

LAMB TO VOTE ON SOIL CONSERVATION SAT.

Meeting Will Be Held Here Tonight To Explain Program

Lem Weaver, Borden, Walter Gray; Others To Address Gathering

In order that farmers may have an opportunity to learn the laws and the advantages of a district prior to the Soil Conservation election in Lamb County on June 15, meetings have been held over the area for the past two weeks.

Meetings have been held at Spade, Fieldton, Olton, Springlake, Amherst and will be conducted here tonight (Thursday) opening at 8:30 o'clock at the Court House, when everyone interested in a soil conservation district for this county are urged to attend.

Lem Weaver, County Agent, will discuss the soil conservation law and Mr. Borden, Farm District Supervisor, of Lubbock, will discuss the operation of the District in Lubbock County and the benefit derived there from.

Walter Gray, of East of Littlefield, one of the farmers who have received some of the benefits of soil conservation, will address the gathering and report how the program has helped him.

Claude Emmons, Assistant County Agent, will give a demonstration on DDT.

A soil conservation meeting will also be held at Hart Camp Friday night.

These meetings are being held to prepare the farmers for the soil conservation election to be held Saturday.

The election in Littlefield will be held at the Court House, and voting will take place over the county at the various regular voting places, as follows:

School Election Set for Saturday

A Message To The Tax Paying Voters of the Littlefield School District

AND INDORSED BY THE ENTIRE BOARD

The Littlefield School Board ask the property owning voters of the district to go to the poll in the Methodist Church Saturday, June 15, and vote. The Board is faced with the critical question of financing an adequate school program for the children of the community.

The amount of money available to pay adequate teachers' salaries, and maintain building and equipment has for some time been inadequate for a modern, up-to-date school. It is critical now since the city of Littlefield has grown out of the "Rural School" class and will never again be eligible to qualify for "Rural Aid" money from state funds.

Since that loss will amount to about \$18,000 annually, the only way to offset it is to ask the taxpayers to vote to authorize the raising of the tax rate from \$1.00 to \$1.50. The property owners are the only people who can do this.

Upon receipt of a petition signed by qualified voters, the School Board has called and ordered the election to be held next Saturday in the Methodist Church.

The present School Board is composed of:

Any of these men will welcome a discussion of this issue with any interested citizen.

Paving Project Is Progressing

The price charged is 30 cents per square foot.

According to Mr. Street, under the WPA paving project sometime ago, the charge made by the City was only 20 cents per square foot.

Mr. Street also added that "It would be an accommodation if all those who are interested in having paving put down would call at the City Secretary's office in the Rowe building, and sign contracts. Mr. Street has been making almost a house to house canvass and stated he didn't mind doing this, but that it will take that much longer to get the job started. He also said that the City would put down sidewalks also if residents wanted them."

Will Vote On Raising School Tax To \$1.50

To Be Held In Methodist Church Jess Elms Judge

A School election has been called for Saturday next for the purpose of voting on the question of raising the school tax from \$1.00 per \$100 valuation to \$1.50 on \$100 valuation.

The election will be held in the Methodist Church with Jess Elms as election judge.

According to the Littlefield School Board, the boost in taxes is made necessary by the loss of teacher salary aid from the state. Littlefield is no longer eligible to receive this aid because the city population has pushed above the 3600 mark. This caused a loss of approximately \$18,000 for teachers' aid.

The Littlefield School officials state they must have this additional revenue to maintain even its present standard of work. Without it, they state, the teachers' salaries would have to be reduced and some departments and services discontinued.

At a meeting of the Littlefield School Board Monday night, Joe Hutchinson, formerly Superintendent of the Sudan Schools, and recently in business in Plainview, was elected Superintendent of Littlefield schools taking effect July 1.

Mr. Hutchinson is a brother of Mrs. Sibyl Moorehead, member of the Littlefield School Faculty.

He served seven years as Grade School Principal of Sudan Schools, when he was elected to the superintendency, in which office he served about three years, leaving the school work for the service. He received his discharge from the armed forces about the beginning of this year, when he purchased a grocery store in Plainview, which he has since been operating.

Mr. and Mrs. Hutchinson have one son, Brodie, a pre-med student of Trinity University, San Antonio.

They plan to buy a home in Littlefield, and make this their permanent home.

