County Employment 5 Per Cent Rise

County employment in Lamb County rose 5 percent between 1964 and March 1965, according to one of the nation's leading indicators, "County Patterns" 1965 - Text recently by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of Economic Analysis. Business Patterns, published annually, uses information gathered in the first quarter of each year by the Social Administration coverages in most kinds of industry, but notably agricultural farm workers and the employed.

The number of employees in the county's businesses covered in the report, for March 1965, rose 2315 for the month a year earlier. The average payrolls for the quarter were \$2.1 million and \$2.2 million respectively.

The largest employers in the county in March 1965 total payrolls of \$780,000. The county's largest group of employees had a total of 450 employees and \$275,000 in payrolls.

Lamb County ranked 97th in the 254 counties in the March 1965 in number of employees in businesses covered in the report.

Comparable figures for Texas show the state's employment rose some five percent from 2,197,331 to 2,307,331 between March 1964 and 1965. Total January-March 1965 payrolls for Texas were \$2,607.2 million as compared to \$2,507.2 million in 1964.

Lichte Well May Mean Renewed Oil Play Here

New Field, Sitton Says

The extent of a new oil discovery in the Littlefield area was the object of discussion here this week as a pump was installed on No. 1 Fred E. Lichte, three miles south of the city.

"It's definitely a new field," declared Pete Sitton of Sitton Drilling.

"We're not sure just exactly what we have," said J. C. Williamson of Midland, independent oil operator, in a phone conversation.

First report after the pump was installed said the project swabbed eight barrels of fluid per hour, of which 50 per cent was oil.

Williamson said the project later began making a higher percentage of water, but that clean-up operations were under way for further activity.

The new well is the first production in the location's immediate area. Location is 467 feet from the north and east lines of Labor 24, League 673, State Capitol Land survey.

It is 1 1/2 miles northeast of the Illusion Lake (San Andres) Pool.

Sitton, who completed drilling on the well two weeks ago, said the project is definitely new production.

"There are dry holes between it and the Illusion Lake Pool, and of course between it and the Littlefield San Andres," he said.

Sitton told the Leader that the drilling activity on the Lichte well was the first in about three years in this area.

Completion from the San Andres is being attempted from an open hole section at 4,074-82 feet. The section was acidized with 4,000 gallons, then swabbed eight barrels of fluid per hour, 50 per cent oil.

Oil first was discovered here in 1953 in the Littlefield San Andres, which now has about 65 producing wells.

About four or five years later, the Illusion Lake Pool was tapped, and it now has 35 to 40 producers.

Joyner Named New C-C Head

Street Map At Printer

A brand-new street map, complete with points of interest in Littlefield, soon will be available for residents and prospective residents.

The new literature on Littlefield is now in the hands of the printer, A & B Office Supply. The project was co-ordinated by the agriculture and tourist division of the Chamber of Commerce.

The project is being financed completely by the two Littlefield banks, the Production Credit Association and Littlefield Federal Savings and Loan.

A new Littlefield brochure, showing points of interest complete with pictures and information on the advantages Littlefield offers, was recently put out and paid for completely by the Board of City Development and General Telephone Co.

Joyner, who will succeed Arthur Duggan Jr. as president of the Chamber, told the group: "I'm probably the greenest president of this organization in many years, but I will work hard. I will expect your cooperation and help, because we are going to have a 12-man board. I am going to be just one of the 12, trying to do my best."

Following the election, the board discussed plans for the annual banquet. The event will be held at 7 p.m. Thursday night, Jan. 26 in the Littlefield school cafeteria.

Tickets will be \$3 per person and Charles Duval has been named ticket chairman.

Committees will be appointed in the near future to select Littlefield's "Outstanding Citizen" of the year, and the area's "Outstanding Farmer" of the year.

In other activity, the board authorized closing of the C-C office Jan. 2.

