New Field, Sitton Says

The extent of a new oil discovery in the Littlefield area was the object of discussion here this week as a pump was installed on No. 1 Fred E. Lichte, three miles south of the

"It's definitely a new field," declared Pete Sitton of Sitton Drilling.

"We're not sure just exactly what we have," said J. C. Wil-liamson of Midland, independent oil operator, in a phone conversation.

First report after the pump was installed said the project swabbed eight barrels of fluid per hour, of which 50 per cent was oil.

Williamson said the project later began making a higher percentage of water, but that clean-up operations were under

way for further activity.
The new well is the first production in the location's immediate area. Location is 467 feet from the north and east lines of Labor 24, League 673, State Capitol Land survey.

It is 1 1/2 miles northeast of the Illusion Lake (San An-

dres) Pool. Sitton, who completed drill-ing on the well two weeks ago, said the project is definitely

new production. "There are dry holes between it and the Illusion Lake Pool. and of course between it and

the Littlefield San Andres," he Sitton told the Leader that the drilling activity on the Lichte

well was the first in about three years in this area. Completion from the San Andres is being attempted from an open hole section at 4,074-82

The section was with 4,000 gallons, then swabbed eight barrels of fluid per hour, 50 per cent oil.

Oil first was discoveredhere in 1953 in the Littlefield San Andres, which now has about 65 producing wells.

About four or five years later, the Illusion Lake Pool was tap-ped, and it now has 35 to 40 producers.



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

During World War II the juke boxes had hardly anything on them but patriotic songs. But there hasn't been a good war song written since the Japanese surrender.

Don't blame the song writers. There are guys in the song writing business who can knock out a tune with lyrics in 10 minutes on any subject you can name. But they write what they think will sell, and you can't sell patriotism any more.

Thoughts along this line were inspired recently by disc jockeys dusting off old WW II platters in honor of the 25th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

The tune it inspired, "Let's Remember Pearl Harbor," has lived on as a kind of anniversary song for that 'day of infamy.'

The Big War produced a lot of other good songs, but most of them died a natural death after the smoke cleared. An exception was "God Bless America," which became a second national anthem during the hostilities. I used to get a lump in my throat every time I heard Kate Smith sing it. She's still singing it too, bless her heart, and she must be old enough to draw social security.

Remember "Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition?" That was one of the wingin'est war songs ever written and was No. 1 on the hit parade for many years when Frank Sinatra was nothing but an Adam's apple and a floppy bow tie.

On the sentimental side there was "White Cliffs of Dover," "When the Lights Go on Again All Over the World" and "I Lost (Left?) My Heart at the Stage Door Canteen."

A good jazz number was "G. I. Jive," and in the novelty class was "Right in Der Fuhrer's Face," "Stalin Wasn't Stallin" and one called "Let's Give the Axe to the Axis," or something like that,

Women defense workers were immortalized to "Rosie the Riveter," and man-hungry women sang, "They're Either Too Young or Too Old," while homesick GI's sang, "I'll Be Home for Christmas" and "Don't Sit Under the Apple Tree With Anyone Else But

I think the official Air Force song, "Off We Go, Into the Wild Blue Yonder" was penned during the war, and "Johnny Got a Zero" was sung in praise of an air ace, not ridicule of a dumb student.

We stopped singing about military herois, and wartorn love after Big War II.

"The Ballad of the Green Berets" in mortalized the heroes of Vietnam and pre bably made its composer and performe S/Sgt. Barry Sadler, a cool million despits his off-key rendition of it. But its popular ity was short and his efforts to produce mon of the same have so far been unsuccess

Illinois Sen. Ev Dirksen has entered whole new field with his narration of "Callant Men," an album which also eulogiz the bravery of Americans in Vietnam, Bu it's doubtful that he will shove "Winchester Cathedral" off the top of the popularity charm.

I believe this country is in as much dange as it was on Dec. 8, 1941, when there wa nothing to stop the Japanese navy from sail ing into San Francisco Bay. But you can expect people to unite in song about a wa that's never been declared; that some peo think is unnecessary, and nobody wants



No Snow, Just Sweat

Hand In Your Pocket BY PAUL HARVEY

You could do away with Federal taxes altogether, and still be overloaded. Indeed, if we continue to demand more and more "government services," it could be that state and local government could tax us out of all private property.

It's not just Uncle Sam who has a hand in your pocket. Last year, every American paid \$266 in "other taxes." That's \$16 more than the year before.

In California, which state provides more "free services" than any other, residents paid more state taxes than anybody. The average state take from California taxpayers

We get nothing for nothing. Whether Washington provides it -- or City Hall -- the money still comes out of your pocket -- plus "handling charges."