Mr. Hutchinson is recognized as one of the outstanding educators of this area—a man who is highly respected and regarded by students. He has always been active in boy scout work, and in all civic activities for the betterment of the City and County in which he lives.

In an interview with Dr. Wm. N. Orr, President of the School Board, he stated he felt that the City was fortunate in securing the services of such a high grade school man as Superintendent.

The Leader joins Littlefield residents in extending a welcome to Mr. Hutchinson and his family.

Jimmie Singer Dies Suddenly Early Wednesday

Last Rites Expected to Be Held Here Friday Afternoon

Johnny (Jimmie) Grafton Singer, 47, prominent local business man, passed away about 7:30 o'clock Wednesday morning at a local hospital, as a result of a heart attack suffered about 11 o'clock Tuesday night.

Funeral services are expected to be held at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon at the First Baptist Church, Littlefield, with Rev. Lee Hemphill, pastor, officiating. Final plans however, were indefinite pending word from relatives in California.

The Masonic Lodge will be in charge of the service at the grave, deceased having been a member of the Masonic Lodge for 20 years, and a member of the Scottish Rite at the time of his death.

Interment, in charge of Hammons Funeral Home, will take place in the Littlefield Cemetery.

Mr. Singer had been a resident of Littlefield since 1924, and connected with the Southwestern Associated Telephone Company as manager and plant man during that time until three years ago, when he sustained a fall at Circle, Tex., when repairing a telephone line, and had been in poor health since that time. At that time he fell from a telephone pole.

Mr. Singer is survived by his wife and two sons, Jack of Hermosa, California, and Neal Singer of the Navy, now at home on terminal leave and five brothers and sisters. The Brothers are C. H. Singer of Littlefield, T. A. Singer of Dimmitt, Texas; W. C. Singer of Nocona, Texas; A. C. Singer of Hobbs, N. M., and O. L. Singer of Hermosa, California. The sister is Mrs. A. C. Hendricks of Roswell, N. M.

Ohio Couple Die In Sudan Crash

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Peterman, two of a party of five persons from Zanesville, Ohio, enroute to the Texas Gulf Coast on motorcycles, were killed at Sudan Saturday morning when the motorcycle they were riding and a truck collided at a street-highway intersection in the city limits.

Peterman, 33, died instantly and his wife about 39, lived only about 15 minutes after the collision which happened about 8:30 o'clock Saturday morning.

As a result of the crash, Johnnie Jay Serratt, Sudan, driver of the truck, pleaded guilty and was fined \$1 and court costs in justice of peace court at Sudan on a charge of not having a commercial operator's license and posted bond of \$1,500 on another charge, filed in Lamb county court, on a charge of negligent homicide in connection with the two deaths, said T. A. Rowland, Texas Highway patrolman, who with Jim Riddles, also a patrolman, investigated.

Sheriff Sam Hutson also went to Sudan to assist Deputy J. D. Chester in the investigation.

The Ohio couple, both on the same motorcycle, were riding southeast on U. S. Highway 84 when they crashed into the dump truck which had been going northwest on the highway before making a left turn onto Commerce street, investigators said. The driver of the truck had just met and allowed to pass, a coupe in front of the motorcycle when he made the turn. The lead motorcycle collided with the truck, throwing Mr. and Mrs. Peterman against the truck near the right rear wheel. Heads of both victims struck the lower part of the body of the dump truck, it was reported.

The five cyclists were on a vacation trip to the Gulf coast at the time of the accident. The three who were unhurt, after the mishap, decided to crate their machines and ship them home and return by rail. They were Mr. and Mrs. Edward Rodgers, on one motorcycle, and Louis W. Donkey, Jr., of Zanesville.

Bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Peterman were taken by Sudan residents to Payne Funeral home at Amherst. The bodies were then shipped by this funeral home to Zanesville, Ohio, for burial.