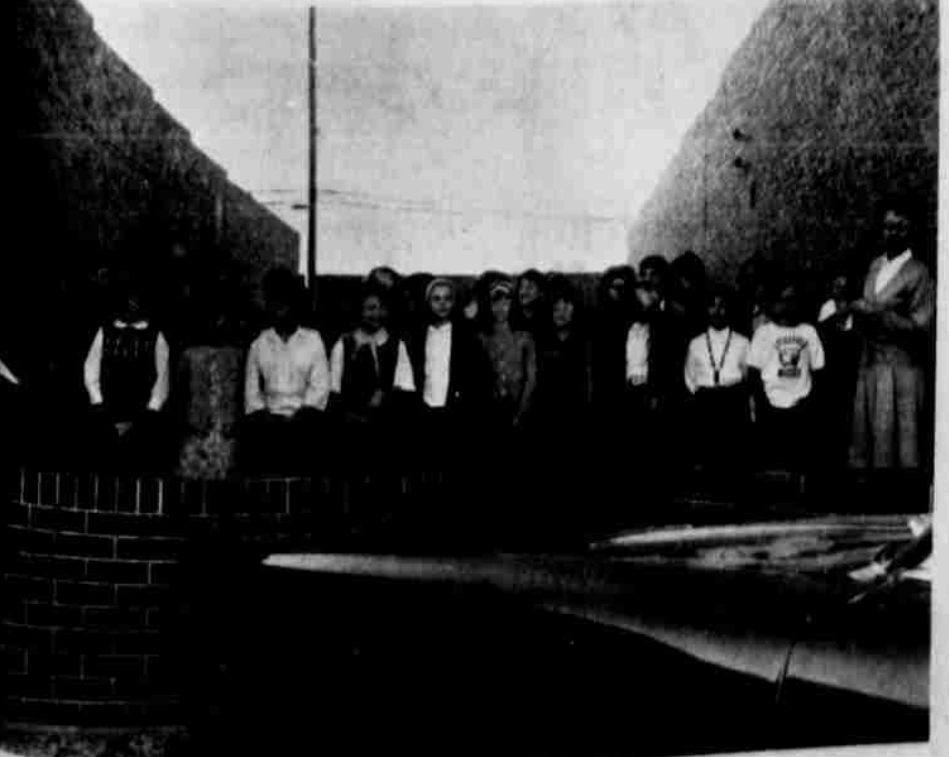

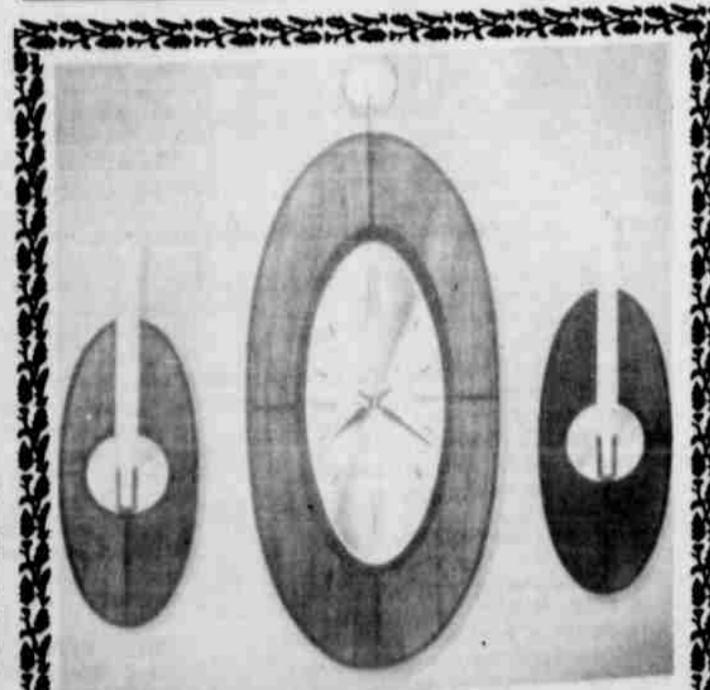

As the fire smoldered on the hearth under a decorated mantle and cast a dim light on a glit-

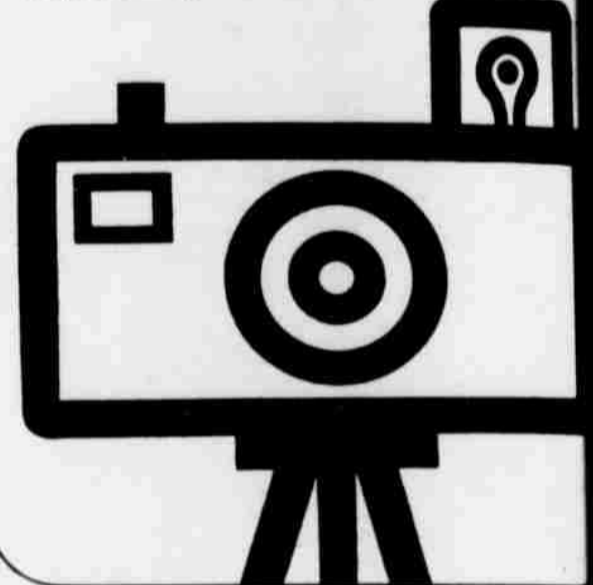

Social Security Taxes Going Up

Social Security taxes go up
Jan. 1.

Employers and employees
will each pay 4.4 per cent in-
stead of 4.2 per cent. The maxi-
mum of \$6,600 is unchanged.
For a person making the maxi-
mum wage, the tax will be
\$290.40 a year for both the
employer and employee. That's
up from \$277.20.

For the self-employed, the
tax goes from 6.15 per cent to
6.4 per cent, an increase of
\$16.50 per year. It amounts
to a total yearly tax of \$405.90
for the man making \$6,600 or
more.

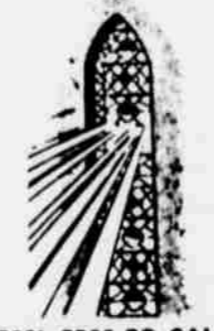
