#### **Taos Indians Are** Coming to Palace Thursday, Nov. 1

A group of real, long haired blanket Indians from the Taos reservation in New Mexico will appear on the stage at the Palace theater Thursday, November 1.

They will present ceremonial dances, moon songs, chants, war whoops, tom-toms, etc.

The show will feature John Lujan (Snow Dew), champion hoop dancer of the Southwestern tribes, who was a sensation at the Century of Progress; Albert Lujan (Weasel Arrow), renowned Indian artist at Taos Pueblo, together with other star performers of "The First American" at Albuquerque and the Indian Ceremonial at Gallup.

The Taos Indians are recognized as the most picturesque tribe of Indians in America.

The presentation at the Palace. and other places where the Indians have appeared, was made possible only after lengthy negotiations with the "powers that be" at the Indian Pueblo and the Indian agency at Santa Fe.

The body, accompanied by J. P. White, eldest son of the deceased, passed through Littlefield Monday on the 3:25 p. m. train for Roswell, where he had lived for a number of years. In respect to the deceased, who at one time, in partnership with Major George W. Littlefield, owned 300,000 acres out of the XIT Ranch and lived at the Yellow House headquarters for many years, all

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