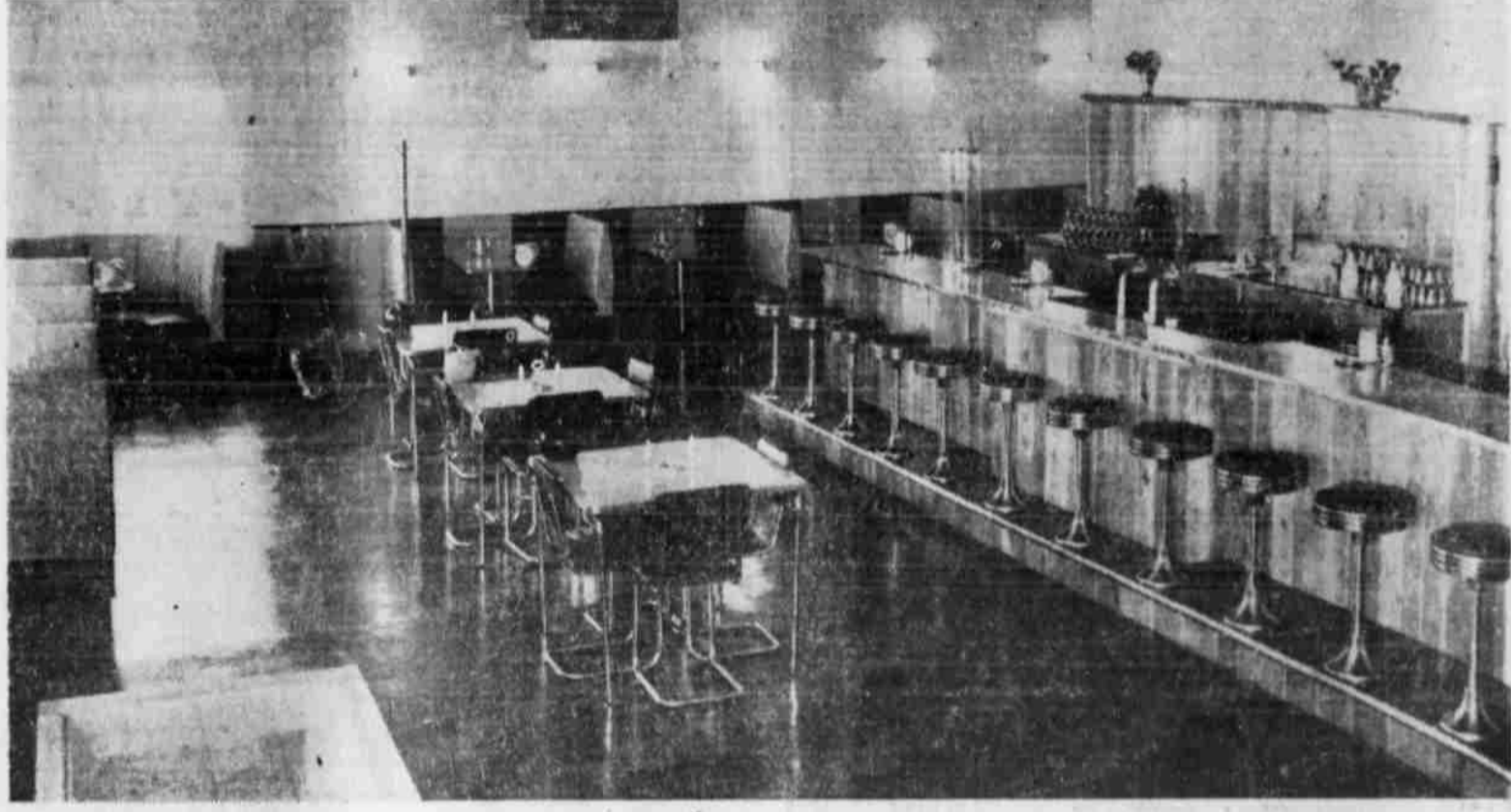

War Heroes Will Talk Over Radio For Price Daniel

An old-fashioned political rally with placards heralding the counties represented will be staged by friends of Price Daniel in the City Music Hall at Houston, Texas, next Monday night, June 17, to officially open his statewide campaign for Attorney General. Heroes of World War II will be among the speakers on the half-hour radio program which will

be broadcast over all stations of the Texas Quality Network and the Texas State Network from 8:30 to 9:00 P. M.
 Supporters from nearly 200 counties have already indicated their intention of attending the Rally in behalf of Price Daniel's candidacy. The first fifteen minutes will be taken up by key speakers from various sections of the State, including GI veterans whose exploits have been recorded in the pages of Army and Navy history. The last fifteen minutes will be used by Price Daniel in presenting for the first time to a state-wide audience the principal issues of his campaign for Attorney General.