And while we have been complaining most about federal taxes, state taxes have been increasing faster! In 1963 the average family paid \$235 in

In 1964 the average was \$250. In 1965 the average was \$266. In 1966, the state and local take will in-

crease by another half-billion dollars! 10,3 So, while the federal tax take has increased

300 per cent in 15 years, the state and local tax take has increased more than 300 per cent! And the rate of increase is accelerating. State taxes increased 7.9 per cent in fiscal '65, but increased 12.4 per cent in fiscal '661

Last November an increasing awareness of this tax load was apparent in resistance at the polls to increased state tax levies. South Dakota voted no to a new income levy. Vermont rejected a sales tax. California and Georgia rejected sales tax increases.

New York Congressman John Wydler and others, looking for a detour around this voter resistance, will seek to get a portion of federal taxes returned to the states, especially for educational purposes. Heretofore, however, federal money comes

back home with too many strings attached. And there is no detour around higher taxes, if state and local government payrolls con-tinue to increase (31 per cent in five years).

When we worry about "big government," we must include this everbigger state and local government. We must somehow learn that when we vote for the politician who promises us more, he

is going to cost us more. It is easier for us to criticize federal taxes because it's easier to resent foreign aid than it is to object to new street lights and sewers. Also, we are painfully reminded each April of the cumbersome burden of federal income

But it would be prudent to remain cognizant of the pyramiding cost of state and local government. However less painful, this slower strangulation by taxation is potentially equally deadly. (Copr. T-M, 1966 Gen. Fea. Corp.)

The mass exodus of 25,000 students creates a ghost-town like appearance in the "little-city" surrounding the University of Texas campus. For the Austin shopper, it's a grand opportunity for relaxed Christmas shopping. Parking spaces galore!

A SUBJECT dear to the Heart of many will be up for discussion in the Texas legislature soon, as a porposal for an increase intuition for students in all the state's senior colleges comes to the floor.

The "super board" which was created for

the state's higher education system has passed a recommendation, 10-1, for a hike which would more than double the present tuition rate.

A flat rate of \$50 per semester is charged any full-time student (taking 12 or more semester hours) at the present time. The new charge system, based upon the number of semester hours, would be \$7perhour. A stu-dent carrying 15 hours, the average, would pay \$105 per semester. The average per-hour rate under the \$50 system is \$3,33.

Out-of-state students, now required to pay \$200 extra every semester for attending Texas schools, would only have to pay an ex-tra \$100, making their average per-hour rate

The only dissenter to the recommendation for the tuition hike said that students have enough of a financial burden without facing higher tuition.

United States Senator Ralph Yarborough has called the increase as "short sighted anti-education, and anti-people." He calls it an "effort by greedy big interests to grab all the profits of Texas without any responsibility for educating its people, and by leaving its people in ignorance, continuing the establishment of the anti-people state government we have had in Texas for de-

A report drawn up by the coordinating board showed that three-fourths of the students at state-supported colleges and universities pay higher tuition than Texas students. The University of Texas has the lowest in-state tuition of any major state university. The tuition hike would be expected to bring a total of \$47,8 million into college accounts during the next biennium.

Dr. Harry Ransom, chancellor at the University of Texas, says UT's policy will be the same as that of the Texas Legislature. He hopes any increase will be used exclusively for the improvement of teaching.

In a question-and-answer session discus-sing the tuition hike and other areas of university policy, it was said by Dr. Ransom that there are no plans—or suggestions of plans—to put a limitation on the total enrollment of the university. 'I hope that the limitation of Tayas never reaches the level University of Texas never reaches the level that it excludes undergraduates," he said.

Speaker of the House of Representatives Ben Barnes has said, "I am not personally going to support the tuition raise unless a liberal scholarship program accompanies it. We need to take a realistic viewpoint and provide an adequate scholarship program."

WALTER REUTHER, president of the United Automobile, Aerospace, and Agricul-tural Implement Workers, called America's abundant economy "freedom's great asset," but one which necessitates a balance between ability to create new economic wealth and

the purchasing power of consumers. He made the statement in a lecture series on "La and the Free Society" in Austin. Manage ment representative John E. Branch also was a speaker on "The Future of Labor Management Relations: Collective Bargain ing of When?"

'In a free society, it is wrong to believe you can legislate a little piece of compulsion for—like a little pregnancy—it will grow, Reuther said. More stable labor-manage ment relations will help avoid such legislation, both leaders agreed.

Branch claimed that "the process of ire collective beautiful that the process of ire co

collective bargaining presupposes equality of strength, but the number of weapons give to unions tips the scales in favor of uni and against management. These powers unions have destroyed government guideling for achieving fair wages?"

Reuther suggested the establishment of Public Wage Price Board which would fore corporations to justify economically contemplated price increase in public hearings, making 'private decisions publically responsible.'

The eight-level building will be on a site overlooking the present campus of the university.
