### Central School Athletic Director

A total of 1,686 students were enrolled in the three local schools yesterday afternoon and several more are expected to enroll before the school week closes Friday.

Primary school has the largest enrollment with a total of 608, with the largest number of students in the first grade, which has a total of 164. There are 156 in the second grade; 156 in the third grade and 132 in the fourth grade. Paul I. Jones is the principal in the primary school. He announced yes terday that there are six new faculty members in the school and they are: Mesdames Hardin, Mo-Cowan, Holt, D. Thornton, Burks and Beck. There are 16 teachers in that department.

Central school enrolled approximately 545 students the first three days, with 116 in the 8th grade; 138 in the 7h; 135 in the 6th; and 156 in the 5th. D. C. Lindley, principal, announced only one new addition to the faculty in that department and that is the addition of athletic director, Pat Patterson.

High school enrollment is approximately the same as last year, with a total of 148 students; 51 in the sophomore class; 72 juniors and announced that a total of 22 teachers make up the faculty. with five coming here this year from other schools. They are, Win Brume, of Amarillo, general super-visor; Mr. Amonette, Lubbock, math instructor; Mr. Jelks, Pangue, Canyon, history teacher, and Mrs. Pierce, Muleshoe, sci

The Dunbar school in the colo ed section of the city has a total enrollment of 178 students.