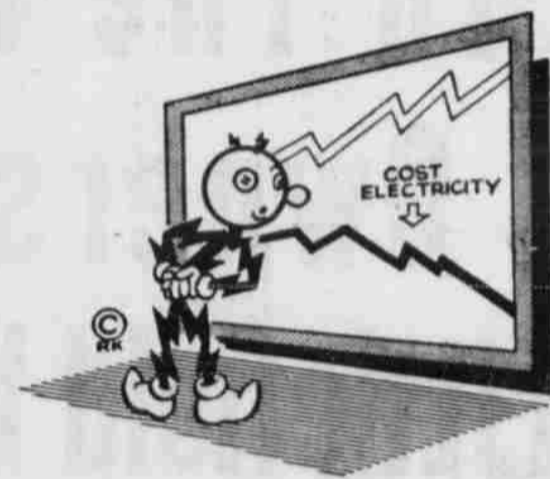

Farm Production Recommended

A series of emergency measures to help farmers tide-over this summer's grain and feed shortage, and get fullest meat, milk and egg production for world food needs, was recommended by authorities of the American Foundation for Animal Health.

Recommended steps include these

"Cull out unproductive, over-age, or sterile animals.

"If dairy cows do not conceive, have them examined for sterility, and dispose of them if they cannot be restored to usefulness.

"Make maximum use of pasture to conserve on grain.

"Keep abundant water before animals and poultry; it increases gains, reduces feed consumption.

"If livestock disease outbreaks occur, segregate well animals promptly. Every animal lost to disease means a complete loss also of the feed it has consumed.

"Have stock vaccinated against preventable diseases, such as hog cholera, swine erysipelas, anthrax, and such diseases as may be periodic threats in the locality.

"Do not feed straight grains; that is wasteful. See that grain rations are carefully balanced with supplements to stretch feed supplies."

The Foundation points out that there is likely to be a serious shortage of meat, milk, and poultry products next winter, and that these will be excellent property if farmers can carry them through to the fall and winter season.

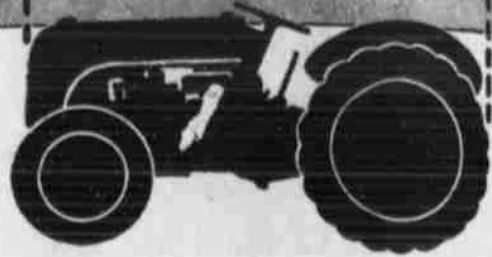

Formal Opening Of New Cafe and Bus Depot Announced For Saturday

Lovely New Eating Place To Be Known As Pope's Cafe

New Fixtures and Equipment Installed Throughout Building

Littlefield's beautiful new bus depot, located on highway 84, just west of the City, has been completed and will open for business Saturday. Mr. and Mrs. Jack Pope, who have been in charge of the bus depot at the old location, Cotton's Cafe, will continue to be managers at the new station, and will also move their cafe business to the new building, where they will operate same under the name of Pope's Cafe.

This structure is 40x60 feet in size, is of concrete tile and stucco construction on the exterior, of a white color, trimmed in cream.

R. L. Byers, owner of the building, personally supervised the construction, while Mr. Pope built the fixtures, which are beautiful in design and of solid oak wood with a light oak finish.

The interior of the building is decorated in an off-white shade, with buff trim. The cafe tables are on stainless steel bases with formica tops, in natural linen color, and will not scratch or burn. The floor of the building is of asphalt tile in colors of brown and ivory.

The chairs are upholstered in brown and antique ivory. The backbar and counter are of solid oak and finished in natural color. A stainless steel coffee urn stand with stainless steel canopy and 54-inch stainless steel water station are also included in the new equipment.

New fixtures and equipment have been installed throughout the establishment. The colors of brown and ivory are carried out throughout, including the interior decorations, the equipment and supplies, even to the dishes, which are of a brown and ivory design.

The new building will afford twice the seating capacity as enjoyed at Cotton's Cafe, and will provide room for about 75 persons. Facilities include a 30 ft. serving counter, ten regular sized booths, one round large booth for group serving, and three tables which can be arranged to accommodate 12 or 14 persons.

The structure is equipped with an overhead heating unit, and a 10,000 cubic foot washed air cooling unit.

