

#### To House Payne-Shotwell Hospital & Clinic When Completed

TO BE SPE

NEW STRUCT

As announced by Drs. C. E. Payne and I. T. Shotwell, Jr., plans are completed and work is expected to get underway next week in the construction of a new building to house the Payne-Shotwell hospital and clinic.

To Cost \$100,000

The contract for the erection of the new structure, which will represent an investment of about \$100,000, has been awarded to W. G. McMillan of Lubbock, who will let the various sub-contracts to lo cal concerns as far as possible, and use 90 per cent local labor.

Location 5th St. and LFD Drive The location for the new hospital will be LFD drive and East Fifth street, with the property extending from the Cooper apartments southwest to the Methodist church.

W. L. Bradshaw of Lubbock was the architect, who prepared the plans of the building, which will be of light brick exterior; of modernistic design and treatment, and of concrete and steel construction, making it absolutely fireproof.

To Be 2 Story

The structure will be two story 50 feet wide by 135 feet long, and when completed will afford a total floor space of 27,000 feet.

The building will be completely air-conditioned, with special arran gements whereby the air will be zoned, so that the atmasphere from rooms occupied by patients with contagious diseases will not be me circulated through the building.







#### The Siren Sound of "Oil"

Farmers of the Plains, are traveling in the paths of a most strenuous temptation these days. Oil dealers and doodlebuggers, have filled their purses with lease money and their hearts with high hopes. In Texas-no one can turn a deaf ear to the musical notes of "Liquid Gold." It is-of course, a wonderful help to have this extra money thrown in our laps, and everybody is tense with expectancy. But there is a serious danger in every oil boom or even the prospect of oil discoveries.

Many land owners are prone to surrender themselves to the hope for oil fortunes, and neglect their crops and other regular tasks. Then-too, when an oil boom does hit a section, farm laborers abandon the farms for the more profitable wages with the oil crews. It is the history of oil developments and booms; that the farmers who never neglected their fields profited most in the end.

If ever there was a time when farmers of the Plains needed to apply themselves to the complicated problems attending their agricultural and economic welfare; that time is upon us right now. One need not be a prophet in order to foretell that the "Gifts-From-Washington" era will soon be a matter of history only.

We believe that President Roosevelt's agricultural relief was a timely and imperative measure. Only a fool would look forward to an indefinite distribution of government funds for the non-planting of crops. Farmers - throughout the United States, are fully cognizant of the fact that they are pretty much on trial. Federal millions have carried them safely across the depression bogs but they can not and must not look to Uncle Sam as the everlasting supporter. We too-hope that our community may be blessed by the wealth contingent upon oil discoveries. But we are not going to neglect or give up. our jobs and normal ambitions because we have listened to the siren who sounds the call of oil.



It is not to be inferred that Farm Chemurgy is a cure-all for the ills of agriculture. Its function at best is to supplement the farmer's income from his existing outlets with new outlets to factories. Not every region of Texas possesses the marked advantages which East Texas happens to have from a chemurgic development standpoint. For that reason the movement has taken its firmest hold in the piney woods where surveys show a standing wealth of some 200,000,000 tons of wood fiber which can be converted into paper and plaustics, an annual production of 4,000,000 bushels of sweet potatoes as a source of commercial starch, an array of vegetable oil crops from cotton and Spanish peanuts to flax and possibly castor beans. These three fundamental sources of chemurgic raw materials give East Texas a marked advantage over most other regions of the state.

The East Texas Chamber of Commerce and enterprising leaders in Gladewater and Beaumont were quick to realize their natural advantages not only of raw materials in the form of cellulose and lignin, starch; vegetable oils and protein, but the further advantage of cheap and abundant fuel in the form of natural gas and petroleum, vast deposits of iron, sulphur and salt. This combination is not easily duplicated. For this reason the farm chemurgic movement fits East Texas like the proverbial glove. Of course, common sense must be linked with regional enthusiasm. A firm hand must be kept on the bridle. Careful surveys and pilot plants must precede capital to insure the widest possible distribution of its benefits to all concerned. Under sound guidance chemurgy can transform an entire region by revitalizing an agriculture which has sunk to desperate levels but which needs only correct planning to provide new or enlarged sources of farm income.



#### Affidavits Must Be Signed by Workers **Under WPA and NYA**

San Antonio, Feb. 20 .- Affidavits of citizenship must be executed by all persons receiving employment under the terms of the emergency relief appropriation act of 1938 if their employment is to be continued after March 5, it was announced today by State Works Progress Administrator H. P. Drought.

Affecting an estimated 147,000 persons in Texas, the citizenship regulations written into the act by congress requires the execution of affidavits by all WPA and NYA project workers and student aid employes as well as supervisory and administrative personnel.

In releasing instructions on methods of obtaining affidavits, Drought expressed the hope that it will be possible for destitute workers employed in the works program to obtain notary service without cost. WPA administrative employes who are notaries public will be relieved of regular duties to the fullest possible extent so that they may devote their time to notarial work. WPA administrative officers are seeking the cooperation of counties, cities and other sponsoring agencies to assist in providing free notary service to project workers.

Project employes who lose working time in order to obtain citizenship affidavits will be given an opportunity to make up the time lost, Drought said.



If the garden is not sub-irrigated. watering may be done from a hose or a sprinkling pot, and should be sprinkled daily, or kept damp. The vegetables rows are planted five to eight inches apart, being


