This Christmas may not be observed so boisterously and hilariously as some of the past, yet there is a deep undercurrent of same and sensible observance this year that outclasses many of yesterday's Christmases. Millions of hearts here at home will be in the training camps and battlefronts this Christmas, 1943. Very few families will enjoy the presence of all its members as the circle gathers around the family table on Christmas Day.

A fine thing about this war period in which we are now engaged is that many minds are already grappling with peace problems. We are supremely confident that we will win the war. Just how short or long the war will be, no one knows, but as to the ultimate outcome no American has the slightest doubt.

And we all agree upon a desire for a lasting peace. No mere armistice nor makeshift peace will satisfy this time. We do not want a third World War. World War Number II will probably almost exhause the world and its resources; a third World War would complete its destruction.

Christmas time is a good time to think constructively about peace, even if this is a war-time Christmas. We do not want platitudes about peace, maudlin notions about peace, but real peace. Conditions at the close of the war will probably be such that strong methods will be required to insure lasting world peace. Problems surpassing the problems of war will doubtless present themselves at the close of the war. The sanest, wisest and strongest statesmanship and humanitarianism will be required to solve coming peace problems.







During the past 10 years, 2750 loans amounting to more than 61/2 million dollars have been made to finance sound farm and ranch op-erations in the 8 Panhandle counties served by the Plainview association, according to Mr. Snyder.

At their tenth anniversary annual meeting, which will begin at 10:00 a. m., the stockholders will hear reports on the progress and financial position of their associations, said President C. W. Smiley. "They will learn how service has been adapted to fit the real needs of members and discuss further improvements needed. They will also elect a directory."

The farmer and rancher members will be celebrating the building in 10 years of special credit institution of their own, which has a local capital structure of over \$125,000, Mr. Snyder said.