Pvt. Fred E. Grisham Stationed in Italy

Pvt. Fred E. Grisham, son of Eugene E. Grisham of Star Rt. No. 1, Lamb County, Texas, has been assigned to the 30th Signal Heavy Construction En., a unit of the Peninsular Base Section, the Army Service Force in Italy.

PBS served and supplied Fifth Army and the ground crews of the U. S. Air Force and Navy during the entire Italian Campaign. The Base is commanded by Brigadier General Francis H. Oxx.

After arrival in Naples port, Pvt. Grisham was transferred to the 7th Replacement Depot for processing according to Army skill and civilian specialty. At the depot he was provided with bed and mattress, adequate blankets and Post Exchange supplies in buildings of the "college" area in Bagnoli. Within thirty-six hours he boarded coach trains to Leghorn. Enroute here the train stopped at Rome where a hot meal was served. At Grosseto, almost midway between Rome and Leghorn, coffee and doughnuts were provided in a railroad station club of the American Red Cross. At arrival at Leghorn, the soldier went to the 1st Staging Area to be transferred to his assigned unit in the near vicinity.

PBS rehabilitated the ports of Naples, Anzio, Civitavecchio, Piombino and Leghorn in support of Fifth Army's drive to the Italian Peninsula. PBS also played a major part in the mounting of the Southern France invasion.

H. C. Pumphrey Jr. left recently on a several weeks' vacation trip. He visited a cousin at Denton, Texas, and relatives at Henderson, following which he will spend some time with an aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Pumphrey at Texarkana, Texas, before going to Bentonville, Ark. to visit his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Pumphrey. After his visit in Arkansas Mr. Pumphrey may go to Chicago, Ill.

Pvt. Grisham attended Littlefield High School and was still a student, prior to his entry into the Army, on June 14th, 1945. He took basic training at Camp Roberts, Calif. before coming overseas.

