation. Last one to pass authorized county judges to require registration of organizations they feel are interfering with school operations.

In reference to the sessions Governor Daniel said he felt "very good" about them. In the first session they completed enactment of the 52-point program he submitted originally, said Daniel. "Old political pro still are fussing," he commented, but "we've never had so much mail from the grass roots voicing approval."

Critics contend, however, that the new laws are an empty victory.

Their view: (1) Measures on water planning, lobbyists, etc., were so riddled with amendments they'll have little effect. (2) Second session school bills won't stand up in court and will, therefore, prove a disappointment to the people who wanted pro-segregation laws. (3) Whole thing cost the Governor support of the Legislature and took nearly \$2,000,000 from an already overstrained state treasury.

It's a debate that likely will continue until voters have the last say in next summer's primary.

Census Bureau figures just compiled on farmers and farming tell a story that may shock and surprise you, as it did us.

Farming, hints the Bureau, like the old grey mare, "ain't what she used to be." And what is more, the changes in the next 50 years may be even more surprising than in the years since just before World War I.

The results of the survey amazed even veteran Agriculture Department officials. Secretary Benson called events of the past half century "an agricultural explosion." More staid Bureau officials called it an "agrarian revolution."

Whatever you may call it one "Give the gift of life for Christmas."

That is the slogan for holiday driving agreed upon by the Texas Safety Council and Governor Daniel. Objective is to prove the usually-right statisticians who say that 115 Texans will die in traffic accidents this holiday season.

To make drivers safety-conscious, an all-out program is being launched by the Governor's office, Department of Public Safety, Highway Department, schools and military installations and the Texas Safety Association.

Last December's traffic accidents took 252 lives, 108 of them during the holidays.

**APPOINTMENTS DUE** — Governor Daniel says he hopes to have some 100 appointive jobs in state government filled by Christmas.

During the session several legislators publicly needed the governor about the pile-up of vacancies in state boards, departments and agencies.

### The Sandhills Philosopher Scientists For Both Outer Space, Appliances Needed

Editor's note: The Sandhills philosopher on his Johnson-grass farm is taking an earth-bound view of the need for more scientists, his letter this week indicates.

In nearly everything I've read lately, regardless of the name of the newspaper that turns up out here, there has been a lot of talk about the need for more scientists in this country.

As I understand it, everybody is arguing the reason the Russians are ahead of us in the rocket field is because they've been turning out more scientists, and we've got to do something about it.

I wish to let you know that I'm in favor of it, for a couple of seasons.

First of all, of course, like everybody else, I'd like to see the United States keep ahead in guided missiles and rockets, although I'll admit I don't find any overwhelming hunger within myself to go out and conquer space. While there might not be any rocks out in space to bust a plow point, no fences to fall down, no weeds to chop, still there's something about the feel of solid ground under a man that's going to make the exploration of space a spectator sport as far as I'm concerned.

But the other reason I'd like to see the U.S. give more science instruction in schools and develop to more than half of the net income of all farmers from the sale of farm produce. Those who stuck strictly to farming for their income had an income averaging 70c an hour for their work.

The fact that this is well under half of the average city wage accounts for a major portion of the farm-to-city movement. Another reason is the fact that many farmers are reaching 65 years of age and applying for Social Security payments.

The farm-to-city trend may not keep up at the rate reported by Census, but so long as higher-paying jobs are available in cities the movement is likely to continue. Officials think farm population likely will level off at about 7 per cent of the national total somewhere around 1975.