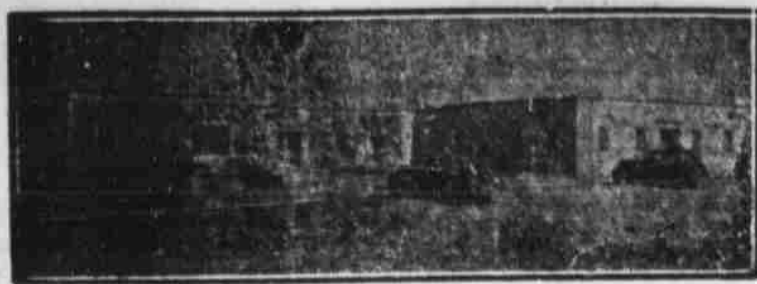

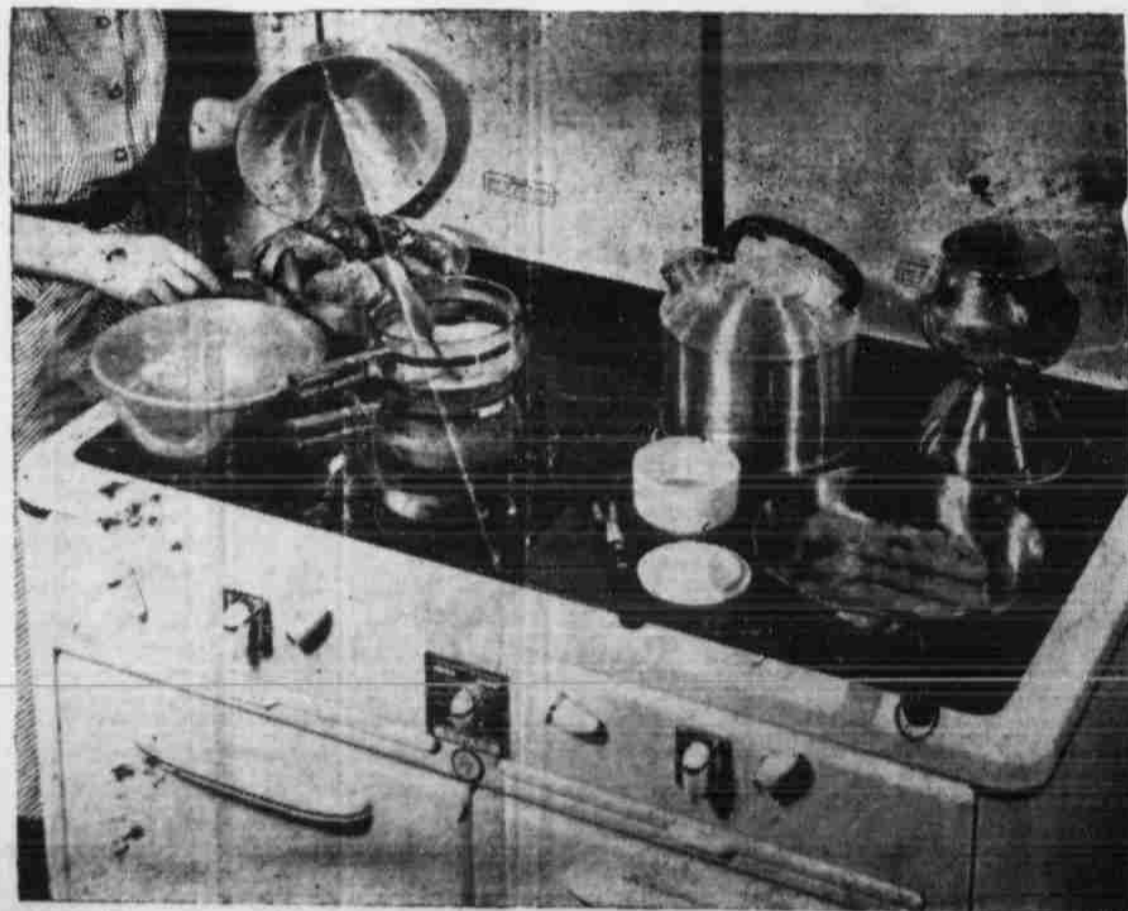

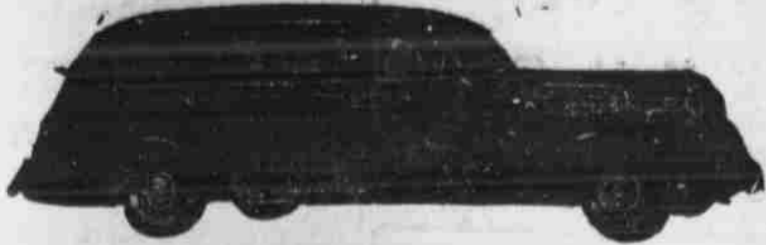
HUDSON DEALERSHIP TO BE ESTABLISHED BY H. L. ATWOOD IN COTTON'S CAFE BLDG.



**Third Trial In Sight
 In Newton Case**

A third trial, probably this summer, is in sight in the case in which Dr. W. R. Newton, Cameron physician, is charged with assault to murder the late Dr. Roy E. Hunt of Littlefield.

Dr. Hunt was shot down on the Littlefield-Lubbock highway, about three miles east of Littlefield, when he answered a call on the night of May 21, 1942.

Dr. and Mrs. Hunt were later murdered as they lay asleep in their bed in their Littlefield home. A paroled convict, Jim Thomas, is now facing a third trial in connection with the murder of Dr. Hunt.

Trial of Dr. Newton for a second time on the assault to murder charge got underway Tuesday morning, May 28 before Judge C. D. Russell in District Court at Plainview. Newton had been previously tried and convicted and assessed a penalty of seven years in the penitentiary. He appealed the decision and the case was reversed and remanded.

Judge Russell overruled a defense motion for a change of venue.

The jury received the case for deliberation at 9:10 p. m. Monday, June 3, and one hour later reported that it was hopelessly deadlocked 11 to 1.

Judge Russell discharged the jury and declared a mistrial.

District Attorney Harold M. La Font directed the prosecution, assisted by E. A. Bills, Littlefield, and Meade F. Griffin, Plainview.

Defense attorneys were Camp and Camp, Cameron; E. D. (Dusty) Miller Amarillo; Robert Lyles, Angleton; T. Wade Potter Littlefield, and Frank R. Ray, Plainview.

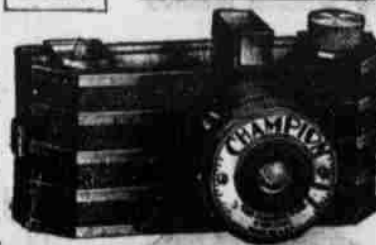

Demand-Good For Better Grade Of Cotton

(USDA)—Prices were higher for cotton, lambs and cattle, steady for grain and hogs, and slightly weaker for vegetables and poultry and eggs last week, reported USDA's Production and Marketing Administration today.

Prices for spot cotton advanced about \$1.75 per bale during the past week, but market activity decreased due to scarcity of offerings. Demand continues good for most of the better grades. Trading in the lower grades increased as this was the principal source of supply. Inquiries for new crop cotton increased and some substantial sales were reported. Sales in the 10 spot markets totaled 66,800 bales for the past week compared with 82,600 bales the previous week and 124,500 bales a year ago.

Tight supplies of grain and feed continued to bring ceiling prices. Little movement of new crop oats and wheat was reported.

Last week saw slightly weaker prices for eggs and poultry at most southwest terminals compared to closing prices of the previous week. Demand was slow to fair. Heavy rains tended to clog receipts at country points. Current receipt eggs brought 30 cents a dozen, Fort Worth; 31 cents, Dallas and Denver; and 32 cents, New Orleans. Heavy hens sold at 23 cents a pound, Dallas; 23 to 24 cents, Fort Worth; 25 to 26 cents, Denver; and 28 to 31 cents, New Orleans. Most markets quoted fryers at 30 to 33 cents.

The rail strike and heavy rains hindered vegetable shipments last week. South Texas tomatoes were slightly stronger early in the week but declined Friday. Lug boxes of U. S. No. 1, six by six and larger sold mostly at \$2.25 to \$2.35. Fair demand kept South Texas corn about steady, but offerings were too small Friday to test values. North Texas onions were slightly stronger near the end of the week. U. S. Commercial and U. S. No. 1 Yellow Bermudas were quoted mostly around \$2.25 to \$2.50 per 50-pound sack. Louisiana sweet potatoes were about gone. Watermelons began moving with Texas Black Diamond or Florida Cannon Ball quoted at \$5.50 to \$6 per hundred pounds for 30-pound melons.

Livestock receipts were light last week because of the rail strike and the holiday Thursday. Most southwest markets reported active cattle trading at steady to stronger prices. Houston quoted medium prices. Houston quoted medium steers and yearlings at \$13 to \$14.50 per hundred pounds and medium cows at \$10.75 to \$12.25. Medium cows brought \$10.75 to \$12, San Antonio. Fort Worth moved medium beef steers and yearlings at \$14 to \$15.50 and common and medium cows at \$9 to \$12. Medium and good yearling steers and heifers ranged from \$12.50 to \$16, Oklahoma City. Bulk medium and good slaughter steers and yearlings realized \$14 to \$16 at Wichita. Denver quoted common and medium cows at \$10.50 to \$12.75.

Sheep and lambs were up 25 cents to a dollar at most southwest markets Friday compared to prices of the previous week. Good and choice spring lambs brought \$13 to \$14.15, San Antonio; \$14.50 to \$15.25, Ft. Worth; \$15.50, Oklahoma City; and \$15.50 to \$16, Wichita. Good and choice clipped lambs, mixed numbers 1 and 2 pelts, moved at \$16.25, Denver.

**First Load of
Wheat Received
At Sudan Elevators**

The first load of the 1946 crop of wheat received in Sudan was brought in by Jess Shirley from his farm about one and one-half miles west of town, and was sold to the Sudan Elevators for \$1.70 per bushel. The load weighed out 6,570 pounds, or 109½ bushels, which, at \$1.70 per bushel, netted the grower \$186.15. A premium of \$67.00 for the first load of wheat was made up among local business men which brought the total for the load up to \$253.15.

The wheat showed a test of 60 with 14.06 moisture content, and is producing 18 bushels per acre, which is a much better yield than Shirley had anticipated from the acreage. It is the earliest Sudan has ever received its first load of wheat, according to local elevator men, and loading of the first car of the 1946 wheat crop started at Sudan Thursday, at the Sudan Elevators.

According to latest government regulations, growers are required to sell 50 per cent of the grain stored by them in elevators and, in turn, elevators are required to sell 50 per cent of the grain they purchase to government agencies.

The Sudan Elevators and the Shannon Elevator, two of the largest in this immediate area, have a storage capacity in excess of 180 cars.

The yield of wheat in general in this area is considerably higher than earlier estimates of many growers, and perhaps an earlier estimate of an approximate 60,000 bushel yield for the area will be considerably upped before the harvest is finished.
